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## School Receives Federal Grant For Remedial Reading Program

Springlake-Earth school has received a Grant of \$32,000.00 to participate in one of the recent Poverty Programs set up by the Federal Government as a remedial reading program. This grant is identified as elementary secondary educational act title I under the new poverty act.

And additional grant of \$2,070.00 was received by the local school, in another of the poverty programs, this one is identified as elementary secondary educational act title II. This grant was made to be used for the purchase of library supplies, but cannot be used for equipment for libraries.

The remedial reading program was set up basically to teach slow readers who are members of families whose Annual Income was less than \$2,000.00, based on the federal census taken in 1960. "However," Supt. Bill Mann said, "we plan to teach all slow readers regardless of their financial status, if they are incapable of reading at their own grade level."

Although final plans for the beginning of this federally financed remedial reading program in Springlake-Earth school has been completed, classes which were scheduled to begin last Monday with the beginning of the second semester are temporarily delayed. The delay resulted from a lack of available space to hold the four new classes, coupled with a shortage of available reading specialist for hire. However these shortages are expected to be overcome shortly, and classes will begin in the very near future.

The four new reading teachers employed to teach these four new reading classes, are attending a workshop this week in Tulia, along with many faculty members across the Plains in an effort to receive their briefing on how to operate the new controlled reading machines.

The four new reading teachers will be required to attend a workshop each Saturday of the week, and an additional six weeks study period will be required during the summer vacation, to become fully acquainted with the new reading machine method of teaching reading.

Reading teachers employed are Mrs. Danny Smith, Mrs. Albert Lindley, Mrs. Edward Stanley, (continued on page 8)

## City Dads Vote To Enforce Dog Ordinance

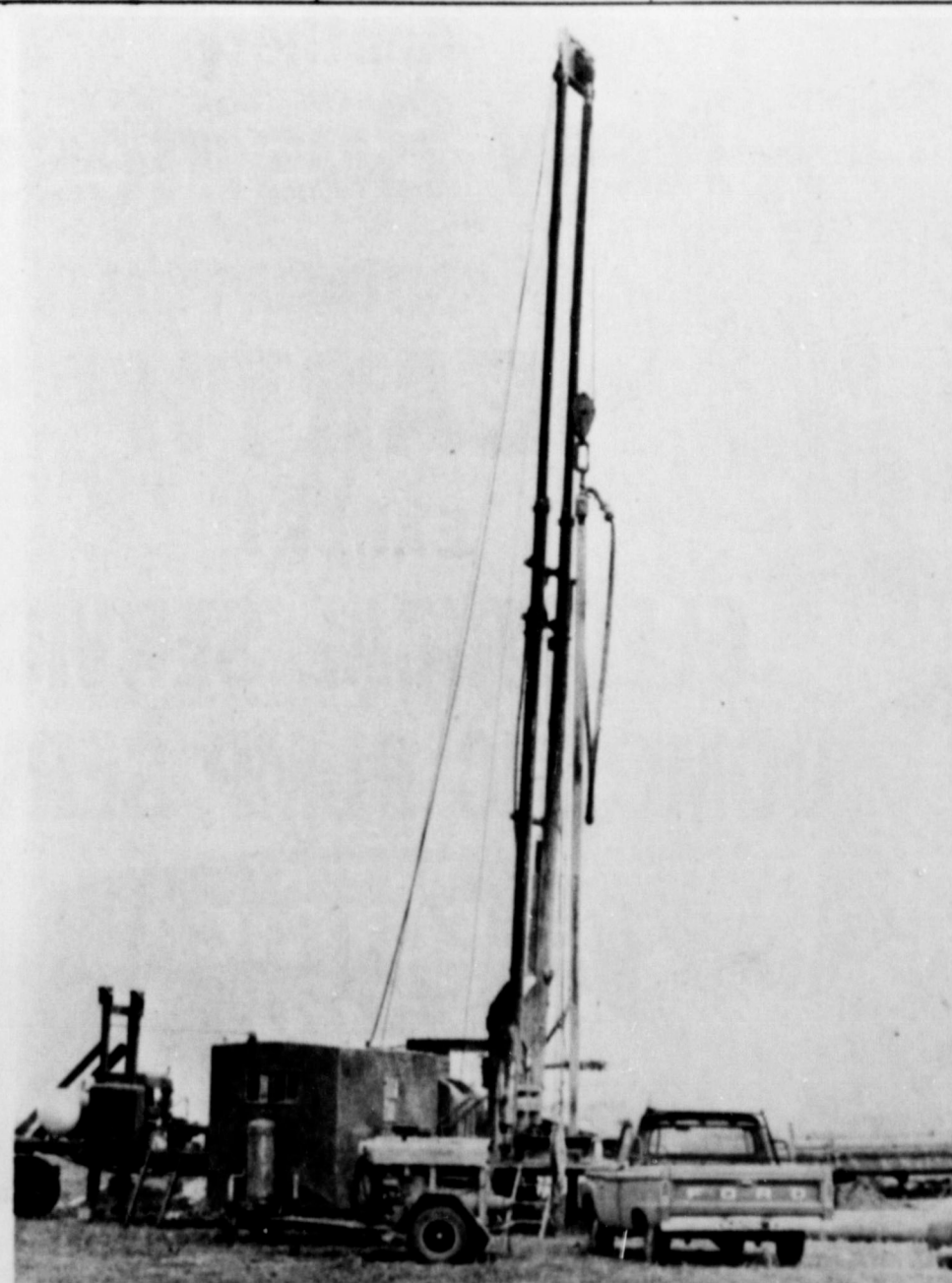
At a regular meeting in the City Hall Monday night, City Dads voted to appoint Margarito Ramon as City Dog Officer. The group voted to pick up and destroy immediately all untagged dogs running loose within the city. Dogs that have tags but are allowed to run loose will also be picked up. These dogs will be held for three days. If within the three day period, the owner does not call for them, they will be destroyed.

