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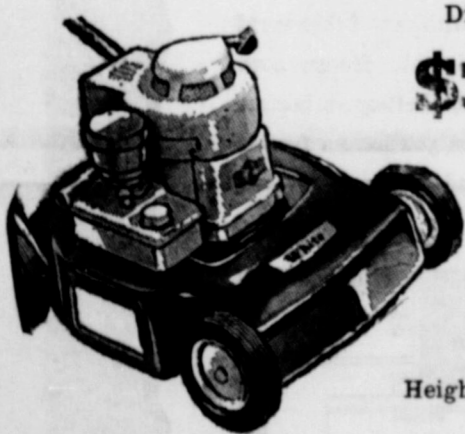

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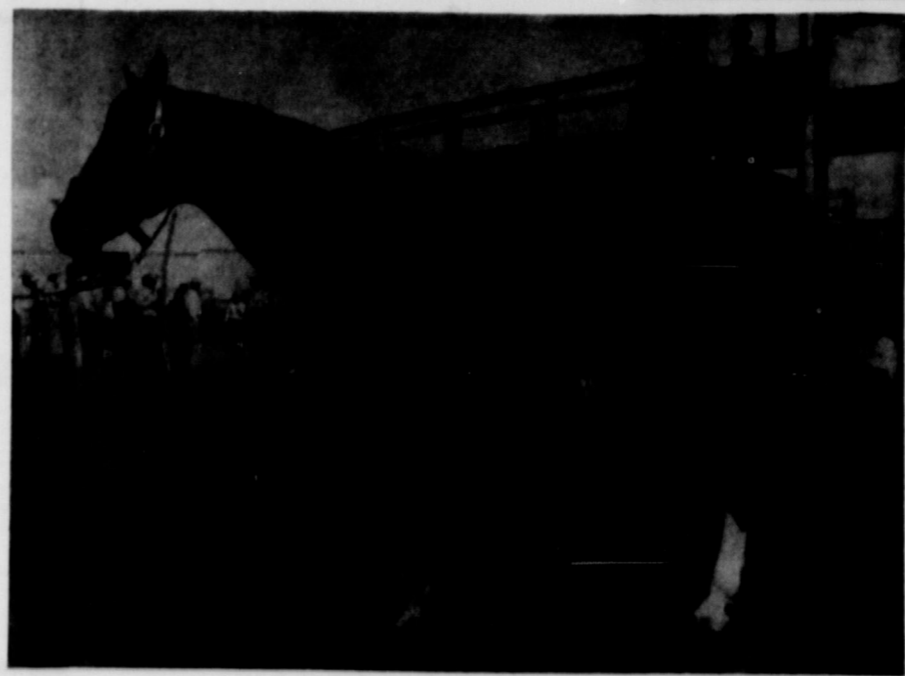
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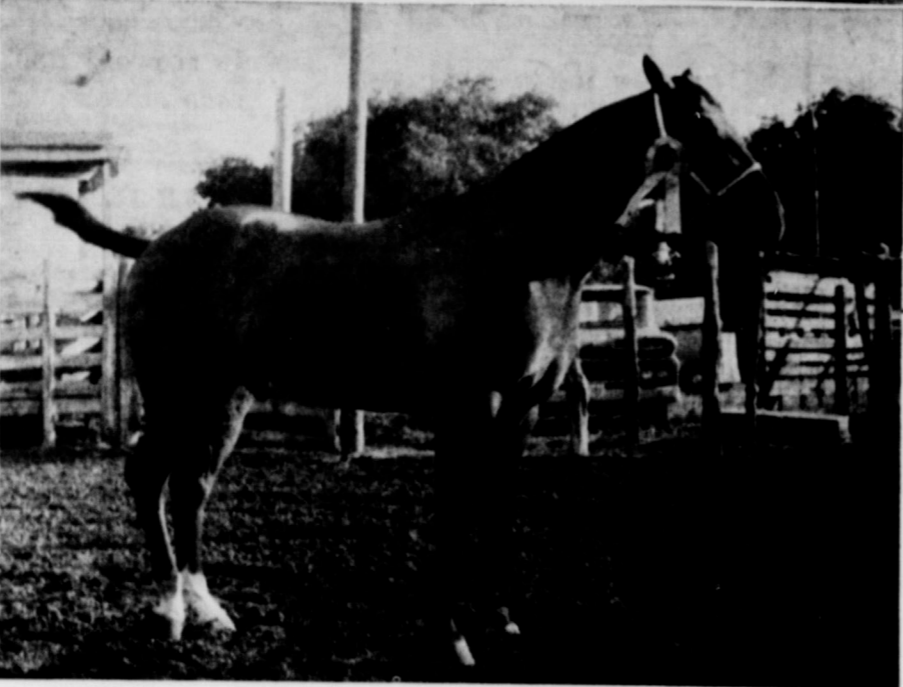

