She was the grandmother of Mrs. B. V. Maples of Earth. The Maples attended funeral services.

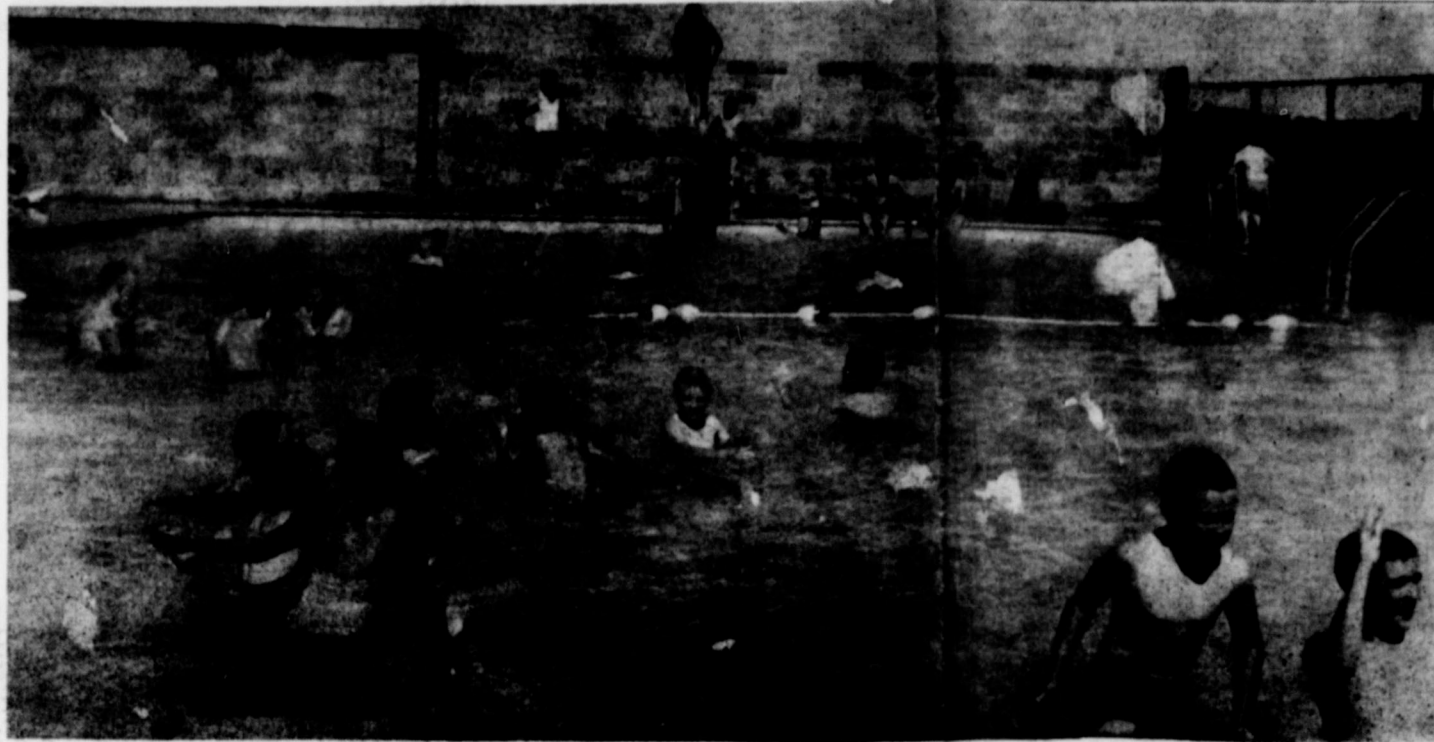

## John G. Tower Wins Senate Race

John G. Tower, College Professor won the election to the United States Senate by 8,000 votes. He is the first Republican ever to be elected to the office by Texas voters.

Tower, who has never held public office clinched his victory against Democrat William A. Blakely, 22 hours after the polls closed.

For quite some time the battle was said to be "nip and tuck."

In Lamb County Blakely took the votes by a meager 103 votes.

Blakely carried 11 of the county's 16 voting boxes with Tower taking three. Two of the boxes, West Littlefield and Hart Camp, gave each man the same number of votes.

