## Car Stolen From School Grounds

Three youths, from Cal Farley's Boys Ranch near Vega were apprehended in Wichita Falls at 3 A.M. Sunday morning and held in custody for Earth law officials after they had stolen a car at the Springlake School grounds Saturday afternoon around 9 P.M. This was the second attempt the lads had made to steal an auto there.

The youths were among the 900 boys from surrounding schools participating in a track meet at Springlake Schools Saturday.

The first car the lads attempted to steal was a '63 Ford owned by Larry Parish. The car was spotted by Parish, who was riding past the school with Randy Kelley and Phil Middleton as his car was pulled away from its parking place on the school lot, so the three Earth-Springlake lads followed close behind to see who was driving the Parish automobile. The three thieves, spotting themselves being followed, turned around and returned the car to the school parking lot. When the local boys walked up to the car, one of the boys asked if the car belonged to Carl Anderson. Parish told them the car was his, so the three apologized and the three local lads forgot the incident.

The second attempt was successful. The stolen automobile a 1959 Chevrolet Bel-Air, was parked on the school parking lot, at 2 P.M. with the keys left in the ignition by the owner, Mrs. Betty Matlock of Springlake, who was practicing volleyball in the school gym. When practice was completed around 3 o'clock she returned to find her car missing. Thinking at first someone was pulling a joke on her, she looked for the car for quite awhile before notifying Supt. Bill Mann, that her car had been stolen.

Local law officials, Deputy Homer Whisman and City Marshall Clarence Hazlett were called to the school to investigate and a statewide alert was

broadcast, giving a description of the car and the youths.

The three youths, two age 15 and the third 16, were taken into custody when Wichita Falls police found the Matlock car parked along side the highway near a washateria, where it had run out of gasoline. When this happened the lads immediately set out to steal a second car near by with intentions, they said, of cyphering the gasoline from the later automobile to place in the Matlock car so they could go on to Oklahoma. When law officials apprehended the lads they were inside the car near washateria. Deputy Sheriff, Homer Whisman, City Marshall Clarence

Hazlett and Mr. Matlock went to Wichita Falls Monday and returned the car and the youths. The boys were placed in the County Jail in Littlefield where the 16 year old is being held for a courts decision. The two 15 year old boys have been released to Boys Ranch officials.

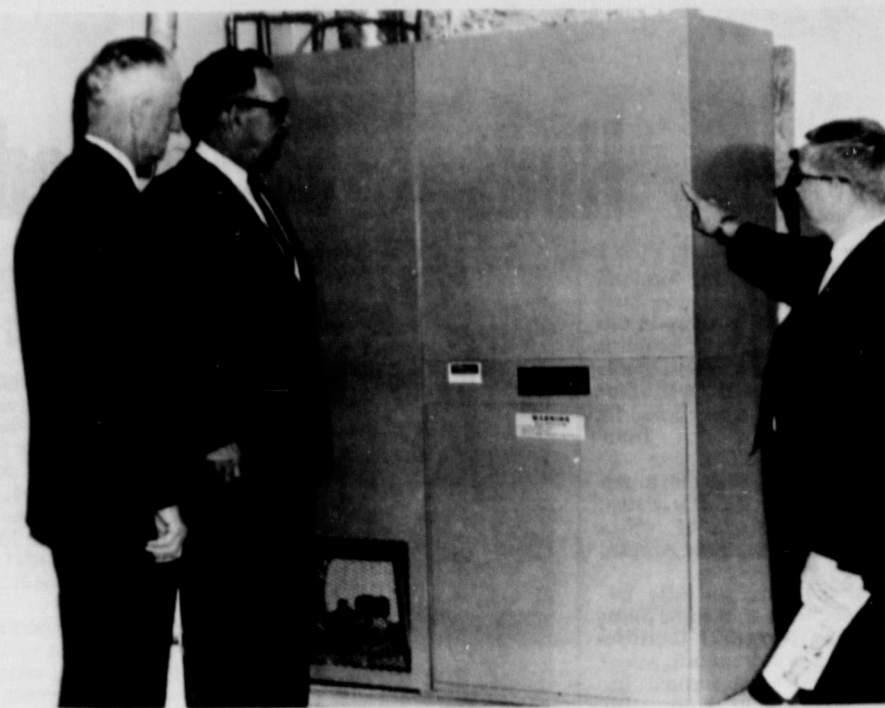
