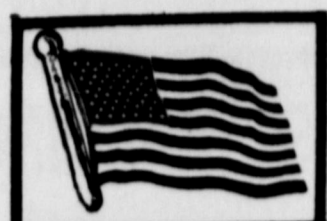

## Commissioners OK Bookmobile

The Lamb County Commissioners Court approved the Bookmobile when approximately 50 persons over the county men with them Saturday in Littlefield to discuss the service. Preparations to begin the bookmobile service as soon as possible are underway and additional information should be available next week. The Bookmobile unit, which was displayed here three weeks ago will give residents in the county an excellent opportunity to secure carefully screened books that range from light fiction to reference books, without the bother of having to check them out from a library in another town. The Bookmobile will contain a selection of 8,000 to 10,000 books at all times.

The service which will be pro-rata on population of the four counties, including Lamb, Bailey, Cochran and Parmer. The Bookmobile unit will be free of charge for the first 21 years. Then the above counties will divide the estimated cost of \$14,000 for the first year, on a percentage basis, according to county population. The \$14,000 cost includes \$10,500 for the truck, plus books and material \$2700, and \$800 for gas and oil.

A local group, or organization will also be required to donate their time in handling local service, before and after the Bookmobile unit is here. The day and time the unit will arrive and depart will be worked out between all communities involved. Friends of the Library Club in Muleshoe have already agreed to furnish a building to house the large stock of books and the bookmobile unit.

## School Board Select Judges For Election

The Homemaking III girls prepared and served a delicious meal to members of the Springlake School board when they met in regular session Monday night at the school. The group approved the minutes, paid bills, heard the principals reports, appointed election judges and discussed teachers contracts. Carroll McDonald will serve as election judge in the forthcoming school election with Clifford Hopping, Norman Hinchliffe and Ed Jones serving as clerks. The board members approved the text books, selected recently by the text book committee. The group heard a report on the school enrollment, with a total of 908 students enrolled at the present time, ranging from 141 first graders to 24 seniors with 37 students enrolled in the colored school. Ninety students complete the second grade, 72 in the third, 92 fourth graders, 89 fifth graders, 74 in the sixth, 80 in the seventh grade, 54 eighth graders, 68 freshmen, 56 sophomores, and 31 juniors. The board accepted a letter of resignation from Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Lane, who are moving to Abilene. Mrs. Connie Sanderson is at present replacing Mr. Lane and will continue throughout the remainder of the school term. Mrs. Raymond Jones will serve as librarian in the Elementary school to fill the vacancy created there.

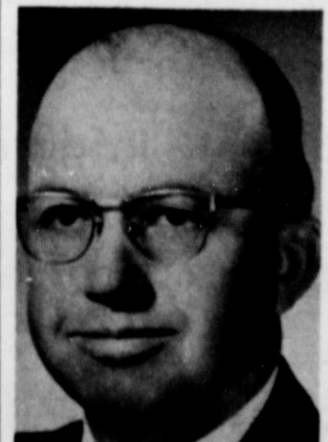
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## FFA Boys Enter Lubbock Show

