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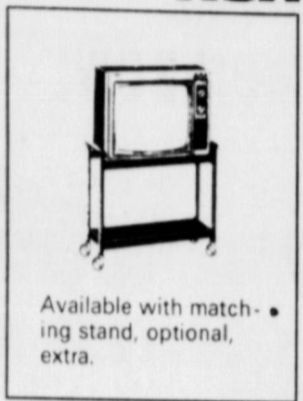

Springlake-Earth Wolverine's offense scored 14 points in the first half Friday night and the defense held the Dimmitt Bobcats to 13 points to win, 14-13. Brian Sanderson scored from 9 yards out and Nicho Triana kicked the extra point in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Larry Thomas connected with Luis Palacio on a 5 yard pass for the Wolverines second TD and Triana booted the extra point to make the scoring 14-0 at half time.

In the third quarter the Bobcats scored 7 points.

The final TD of the game was scored by quarterback Terry Powell. The try for 2 points to win the game failed, and the final score was Wolverines 14 and Bobcats 13.

Wolverine individual statistics showed Sanderson carrying the ball 19 times for 21 yards total and one touchdown.

Rudy Moreau carried the ball 9 times for 15 yards, Thomas, 12 times for 5 yards and Lonnie Wilson, one time for 3 yards.

In the passing department, Thomas completed 4 of 11 attempts for 75 yards and one TD.

Palacio had one reception for 5 yards and a TD. Moreau had two receptions for 45 yards and Hal Wood received one pass for 25 yards.

The Wolverines ran a total of 50 rushing plays for 59 yards and the Bobcats had 38 rushing plays for a total of 115 yards.

In passing the Wolverines gained 75 yards and the Bobcats gained 53 yards.

Total yards passing, rushing and penalties showed the Wolverines with 200 yards and the Bobcats 183 yards.