Ford Motor Doubles Rebate To Dealers For School Cars

Ford Motor Company moved today to make it easier for schools to borrow new cars for use in teaching student to drive.

James O. Wright, vice president-car and truck group, said Ford is doubling the amount of its rebate to dealers for new units loaned to schools for use in driver-training programs. Mr. Wright said the increase in the rebate from \$125 to \$250 a unit will be retroactive to the beginning of the 1960-61 school year.

At present, 2,689 Ford and Lincoln-Mercury dealers are participating in the program to provide cars for driver training. Of the 3,912 units now supplied by these dealers for driver-training, 2,633 are loaned. The remainder are either bought or leased by the schools or program sponsors.

It pleases us to say that our behavior problems have been minor this year but because of the national and world unrest they do exist.

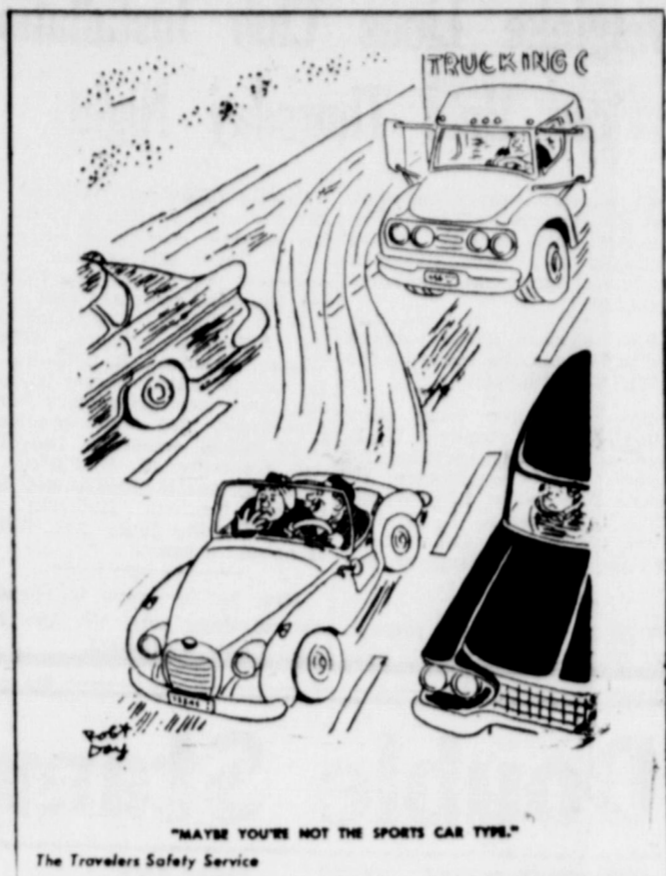

Ortis Wilkinson, disaster chairman, explained the county disaster program.