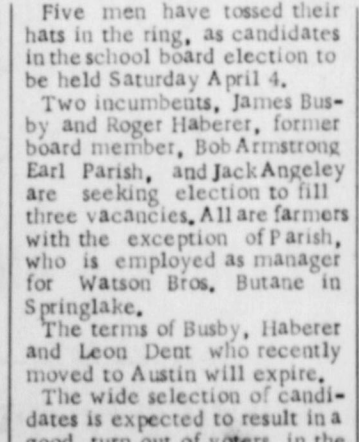

## Five Men File For School Trustee

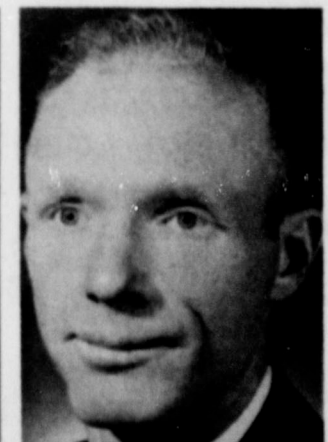

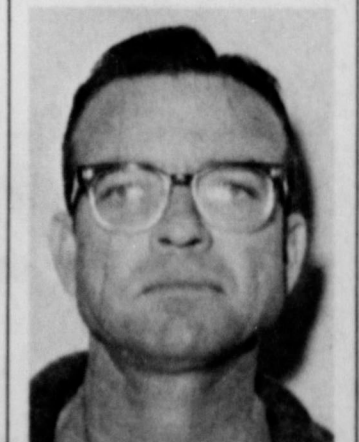

## Research Meeting At School Tonight

Hale County farmer, Frank Moore will present a very interesting program on skip row interplanting at a meeting in the Springlake School Cafeteria at 7:30 pm (tonight) Thursday. Two local men, R. L. Byers, Jr. and Jarvis Angeley, trustees for the High Plains Research Foundation encourage each and everyone to attend this meeting which will be of special interest to the farmer. Working closely with Delbert Langford, High Plains Research Foundation agronomist, Moore selected the system he felt best suited his operation. This

was cotton and grain sorghum. Three years and several hundred acres later, Moore says: "When there's no weather problem (which is seldom,) such cotton will produce that solid planted by 50 to 50%. In bad-weather years, increase will be near 100%." Then you can throw in a grain sorghum increase of 40 to 50%. Terminating his estimates "ultra-conservative," Moore says a farmer using this system can easily double his income in a three to five year period. Colored slides will also be shown as Moore presents the interplanting program.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, TEX. -- Courts are making the news these days. Texas Supreme Courts will hear arguments in an important test case which will determine whether holders of paid political offices can run for the Legislature during their present elective or appointive terms.

Truman P. Kirk, Abilene Lawyer and legislative candidate, is trying to keep 104th Dist. Atty. Tom Todd off the Democratic Ballot. Todd's term as D.A. runs through December 31, although he has resigned effective November 1. Present office holder is Rep. Allen Glenn of Abilene.

Court's decision will affect many local office holders over the state similarly seeking legislative places this year.

In earlier action the State Supreme Court lost little time in polishing off an attempt to ban, from jury service, all who saw telecasts of the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald.

High court refused a request by Jack Ruby's attorneys for permission to file a petition for mandamus to force Dallas Trial Judge Joe B. Brown to accept two televiewers as defense witnesses.

A day later the court turned down another motion for leave to file a mandamus pleading.

