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It was recently brought to our attention by a very concerned parent of a student at Springlake-Earth School, that the speed limit in front of the school is 50 miles an hour. This bit of information was quite a shock to yours truly, because most school crossings even two, three or more blocks away from other schools has a set speed limit of 15 or 20 miles per hour, which is highly enforced.

We can't help but wonder why our students aren't likewise protected. I realize the front of the school may not be considered a crossing, yet cars and buses are loading and unloading, pulling in and out of the parking area on to the Farm to Market road and a 50 miles an hour speed limit right in front of such a busy place seems quite inconsiderate, considering our state speed limit on Texas Highways is only 55 miles an hour. This seems to be a little irregular, and surely should be the concern of every parent in the area.

Can we be sure that a young student won't become a little playful and momentarily forget, and allow his young feet to find their way out on the Farm to Market road where cars speed by at 50 miles an hour.

There is much confusion, I'm told, goes on out there when school lets out, and its hard to know which way to go to get out of the way at that time. Surely if we do not have a slower take off and a lower speed limit than 50 miles an hour on the road in front of the school we're just asking for trouble. There must be a way to change the speed limit there, before a tragedy occurs.

This parent who was so concerned, presented the problem in such a manner that we feel there is a need for cutting down the speed.

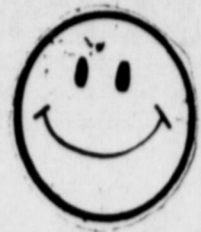

## House Okays Bill To Provide Rural Doctors

AUSTIN—State Representative Fred Head's bill to provide doctors for underserved small cities and rural areas successfully passed final reading in the Texas House of Representatives and now awaits approval from the Senate.

1975 shows a total of 425 accidents resulting in 18 persons killed and 251 persons injured as compared to April, 1974 with 390 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 218 persons injured. This was 35 more accidents, one less killed, and 33 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 18 traffic deaths for the month of April, 1975 occurred in the following counties: four in Lubbock; two each in Bailey, Clay and Garza; and one each in Hockley, Wise, Yoakum, Briscoe, Castro, Hartley, Ochiltree and Potter.

"The bill gives adequate financial incentive to insure that underserved areas of Texas will have ready access to qualified medical care," explained Representative Head.

Currently, 17 counties in Texas have no medical doctor. Residents of those 17 counties must travel several hours to nearby cities in order to receive any medical attention.

Citing the most common hardships incurred by rural residents whose communities lack the services of a qualified doctor, Head stressed, "That means there is no one to take care of the child whose flu takes a serious turn for the worse in the middle of the night; or to set a broken limb; or even to deliver a baby who arrives a couple of weeks early."

The bill allows for medical students to receive a \$100,000 monthly stipend after they sign a contract to serve in a rural area for at least four years after their graduation and residency.

In order to insure an adequate number of rural doctors in the medical school's new class must in future, the bill stipulates that at least 20% of each Texas medical school's new class must participate in the program.

"That way, the family can retain the home's spacious feeling and achieve a really unique architectural feature, while, perhaps, easing the space 'crunch.'"

"Few new homes today are built with galleries or lofts, because architects tend to think it more thrifty and sensible to build a full second story," the specialist observed.

"However, when homes with two-story rooms are remodeled, sometimes a gallery or loft can solve an architectural problem or create new space.

"When the rooms of town houses are made into apartments, for example, very tall rooms often are given a sleeping gallery or a dining-kitchen gallery.

"And roomy Victorian houses with high ceilings can be remodeled easily to include such features."

The specialist also pointed to a feeling of "spaciousness, flow and elegant detachment" achieved with a gallery or loft, because it provides space set off from the rest of a room.

Concerning functions of a gallery, loft or balcony, Mrs. Berry said each structure is suitable for use as a study, playroom, dining or sleeping room, library or storage area.

"This new space also adds to the overall square footage of a house, while it gives the family more room," the specialist said.

### Cotton Making A Fashion Comeback

Cotton is recapturing its share of the fiber market taken by polyester fibers in recent years, according to Marlene Odle, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Consumers are beginning to look for new properties in clothes performance that only the natural fibers, such as cotton, can provide."

To enhance the properties of

cotton, manufacturers blend it with other fibers such as polyester, in different percentages.

"The most popular percentages seen on the market now are 65 per cent polyester, 35 per cent cotton, and 50 per cent polyester, 50 per cent cotton. Special finishes like permanent press are applied to make the blended fabric easy to care for," Miss Odle said.

She reminded consumers that sewing with cotton doesn't require special techniques. But homesewers should remember not to use patterns designed for knits because cotton doesn't have the natural elasticity of knits. The ease necessary for cotton has been eliminated in these patterns.

"Polyester threads or cotton-coated polyester threads provide elasticity to prevent puckering when sewing cottons and

## Rollover Protection Required For Tractors

AUSTIN. Modern jet combat aircraft have rocket ejection seats to save the pilot from almost certain death in a crash. So far, no one has proposed rocket seats for tractor drivers, but starting in 1976 all new tractors will afford the operator increased protection in a rollover.

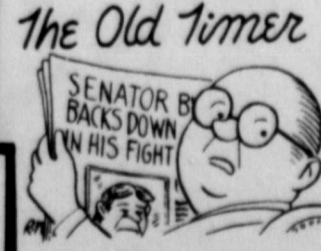
Noting that tractor rollovers have accounted for some 125 deaths among Texas farm workers during the past five years, The Texas Safety Association today issued a reminder that the Occupational Safety and Health Administration has now officially adopted rollover protection standards for agricultural tractors.

The standard applies to all agricultural tractors manufactured after October 23, 1976. After that date tractors of over 20 engine horsepower used in agriculture must be equipped with a seat belt and rollover protective structures which meet government performance requirements.

In addition, the standard requires that the employer assure that all employees use the seat belt and that employers enforce prescribed operating rules whether or not a rollover protective structure is required.

Unlike earlier proposals, the final standard exempts "low-profile tractors" while used in orchards, vineyards, hop yards and low clearance buildings. Also exempted are tractors mounted with implements incompatible with the protective structure during these usages.

The new standards, adopted April 25, are included in a new Part 1926 of Title 29, Code of Federal Regulations, safety and health standards for agriculture. The Secretary of Labor designated the area of rollover protective structures a priority subject for a standard in appointing the Standards Advisory Committee on Agriculture in June, 1972.

### Cotton Still In The Ballgame
