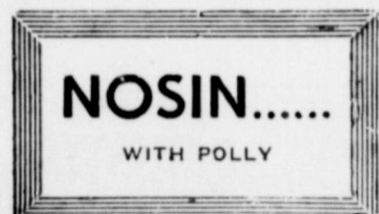

However we have worked hard to promote this thing since it was voted the best city-wide sales promotion at a citywide meeting over a month ago, and I am truly proud to see sixteen of our merchants unite in one big effort to PROMOTE EARTH as a better Shopping Center for area customers.

For quite a long time (seven years and some odd months to be more specific) I have wondered why merchants who admit they want an advertisement in the paper wait until after deadline to get their copy in. ### Rains - Cloudy Weather Prevails, Slows Harvest

Rains up to three inches, accompanied by small hail, lightning and thunder hit the Earth-Springlake area Sunday night between 7 p.m. and 8 p.m.

As much as two inches of rain was reported to have fallen in the City Limits of Earth Sunday night.

Early Monday morning a rain gauge at the George Kasinger residence showed two inches.

Mrs. Orville Cleavinger reported three inches of moisture fell Sunday night at their farm nine miles northeast of Earth. She also reported very little hail fell.

In Springlake the rainfall was reported 1.4 including the rain which fell Sunday night and again Wednesday.

Hail damage to crops in the Springlake area was reported to be heavy in some places. Damage was reported heavy north and east of Springlake and also between Earth and Springlake.

A large amount of grain south of Springlake was reported to be shattered by the hail.

Rainfall in Earth Wednesday ranged from light drizzle to heavy showers during the day which brought rain gauges up one more inch over Sunday night's two inches.

### Springlake School Enrollment Shows Increase

The Springlake School enrollment shows an increase of 25 students since school opened August 28. This is probably due to the harvest season and new residents moving into this community.

To date the enrollment is as follows: first grade, 117; second grade, 105; third grade, 102; fourth grade, 78; fifth grade, 92; sixth grade, 64; seventh grade, 69; and eighth grade, 56.

In High School the registration is freshman, 47; sophomore, 39; junior, 28 and senior 32, which is a total of 839.

This does not include the Colorado school, which has 34 students enrolled.

This brings the total enrollment for the entire Springlake School to 873.