Only 2168 county voters out of a possible total of 4251 voted in the special election.

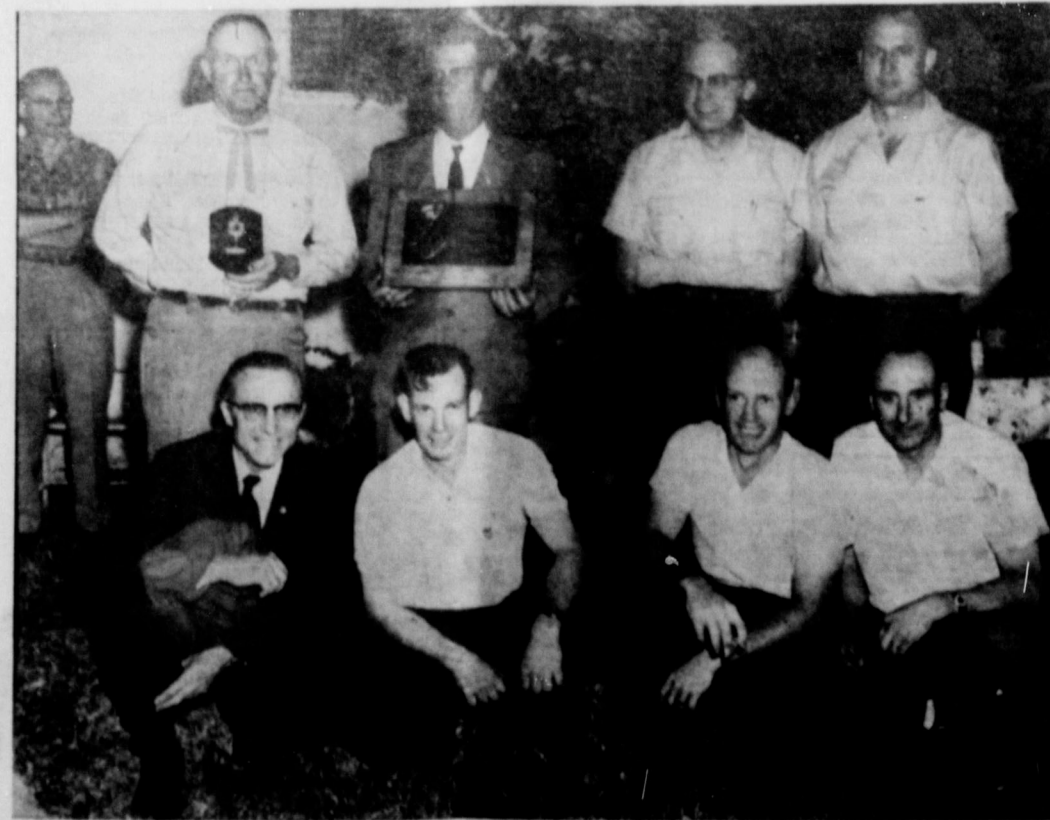
Woodrow Powell was awarded a plaque for his outstanding services as projects chairman.

The heating system will be in operation throughout the season, keeping the water at the same temperature all the time.

Swimming lessons for all ages will be taught each morning.

The pool is open from 1 p.m. each day and will close at 6 p.m. on Sunday and Wednesday.

Admission charge is 25 cents for high school age and under and 50 cents for adults.

Lessons will begin Tuesday morning, June 6, and will be taught each Tuesday through Friday.

Life saving lessons for both juniors and seniors will be from 8 to 10 a.m.

Diving lessons for advanced swimmers will be at 10 a.m.

Intermediate swimming lessons will be from 9 a.m. to 10 a.m. Beginners lessons will be from 10 to 11 a.m. except on Thursday when lessons will be from 11 a.m. to 12 noon.

Ladies classes will be held each Thursday from 10 to 11 a.m. This is open to all ladies including beginners, intermediates and advanced swimmers.

Mrs. Hemphill will conduct these lessons and only ladies are allowed at the pool at this time.

All swimming lessons are free, only a charge of 50 cents per person for the use of the pool.

For Halter Classes, Stallions, Mares, or Geldings in the Appendix are eligible to participate in all approved Halter Classes through their two-year-old year.

