ates in Mineral Wells and Amarillo. He does evangelistic work in the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

Corn Acreage Sign-Ups Give Go Ahead Sign To Milling Plant

Dimmitt Wheat Growers, Inc., passed the \$2,200,000 mark in corn contracts for its proposed milling plant, and General Mgr. Aaron Isaacs predicted sign-ups would reach the \$2.5 million target quota.

Last week, area farmers signed new contracts at a clip of \$100,000 worth a day, Isaacs reported.

The \$2.5 million mark in contracts will satisfy the requirements by finances of the mill and will assure enough corn production to supply the mill's first-unit appetite of 3,3 million bushels per year.

FARMERS in the Hart, Friona and Olton areas have helped out the sign-ups by showing a good response during the past week, Isaacs said. He added that further meetings may still be called in these three cities to give farmers there a chance to pick up available poundage if they want it.

The cooperative still must reach \$2.5 million in mill investments—either through corn contracts or through the sale of first preferred stock, Isaacs said. Dimmitt Wheat Growers is now registering with the Texas Securities and Exchange Commission for authorization to sell up to half a million dollars worth of the stock on the market.

Isaacs said the amount of first preferred stock to be sold to private investors will depend on the final corn contract figure. Farmers signing contracts to

supply corn are being issued first preferred stock at the rate of 70 cents worth per 100 lbs. Stock is still open to farmers of the area on a first come, first served basis. Approximately \$300,000 more contracts are available.

National Library Week To Be Observed In Local Church

The library of First Baptist Church, Earth will observe the annual National Library Week Emphasis, April 21-27.

On April 21 the church will give emphasis to its church library during the morning worship hour. Throughout the week the library will have special displays of books and audiovisual materials.

The First Baptist Church library has more than 500 books, filmstrips, slides, pictures, maps, and numerous pamphlets and clippings. At the present time, books are being added to the library by way of gifts and memorials. A special book containing the names of the donors of memorial books is on display in the church library.

Mrs. Betty Anderson is director of library services. Her assistants are Mrs. Inez Inglis, Mrs. Jeanette O'Hair and Mrs. Clota Bell Kelley. The library is open regularly before and after each service on Sunday and Wednesday and on Tuesday afternoon following Sunbeams and Girls Auxiliary meetings.

movement, dedicated to encouraging lifetime reading habits, increasing the use of libraries, and expanding the nation's library resources. It is sponsored by the National Book Committee, Inc., a nonprofit educational group, in cooperation with the American Library Association.

The Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, through its Church Library Department, has promoted a library emphasis week since 1944 and has cooperated with National Library Week efforts since its beginning in 1958. There are over 16,200 known libraries operating today in Southern Baptist churches.

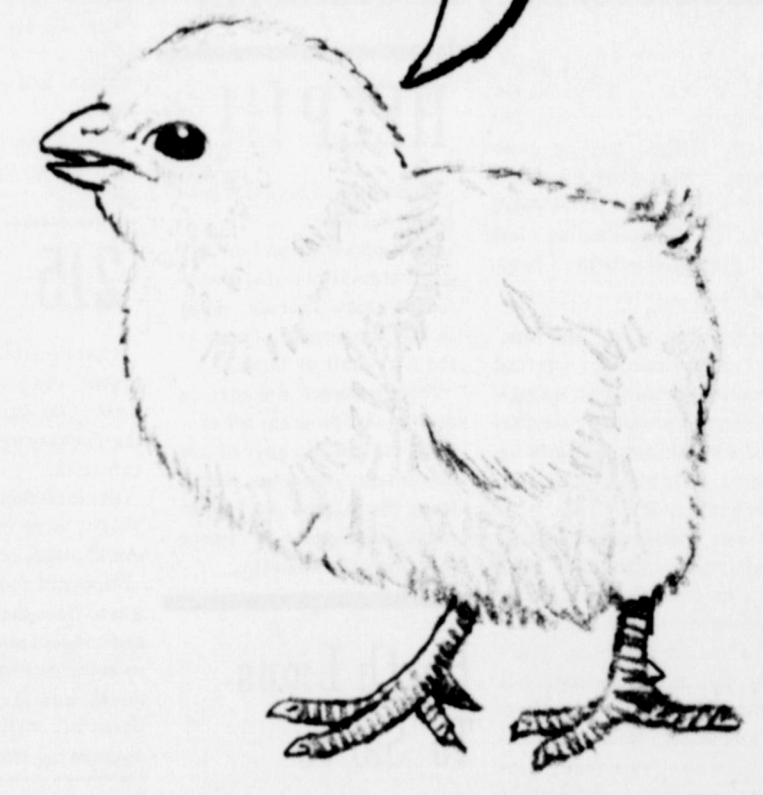

Students Aid Youngsters With Learning Disabilities

EDITOR'S NOTE: THIS ARTICLE IS A REPRINT TAKEN FROM THE HARDIN-SIMMONS UNIVERSITY PAPER. PRUDA SANDERS IS A FORMER GRADUATE OF SPRINGLAKE-EARTH HIGH SCHOOL AND THE DAUGHTER OF MR. AND MRS. MARVIN SANDERS.

