I attended the West Texas Press Association in El Paso this weekend and was surprised at the utter neglect we American people have doubtless shown toward prisoners of war in Viet-nam. I found out there was something everyone could do to help the POW's. Major Joe Carpenter, one of only nine American prisoners of war released by North Vietnam, was guest speaker Saturday night at a banquet for members of the WTPA Convention in Airport Holiday Inn, He was released because of U. S. public concernabout the hundreds of POW's held there.

He told the press that Hanoi was well aware of American public opinion on the war and the POW's. He said that five years ago, the POW's were herded through the streets and allowed to be abused and thrown into dungeons in North Vietnam.

U. S. outrage at these actions caused the North Vietnamese to treat the POW's better. The speaker himself was released in September, 1968, after spending six months in prison. He said he thought he was released to promote the North Vietnamese image.

The speaker pleaded with the editors to urge their readers to write their congressmen and to write Hanoi to inquire about the treatment and release of the prisoners. He said Hanoi is effected more by the grass-roots of America (the people) than by pronouncements from Washington.

Laughingly he commented, "Contrary to the TV program 'Hogan's Heroes' the POW's are not allowed to be together. They are kept alone, isolated, and for months have no one to converse with except the enemy occasionally to see if they were ready to reveal

He commented on the fact that for months POW's had nothing to read, no radio, no news--except the discontent, demonstrations, fights and arson in cities of the USA. "This material was made available to all POW's, Clippings from every paper that

Home Explosion Suspected Arson

of the World's Richest Irrigation Area


An early morning explosion resulting from an apparent arson attempt Thursday, August 6, racked the E. E. Danforth home located north of Earth on FM 1055,

The Earth Volunteer Fire Department was called to the scene at approximately 8:30 a, m. but there was no blaze inside the home.

An investigation as to the cause and resulting damage of the incident set the time of the explosion at between 4

and 4:30 a.m.
According to Fire Chief Bud
Matlock, a flammable substance had been poured throughout the home. The explosion occurred when a rock was thrown through a kitchen window in an attempt to ignite the blaze. The force of the resulting explosion raised the roof of the home approximately six inches and tore the ceiling from the walls. The sheetrock on the walls and the carpet were termed a complete loss.

At the time of the incident, Mr. and Mrs. Danforth were on an extended vacation in California,

Mother Gives Birth To 10 At Local Hospital

Pigs, pigs, pigs and more

The pig population of Earth increased by ten on August 1 when the first litter of pigs to be processed by the staff of the Earth Swine Breeders Hospital were delivered by caesarean section. Dr. Jerry Gleason, Muleshoe veterinarian, was in charge of the delivery of the pigs making up the first litter and has completed delivery of 24 pigs in seven operations to-

The one and a half hour pro cessing operation, involving a total of six workers, begins with the washing of the sow. When this has been completed, she is strapped to the operating table and the incision area is sterilized. Following the administration of the anesthetic, a sterilized operat-ing bubble is placed over the incision area.

The actual surgical process then begins as the veterinary opens the sterile operating pack, which is already inside the bubble, and makes an eight inch incision in the left flank of the sow. The uterus, containing the pigs, is worked outside the sow and an incis-ion is made in the uterus through which the pigs are re-

As the baby pigs are delivered, they are passed into a con-necting sterilized hover. While the pigs are still in the hover, attendants begin their breathing process, dry them and tie their navel cords. The pigs are then placed in sterile sacks for transportation to their destination. As the attendants prepare the pigs for transporta tion, the sow's incision is su-tured and she is taken back to her pen,

The newborn pigs are taken into the hospital nursery where they are placed in individual sterile boxes. All air entering the boxes is first filtered and a temperature of 95 degrees is maintained inside the boxes The pigs are fed three times daily from stainless steel

troughs inserted into the indi-vidual boxes. The special for-mula, made by the Borden Company, is fed from troughs to teach the pigs to drink from troughs immediately and to prevent the spread of any disease which the sow may have.
After seven days, the pigs are moved from the boxes in

groups of 8-10 into brooders where they are kept for three weeks. At the end of this per-iod, the pigs are either taken home by their owners or placed in the Earth Swine Breeders, Inc. installation,

The cost of processing ranges from \$255 per sow, when the pigs are raised by the owner, to a \$125 operating fee plus \$50 per pig when they are raised by the Earth Swine Breeders, Any Individual wishing to have sows processed may contact Gene Gaston for further information,

Edwin O'Hair, husbandryman and nurseryman for the hospital, is in charge of the daily feeding and care operations, Earth Swine Breeders, Inc. is currently handling 184 pigs. 160 are situated in the Swine Breeders regular operation and 24 are in the nursery facilities of the local hospital.