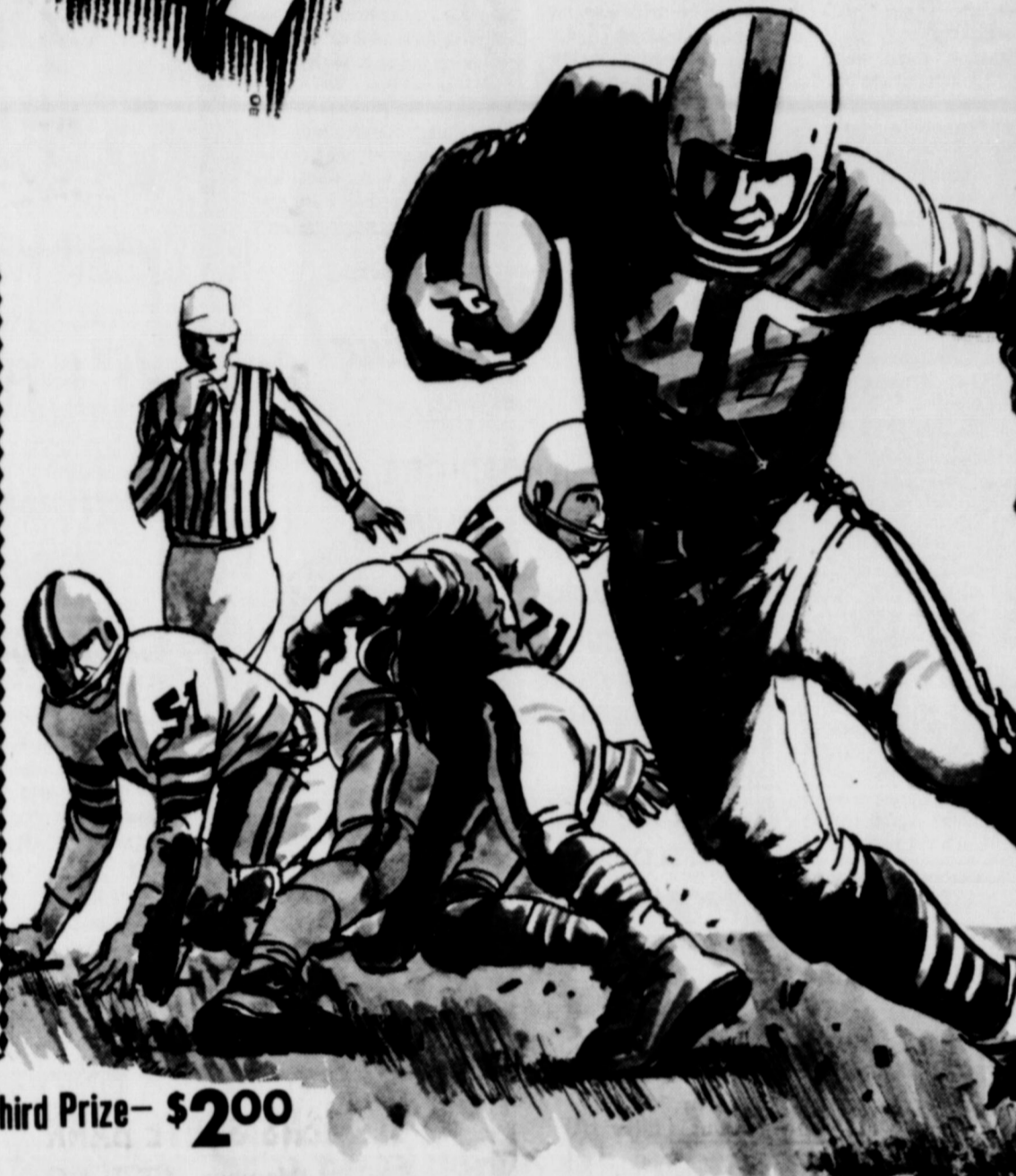

August Bad Month for Wrecks in County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1972 shows a total of 67 accidents, resulting in seven persons killed and 53 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in August, 1972 of 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 581 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 400 persons injured. This was 12 more accidents, three more fatalities and 41 less injured in 1972, at the same period of time.

The 28 deaths for the month of August 1972 occurred in the following counties: Castro, four; Palo Pinto, three; Lubbock, Carson, Deaf Smith, and Gray, two each; Clay Cochran, Hale, Haskell, Lamb,

Lynn, Montague, Parker, Stonewall, Wichita, Wise, Yoakum, and Briscoe, one each.

Young Farmers View Film

Jimmy Nail from the Plains Cotton Marketing Association in Lubbock, presented a film and discussion on how to increase Cotton Profit From Stalk To Bale, to the Springlake-Earth Young Farmers at their last regular monthly meeting, September 21.

Mr. Nail said that from \$10 to \$24 per bale could be saved by using a new method of stacking or ricking the cotton on the turn row in the field when there is a shortage of cotton trailers and then later moving it to the gin as trailers are available. The new method means new economics for the grower, too. Since the grower stores his cotton in the field, the ginner can gin at a constant rate over a longer ginning season.

AUSTIN—Three new members have been elected to the nine-member Texas Soybean Producers Board which administers a fund for research, disease and insect control, education and promotion of Texas soybeans.

Chosen by soybean producers to six-year terms on the board were Jack Witten, of Edmonson, Hale County; Don Blacketer of Honey Grove, Fannin County; and Jack Stoesser of Dayton, Liberty County. They succeed Loyd Goldston and W. A. Maby of Petersburg and L. O. Feagley of Littlefield, whose terms were expiring.

The organizational meeting of the new school board is scheduled to be held in Paris, October 17.

In a 1970 election, soybean producers voted to assess themselves a half cent per bushel for the fund which the board administers. The election was authorized by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White after a public hearing on the application of the Texas Soybean Producers Association.

Absentee Voting

point outside the county and the affidavit on the carrier envelope is certified by an officer or notary public other than an officer or notary public of the county of the voter's residence.

(C) Qualified voters who, after the beginning of the period for absentee voting, (October 18, 1972) apply for an absentee ballot on the ground of expected absence from the county and who are absent from such county at the time of applying for an absentee ballot and expected to be absent from such county during the clerk's regular office hours for the remainder of the period for absentee voting may vote absentee by mail. The voter must state in his application that he is absent from the county at the time of making the application and expects to be absent on election day and during the clerk's regular office hours for the remainder of the period for absentee voting. The clerk shall not mail a ballot to any such voter unless the envelope in which the application is received is postmarked from a point outside the county, and the ballot must be mailed to the voter at an address outside the county. The ballot shall not be counted unless the envelope in which the application is received and the carrier envelope in which the ballot is

returned to the clerk are each postmarked from a point outside the county and the affidavit on the carrier envelope is certified by an officer or notary public other than an officer or notary

public of the county of the voter's residence.