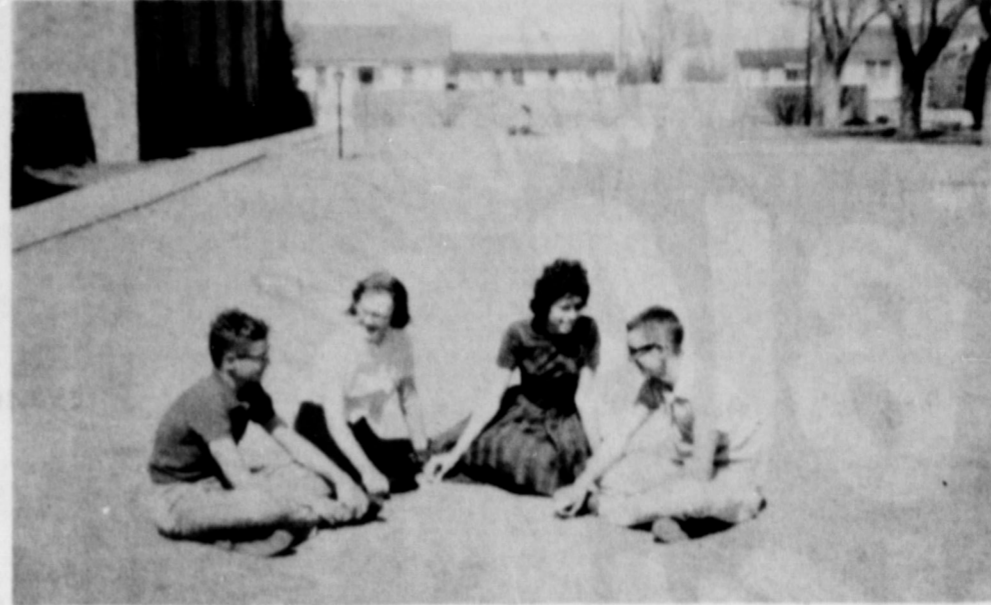

## High Plains Annual Field Day Scheduled September 10

Thursday, September 10, was selected for the observance of the Eighth Annual Field Day of the High Plains Research Foundation at the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation at Halfway, Saturday, February 22, 1964. Ewald Quebe of Lockney who is a Vice-President presented preliminary plans for the Field Day.

tion of acre cost below appraised value of the farm. Mr. Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Board, heads the committee to secure capital funds for the down payment. The Foundation will take full possession of the farm in January, 1965.

E. Moss of Lubbock and H. E. Schuster of Muleshoe, who had passed away since the last meeting of the Board in September 1963.

of the research program of the Foundation of recharge irrigation and bench-leveling.

Virgil Patterson, Amarillo, Vice-chairman of the Board, presented the need for and requested the creation of a new staff position for the Foundation. The expansion of the staff was approved by the Board.

Chairman Harold Hinn presented the plan for an area-wide campaign for the Foundation's operating budget in March, which was approved by the Board. He then appointed

board members in the various counties to head the campaign. A tour of the Foundation's new facilities was conducted for the Board members, press and visitors following the noon luncheon at Halfway. The new gin, seed processing, laboratory, shops, offices, and machinery storage were included along with new equipment and machinery.

## Girls Outnumber Boys In School Census Count

An enrollment of 867 students for the 64-65 school term was tabulated at Springlake schools when the final count of the school census was made recently, showing an increase of 29 students over last year's total of 838.

Results in the count of school age youngsters showed 316 white children and 51 negro children.

## Tax Cut Effect To Be Felt In County

There will be more spending money in Lamb County soon and consequently, more business activity as a result of the tax cut approved by Congress.

The bill provides for tax reductions of different sizes, varying according to income level. For a person who is lucky enough to be in the highest income bracket, the reduction this year will be very large. Instead of the 91 percent he had to pay last year on his taxable income, he now will have to pay back a mere 7%.

For those with modest incomes the reduction in the tax rate is less dramatic. However families in the lower brackets will profit considerably from the new "minimum standard deduction" of \$400 for husband and wife. Many families will be lopped off the tax rolls because of it.

In Lamb county, where average earnings have been on the rise and have reached \$8,725 per household before taxes the savings will be greater than in many other communities.

For a married couple, locally, with two dependents and with an income equal to the prevailing average, the tax on 1964 earnings will become \$1,027 or \$141 less than before.

For families with gross incomes at the 12,000 level the annual tax will drop to \$1,675 a cut of \$185.

## Small And Medium Cities Of Texas Make Growth Rates

Texas metropolitan centers are not the only cities posting phenomenal growth rates. Gerald F. Vaughn, specialist in rural-urban affairs for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service reports that 82 percent of the 268 Texas cities with population between 2,500 and 10,000 in 1960 showed gains during the past decade.

Twenty-six percent posted gains in population of more than 50 percent, 39 percent showed gains of 11 to 50 percent, 17 percent had gains of 0 to 10 percent while the remaining 18 percent had declining populations, Vaughn said.

Generally, he added, cities in the 25-49,999 population bracket are showing the greatest gains among the small and medium sized municipalities. Increases of more than 50 percent were posted by 63 percent of these cities while gains ranging from 11 to 50 percent were made by the other 37 percent in this classification during the 1950-60 period, Vaughn said.

Twenty-three percent of the cities in the 2,500 to 9,999 range in population posted gains of more than 50 percent, 36 percent showed gains from 11 to 50 percent, 19 percent had increases of 0-10 percent while 22 percent suffered population losses, Vaughn said.

These widespread population increases are having an influence on surrounding rural areas. New local markets for agricultural products are opening, opportunities for off-farm employment.
