at the County Clerk's Office. Each year the Texas absentee voting laws become more complicated. In most cases, when person qualifies to vote absentee by mail, voting material must go through the mail four different times before their ballot is finally placed in the

ballot box. The voters that are in one of the categories listed below and wish to vote absentee by mail are urged to contact the County Clerk's office now.

Art. 5.05 of the Texas Election Laws reads as follows:

Subdivision I. Any qualified voter of this state who expects to be absent from the county of his residence on the day of the election, or who because of sickness, physicial disability, or religious belief cannot appear at the polling place in the election precinct of his residence on the day of the election may cause his vote to be cast at any election held in this state by compliance with the applicable method herein provided for absentee voting. Absentee voting shall be conducted by two methods: (1) voting by personal appearance at the clerk's office (starting October 18) and (2) voting by mail (applications being accepted now but ballots will not be mailed until the first day of absentee voting, October 18). THE FOLLOWING, AND NO OTHER, MAY VOTE BY MAIL

(A) Qualified voters who because of sickness or physical disability cannot appear at the polling place on the day of the election may vote absentee by mail.