The group discussed the purchase and installation of elect-

rodes for the water storage tanks and tower. These electrodes are used to regulate the motors on the tanks to insure a permanent water level at all times, thus avoiding the possibility of running out of water at one particular time, while the tank overflows at another time. The group, however, voted to table the decision until more information can be obtained.

A decision was reached to enforce parallel parking only on the farm to market road number 1055, within the first half block north of the traffic light. Signs have already been erected. Emphasis was also placed on the State law which prohibits U-turns under any traffic lights. This law will be strictly enforced in Earth.

The comprehension plan for cities was discussed. It was decided that a public meeting will be called within the near future to inform citizens of the plans for the city. The comprehension (Continued on page 2)

## Jill McCord Named Betty Crocker Homemaker

Jill McCord has been named Springlake-Earth's 1966 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She scored highest in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls on December 7.

Jill is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat McCord. She has had three years of homemaking and has served as an officer in FHA since 1964. At present she is FHA president and Miss FHA of Springlake-Earth High School. In April of last year, Jill received her State Homemaking degree.

Test papers of all school Homemakers of Tomorrow in the state are currently being judged. The state's highest-ranking girl will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, with the state runner-up to be awarded a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica from Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc.

Later this spring, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join first-place winners and advisors from each of the 50 other states and the District of Columbia in a tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington,

D. C., and New York City. Climax of the week-long tour will be the naming of the Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. To be chosen on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second-third-and fourth-place winners in the nation will have their grants raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

The Betty Crocker Search for

the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was initiated by General Mills in 1964 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Including this year's record enrollment of more than half a million senior girls in more than 14,000 high schools, the total number of participants during the program's 11-year history stands at four million. Scholarship grants exceed \$1 million.

## One Inch Snow Received in Area

Approximately one inch of snow was received in the area Tuesday night and early Wednesday morning.

James Busby, Springlake, reported that about .2 of an inch of moisture was received from the inch of snow, and this would be beneficial to farmers as the soil was getting extremely dry.

Thurlo Branscum, whose farm is located 6 miles west and 5 miles North of Earth, reported to have received about .2 of an inch of moisture. He said the snow came at an ideal time as most of the cotton harvest was completed and the soil needed some moisture. Branscum also said, "I believe we will have quite a lot of snow before Spring arrives."

The Texas State Library high plains bookmobile will be in Earth-Springlake area Thursday and Friday, January 20-21.

The bookmobile will begin its schedule Thursday morning with a stop in Amherst from 9:15 until 10:15 a. m. From Amherst the library on wheels is slated to proceed to Springlake where it will arrive at 11 a. m. and remain until 11:45.