One day in October Pruda Sanders, H-SU junior, walked into a classroom at Central Elementary School here in Abilene. She met for the first time a small boy named Earl Music who likes football and talks about his family. What made this scene unusual was a program called TOLD. TOLD stands for Tutoring of Language Disorders. Pruda is a TOLD tutor and Earl has a language disorder called dyslexia.

The TOLD program has come to the Abilene area in a tri-college effort headed by Mrs. Lee Gann, Project Coordinator, Supervisors for Hardin Simmons are Opal Mae Howard and Mrs. Florene Currin.

"I think the TOLD project fills a definite need in the field of language disorders because these children aren't mentally retarded and need extra attention," said Pruda.

The process that leads two people into such a situation as Pruda and Earl begins when

doctors or teachers recommend a child for the program. After the screening of psychological, medical, and educational tests the child is chosen. The schedule is then arranged through his school for tutoring sessions. "In a one to one atmosphere such as the TOLD Program the child is able to learn more effectively," according to Mrs. Currin.

Sullivan's Program Reading is used by the tutors. All instructional material used by the Abilene TOLD Program is supplied by Abilene Public Schools. Included in Sullivan's Reading, which is in the form of a workbook, is spelling, vocabulary and handwriting.

Pruda meets with Earl and hour and a half three days a week. Since Pruda is a special education major the tutoring offers experience that will be valuable in her career to come.

Other students wishing to enter the program should see one of the supervisors. Requirements for the program are junior or senior status with at least 12 hours in special education courses.

"I hope this program will encourage more students to enter the field of teaching exceptional children," said Mrs. Currin.

Area Athletes Selected To West Texas Academic BB Teams

The All West Texas Academic Basketball Teams have been announced by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Nominations were made from the more than 400 high schools in the 132-county area served by a special committee named by President Don Wooten of Abilene.

Boys and girls teams were named in all classifications which filled teams. To qualify for nomination to these teams the students had to be classified as seniors, maintain much better than average grades and must have been selected to represent the school on an all district team.

Entrance prices for HemisFair are \$2 for adults and \$1 for children ages 2 through 11.

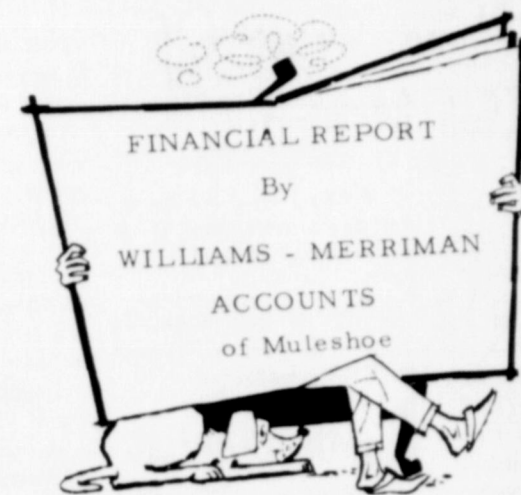

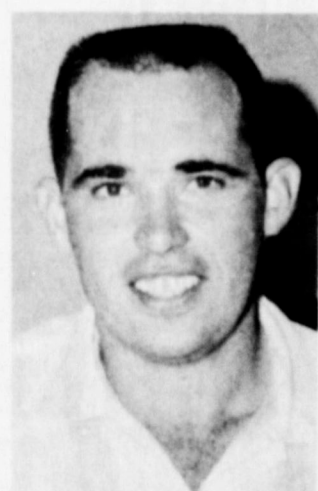

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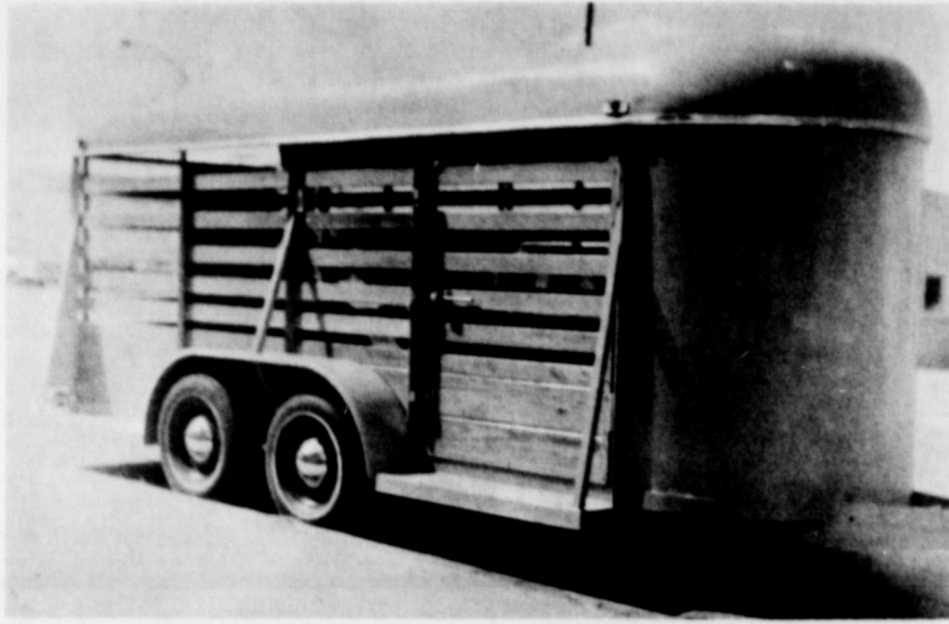