Appendix horses do not necessarily have to have registered sire and dam. After two-year-old, stallions and mares must have a registered number.

Entry fee for the Halter classes will be \$5.00 with trophy and rosette for grandchampion mare, reserve champion mare, grand champion Stallion, reserve champion Stallion, grand champion Gelding and reserve champion Gelding.

In the performance classes any horse may show on appendix, national, tentative, or permanent register papers. Horses do not have to show at halter to enter performance classes, person may enter as many horses as he wants in any class, but a rider may ride only one in each class.

Junior and Senior cutting entry fee will be \$25.00, office charge \$5.00, cattle charge \$5.00. \$15.00 will be split 50-30-20.

# Soil Conservation Team Cited By Dept. of Agriculture

Washington—The U. S. Soil Conservation Service employee team at Littlefield, Texas, today was cited by the Department of Agriculture for "an outstanding record of accomplishment" in 1960.

The work unit won the coveted Superior Service Award, the Department's second highest. It was presented to Roland R. Willis, who heads the team, by Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman.

Other members of the unit are Soil Conservationist Bryson T. Kisner, Agricultural Engineer Joe F. Krizek and John D. Harmon, Aid.

The Littlefield unit serves farmers and ranchers in the Lamb County Soil Conservation District. There are 2665 farms and ranches in the area, with 636,300 acres of agricultural land. Engineering work in conservation is needed on 55 percent of the farms.

The work unit, according to State Conservationist H. N. Smith of Temple, was the highest production record among the 264 such units in Texas. It served 1081 farmers and ranchers in the district.

Conservation cropping and range seeding practices more than doubled in the district during the year. Other practices in which exceptional progress was made include brush control, terracing, land leveling, improved irrigation systems, and rotation hay and pasture.

A total of 2939 acres of former cropland was returned to permanent grass on district farms as a result of the work in the district.

The unit under Willis' guidance has worked effectively with other agencies, organizations and individuals toward a goal of complete soil and water conservation in the district.

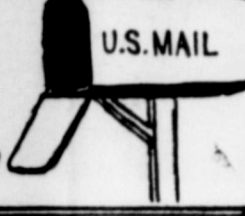

# New Food Dehydration Process Developed

College Station — Scientists of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service are developing a new means of dehydrating potato, carrot or other vegetable pieces so they will be ready to eat after simmering in water for about five minutes. Before this new process is recommended for commercial use, however, cost estimates will be made and storage data obtained.

According to the scientists working on this project, it gives vegetable pieces a porous structure which enables them to take up water rapidly. As a result, their cooking time is shortened from the 15 minutes to 30 minutes usually required to about five minutes. After this short time in boiling water, the dried pieces resume their original shape and become tender and palatable.

The porous structure is obtained by interrupting the drying process at the point where the pieces would normally begin to become hard and shriveled, subjecting them to pressure-cooking, and then suddenly releasing the pressure. This operation gives the pieces a porous structure before they enter the final stages of drying.

An additional advantage of the process is that the final, more difficult drying operation can be performed much more rapidly than would otherwise be possible. Also, considerably larger vegetable pieces can be dried by the new process.

# Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

The High Plains Research Foundation is extending its private enterprise research program into the field of grasses and legumes. The Board of Trustees of the Foundation, realizing the need for additional grasses and legumes that could be used in farming and ranching throughout West Texas, recently approved the new research program.

This research endeavor is being initiated to develop improved varieties of grasses and legumes that would be adapted to both dryland and irrigated farming and ranching.

The Foundation has received international recognition through the cooperation of scientists from all over the world. These scientists have direct to Halfway not only the grasses and legumes but also many varieties of crops for the Foundation's research program. Included are: cotton, grain sorghum, soybeans, sesame, corn and peanuts.

Sixty-six different crop and range grasses, and one-hundred and fourteen legumes have just been planted in the new research program. Some of the seed came from the Central Rainland Experiment Station in Anglo-Egyptian Sudan. Others from Amman, Jordan; Montpellier, Herault, France; Morocco; and Johannesburg, South Africa. Included also are grasses and legumes from throughout the United States.

