FOUNDATION FOR FREEDOM

Some of the most loyal citizens in America are aiding the Communist cause unwittingly. The Communist agents among us are many and they are skilled in their nefarious work. They have enlisted tens of thousands of non-Communist Americans in their hundreds of Communist fronts, thus creating a powerful force working for Communist worldwide objectives. But one of the most destructive tactics is that of keeping American opinion shattered into many fragmentary groups, badly divided on basic issues, undecided on basic principles.

For instance, the Communists have persuaded many influential Americans that there is really no specific definition for the term "The American way of life." These loyal but misguided Americans contend that the term is "an abstraction," that there are as many definitions for it as there are people. This means that we haven't any common ideology for Americans to stand for. At least that is what some Americans say, influenced by subtle Communist thought-shaping. But it is a fallacy. There is a specific definition for "The American way of life." It is acceptable to all Americans—whatever their race, creed or color, whatever their calling, whatever their economic station in life. We can all rally around it and defend it. If we know about it and understand it.

The Definition

An acceptable definition for "The American way of life" is: A social system built upon the foundation of Faith in God, with a governmental system anchored to the United States Constitution, (a Republic) and with a capitalistic economic system having as its keystone the principles of private ownership of property, the competitive market, and the profit motive.

It can be put even more simply: Faith in God, Constitutional Government, Private Enterprise. Here are the three great pillars of our American system. They are not complex or abstract. They are understandable. And every American can stand for them proudly. Every American likewise has the responsibility to defend them, to safeguard them from erosion, to determine, gradual smothering, or outright destruction.

First Pillar

Let's examine the first, foundation pillar: Faith in God. The leaders among the Pilgrim families who settled along our eastern shores 350 years ago were Godly people. The Mayflower arrived off Plymouth Rock on a Saturday evening; but all day Sunday the historic voyagers remained aboard the little ship and worshipped God. That day they created and signed the Mayflower Compact, which began—"In the name of God, Amen..."

When the Pilgrims built their communities, the church was the very first building to go up. In all of America's founding documents, the leadership of our rising young nation expressed a beautiful reverence for God Almighty, a deep and abiding faith. The great Declaration of Independence ended with the immortal words: "...with a firm reliance on the protection of Divine Providence..." Jefferson himself said: "The God who gave us life gave us Liberty." At the Constitutional Convention, the delegates prayed.

Inner Motivation

It is vitally important to understand that only a people who are spiritually motivated and guided from within can be free. If our allegiance were not to a Higher Power—to God—our moral code would be man-made, or rather self-made. To be selfish would not be wrong. To covet would not be wrong. Bakunin, the first Russian Communist, said: "Let your own happiness be your guide to life." Without moral underpinning, this is an invitation to the lowest animal impulses.

Where people are motivated by such a Godless code the Police State is necessary. There is no inner compulsion to do right. Our laws in America come out of the moral concepts of Right. Since we are a Godly nation the average citizen breaks a law only accidentally. This has been true through the course of our history. Now, however, crime is on the increase. And every day more and more Americans are breaking the more important, the moral laws of God. This is getting at the root of our gravest problems. The foundation stone of our American system is being eroded. We need to recognize it as the foundation stone, and we need to be sure that in the heart and the behavior of each of us it becomes the foundation stone for our every action.

City Fire Department To Be Reorganized

At a called meeting of the Earth Fire Department Tuesday night it was decided that the department would be re-organized.

In order for the fire boys to improve the department and buy better equipment, such as water hose and other necessities, twenty five cents per month will be added to the bills of City water consumers.

This additional twenty five cents will be placed in the fire department fund to be used as needed.

The department hopes to get as many as twenty five members and they hope to have seventeen fully active members who will be present at each meeting.

The regular meeting time for the fire department is each first and third Monday night but during football season they are meeting each first and third Tuesday due to interference with the Springlake Quarterback Club meeting each Monday night.

There will be another meeting of the department Tuesday, October 18 at which time more business will be taken care of by the fire boys.

Fire Prevention Week October 9-15

This is National Fire Prevention week, beginning October 9 through 15 as designated by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The people are called upon to promote programs for the prevention and control of fires and every one is urged to assist in this National effort to reduce the loss of life and property resulting from fires.

Preventable, destructive fires continue to be the major cause of human suffering and economic waste in communities throughout the nation.

Intelligent and determined individual and cooperative action can greatly reduce this needless waste of our country's resources.

Residents are asked to hunt out and correct any possible fire hazards which exist around the home or at their business houses.

More than 11,000 lives and one billion dollars worth of property are wiped out each year by fires, many of which could have been prevented with proper care.

