The "Valentines for Hero's in Vietnam" project recently undertaken by our local FFA Chapter, along with several other chapters over the Plains, resulted in letters of appreciation from some of the boys receiving the Valentines and gifts from the local chapter.

February 11, 1966
Da Nang, Vietnam

Dear Jamie,

The Chaplin brought around a big box of Valentines and was much surprised to see that its from a Texan! You see I am from Texas myself, Texas Chapter that is. Its just a little town 18 miles from Galveston and about 25 miles from Houston.

Lets see now, I'll tell you about myself. I am 6'2", 175 lbs, blond hair, blue eyes, and am 20 years old. I have been in the Navy for 3 years and 6 months. I am due to be discharged August 22, 1966. (I hope!) I have been where the fighting is and have been wounded twice. Thats why I am here at a Medical Battalion. I have seen many men killed and some were Texans, but they died like a Texan would want to die, fighting. Combat is something that one cannot explain, you have to be there to see, feel and see the pain. I can sum it up in two words I guess, "Living Hell!" Its hot here year round and its usually about 95 degrees in the shade. In the summer months it gets up usually about 130 degrees in the shade.

I better explain what I do here, well, I am a Navy Hospital Corpsman attached to the Marines. I was with 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines and I am now with "C" Company, 3rd Medical Battalion. It's terribly lonely here and I must say I will be glad if you would write. I have no girl and I don't get much mail. I did have a girl, I was going to marry but, I got the old "Dear John Letter."

I hope you will send a picture of yourself to me. I sure do get tired of looking at the ugly faces of the guys. A beautiful face would keep me going for days. I will send you a picture as soon as I can get some. It's kind of hard to get pictures around here. I mean get them developed and printed.

I am also a musician, rock and roll style. Before I came over here I was working with a group in California. We made the big times, but we were all sent to Viet Nam. By the way, I am a drummer.

Well, I must close now. Please send a picture and write. I've got to get back to work.

Well to start off with I am a pfc, I have black hair, green eyes and about 5'7. Well enough about me. I would like to hear from you and you tell me about yourself.

Attend "Operation Teenager" Today

"Operation Teenager" is scheduled for 11:30 a. m. Thursday in the Springlake-Earth School Auditorium. Everyone in the area is invited to attend this program co-sponsored by the Lions Clubs of Springlake and Earth along with the local P. T. A.

The idea of "operation teenager" was born in January of 1962, when a young inmate who worked in the education department of the Texas Department of Corrections read an article about three inmates of the Hawaiian Penal System being permitted to make talks to audiences of young people outside the prison.

After some thought, he discussed the matter with three other inmates, and the four began thinking of the possibility of starting a similar program in the Texas Department of Corrections. For weeks, they discussed different ideas during their leisure time about the type of program that could possibly prevent teenagers from making mistakes that would eventually lead to prison. Each man was deeply concerned about the rising tide of juvenile crime and the increasing number of young men and women entering the gates of the penitentiary.

It is very unusual for men in prison to admit the mistakes they have made. A great disadvantage of the early discussions was that one could live for many years with another man, and yet, not really know him. After a few sessions of breaking the ice, each man started to reveal the true facts about himself. It was difficult for them to start, but as they progressed, they began to know themselves, possibly for the first time. It soon became apparent to the men that their crimes hadn't just happened. They realized that their real trouble had started during their teenage years when they were forming habits and attitudes, choosing goals and ideals, whether good or bad, that they would carry with them into their adult life. It was then plain to these men that if such a program was to be successful and effective in helping young people, they must be scrupulously honest and sincere about themselves in the presentation.

Fortunately, each of the four men had different family and ethnic backgrounds so that their stories would not be repetitive; One had been raised in an upper class family and was a college graduate; another had come from lower class surroundings of a large city; one was familiar with torment and heartbreak of a broken home; the fourth was the son of a tenant farmer. Each had a different story to tell, and each felt that by sharing his story with teenagers, the young people could be made to see the waste, futility, and tragedy that results from a life of crime. In this way, they hoped to help others from committing similar mistakes in the struggle to maturity.