"These new programs are a part of the search for new crops for the area," Dr. Earl H. Collier, Chief Agronomist, said when he announced that the grasses and legumes planting had taken place. Gumes planting had taken place.

"Finding new grasses and legumes for West Texas is of interest not only to the live stock industry, but also to farmers searching for additional crops. Deep-rooted grasses and legumes will be beneficial by adding humus to the soil and also improve the silt and structure of the soil," Dr. Collier said.

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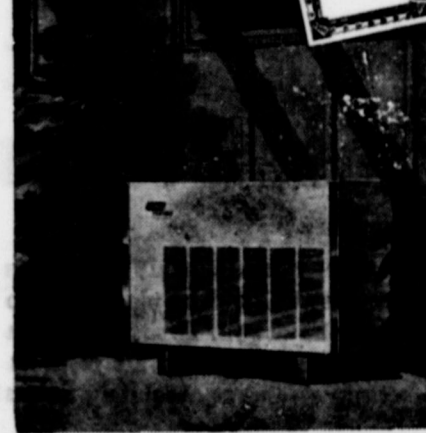

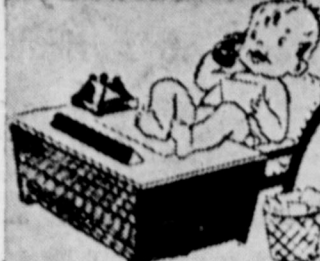

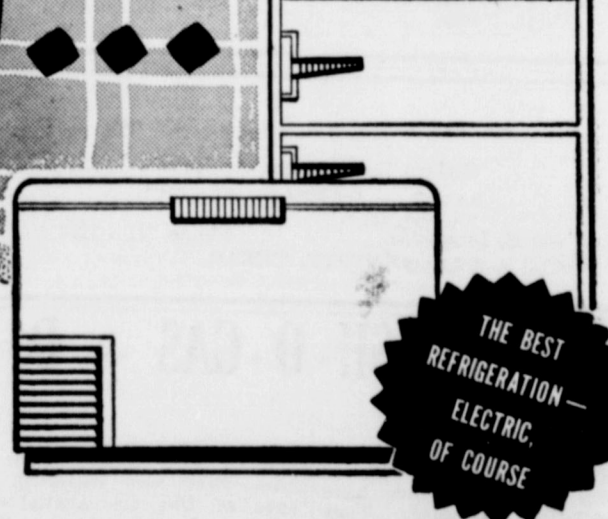

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## Plan Now To Use Cotton Burs Next Fall

College Station — Every year more and more Texas cotton is machine harvested, resulting in a larger supply of cotton burs at the gin. To dispose of these burs, most ginners burn them, thereby increasing the fire hazard.

Research by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has proven, however, that there is a better use for this gin waste. These burs, when applied to the land, will increase cotton yields. In a 4-year study at Lubbock, the use of cotton burs under nonirrigated conditions increased lint yields by an average of 27 pounds per acre, and the residual effect increased yields by 28 pounds per acre for 5 years.

Liberal application of burs results in a better soil-water relationship, thus letting crops use the available moisture more effectively. Soils to which cotton burs have been added are also more resistant to wind and water erosion, and they may have a better infiltration rate.

Angular leaf spot, verticillium

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wilt or cotton seedling diseases have not shown any increase on land receiving six annual applications of burs at Lubbock. In years favorable to angular leaf spot infection, it was more serious where no burs or fertilizers were applied.

Cotton insects which reduce yields and lower grades have not built up to a point in the burnt soil that they nullify the advantage of using burs. In 1951, cotton burs were released by the State Department of Agriculture and the Department of Plant Quarantine for use on the land, provided certain standards in methods of handlings were met by ginners in order to destroy any pink bollworms present.

