The impact of the presentation on anyone who has seen it will bear testimony as to the effectiveness of the program and the beneficial results that have been achieved. Clayton went on to disclose the fact that this piece of Legislature depended on two factors First, he explained, "The Attorney General, Waggoner Carr was appealing the Federal Court's decision, to do away with poll tax, to the Supreme Court. If the Supreme Court should uphold the lower courts decision, then the bill would become effective.