The officials of the Texas Department of Corrections were quick to see the merit and potential value of the program when they were approached by the four inmates. The four men began making appearances in February of 1962, and to date, have delivered their talks to more than 650,000 youths of Texas. They are accompanied in their travels to fill engagements by an employee of the education department in the prison system.

The impact of the presentation on anyone who has seen it will bear testimony as to the effectiveness of the program and the beneficial results that have been achieved. The reaction, response, and support the project has received is indicative of its success. Many commendations have been received from parents, educators, clergymen, and law enforcement officials, but the most numerous and gratifying come from the young people themselves. Some of the more frequent comments received from teenagers are: "You certainly have made me realize the things I have been doing wrong," and, "You have made me see that men in prison are no different than anyone else." Another comment heard very often is, "We see that it can happen to us if we aren't careful in choosing friends, habits, and ideals by which we live. Often, young people confess past mistakes and express gratitude for having the opportunity of seeing where they were headed.

Local School Board Amends Budget

Present Total
\$455,877

The local board voted to amend the original school budget of \$448,377 to take in a recent grant from the Federal government. The amended budget is presently in the amount of \$455,877. The major categories involved in the increased budget is specified for the purchase of library books and equipment.

The board discussed the probability of a night time reading program to be handled similar to the summer drivers education class, as a tuition class. Supr. Mann said there would be no reason why the equipment would not be available for use if a teacher were available to instruct the class or classes. However no concrete decision was reached.

In discussing the reading classes Mann explained to the board, that since Springlake-Earth began their reading class after the beginning of the second semester and all the students had by that time enrolled in something else, there was no time available throughout the day to work in these new reading classes, as a result the best thing they could figure out was to take students out of other classes, that would hurt them less to be omitted. Such as health classes etc., where they had received one semester study or more, and had placed them in the new federal financed reading classes. Though they were not attending these classes this semester, they were continuing to receive a grade in these classes from which they had been taken from.

At least one board member questioned the practice of giving a grade to students who no longer attended such classes. Mann, explained that in some cases a plan had previously been set up where students were to take certain subjects for a number of years in order to graduate. If they failed to receive these grades in these subjects, it might tend to prevent a student from graduating at the proper time. He went on to explain, it was his understanding that this practice was customary in schools all over the Panhandle.

The matter seemed to be dropped at that point. The board voted to have a school board election April 2 in the study hall of high school building. The two vacancies on the board are those created by the terminations of the three year terms of Orville Cleaveger and Price Hamilton. Candidates may file by obtaining an application form from the Superintendent's office. Deadline for filing is set for March 2.

Absentee voting will begin March 10 through March 29. This can be done in school tax office from 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. daily. Mrs. Leon Dent has been appointed absentee clerk. Phil Laught was named election judge, with Dwayne Jones selected as alternate judge and clerk. The two additional (Continued on page 3)

Voter Registration Bill Now Before Legislators

State Representative, Bill Clayton of Springlake called from Austin Tuesday afternoon to report the House and Senate had met Monday in a joint session with Governor Connally addressing the group, and indicating he had called the governing legislative bodies together for no other legislative matters other than the voters registration.

Representative Gene Fondren of Taylor, Texas introduced a bill which was referred to the state affairs committee, of which Representative Clayton is a member. A hearing on the new bill, Bill Clayton said, was set for Wednesday (yesterday). It will require two-thirds of the total votes to put the bill into effect, and it is indicated that 104 or 105 legislators will vote for the bill which has 84 co-sponsors of the bill. The bill provides for an annual registration with no fees.

The registration dates will conform with the same dates Texans now pay their poll tax. There is however a temporary arrangement made for those who did not pay poll tax this year. This 15 day period will be sometime during the month of March.