In all methods of voting absentee by mail (A, B, & C) each application for an absentee ballot to be voted by mail shall state the applicant's permanent address and the address to which the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the applicant and shall also state the address to which the absentee ballot is to be mailed to the applicant and shall also state the address to which his registration certificate is to be mailed back to him. In all methods (A, B, & C), the application shall be accompanied by the voter's registration certificate or his affidavit that the registration certificate has been lost or misplaced. Such affidavit form is contained in the ap-

plication form and must be signed before a notary public. In all methods of voting by mail, the voter shall mark the ballot before a notary public or other person authorized to administer oaths, sign his name on the back of the ballot stub, detach the stub from the ballot, fold the ballot, and place it in the envelope marked "Ballot Envelope" and seal the same. The voter shall then place the stub and the ballot envelope in the carrier envelope, seal the same and sign and swear to the affidavit on the carrier envelope, which shall be certified by the notary public or other officer before whom the ballot is marked. The carrier envelope shall then be mailed to the county clerk. Service men and their dependents are urged to send their official Federal Post Card Applications to vote absentee as soon as possible. Service men and their dependents need not be registered as a voter when they send the Federal Post Card Ap-

plication. If they are registered they need not accompany their application with their registration certificate. Those who vote absentee by personal appearance in the county clerk's office (after October 18) are urged to bring with them their voter's registration certificate.

Applications to vote absentee by mail are available in any County Clerk's office in the State of Texas. The citizens of Lamb County that wish to vote by mail and if they qualify should call the county clerk's office in Littlefield and request the application. The clerk's office will then begin to process the applications.

Students who are attending school out of Lamb County should call the County Clerk's office as soon as possible their applications may be mailed to them now. Parents of students may also request the information to the County Clerk's Office.

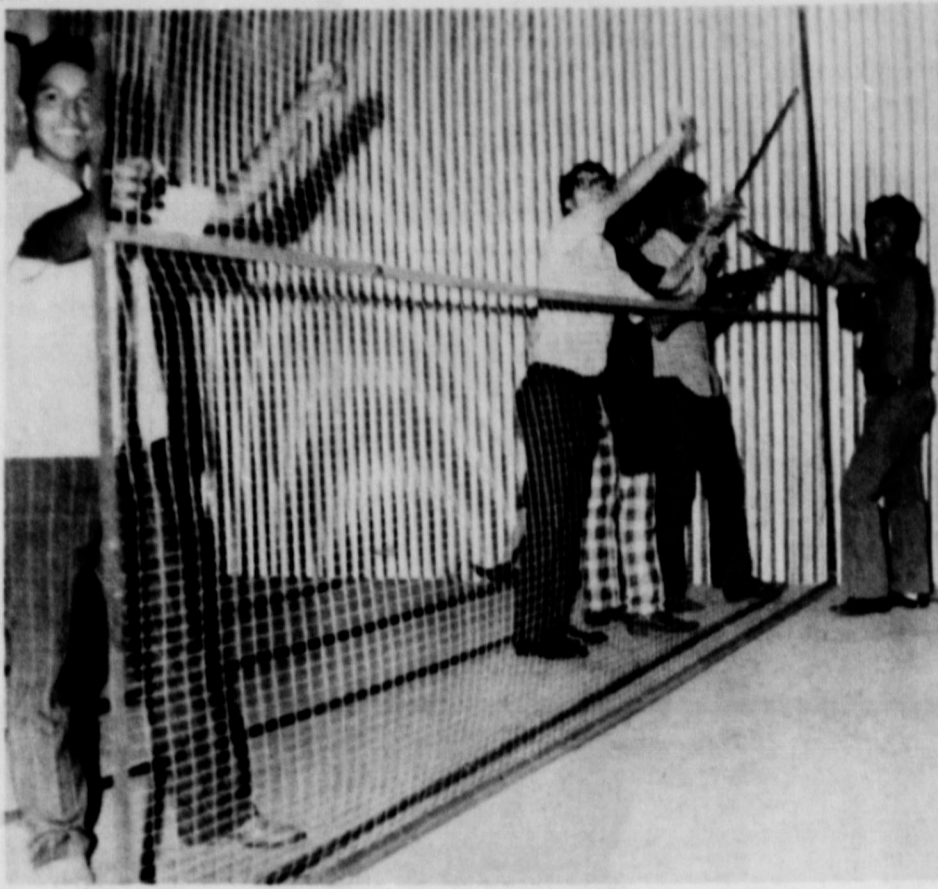
