No reports have been received on gasoline theft, since the first of the group were questioned.

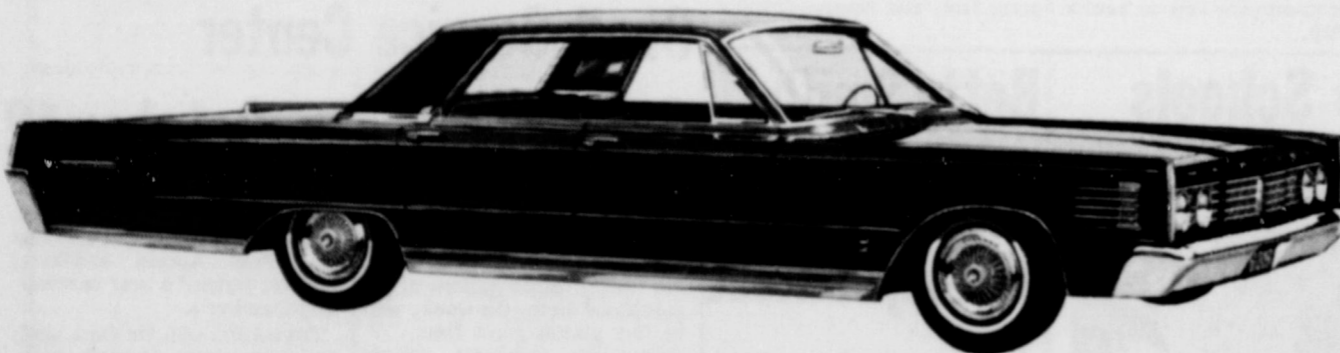

County Mails Tax Bill For \$482,463

Reminders that Lamb County property owners owe a whopping \$482,463.73 in current 1964 tax payers by the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector Herbert Dunn. "All tax bills were mailed last week," Dunn said.

The tax bill, which becomes payable during October and continues through January before penalty and interest charges are added to the account, is owed on a 1964 tax valuation of \$28,492,729 for all county taxable property. The valuation is an increase of nearly one million dollars over last year.

The county's overall tax bill

includes state and county taxes, along with three road districts and the High Plains Underground Conservation Water District. A breakdown of the total tax levy lists \$228,028.85 for the county; \$103,871.06 for highways; \$94,747.32 for the state; \$42,253.77 for precincts; and \$13,552.73 for the water district.

A savings of three percent can be made on all tax bills by making early payment in October, an advantage that most of the county's largest taxpayers will take. The discount is two percent for payment in November, one percent in December, and

the full levy is due in January. Final deadline for payment before penalty and interest is Jan. 31.

Among the county's leading taxpayers, in amount, are Southwestern Public Service Co., El Paso Natural Gas, Pioneer Natural Gas, Haiseil Cattle Co., Santa Fe Railroad and Pan American Oil.

A special reminder is issued in regards to poll taxes. The 1964 poll taxes are payable from now through the Jan. 31 deadline, as in years past. However, they cannot be included on property tax statements as in years before.

To vote in state, county, city or school elections you still need a regular \$1.75 poll tax receipt, but you can vote for Federal offices without the \$1.75 payment. Since the receipt is available unpaid, the tax office cannot bill you for it.

Local FFA Boys To Attend State Fair

The state Fair of Texas in Dallas begins October 10. Gene Gaston, Vocational Agriculture teacher at Springlake high school and five FFA boys will attend the Fair on October 18. Pat Montgomery will assist in taking the boys. They will show twenty head of hogs in the Swine division.

The judges in a new type of event at the State Fair of Texas do everything except cook and eat the contestants!

The event is the quality pork contest, one of the major swine shows at the Pan-American Livestock show of the State Fair of Texas, whose over-all 1964 dates are October 10-25.

Contest judges will grade the live swine and then grade the carcasses after the swine are slaughtered, all in the interest of producing better bacon, ham and pork chops for the Texas table.

First presented in 1961 by the Pan-American Livestock Exposition, the contest is gaining steadily in popularity because it provides a simple procedure for comparing the qualities of meats produced by slaughter animals.

Swine in the contest are of uniform age and weight. The barrows must have been farrowed after April 1, 1964, and each must weigh 190 to 220 pounds on the hoof.

The State Fair contest will begin at 1 p. m. on Sunday, October 11, with Dr. J. C. Hillier of Oklahoma State University at Stillwater judging a class of live barrows in the Pan-American's swine arena.

After the judging, the barrows will be taken to a Dallas meat firm where they will be slaughtered and processed on Monday, October 12.

Using scales and other measuring devices, specialists will go over the carcasses and cuts. They will pay particular attention to hams, loins, butts and shoulders.

Frank A. Orts, Texas A&M University meat specialist, then will announce the final standings in the contest on Tuesday.

