# Gamblin Brings In First Cotton For Earth Trade Area September 15

The first baleof cotton for the 1965 season grown in the Earth trade area was ginned at the Campbell Cotton Gin, Inc., at 5 p. m. last Wednesday, September 15.

The first load of cotton for the 1965 season grown in the Earth trade area was ginned at the Campbell Cotton Gin inc., at 5:00 p.m. last Wed-

nesday, September 15, The load of cotton grown by C. P. Gamblin, weighed 2, 150 pounds and ginned out at 520 pounds, yielding 1,000 pounds of seed,

Gamblin received the premium price of 50¢ a pound for his cotton, and \$50 a ton for his seed. In addition to this, his cotton was ginned free of charge. B. Camp bell, owner of the gin, does this each year as a courtesy to the farmer growing the first

For five consecutive years, the Campbell Cotton Gin Inc. . has ginned the first bale grown in the Earth Trade Territory. Gamblin said pickers began Wednesday morning in his field located 32 miles north

of the Campbell Gin, and gathered the load from a four acre plot in his field of approximately 23 acres.

In preparing his land prior to planting, he fertilized with Western Ammonia 11-37-0 useing 127 pounds an acre, Following the planting of his Gregg seed on April 26, he again fer-tilized his crop, this time use-ing 126 pounds an acre of Anhydrous Ammonia purchased from Western Ammonia, He irrigated the cotton crops twice. Mr. Gamblin has more cotton ready for picking, but recent rains slowed down the har-

Crops all over the area look real good, and grain harvest, which began approximately 3 weeks ago, should resume after a few warm dry days. If favorable weather conditions continue for the next 2 or 3 weeks, cotton harvest should get into



land, where an all-embracing welfare state has been estab-lished. For example, unemployment and extreme poverty have been eliminated and adequate housing, health service and education are available to all.

The story then says "Yet few visiting Americans are satisfied with what they see. They complain of poor service, of a takeit-or-leave-it attitude toward work when other jobs are readily available, of a lack of competitiveness and what they regard as an air of backwardness compared to the United States.

This caused The Wall Street Journal to observe: "The point is simply that any society deliberately fashioned in the framework of governmental gratuities for everything from planting wheat to painting water colors is bound to grow mediocre or worse. That is practically an immutable law, whether the people concerned are New Zealanders, Swedes, Russians, Britons or Americans, and it should not be particularly difficult to see why . . .

Everyone favors the elimination of poverty and of human distress and misery in all its forms. In this endeavor, government inevitably plays a role. The problem is how to help those who truly need help without sapping the initiative, the independence and the ambition of vast masses of people. When that happens, national decadence and decline must follow, no matter how great any country's material wealth may be.

#### Tower Shows Texas Economy Expanding Under Right-To-Work Law

Many Texans have written to me in support of the Texas Right-to-Work law, I continue to believe that Texas has gained a great deal under its present system permitting freedom of choice about union membership. Both labor and management have benefited as our state has out-paced non-right-to-work states in many vital growth areas. Here are some examples:

Obviously, the economy of Texas has expanded at a greater rate than the average of non-right-to-work states. And this has happened in an atmosphere of relative labor-management harmony, I would like to see this progress continue.
Right-to-Work means a man is free to become an active, dues-

paying union member if this is in his best interest. Right-to-Work means he also is free not to join a union if he feels that is best. This is the way of free men. It should continue to be the way of Texans. We should not any more make a man join a union to hold his

ob than we would force him to work for a specific firm, if he wants a job.

Because of our Right-to-Work law, we have a better state, better unions, more jobs, and better labor-management rela-

I will be taking a major part in the extended debate by which we will defend in the Senate the right to work. I am a team captain in this effort, and Texans may be assured that a strong, determined fight will be made to preserve the right to work,