Clayton went on to disclose the fact that this piece of legislation depended on two factors. First, he explained, "The Attorney General, Waggoner Carr was appealing the Federal Court's decision, to do away with poll tax, to the Supreme Court. If the Supreme Court should uphold the lower courts decision, then the bill would become effective. The remaining factor was that should the majority of Texan vote in the November election to abolish poll tax, the bill would then become effective, Representative Clayton said,

Congressman Rogers Schedules Meeting in District Cities

Congressman Walter Rogers, a veteran of eight terms in the U. S. House of Representatives and second ranking majority member on the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, will be honored at a Community Center reception, Monday February 21 at 7 p. m. in the community center in Littlefield.

This reception being held to give the people of the Lamb County area an opportunity to meet and get acquainted with the Congressman, who if the redistricting holds up, will be the Congressman for this area, as Lamb and Bailey Counties move into the 19th Congressional District.

The Congressman, chairman of the Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation will be making his second trip to the area since the redistricting became effective. This will, however, be the first trip that will allow him to visit with the people of the area, and become better acquainted with their problems.

"I am looking forward to discussing first-hand with residents of the 18th Congressional District the problems now facing the Congress in this new Session," Congressman Rogers said. "Of course, the Viet Nam war is of primary importance, but in addition there are a number of questions before Congress concerning agriculture and the Nation's economy generally, as well as the 1966 legislative program."

Congressman Rogers plans to return to Washington February 23 in time for the resumption of hearings February 24 aimed at pin-pointing the cause of recent electric power blackouts in the Northeastern United States and elsewhere. The Congressman was appointed chairman of the special sub-committee to conduct the House of Representatives' investigation of the power failures and to make recommendations.

Before leaving for Texas, Congressman Rogers will preside Monday and Tuesday when his Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation will hold hearings on water resources expansion

legislation and on the saline water program. In making the announcement of the reception, the Democratic Women said this would not be a partisan meeting, it is open to the public, and they hope that people will take this opportunity to become better acquainted with the Congressman.

This meeting is for the entire county and delegations are expected from each community in the county.

Local Boys Enter Lamb County Livestock Show

Over 180 entries have been received for the Lamb County Junior Livestock Show which will be held in Littlefield Friday and Saturday, February 18 and 19.

The entry list is expected to grow considerably as the Olton entries had not yet been received by the Extension Service Office, and in former years the boys and girls in the Olton area have entered many animals in the show.

The final total entry list is expected to be near that of last year, when a total of 292 animals were entered in the two-day show. The number of lamb entries is expected to reach a figure over that of last year when a total of 82 were entered.

The final entry total for calves is expected to be near that of last year when 56 entries were received but a decrease is probable in the number of swine entered as the total for last year was 154 and not over 110 to 120 are expected this year.

Approximately \$750 in prizes will be distributed as premiums as Littlefield and Olton have guaranteed \$200 each; Amherst, Sudan, and Earth-Springlake \$100 each and Spade 50 dollars.

In addition, the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Steer and Reserve Champion Swine and four lamb class champions will receive trophies.

There will be divisions for steers in the Hereford class and the Angus and other breed class. In the lamb judging there will

be four classes, fine wool, medium wool, Southdown and animals showing evidence of Southdown breeding and Shropshires and the fourth class will be cross breed fine and medium wool.

Sifting will start at 1:30 p. m. Friday afternoon with the lamb judging starting at 5:30 Friday evening.

Judging of barrows will start at 9 a. m. Saturday morning with the steer judging scheduled to start at one Saturday afternoon.