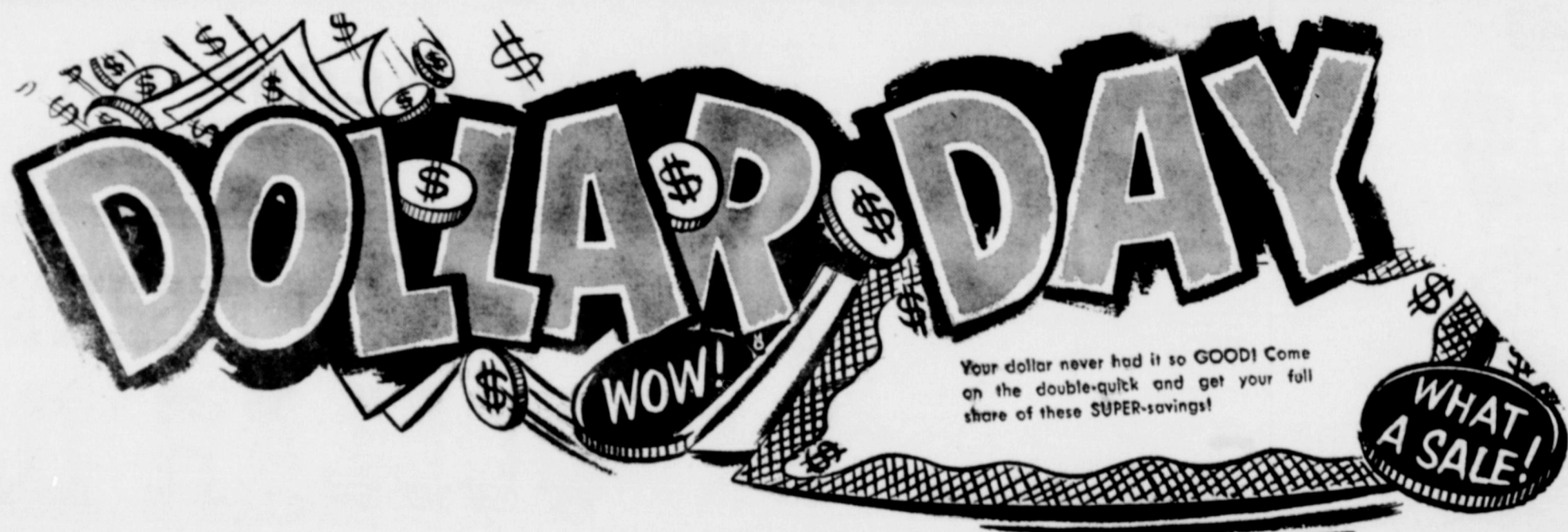

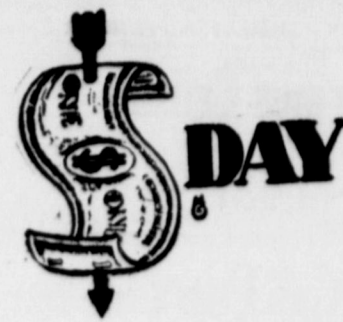

## Gas Users Given Report On Rate Findings

The Plains Irrigation Gas Users Association Board of Directors at a meeting in Plainview Monday night, October 16, announced the results of a study of the records of Pioneer Natural Gas Company made by Dr. E. A. Steinberger, rate engineer and gas consultant of Dallas. Dr. Steinberger had been previously employed by the Board to go to the original records of Pioneer Natural Gas Company in the offices of the Company in an effort to obtain factual information to try to determine the fairness of the rates for gas being charged by Pioneer Natural Gas Company to the irrigation farmers of the Panhandle and South Plains. The report of the gas rate consultant, according to David Burgess, President of the Board of Directors of the Association, reflects that Pioneer was making a 10.342 percent return on their investment by the sale of irrigation gas for the year 1960 and based upon the recent increase effective in February of 1961, Pioneer would receive a return of 12.292 percent on their investment based on actual cost basis, minus accrued depreciation, plus allocated working capital. The report showed that the February, 1961 increase on irrigation gas constituted an 18.852 percent increase in the rate of return over the 1960 rate. Based upon figures submitted by Dr. Steinberger, if "depreciated fair value" were used, the 1960 rate would represent a return of 8.39 percent to Pioneer on depreciated fair value, and under the February, 1961 rate, would return Pioneer 9.98 percent as contrasted to a 6 and one half percent rate of return which is the maximum rate of return normally allowed by the Railroad Commission on gas subject to its jurisdiction. If sales for irrigation gas were subject to Railroad Commission regulations, a decrease of approximately 25 percent would be necessary instead of the 11.129 percent increase brought about by the new February, 1961 rate.

Another finding reflected that in the rate bracket governing the sale of gas over 1,000 Mcf, the new rate effective February 1961 constituted a 17.391 percent increase over the old rate. In the bracket of 501 to 1,000 Mcf the new rate constituted an increase of over 4 percent and in the bracket covering gas over 501 to 1,000 Mcf represents an increase of 16.23 percent over the old rate.

Dr. Steinberger, a registered professional engineer and gas rate consultant, has been often em-

College Station — Rat killing season is here again. During the summer months the rat population is not too noticeable because they stay in the fields, close to their food supplies. They also stay close to their food supplies in the fall, but these supplies have been moved into barns and cribs, thus concentrating the rat and mouse population around the farmstead.

Sampson, Potter County, Rex Wheeler, Crosby County, Bruce Parr, Parmer County, Jay Boston, Secretary, Deaf Smith County, A. P. McWilliams, Hale County, Bob Francis, Swisher County, and S. M. True, Jr., Hale County, attending from this area and representing Lamb County were Gene Templeton, Earth, president, Gene Williams, Littlefield Secretary - Treasurer, and Directors Wylie Medgett, Sudan, Elmer McGill, Olton, Kenneth Sawyer, Earth, V. O. Busby, Springlake, all of Lamb County.

## Former Resident Killed In Fall From Elevator

Frances Marvin Griffith, 32 year old Bledsoe resident, died Sunday afternoon after he fell 10 feet from atop a grain storage elevator.

This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program already programmed for the counties concerned, the State Highway Engineer said.

Projects for Lamb county, according to District Engineer, O. L. Crain, of Lubbock are: U. S. Highway 385, from Castro County line to 1.5 miles south of Springlake, a distance of 5.5 miles, to receive a seal coat at an estimated cost of \$11,650. U. S. Highway 70 in Earth from the west city limit to the east city limit, a distance of 1.5 miles, seal coat, estimated cost \$3,900. Also U. S. Highway 70 in Springlake from west city limit to east city limit 1.1 miles, seal coat, estimated cost \$4,320.
