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Kardiac Comeback Nets Wolverines Homecoming Victory

Call them the Kardiac Kids, or a team of destiny, or fortunate, or just plain old lucky. But in any case, the Wolverines never quit Friday and coupled with Hart's win over Vega, the 13-12 victory set up a showdown on Halloween night in Wolverine stadium for a share of the district crown.

Playing before a Homecoming crowd of 1200, the Wolverines resorted to the same old tune which has carried them much of the season, called Big D, which stands for DEFENSE. With the offense unable to move in the first half because of fumbles and penalties, the defense kept the Bovina Mustangs in striking distance and then shut them out the second half.

The Wolverines started their comeback in the third quarter when trailing 12-0 the defense forced a Mustang fumble at its own 25, with Wood and Hood coming up with the ball. Furr got 2 and then Dear exploded to the Bovina 14. Wood and Dear alternated carrying and picked up another first down at the 4. On 3rd and goal from the 1, Dear dove in with 7:29 left. Andrew Monreal kicked the important extra point and it became 12-7.

Bovina was only able to pick up one first down after the ensuing kickoff and was forced into a short punt which gave the Wolverines good field position at the Mustang 47. Using nearly six minutes of the clock, they started a 12 play drive which resulted in the winning touchdown. In the drive Furr, Dear and Giesler carried most of the load with gains of 20, 9, 8 respectively.

After the Wolverines had moved to a first down on the Mustang 9, they ran into trouble. Dear only got 1 on first, and on second that old nemesis the penalty for motion cost them 5.

Lee Brown's pass to Bridges went incomplete and on 3rd

Mark Barton only got 3. Facing 4th and 10, Brown threw a swing pass to Furr, who zigged in, got two tremendous blocks from Wood and Barton, and walked a tightrope down the sidelines, just getting into the end zone. Monreal's kick was no good and that ended the scoring for the night with 11:32 left in the ballgame.

But it didn't end the action. Faced with a do or die situation, Bovina which had been inconsistent the second half, suddenly cranked up with 1:58 left in the ball game.

Starting at their own 35, Martinez ran for 14. Willard the quarterback, ran for 5 and then the Mustangs most dangerous runner, DeLeon got 6. Running out of time Willard cranked up his arm and hit Caldwell on an out pattern for 7.

DeLeon only got 1 on a draw, and then Willard nearly got it all on the next play with 39 seconds left when he found McCain at the Wolverine 11 and he nearly evaded two Wolverines for the score. Two passes were incomplete and Cox could only get 3, so on fourth the Mustangs went for the fieldgoal. The kick

was long enough but off to the left, and time ran out, giving the Wolverines the victory.

Bovina had set up this last ditch effort, by jumping out to a quick 12-0 lead in the opening half. As against Vega, the Wolverines gave the opponent a gift touchdown by fumbling deep in its own territory, this time at its own 10.

It took the Mustangs just 3 plays to score with Shelby getting the TD with 9:35 left in the 1st quarter. The extra point was blocked and later proved to be costly.

Bovina got its other TD on a four play drive which started on its own 44. Willard and DeLeon ripped off gains of 11 and 15 setting up shop at the Wolverine 30. Willard got 2 on an option then hit Sorley on a quick lookin pattern and when a Wolverine went for the interception and missed, Sorley skipped into the endzone untouched, making it 12-0 with 2:39 left in the half. De Leon was stopped on the pitch thus setting up the Wolverines heroics in the last half.

The Wolverines got a chance to score just before the half

when the Mustangs failed to run out the clock. The referees signalled time for one play and with 0:00 left on the scoreboard, Brown threw a desperation heave into the endzone where Wood had beaten his man only to have the ball fall off his arms for an incompletion, thus leaving the Wolverines to come back in the second half.

The win, while not an easy one sets up a showdown Friday night with Hart. If the Wolverines can upend Hart and Vega was to lose another game, the "Mean Green" would represent the district provided they go unbeaten their final two games.

So the Kardiac Kids have another chance on Halloween to bring home the district championship.

GOD IS ALL POWERFUL.

Forget the candy and popcorn balls. Forget witches and pumpkins. Forget ghosts and black cats. Because all the action on Halloween night will be centered in Wolverine Stadium as the dangerous Hart Longhorns come home visiting.

