#### Fall Is Rat Control Season

season is here again. During the summer months the rat population is not too noticeable because they stay in the fields, close to their fodd supplies. They also stay close to their food supplies in the fall, but these supplies have been moved into barns and cribs, thus concentrating the rat and mouse pop-

pests, say rodent control specialists of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The first necessity in an effect ive rat control program is sanita-tion. All debris, loose grain and any other sources of shelter or food should be removed from the premises. After this has done, poison baits should be place in all areas likely to be frequented by rats or mice. The specialists recommend the use of anti-coagu-lant type poisons, although others may be used.

Once the rodent population is inder control, continued sanitation and the placing of a few sure they are still in place.

This type of rodent control is effective on a single farm, but it much better when employed by every farmer in the neighbor hood. You, your neighbors, your local county agent and rodent conrtol specialists of the Fish and Wildlife Service can organize a county-wide control program that any way he can.