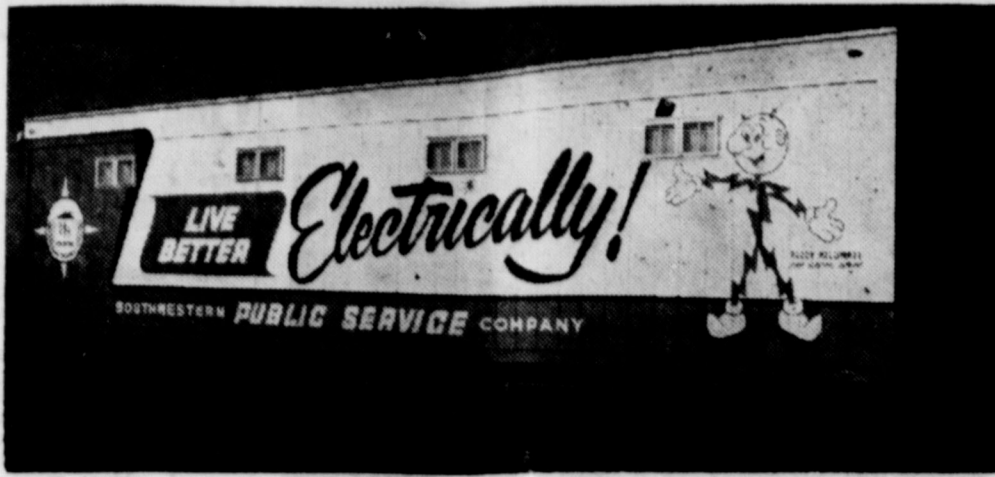

MEMORIAL DAY

On May 30th, we celebrated Memorial Day. To some, it was just another legal holiday; to

others, it provided an opportunity to take the family on a picnic or to relax at home. Some enjoyed the 500 mile race at Indianapolis. But whether we watched the 500 mile race, went boating, relaxed on the picnic ground, or just did the odd jobs around the house, it is well that we realize the importance of the occasion.

Memorial Day is not new. The first Memorial Day was held April 26, 1865. It was called "Confederate Memorial Day."

Memorial Day is also known as Decoration Day and is observed by the States of the North on May 30. The first set date for the celebration by the North was 1868. On May 5, Commander-in-Chief John A. Logan of the "Grand Army of the Republic" issued an order which designated May 30, 1868, "for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who

died in defense of their country during the late rebellion."

Later on, the name Decoration Day was officially changed to Memorial Day. Although most states observe Memorial Day on the 30th, there are a few states who have set aside special days or the observance of the "Confederate Memorial Day."

Whether you believe in the Confederate Memorial Day or Memorial Day as designated as a legal holiday for most states in 1910, it would be well to recall the purpose of the occasion — a day for their country. We are made conscious of those who gave their lives in the Civil War, World War I, World War II and the Korean War. It would behoove all of us to read immortal words of Abraham Lincoln.

"Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting-place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that

Classes are being held from 8:30 a.m. until 11:15 a.m. daily for children ages 3 to 12.

