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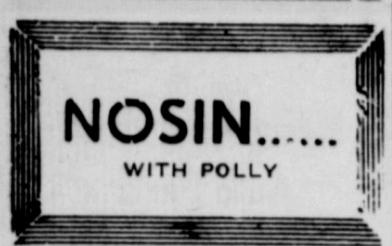

Dick Tracy had no troubles, compared to the troubles Earth's City Commission faces as they gather and attempt to liquidate a portion of their problems.

I am not positive as to why the easements were not secured and signed before the present contract or began work on the expansion of Earth's water and sewer project, which the city recently voted a bond to cover. These easements I was under the impression should have been signed prior to letting a contractor begin work. However, this is of little importance now. The point is work has begun and the contractor was stopped last week and held up until something could be done.

Those Aldermen have this problem on their shoulders, of getting easements signed, and they're spending long hours trying to figure out the solution in the best interest of the townspeople.

A project such as this cannot be feasible if they zig-zag to one resident's front yard and cross back to the alley of another. It must be a feasible project and cannot be bent to the whim of every city resident. The progress of a city must have some give and take, some devoted people, and some who think of their neighbors will fare as well as themselves.

Another problem they face is the fact that after much effort in the beginning to run the sewer and water to everyone who wanted service, some of the folks didn't want it, and putting it lightly, were not exactly boosters of the project and stated their views and controversial opinions on various occasions. However, after work has begun some of these residents have decided they want city water and sewer badly.

This problem was brought up and the boys went to work and after much discussion, agreed to let them in the city limits if they could get easements signed and alley permits from those four concerned in this particular addition and have them back in the City Office in a week, so as not to stop the contractor anymore or have to order more pipe and supplies, once he begins work in that direction.

These are only a part of their headaches, they have their own businesses to run and farms to attend, plus trying to devote the time to figuring out the problems and trying to get the easements signed all by themselves.

It would be nice if folks came into the office and signed their easements.

WANTED BY THE FBI



JOSEPH CORBETT, JR.

Corbett, one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives," is wanted for escape from the California Institution for Men, Chino, Calif., where he was serving a 5 years' to life sentence for murdering an Air Force sergeant. A Federal warrant was issued at Los Angeles, Calif., on March 21, 1960, charging him with unlawful interstate flight to avoid confinement for murder.

A white American, born on October 25, 1922, at Seattle, Wash., Corbett is 6 feet 1 inch to 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 160 to 170 pounds. He has light brown hair, hazel eyes, a fair complexion, a medium build, and has worked as a clerk-typist, laborer, warehouseman, laboratory technician, and silyd-resin cooker for a paint manufacturer. His two upper front teeth slant inward and he wears glasses, reportedly being extremely nearsighted and capable of seeing only close objects without them. He has a mole under his chin and a C-shaped scar on his right thumb.

Corbett, once a premedical student, is interested in scientific matters, avidly reads technical and travel books, and is intensely interested in firearms and target practice. He reportedly has a superior general intelligence and generally lives quietly and neatly but becomes erratic when drinking alcoholic beverages.

Convicted of second-degree murder, he is considered armed and dangerous.

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Dr. T. C. Longnecker, director of the High Plains Research Foundation announced that the Foundation is increasing its cotton research 34 percent over previous years. Dr. Longnecker stated that the Foundation has more acres of plot research with cotton this year than in 1959. This accelerated program in cotton research is a result of a cooperative research agreement that has been worked out between the High Plains Research Foundation and the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station No. 8 at Lubbock and College Station.

This cooperative arrangement in research will enable the Foundation to better serve the High Plains area. Personnel from the Agricultural Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and the Foundation are cooperating as research teams in conducting the joint research projects.

On commenting about the scope of the increased program of cotton research, Dr. Longnecker stated that the following cooperative projects are being conducted at the Foundation this year:

- (1) Regional cotton variety test;
- (2) date of planting experiment with cotton;
- (3) a climatology study involving different varieties, moisture levels, dates of planting, fertilizer levels, and varieties;
- (4) an in the furrow fungicide experiment;
- (5) a cotton harvesting study involving different varieties and various methods of harvesting;
- (6) planting equipment test using different types of planting equipment; and
- (7) a cotton irrigation experiment consisting of a detailed evaluation of different varieties, irrigation methods, and cultural practices.

