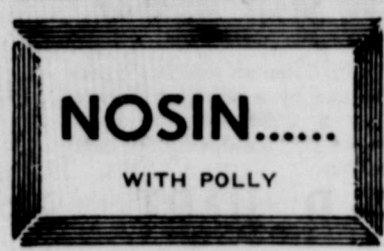




Annual Talent Show Scheduled March 25

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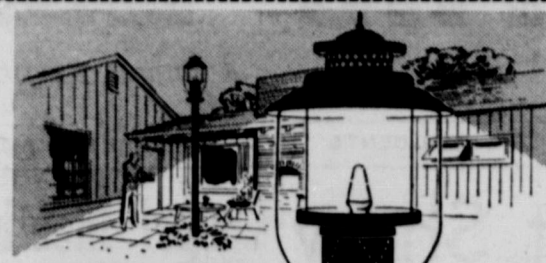
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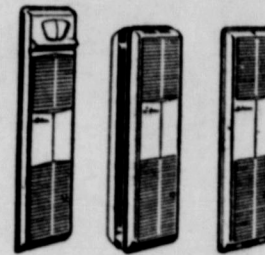



Have you ever driven through a City and thought, "Now this is the kind of City that I'd like to live in!" If you have, I'm almost positive that, that City was clean and neat. I'm sure it was beautiful.

Now, what dose Earth have to offer people who might be interested in moving there? I mean, what does it have to offer at the first glance?

On clear, dry days most of the streets in Earth are dusty and filled with ruts. On rainy days you face the very real danger of getting stuck in the mud. A street paving project is needed very badly.

Good Values in Finance and Small Loan Companies
In the past year finance and small loan company stocks have been extremely poor market performers. Of the thirty major industry groups traded on the New York Stock Exchange the finance group acted as the poorest in 1959 and was off 11.64% versus an 8.83% gain on a dollar basis for the overall market as recorded by the Hemphill, Noyes Average. This sub-average performance can be attributed to several factors prevalent last year which will not come into play under present market conditions and outlook. Today there are several issues which offer excellent statistical values even though the growth prospects are limited. Among issues in the group that we believe offer above average attraction are, Commercial Credit in the finance field and Beneficial Finance among the small loan companies.
Last year saw the intensification of many problems confronting this industry. By year end, with profit margins under pressure and future prospects mixed, investors were loath to consider these issues even though they looked statistically underpriced and could have been bought for income. Historically, these issues have been noted for their defensive characteristics and attribute that will probably be appreciated in today's market a lot more than it has been in the market of the past year and a half.
Money Rates:
The increased cost of money has had a serious effect on the profit margins of sales finance companies. This can be more readily understood when it is realized that one-third, and in some cases substantially more, of total expense for an installment finance company are interest requirements of money borrowed to finance consumer loans. This does not only include the rather substantial long term debt which most finance companies carry but also the short term paper including 90 day notes and bank loans. With the bond market showing more firmness the near term outlook for money rates is not expected to be the problem that it was last year. The significance of this can not be underestimated for while this is not a discussion of the bond market nor will this be an attempt to project the future trend of interest rates there is sufficient evidence to indicate that 1960 will not bring the pressures that occurred in 1959.
1960 Prospects:
At the close of 1959 and in January 1960 most economic forecasters projected an excellent year in 1960. Now some of these forecasts (but not all) are being revised. However, the most pessimistic still forecast a good 1960.
All of this spells a reasonable improvement in results for the finance companies. Were it not for present money market conditions and the highly competitive nature of the field profit improvement would be more impressive. **INS**

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New Concept For Feeding Barley To Beef Cattle

At the recent annual meeting of the American Society of Animal Production in Chicago, Purina researchers reported to a nationwide group of college and industry scientist on a new concept for feeding barley to fattening cattle. This new method, which utilizes the barley hulls as the source of roughage in the ration, was developed at the Purina research farm in Missouri.
The report covered a series of six experiments in which cattle were fed a ration consisting only of properly supplemented barley on a full feed basis. The barley was rolled to preserve the roughage characteristic of the hulls. The supplement was a commercial, fortified 32 percent protein supplement. Three of the experiments afforded direct comparisons of cattle full-fed on rolled barley and supplement versus ground ear corn and supplement.
The report indicated that steers gained rapidly and efficiently on the ration using adequately supplemented rolled common barley as the full source of both grain and roughage. The cattle that were fed barley in accordance with this new concept gained significantly faster and more efficiently than comparable steers on ground ear corn. Differences in selling price, shipping shrinkage, dressing per cent and carcass grade were slight, but were in favor of barley.
Barley is the third largest grain crop in the United States. Cattlemen have long recognized the economic possibilities of using barley in beef rations. Until the Purina work, no practical way had been found to use barley as the only grain and still get top finish on the cattle.

Safflower will be tested at the High Plains Research Foundation this year in cooperation with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, as a part of the Foundation's program to develop new crops for the area.

Five varieties were used in the 1959 tests at Halfway. Heavy hail on June 22, 1959, damaged the crop so severely that the tests

had to be abandoned. There is still a possibility that a variety can be found that will be adapted to the area. Dr. Earl Collister, Chief Agronomist, said in announcing the acceptance of the request of the U.S.D.A. and farmers in the area for further research on the crop.

The Foundation has been selected by the U. S. D. A. to conduct the regional test. This will be the only safflower test of its kind to be made in the area. The varieties

Dr. Witt received his B. A. degree from Abilene Christian College in 1922 and M. A. degree from the University of Texas in 1927, also received a Ph. D. from the University of Colorado in 1938.

He has been Instructor to Head of Department, Abilene Christian College since 1922, and is also a member of the Texas State Board of Examiners in Basic Sciences.

to be tested are being supplied by Dr. Lester N. Leininger, Research Agronomist, of the Agricultural Research Service at Utah State University.

The eight varieties to be included in the test are U. S. 10, N-6, N-10, N-4051, N-4054, N-4055, Gila, and A 5731. Three of these varieties were included in the 1959 test program at Halfway.

Dr. Witt is a member of the American Chemical Society, Texas Academy of Science and the American Association of Basic Science Boards.

In the Scientific Field Dr. Witt has taught Organic and Inorganic Chemistry, also Foods and Biochemistry, and has done research work in Determination of carbonate in presence of barium hydroxide and sulfanilamide.

Dr. Witt is also the publisher of three scientific papers.
