The bill provides for tax reductions of different sizes,

varying according to income level. For a person who is lucky enough to be in the nighest income bracket, the reduction this year will be very large. Instead of the 91 percent he had to pay last year on his taxable income, he now will have to turn back a mere 77%. For those with modest incomes the reduction in the tax rate is less dramatic. However families in the lower brackets will profit considerably from the new "minimum standard deduction" of \$400 for husband

and wife. Many families will be lopped off the tax rolls because of it.