An advance demand for fire safety literature indicates that participation by Civic groups in Fire Prevention Week will be the largest in history, according to Lewis A. Vincent, general manager of the National Board of Fire Underwriters.

More than 22 million pieces of literature has been sent to Civic groups, municipal officials, educational and service groups and Boy and Girl Scout organizations for distribution in the campaign. This was two million pieces more than last year.

Fire Prevention Week posters are being posted in public places, including every post office in the nation.

The Springlake Junior High school students have made posters, on fire prevention, which have been distributed throughout

the buildings. They have also written reports and learned the cost of fires.

Rain, Hail Lash Crops In Area, Twister Hits Friona Tuesday Afternoon

Rain and hail, causing heavy damage to property and crops fell Monday night in the Earth area with heavier crop losses in the Sudan area.

An estimated \$150,000 in damage to cotton crops was reported in the Sudan area alone.

The northwest corner of the South Plains received most of the rain and hail, with hailstones ranging from fine to the size of baseballs, according to reports.

The heaviest rainfall was reported at Muleshoe which was 1.85 inches.

In Sudan where damage appeared heaviest the ground was covered with small hail from 6 p. m. to 6:30 p. m. with some damage to roofs. A few minor injuries were reported along with the staggering cotton loss.

Farmer Bill Nix, a crop insurance adjuster, reported that damage was from 85 to 100 per cent loss in a 60 to 70 acre area hardest hit by "hen-egg sized" hail north of Sudan.

The Sudan storm started with light rain about 5 p. m. approximately one and one half hours before the hail began.

Rodney Balko, manager of Gatewood Ford Sales in Earth reported 25 to 30 cars damaged at Gatewood Motor Company in Sudan, with an average of \$600 dollars estimated damage to each car. Windshields were broken and car bodies were heavily damaged.

Muleshoe had small hail inside the city with larger stones outside.

Olton received more than one and one half inches of rain with city streets flooded and cars being drowned out at the northern edge of town.

Friona and Dimmitt also reported rain and hail.

In the Earth area among those reported to be heaviest hit by hail was on the Abe Griffin farm seven miles west of Earth with 75 per cent damage reported.

Bob Belew, who farms about eight miles west of Earth reported about 80 per cent damage to his cotton and the roof of his house was very heavily damaged.

E. W. Harper reported 50 to 80 per cent damage to his cotton seven miles west of Earth and about 60 per cent to the crop on his home place north and west of Earth.

V. J. Sigman, who farms near Lazbuddie reported 40 to 50 per cent damage to his cotton, a lot of which was already open.

Other farmers in the area had heavy damage to the crops Monday but the extent of the damage was not learned.

Twister Hits Friona
A twister dipped out of the murky skies at about 4:45 p. m. Tuesday demolishing two drive-in theatres in Friona.

The twister then lashed into a trailer court wrecking six trailer houses, then moved into farm residences where it heavily damaged out houses and sheds and shattered communication facilities. Late Tuesday residents west of Friona were without lights or telephones.

None of the occupants of the trailer houses were at home when the tornado struck. They had heard the towns warning sirens and had left their trailers.

Floyd Damron, a Friona trucker, was injured when the vicious twister picked up his truck, traded ends and slammed it down on its side in a grain field just west of Friona.

Hail the size of hen eggs, strong winds and rain battered crops into the ground.

Hail Hits Olton
A pounding hailstorm hit Olton about 8 p. m. Tuesday dumping hail the size of large marbles, reported more than two inches of rain with the heaviest portion of the storm believed to be centered over the city of Olton. Winds were estimated at fifty miles per hour.

Heavy rains and pounding hail also fell at Dimmitt, Bovina and Hereford.