From 12 noon until 1 p. m. the bookmobile will stop at the school, before proceeding to Earth where it is slated to remain from 1:15 to 3:45 p. m. thus completing the schedule stops for the day.

On Friday the first stop will be Pleasant Valley where the bookmobile will remain from 10 to 11 a. m. before proceeding to Sudan.

Local gins report that most of the cotton has been harvested in the area. There are approximately 25 or more bales expected, and it is mostly a matter of "picking up."

Our total bale count including Earth Co-op Gin 1 and 2, Earth Gin Co., Barton Bros. Gin Co.,

Campbell Cotton Gin Co., Nichols Gin Co., Farmers Co-op Association, Springlake Gin Co. and Paymaster Gin, was 46,049 bales Wednesday at noon.

The Lamb County bale count of a week ago was between 190 and 200 thousand bales, which indicates that our area has pro-

duced a nice percentage of the cotton in Lamb County.

## White Sights Year of Growth

Texas agriculture recorded steady, but not spectacular, gains during 1965, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White said production gains were made in cotton, wheat, sorghum, rice, hay, potatoes, peanuts, soybeans, peaches, and pecans, but production fell below the 1964 level in corn, oats, barley, rye, flaxseed and broomcorn.

Total value of Texas' principal crops totaled 1,557 billion dollars for the year compared with 1,381 billion in 1964. Cotton and cottonseed value totaled 742 million or 48 per cent of the overall value. The second most valuable crop was sorghum grain with 19 per cent and then came rice with 7 per cent.