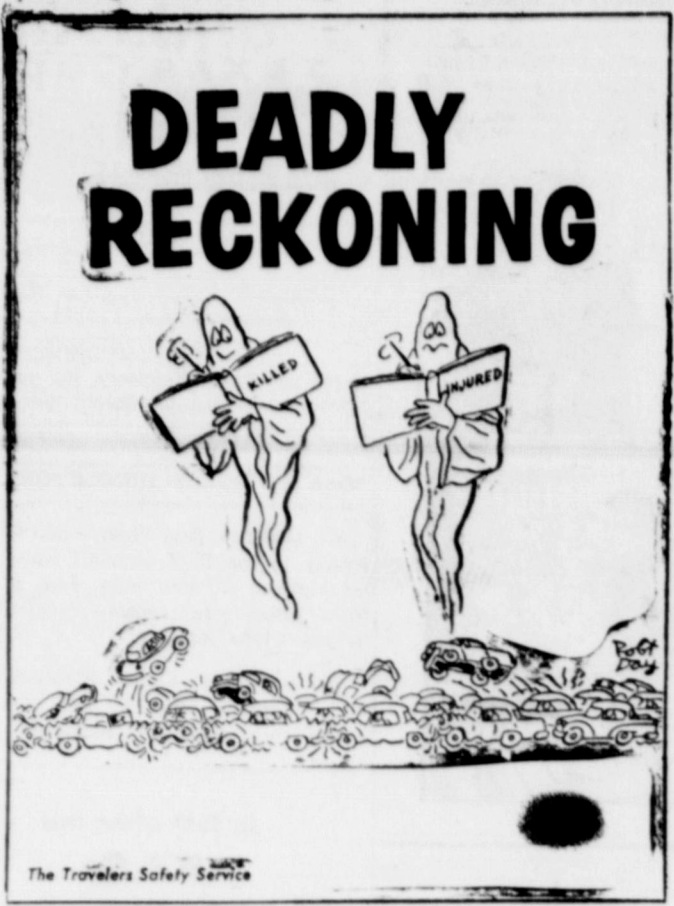

## Deadly Reckoning by Robt. Day

Texas fishing clubs are gaining in popularity in Texas. Seldom does a day pass without some new fishing club being formed in the Lone Star state. Being a 'joiner' we're highly in favor of them. It's our contention that fellowship alone is worth the dues of any organization, not to mention the tips that one receives from fellow members.  
Speaking of TIPS—the latest organization we have become affiliated with is known as TIPS. Spelled out it's Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen. Except for yours truly it is composed of real top-flight fishermen every one of them.  
Head man is Billy Disch, Austin Evinrude dealer. Billy earned quite a reputation, from the Gulf Coast to the Red River and from Caddo Lake to the Rio Grande, for his bass catching abilities.  
Second in command is Jim Roddie, Austin insurance man. If you think he's not good then just consider the fact that he has caught three eight pound black bass kith jig and eel during the past twelve months. That's something few fishermen do once in a lifetime. In fact just one eight pound catch in a lifetime would thrill this scribe.  
But I'm getting off the track. What I want to do is tell you about this bass fishing club that they call TIPS—namely Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen. Top man is not called president. He's referred to as Large Mouth.  
Second in command is Small Mouth.  
Other officers are a treasurer, better known as the Hook; and a secretary who is referred to as the Line.  
TIPS' sergeant-at-arms is dead. All other members are Vice Presidents!  
So if you want to be vice president of something, organize a fishing club like TIPS. In the case of TIPS it's the lowest office you can hold.  
Kinda clever club eh? But you haven't heard everything. Five bucks gets you into the club. That's the application fee. But it takes even less to get you out. Members meet evenings, every night as — The Sinker.

other Wednesday. Miss three straight months of meetings, without an 'excuse' and you're no longer a TIPSer.  
And by the way that's one of the main purposes of the organization — passing on your fishing tips to fellow members.

Dues? There are none. And there won't be any until and unless the club needs more money.  
What do they do besides meet and talk shop, or hear specialists discuss bass, bass habitats, and bass catching methods. They hold contests!

With no dues income, how do they purchase prizes to award to the top fisherman and to the top fishing teams. They charge an entrance fee in each fishing contest. Such events are held every other month and on a different lake each time.

Entry fee is determined largely by the number who sign in. They just divide the cost of the plaques by the number of entrants. Works out fine! If a fellow signs up to fish and fails to show, he sacrifices his entry fee. If he doesn't sign up by a predetermined date he can't enter. It's that simple.

Like to know something about the constitution and by-laws of TIPS? Well, the PREAMBLE reads like this:

"We the bass fishermen of Austin, Texas in order to form a more perfect fishing club, establish fellowship, ensure conversation, provide a means of collaboration, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of bass fishing to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the Texas Invertebrate Piscatorial Sportsmen."

Membership in the club is limited. Each charter member is permitted to sponsor another member; then each new member sponsors another new member until the maximum of 40 is reached.

Every candidate must be approved by the membership committee, then endorsed by the organization as a whole, at an official meeting of the group. When the full quota of members is reached no new members may be added until a regular member drops out or is dropped for non-payment of dues.

As a bass fisherman you will be interested in the fact that each member of TIPS is supplied with a record book in which he lists his catch. The record page calls not only for the size of the bass, its length and girth and weight, but also exactly where it was caught, on what specific lake, at what depth, and on what lure.

Also requested is information as to the time of day, weather conditions, wind conditions, and the temperature of the water.

At each meeting of the organization the fishermen turn in their reports and each is given a badge by the secretary to sew onto his fishing jacket or hat. This badge

is merely a number which designates the size of the fish caught. It's a new method of 'lettering' in sports.

Anyway it's a different club to say the least, and their meetings bring forth dozens of good ideas for fishermen during every session.