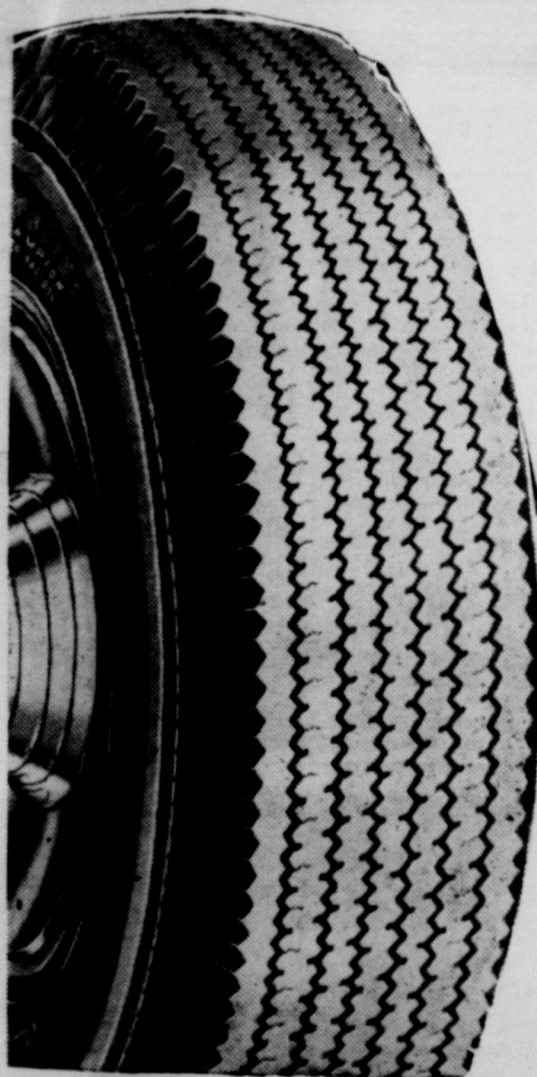

Pioneer Natural Gas Company Seeks Hike In Rates In Earth

The Earth City Commission received an application request from Pioneer Natural Gas Company to raise gas rates here by 10 per cent.

The request was received October 6, after the regular monthly meeting of the city commission, thus no action has been taken. The request for the raise in gas rates will be discussed at the next commissioners meeting to be held November 7.

Simultaneous requests will be filed with the governing bodies of 45 other Northwest Texas cities. Only cities in this area served by the company for which increased rates will not be sought are those which recently have granted increases. They are Panhandle, Pampa, Dalhart and Amarillo.

Last Increase in 1957
Last gas rate increase here was in 1957, a hike in the minimum bill of 25 cents per month. Under the increase sought, the average cost to the consumer is reckoned at \$6.55 per year.

The increase to be asked here and in other cities would increase minimum bills from \$1.50 to \$1.65 and the ten per cent hike would continue in all brackets. Gas costs vary downward with volume used.

Present average price per thousand cubic feet of gas consumed is 57.6 cents while the requested average price per thousand cubic feet would be 63.4 cents, an increase of 5.8 cents per thousand cubic feet.

A graph in the petition shows that the average rate for all Texas cities is 75 cents per thousand cubic feet.

Since 1951, operating expenses and general taxes per customer have risen from \$21.49 to \$31.19, another graph shows. Other graphs show that investment per customer in the distribution plants and equipment has risen from \$80 in 1947 to \$150 and the field cost of gas per thousand cubic feet has increased from 8 cents in 1952 to 16 cents, a raise of 50 per cent.

Service Rate Cited
The company's present general service rate is as follows: First

2,000 cubic feet or less per month \$1.50; next 8,000 cubic feet per month 55 cents per thousand cubic feet; next 40,000 cubic feet per month 50 cents per thousand; next 50,000 cubic feet 45 cents per thousand; next 200,000 cubic feet per month 35 cents per thousand; next 200,000 cubic feet per month 30 cents per thousand and all over 500,000 cubic feet per month 25 cents per thousand.

The requested general service rate would be: First 2,000 cubic feet or less per month \$1.65; next 8,000 cubic feet per month 60.5 cents per thousand; next 40,000 cubic feet 55 cents per thousand; next 50,000 cubic feet 50 cents per thousand; next 200,000 cubic feet 33 cents; and all over 500,000 cubic feet per month 28 cents per thousand feet.

A delayed payment charge of ten per cent would be added to the bill if not paid within ten days after date of billing as compared to one-ninth of the bill under the present general service rate.

The company's reason for the request is based, on increased cost of gas at the well, increased costs of labor and materials.

In filing the application, Pioneer officials will offer to meet with the commission at the latter's convenience to discuss details and make any explanations requested.

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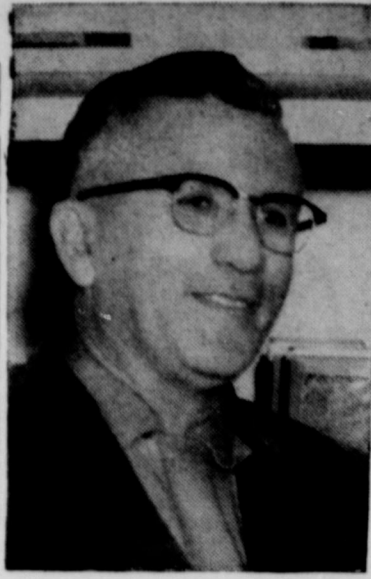