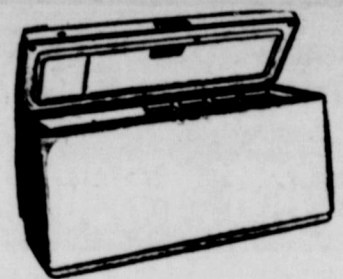

What Does The Bible Say About Regard For The Church?

Reading Time: 4 Minutes

The 27 books which compose the New Testament testify as to the identity and necessity of the church in the divine purpose and pattern of things. The subject of the church is not a mysterious theme, nor is it profound and difficult. On the contrary, like all things which concern man's salvation, it is simple and to the point.

Peter confessed the truth that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of God, and the Lord said: "Upon this rock I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it" (Matt. 16:18). Are we to believe that Jesus through his death established an institution on this earth not necessary?

Paul declares: "Christ also loved the church, and gave himself for it" (Eph. 5:25). Did Christ give Himself for a thing that is optional? Surely none will think that lightly of the death of the Savior! Read again: "Feed the church of God which he hath purchased with his own blood" (Acts 20:28). Am I to believe that the Son of God shed His blood for a non-essential church?

If anyone is to receive any benefit from the shed blood of Christ, he must find it through the church which the Lord purchased with His blood. If you have \$5.00 and buy a book with it, the only way in the world you will derive any benefit from that \$5.00 is through that book you purchased. Thus it is with the blood of Christ and the church. Christ bought the church with His blood. If you will gain any benefit from the blood of Christ, you will gain it through the church he purchased.

But obviously there are many so-called Christians today who belittle the necessity of the church of the Lord. Thus something is strangely wrong: "Christ and 'Christians' are contrary to each other. One is right and the other is wrong. One is God's will and the other is not.

Leading the crowds who deny the essentiality of the church,

are many modern-day preachers. They stand in the pulpits of the land and declare it is not necessary to be a member of the church to receive the Lord's blessings of salvation. Like the Pharisees they "compass sea and land to make one proselyte" and then labor hard to convince him that the church is not necessary to salvation!

If these men study the Bible, they know the church was built by Christ, that He died for the church, that He purchased the church with His blood. They surely know that the church is the body of Christ over which He rules as Head (Eph. 1:22-23). They surely know that the church is the House of God made up of His children (Tim. 3:15; Heb. 3:6). In spite of these things they vehemently proclaim that the church has nothing to do with salvation!

There are some unfaithful members of the church of the Lord who join the crowd in declaring that Jesus died for a non-essential church. These are people who once died to sin and were baptized in His name, but now they count the blood of the covenant of not enough importance to remain faithful. It is hard to preach over them because they have once tasted the blessings in Christ, but have now turned their backs on Him who died for them.

Then there is a great host of pious religious persons who never read their Bibles, and are satisfied to accept what the preacher says without examining the scriptures for the Truth (Acts 17:11). Consequently, they assume the church is a good thing, but actually not connected in any way with salvation. They are so complacent and asleep that they cannot see their destruction ahead!

Kind reader, the Bible is the only revelation of God's will on earth. If it teaches us the necessity of being a member of the church of the Lord, let us accept the Truth and disregard all human opinions entirely. You can accept the forgiveness in the blood of Christ by obeying His gospel, and thus becoming a member of his Church.