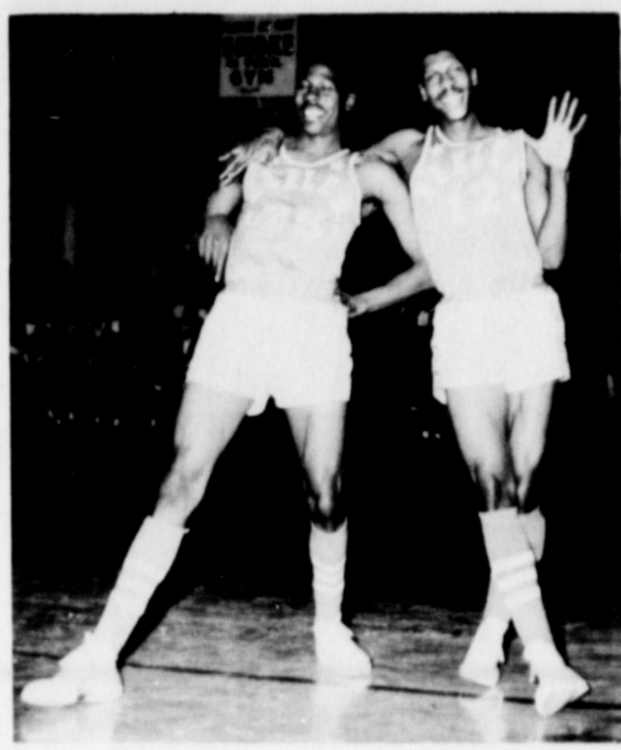

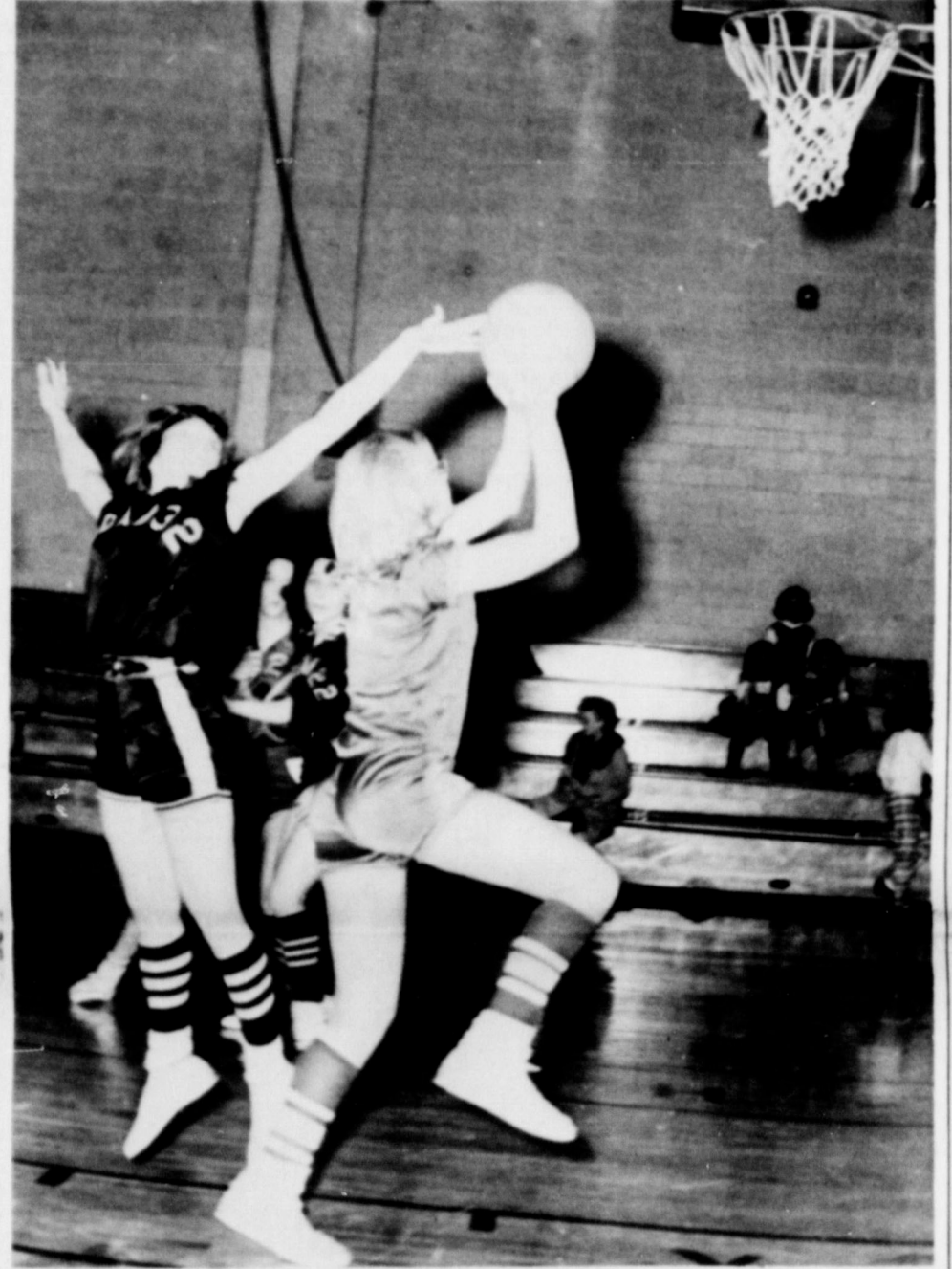

and Mrs. Gladys McCaskill. There will be one classroom set up in the high school building for high school students and one in the junior high for junior high students. These two classes will be taught by Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Lindley. The two remaining classes will be taught by Mrs. McCaskill and Mrs. Stanley. One classroom will be set up in the elementary buildings, while the remaining classroom is being made ready, and will be housed in the original dressing room of the old gymnasium.  
 Supt. Mann said, "We had not anticipated all the special education classes, the additional reading classes, and libraries, which we have taken on this school year. With all these additional new classes Springlake-Earth is literally left void of any useable space." He added, "The original shower and storage room in the old gymnasium is also being made ready as a classroom for a regular health class."

In speaking of the new reading machines, Supt. Mann explained, "Due to the shortage of these machines and the high demand coming in from schools all over the country, we were only able to purchase four large reading machines and two small machines, although we had already received \$15,000.00 of the original \$32,000.00 to purchase this equipment and to hire necessary teachers. It will probably take awhile before manufacturing companies can catch up with the tremendous demand."  
 Mann said, this new program would require definite identification of students enrolled in these reading classes, with reports of their progress sent in periodically to the government, a separate bank account and a separate set of books would be required to keep this new remedial reading project going. In order to work together on this new reading project, should on the Plains recently organized a Panhandle educational service organization, naming Emmitt D. Smith director of the newly formed organization. The PESO

includes approximately 10 units. Springlake-Earth is in Unit 7, which includes Olton, Nazareth, Kress, Tulia, Quitaque and Silvertown.  
 "By banding together and organizing the PESO," Supt. Mann said, "the school will receive additional advantages, such as a workshop for teachers, a psychiatrist, and aid in evaluating the reports from the various schools, before mailing them to

the government office.  
 In reporting on the progress of title II, the Library Grant, Mann said, "We have purchased World Books, Child Craft Books, and Film strips." He went on to disclose, "Before this money can all be spent a complete Library Program must be mapped out, with notification of anticipated purchases, sent the governmental office, they will in turn approve or disapprove of said program and purchases."

