Doughnuts and coffee will be served to all exes at the cafeteria following the game.

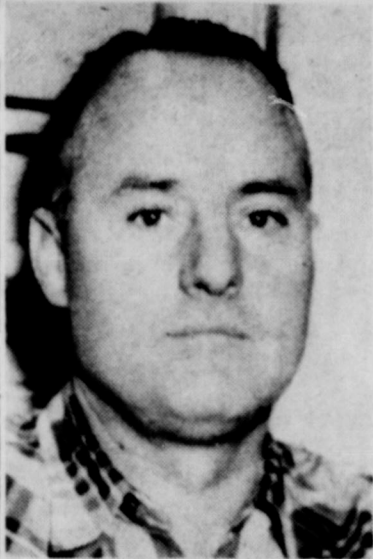

# Springlake Downed by Powerful Mules

The Springlake Wolverines were outclassed by a strong double "A" Muleshoe football team 36-0 at Muleshoe Friday night. Muleshoe is one of the favorites to take their double "A" district. Even though Springlake was playing in competition one class above its class of one "A", the Wolverines once again showed plenty of hustle and desire to play. After the game one of the officials went into Springlake's dressing room and commended them for their hustle and good sportsmanship.

Donnie "Sputnick" Shafer of Muleshoe wasn't able to do against Springlake, gaining only a total of 11 yards for the night from scrimmage. He had been running wild all season, but the Wolverines were ready for him. He caught a fine pass from quarterback Darrell Oliver that covered 40 yards and a touchdown in the first quarter, taking the opening kickoff and driving 47 yards in ten plays with quarterback Oliver sneaking over from the one yard line. Shafer tried to run for the extra points, but was stopped in 10 yards. Springlake just couldn't get going against a tough line in the first quarter, handling the ball only five times, four of them for passes. They completed one pass for 8 yards and ran one play for 4 yards. Muleshoe made their second touchdown of the quarter with a 40 yard pass already mentioned from Oliver to Shafer. Shafer, with his great speed, was able to outrun the safety man and get behind him for the pass. Oliver ran for the two extra points.

Near the end of the first quarter Muleshoe intercepted a pass on Springlake's 35 and in nine plays went over for its third TD with halfback Carralez carrying over from the 2. Oliver again ran for the two points, making the score 12 to 0 at the half.

In the third quarter Springlake got one drive started early only to have it end suddenly by an intercepted pass. Muleshoe scored in the quarter after Oliver intercepted the pass and ran it 55 yards to Springlake's 10 yard line. On the second play from scrimmage Carralez ran it over from the 10. Oliver again took it across for the extra points.

In the last quarter, with both teams playing reserves, Muleshoe scored their final touchdown when the Mules recovered a fumble on Springlake's 18 and went 60 yards with Mills going the final 4 yards. The conversion failed.

Except for two intercepted passes of 55 yards and 25 yards, Muleshoe had to be content to dig out yardage three and four yards at a time. Springlake was in over its head against Muleshoe, but the Wolverines never gave up and fought until the final gun. Even the reserves went in there acting as if they expected to win in the final minutes.

Springlake plays Crosbyton Friday night at Wolverine Stadium and it promises to be a fine ball game. Crosbyton is single "A" class, and they too played a powerful double "A" class team, Sparta, and were beaten by just five or six points. The Springlake boys don't seem to be down after their defeat, and ought to be ready to give Crosbyton a real scrap. Coach Townsend said he was pleased with the boys and their improvement, but there were some things they needed to work out.
