

Dark clouds appeared around the area Thursday night and with them came rain, hall, and high winds. Most crops were not too severely damaged by the hail, although most farmers said they did receive some hail, be installing officer.

One of the worst reports came from Mrs. J. W. Dear, who said that she thought her husband would have to replant his farm, the Copeland farm north of his farm, and his dad's place just east of the Dear farm. Mrs. Dear also stated that they had received 2.9 inches of rain, and that hail was bad enough to cover the ground two different times. The Dears live three miles east of Springlake.

B.V. Padon, whose farm is lo-cated two miles north and two and one-half miles east of springlake, informed reporters that four inches of rain had fal-len on his place, and his crops had been beaten pretty badly, but he was not sure if the damage was intense enough to ne-

cessitate his replanting. A little hail but not much damage was reported by Mrs. Clarence Mitchell. She also Clarence Mitchell. She also said they had received about one and one-half inches of rain. The Mitchell farm is one mile north of the Springlake Laundry. From Clay's Corner, Herbert Clay claimed there was limited hail and very little damages to crops from the hail. #### THE RIGHT ROAD

What economic policies should the government follow when the long-hoped-for peace in Vietnam comes? When that happy day arrives, the Joint Economic Committee of Congress wants to be ready with major recommendations, and to that end it has been hearing the views of leading economists.

One logical and sound suggestion is that economic policy should focus on a series of annual reductions in federal individual and corporate tax rates rather than on specific programs intended to ease the transition from a wartime to peacetime economy.

If Congress should decide to follow this idea to ease the burden on U.S. taxpayers, the additional federal revenue gained from the normal economic growth rate-between \$7 and \$10 billion annually -could be largely earmarked for tax reduction. Specifically, legislation should be enacted that would provide a schedule of annual tax reductions over a period of years. To meet unforeseeable contingencies, a procedure should also be provided by which Congress could speed up, or temporarily arrest or reverse, the pre-scheduled tax reductions.

A tax reduction plan along these lines would encourage the creation of jobs and expansion of the private economy, which must always be the foundation of economic growth generally. In the absence of such a tax program the path of least resistance is likely to lead us toward continuation. or even acceleration, of the spiraling federal domestic spending of the past few years.

This form of tax legislation should be seriously considered for the post-Vietnam era.

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## Education Is Top Family Expense

The home may be taking sec-ond place to college education for the children as the biggest family investment, according to the Department of Health, Education and Welfare thermore, there are other expenses besides the basic charges, Books and supplies cost the average family \$160 a year for each student. Transportation Education and Welfare. costs range from \$150 to \$250 a year, Personal and miscel-

The National Association of Home Builders has reported that the average new home last year cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000, not counting interest on the mortgage. But consider the investment

facing the average family with three teenagers to educate, sug-gests Wanda Meyer, Extension home management specialist at Texas A&M University. Just the basic fees alone can rival a family's housing investment. Basic fees and charges at a

publicly supported four-year college or university average a little more than \$1,000 a year in 1967, according to HEW. Those same basic fees and charges at a private institution averaged about \$2,100. Thus, four years at a public or private university or college will cost a family \$4,000 to \$8,000 for one youngster alone.

For the average three-child household, the basic higher education bill could range from 12,000 to \$25,000, depending upon whether the family chooses a public or private institution. But that's not the end of it. Education costs are rising. Fur-

This is in sharp contrast to the 1960's when the number of workers, age 14 to 24, is expected to increase over 60 percent compared to about 10 percent for those 25 to 54 years old, and about 15 percent for those 55 years old and