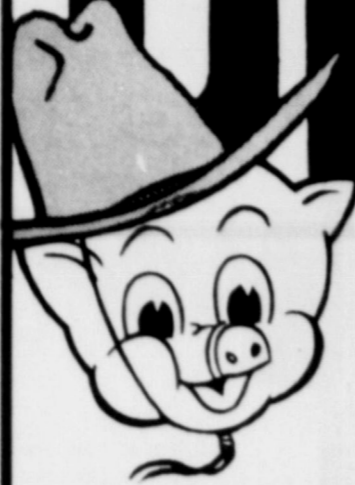

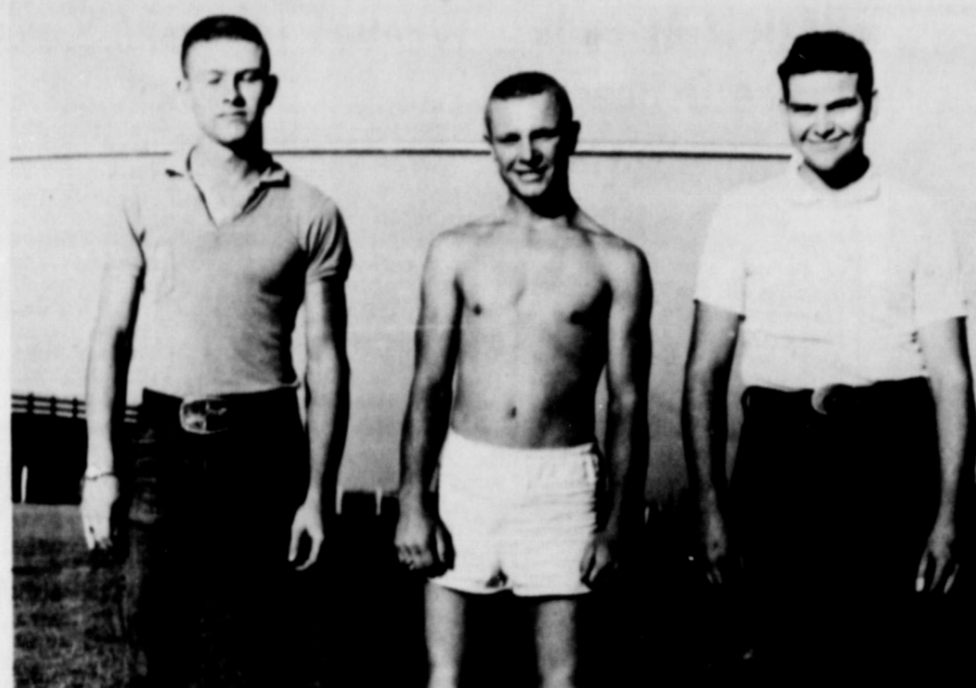

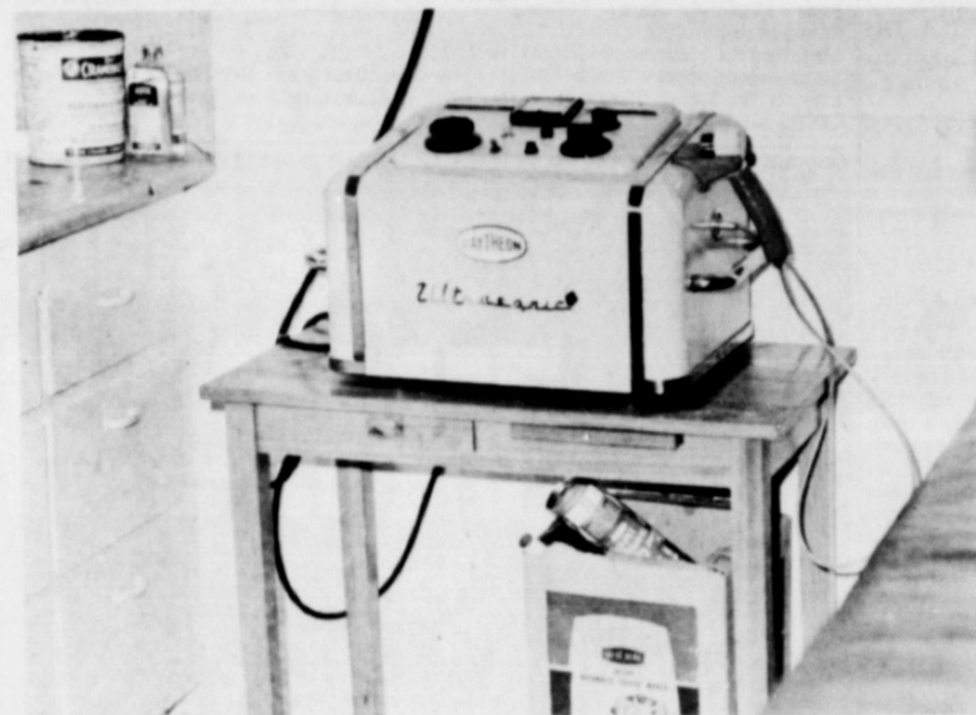