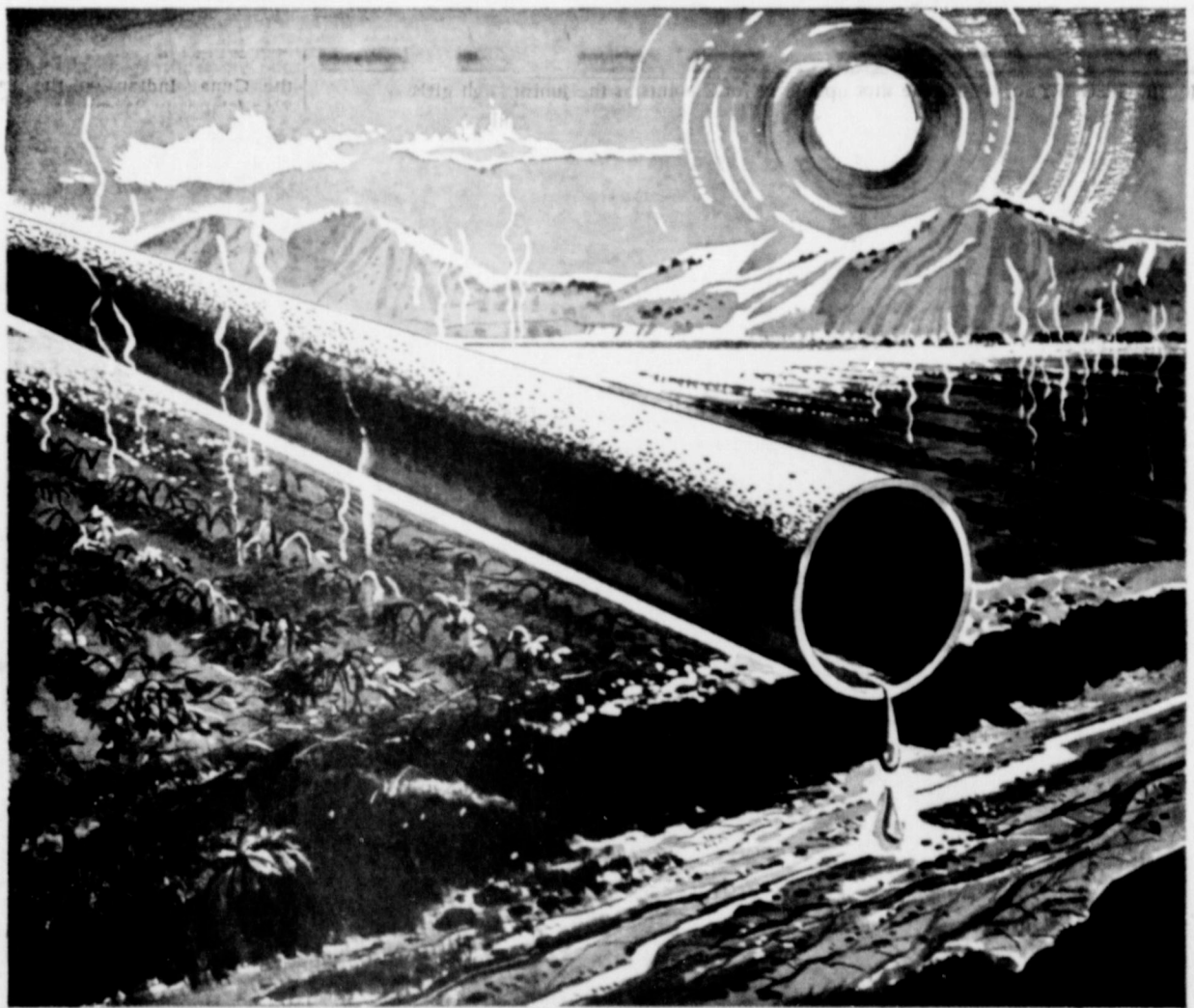

Religious Drama Presented At Springlake Church

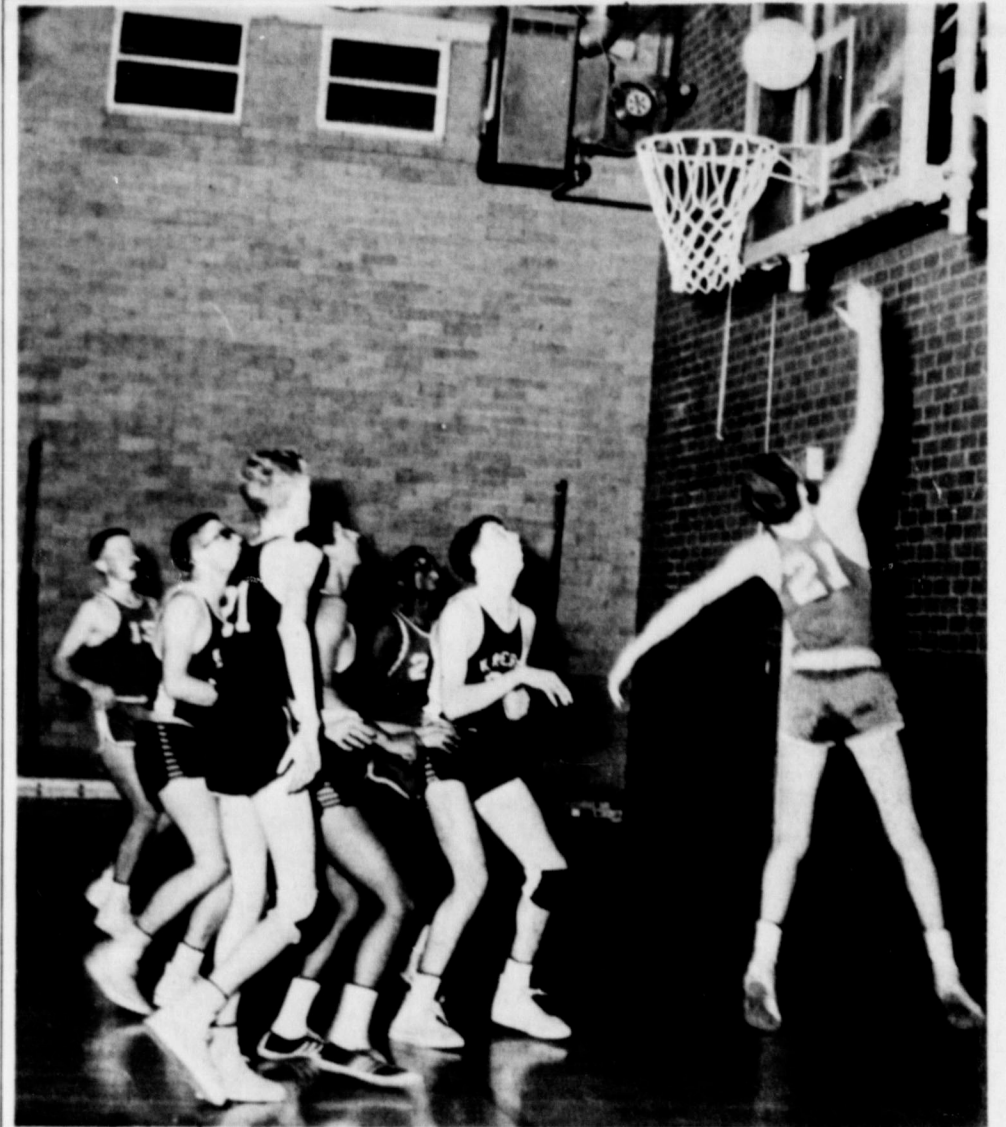

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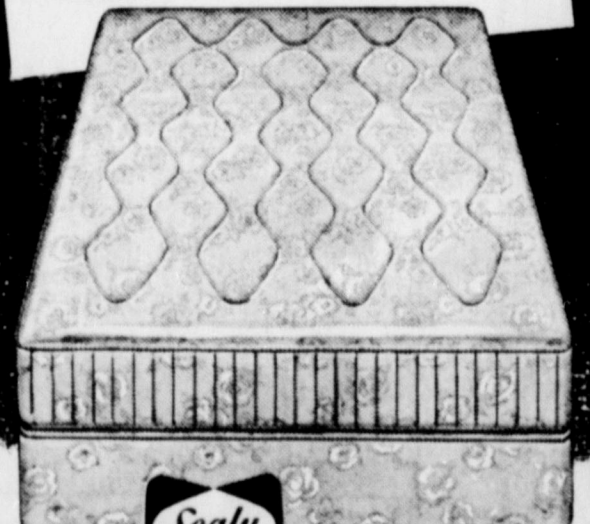