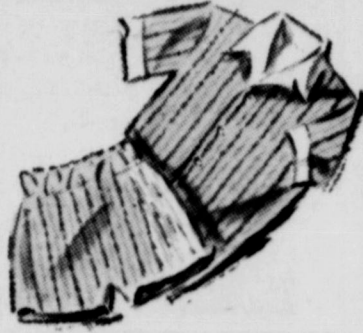

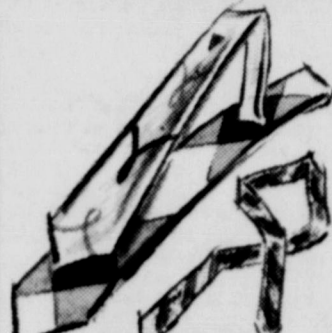
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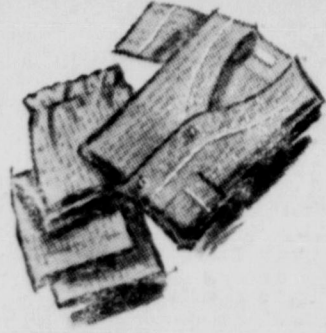

Rotary Lawn Mower Can Be Lethal Weapon

College Station. — Did you know a rotary power lawn mower blade travels at speeds up to 150 miles per hour and is capable of throwing sticks, stones, or other objects at comparable speeds. Imagine what would happen if you were hit by one of these fast-flying objects.

Power lawn mowers are now in the majority both in town and among farm people. Along with their increased use has been a closely related increase in accidents involving both operators and bystanders. Most accidents have been due to carelessness or lack of knowledge on the part of the individual.

W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural engineer, offers these suggestions on how to operate your rotary power lawn mower safely and efficiently.

Always disconnect spark plug wire before working on the blade.

A clean sharp blade does a better cutting job and requires less power.

Never operate mower with safety shields removed.

Make sure all rocks and debris are removed from the area before close mowing.

Do not refill the gasoline tank when engine is hot or running. Run mower as slow as possible to do good work.

Keep children and pets away from mowers.

Always be certain of sure footing.

Never leave engine running when mower is unattended.

Make sure mower is steady and under control before starting engine.

Always be aware of the hazards involved when you are using a power mower.

Don't get caught napping.

Bagworm Control Time Is Here

College Station. — Bagworms are, or soon will be, active in all parts of the State. The time to obtain good control of these pests is when they are young, as chemicals applied after the worms are grown gives no control, says James Hawkins, assistant extension entomologist.

After hatching, the larvae immediately start to feed on the foliage of ornamental plants. The young worms spin a silken bag about themselves and as they feed attach bits of foliage to this bag. The worms carry this bag with them as they come about. When the worms are grown, this bag

is one and a half to two inches long and affords the worm almost complete protection.

In September the female worm deposits her eggs in the bag and then dies. The bags should be picked from infested plants and burned because the eggs for next seasons worms go through the winter inside the bags.

Hawkins recommended 10 percent toxaphene or 4 percent malathion dust as a control. Lead arsenate, toxaphene or malathion spray can also be used. Remember, the entomologist concludes, these chemicals are effective only if used when the worms are young.

For additional information on control of bagworms ask your local county agent for L-199, "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants."

Osborn Re - Elected State Representative

In the Democratic run-off election held Saturday, June 4, State Representative Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe edged by Clarence Hamilton of Earth by 684 votes. Total votes received by Osborn were 4,511 while Hamilton had 3,827.

Hamilton led Osborn in Lamb County, 2,108 to 977 but Muleshoe incumbent took the lead in three other counties, Bailey, Parmer, and Deaf Smith. The contestants held very close votes in Castro county.

Results in other counties were Deaf Smith: Osborn 904, Hamilton 571; Parmer: Osborn 1,017, Hamilton 268; Bailey: Osborn 1,964, Hamilton 347; Castro: Osborn 549, Hamilton 533.

In the Earth-Springlelake precinct, in Earth voting box Osborn received 48 votes and Hamilton 265. In the Springlelake voting box Osborn received 40 votes and Hamilton 109.

A total of 3,249 voters went to the polls in Lamb county Saturday, compared to 5,093 in the first primary.

Over the state McDonald led Davidson 329,702 to 305,258, votes for Court of Criminal Appeals.

A little more than a third as many voters in the state balloted in the second primary as did in the first Democratic primary May 7.

In Lamb Counties precinct, J. J. L. (Roy) Yeager defeated Otha (Skipper) Smith for county commissioner 1123 votes to 457.

In precinct 1, A. J. Spain won over C. M. Moss by 531 to 504 votes for county commissioner.