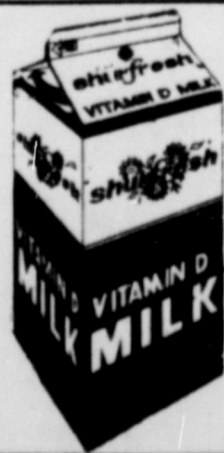

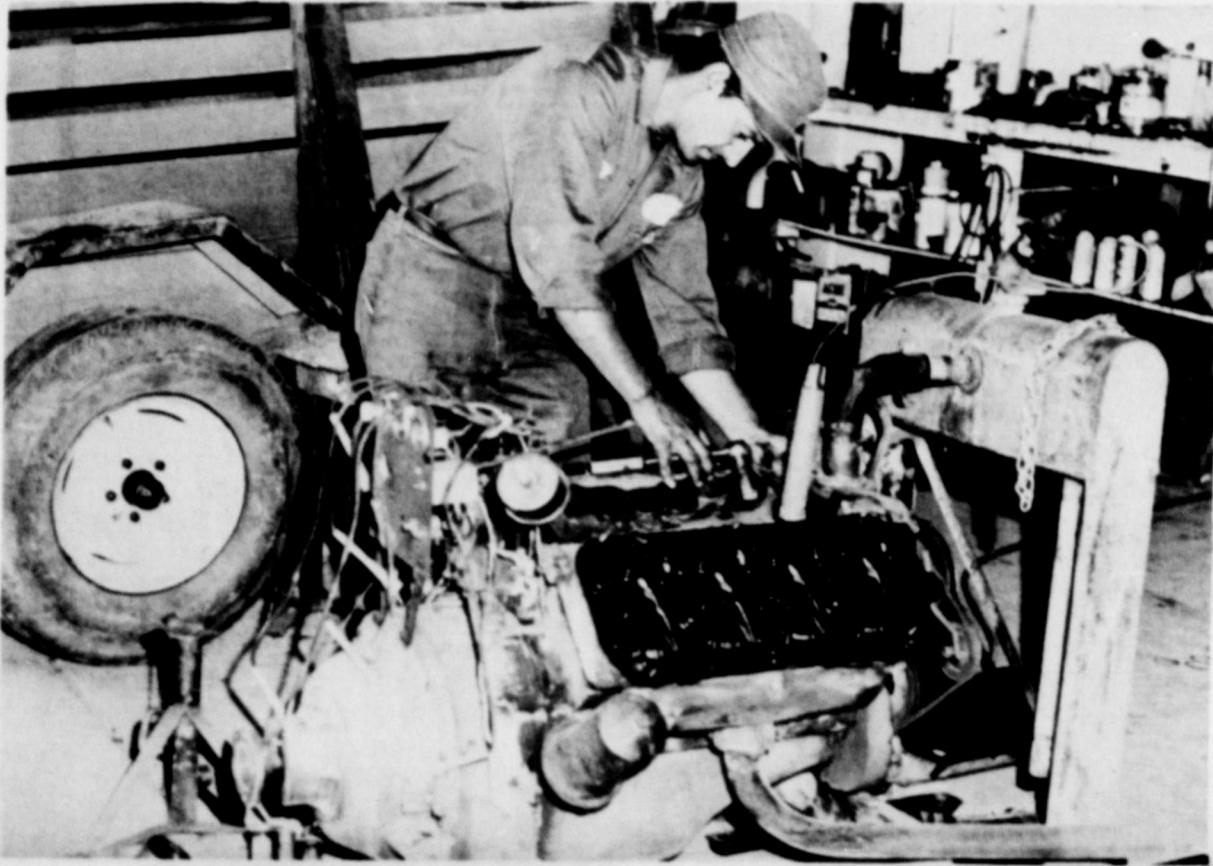
