

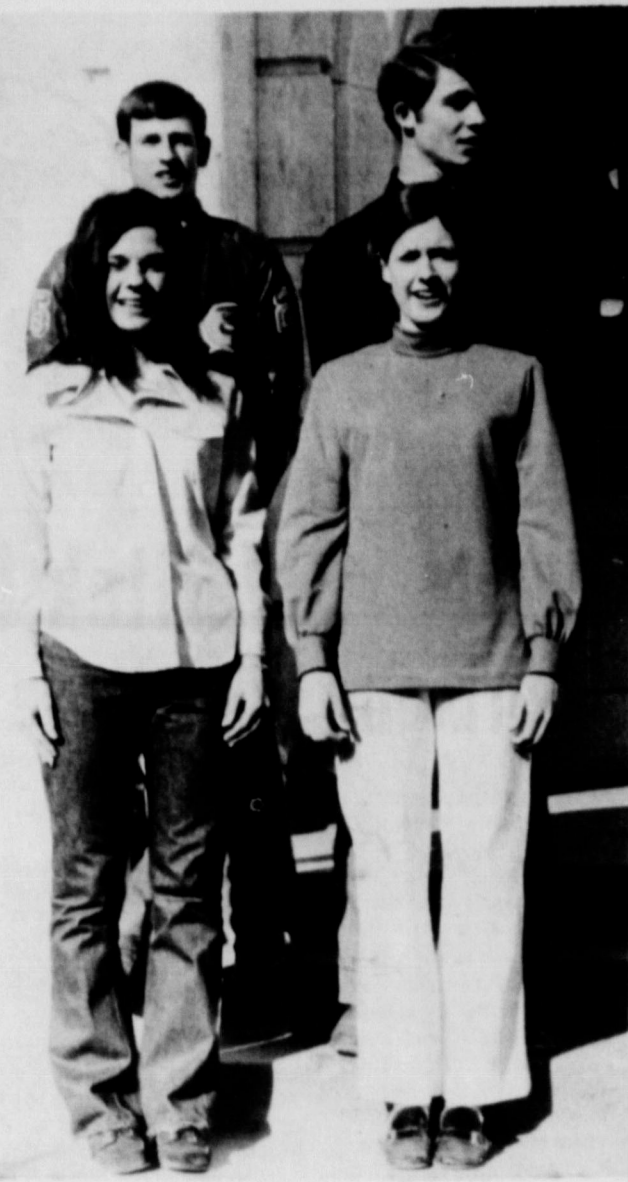
Students Named to All District Teams

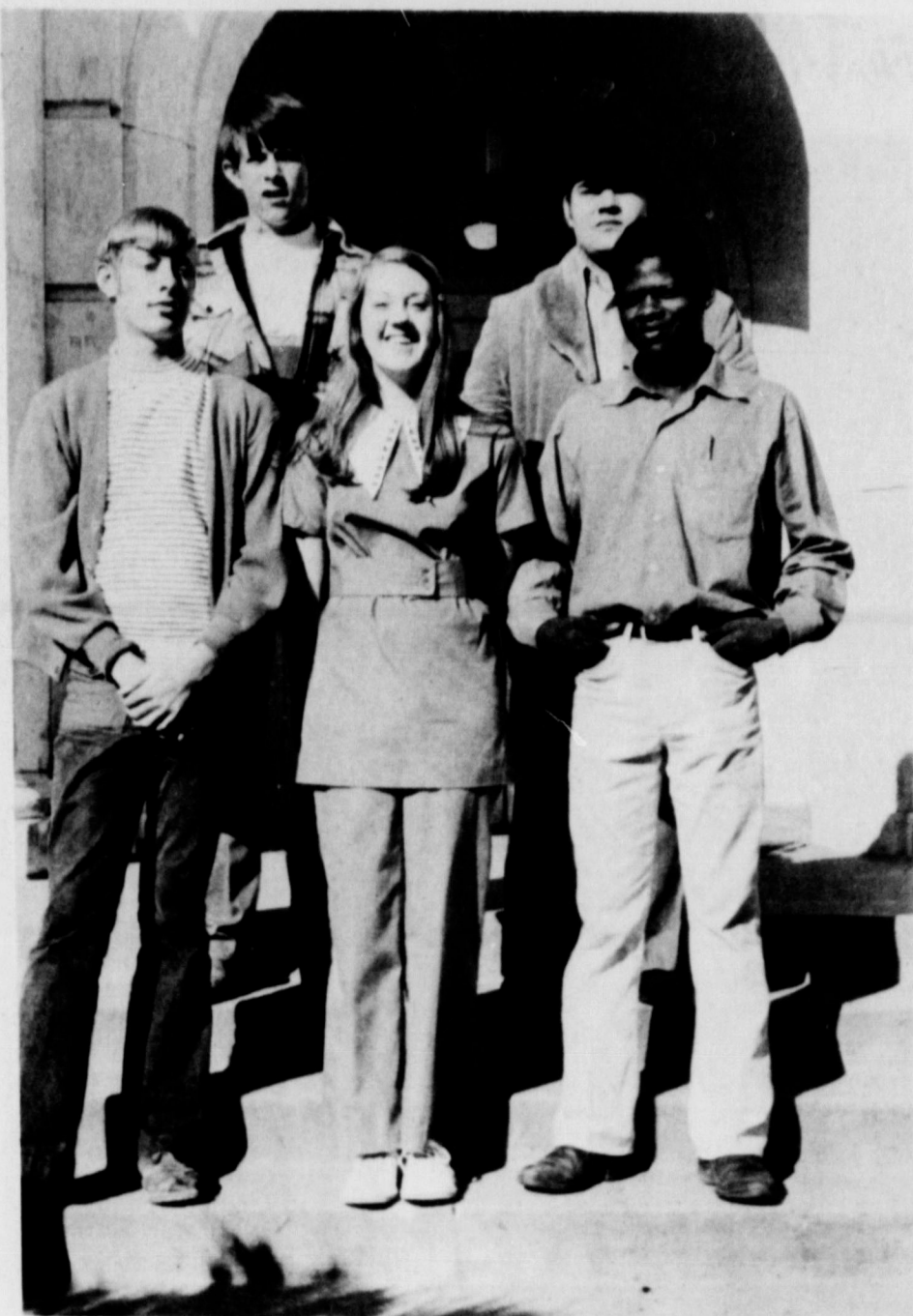