Bringing a brew of explosive offense, the Mean Green will have their backs against the wall, as they seek to stop a Hart offense which has shattered every opponent this season but Petersburg.

The Wolverines, coming off of a Kardiac victory over an underrated Bovina team, will have to improve their offensive play if they are to stay in the same stadium with the Longhorns.

Against Bovina the offense resorted to its old habits of fumbling and drawing penalties which stopped drives. They must put both a passing, as well as running attack together this week, to control the ball and keep it away from the explosive Longhorns.

The Power I set which the Wolverines unfolded last Friday looked good when used and after a week's refinement will be polished. Against Hart

though, there can be no bad exchanges deep inside their own territory if the Wolverines are to win. There can be no mental breakdowns in blocking assignments to foul an already sputtering offensive machine.

The Wolverines must have a perfect offensive game if they are to garner a share of the district title.

The defense which has carried the "Mean Green" most of the season will be put to its severest test, especially in the secondary. Against Bovina they allowed the long gainer and must improve their coverage or Hart's dangerous passing attack will have a field day. The tackling must also improve over the past performance's of the last two weeks.

Hart's dangerous offense centers around Eliazar Castillo, 5' 6", 135 lbs, sophomore quarterback who destroyed Vega by throwing for four TD's. He has a covey of dangerous receivers in Glen Black, Byron Iron and Barry George, all who have above average speed. The Longhorns use variations of the Veer and Power I, and also will use an unbalanced line. The running game uses explosive Donal Robinson at tailback and big Terry Hill (6'2", 195 lbs.) at

fullback.

On defense the play of defensive ends George and Hill as well as that of linebacker Iron played a big role in stopping Vega in the second half giving the Longhorns good field position. Using a basic 5-2 and also a stack 6-3 the Longhorns seem to give up yardage, but always seem to stop the opponent from scoring.

The Wolverines must play better in the first half this week and not rely on a big comeback as they did against Bovina. Hart will be fired to the gills knowing it can all but clinch the championship by winning Friday night. The Wolverines must win and either hope for an upset of Vega or win a coin toss later in the year to represent the district in the playoffs.

The Mean Green is about due to put it all together, if the offense can control the ball and the defense come up with big plays they can pull it out.

The fans will probably see plenty of offense with the scoreboard looking like a Fourth of July explosion.

We believe the Wolverines can pull an upset in a scoring battle.

T.G.S.P.B. Elects Officers

Kress farmer C. C. "PAP" Reed has been re-elected chairman of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board for his second term.

Board members named Larry Witten of Olton to a second term as vice chairman and elected John Gilbreath of Hart secretary-treasurer to succeed Gerald McCathern of Hereford. The new officers were named at the regular bi-monthly TGSPPB meeting during which four newly-elected directors were sworn in.

The four directors, all incumbents, were chosen by fellow grain sorghum producers in the 29-county TGSPPB area.

Named to their second six-

year terms are Ralph Mabry of Petersburg, who received 492 votes; K. B. Parish of Springlake: 474 votes; C. P. Smith of Hale Center, 517 votes and Larry Witten of Olton, 485 votes.

Jerry Don Glover of Lazbuddie, the only other announced candidate, received 446 votes.

Several ballots contained write-in candidates. The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board works to solve production problems, develop new markets for sorghum and provide information on grain marketing.

A course on Sex Education is being offered at the Earth Methodist Church for all High School Students at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, November 8 and each Saturday morning following for five to six weeks.

Rev. Watson has been asked to teach this course by the parents and other concerned members of the church.

Rev. Watson states there is a great need for such a course. T.V., radio, movies, magazines and advertising medias are all bidding for the minds of our youth, even tooth paste is sold to give sex appeal. Clothing is designed to make you look sexy. The exposure of oversized bosoms in almost all media tend to cause frustration to the young or not yet developed girls. Every thing points to sex; yet society demand chastity for the unmarried. Make Children's Celebrations Appropriate For Their Age

A child's age should be one major guide in planning celebrations, especially birthdays, Dorothy Taylor, a family life education specialist, says.

"Younger people, those under 4 years of age, don't understand the significance of a birthday and are often frustrated by the loud noises, the large crowd and the importance of gifts which they cannot easily unwrap," she said.

Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Celebrating the birthday of a child 1 to 3 should be a small affair with parents probably helping the child unwrap his gifts. Small children are not socially developed enough to

respond well to too many people and too much noise. Also, most don't know how to exhibit the enthusiasm that many family members expect over gifts."

She suggested that birthday celebrations for children 4 to 7 years old be limited in number of guests since youngsters this age enjoy small groups, rather than the whole school or kindergarten class.

"Older school-age children enjoy the recognition, surprise and fanfare of the birthday occasion. They like large groups, lots of gifts and many activities for a birthday celebration."

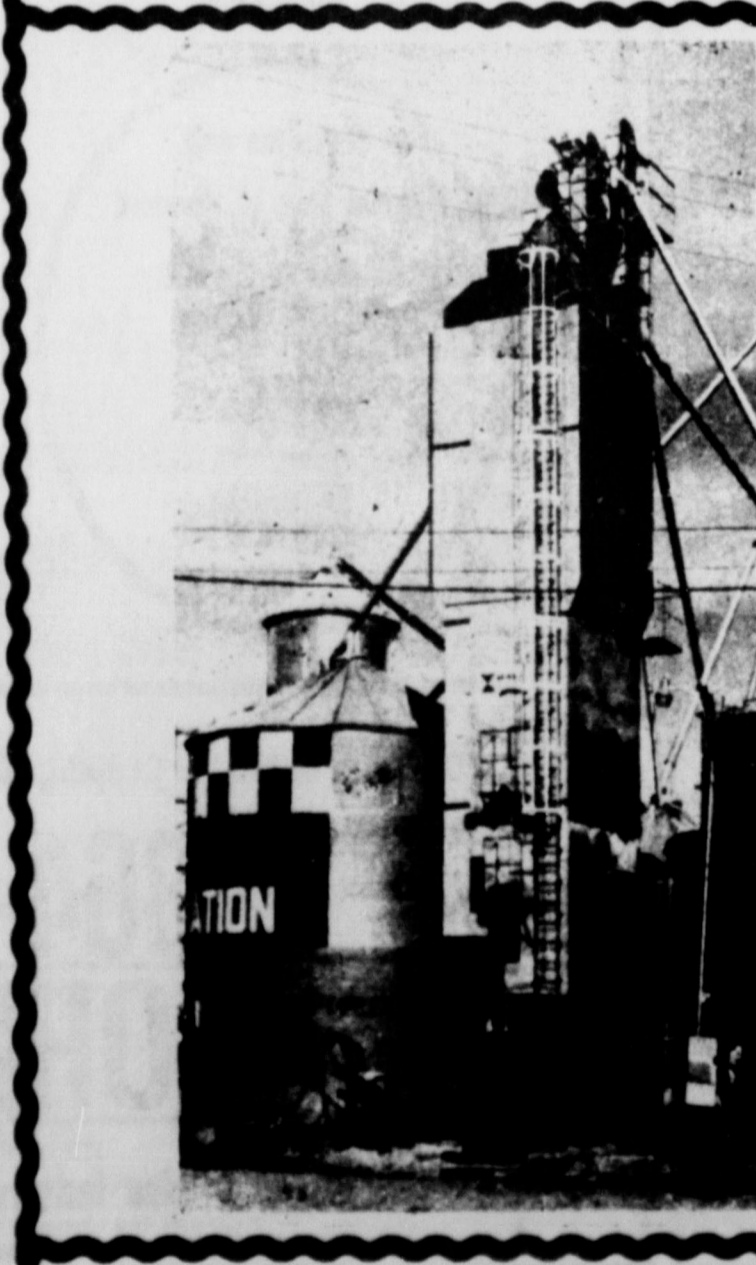

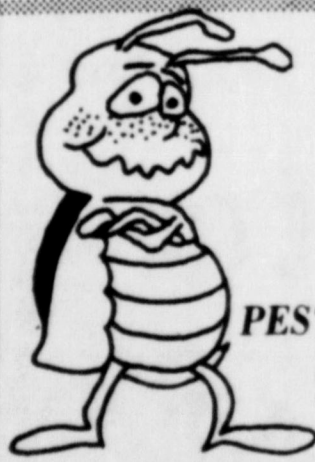