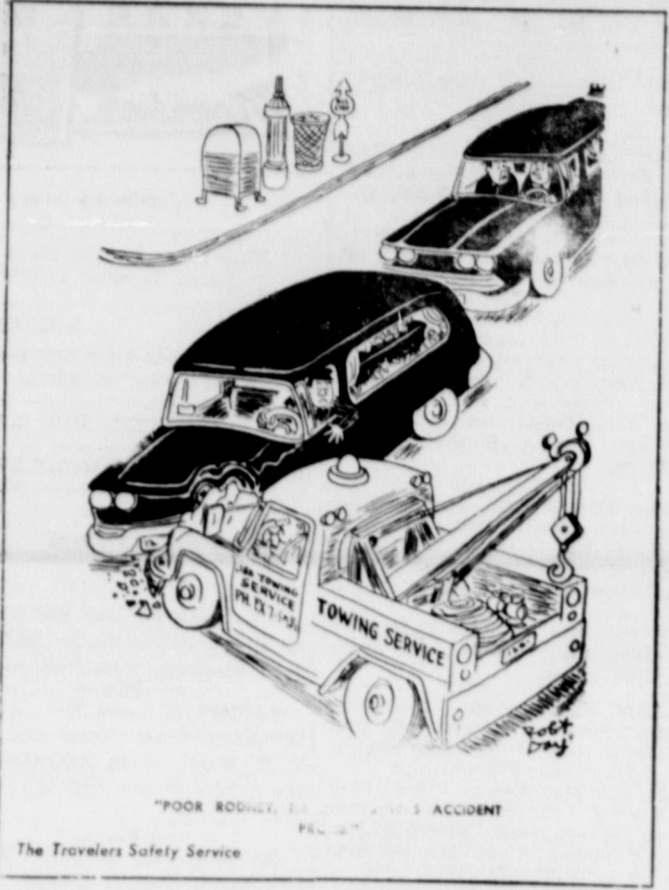

Lamb County Hit By Damaging Rain, Hail And Wind Sunday

Lamb County was hit late Sunday afternoon by damaging rain, hail and windstorm which destroyed a 3 and one half mile wide strip of crops in the center of the county.

Several acres were completely wiped out near Littlefield and a large number of farmers in the Springlake area received from 80 to 100 percent damages.

South of Springlake among the farms receiving 100 percent damage were Busby, Chitwood, LaDuke, Smith and Forward. West of Springlake Bibby and Clayton estimated 100 percent damages, as well as Less Walen and K. B. Parish, whose farms are north of town. This severe damage covered about a ten mile area according to several farmers of the area.

In the Littlefield area rain and marble size hail covered the ground so heavily it looked like snow. The storm began about 6 p.m. and lasted about an hour.

A carport was destroyed, a trailer house was blown from its foundation and a dozen power poles were blown over. Winds were estimated at 75 miles an hour.

Just west of Littlefield, about a mile from town, trees were uprooted, one side was blown out of a chickenhouse and a barn was destroyed.

Littlefield residents said water in the streets ran like rivers. The immediate Earth area was missed by Sunday's storm. On Wednesday, night of last week farmers around Earth were blessed with a gentle soaking rain which boosted crop prospects in the area.

The rain was fairly general over all of Lamb county with 1 and one half to 2 inches of rain falling.

Traffic Death Rate May Double July 4

Governor Price Daniel says Texans may die in the one-day Fourth of July holiday traffic at twice the average daily traffic death rate "unless everyone undertakes a real and conscious effort to prevent it."

Opening the fourth July 4 traffic safety campaign since taking office as Governor in January, 1957, Governor Daniel said he was again "calling on all law enforcement agencies, traffic safety citizen-support groups, mass communications media and everybody else interested in saving lives in Texas traffic to do everything possible to save human life during the long summer holiday season."

The Governor said records show that the second half of the year usually produces about 60 percent of all the traffic deaths in Texas. There is usually a noticeable increase in July traffic deaths over June, each year, because of the increased vacation travel and seasonal harvests.

"Under these circumstances," the Governor said, "the nationwide 'Slow Down and Live' campaign and our Statewide Fourth of July and Labor Day traffic safety crusades to save lives and reduce injuries in Texas traffic are timely and urgent."

"I have appealed to the sheriffs and chiefs of police in Texas to cooperate fully with the Texas Department of Public Safety in clearing our highways of drinking and speeding drivers. After four years of strenuous effort and a pointed campaign directed against these two types of traffic violations," the Governor said, "we found in 1960, that speed too great for conditions was still involved in 48 percent of all fatal crashes out on our highways. While that was a good improvement over the previous six-year average of 56 percent, there was no excuse for the loss of over 600 lives in these crashes alone."

"We also find," the Governor continued, "that driving while drinking was involved in 29 percent of all the fatal highway crashes. That figure represents a reduction from the 1959 'involve ment of 45 percent, but it is about average for the past six years. It means that more than 500 persons died in Texas highway crashes last year that involved drinking while driving."
