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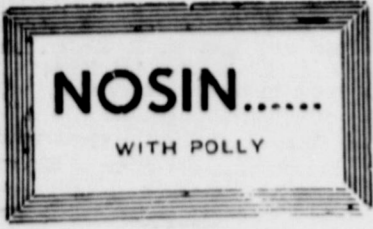

Springlake Downs Olton, Chalks Up Third Straight Win

Friday night's game between the Olton Mustangs and our hard hitting Wolverine team was a thriller from beginning to end, and especially at the end was the game termed as a "Bang Up Thriller" when the Wolverines who had managed to keep the Mustangs scoreless, and with only 34 seconds to go in the last quarter scored a touchdown, tallying up a third straight win in the season, by scoring 8-0 over the Mustangs.

Springlake, who was again this week rated the underdog went into the game playing hard, knowing full well they were up against a topnotch squad. But their apparent determination to win was undimmed.

This win gave the Wolverines who are a class A school a big charge because it came over a Class AA team.

Olton is a member of District 2AA, and now stands 1-2.

The Wolverines and Mustangs held the spectators attention throughout the hard fought game, and it was "Nip and Tuck" all the way, until quarterback, Hal Hudson threw a perfect pass into the arms of end Darrell Barlow who laid in a field goal from the 44 yard line, and it was 3-0.

Olton won the battle of statistics netting a total of 133 yards in the air and on the ground. Springlake got 84 airground and 40 more on Hudson's aerials. Wolverine fullback, Don Layman was the top ground gainer with 61 yards net on 13 carries.

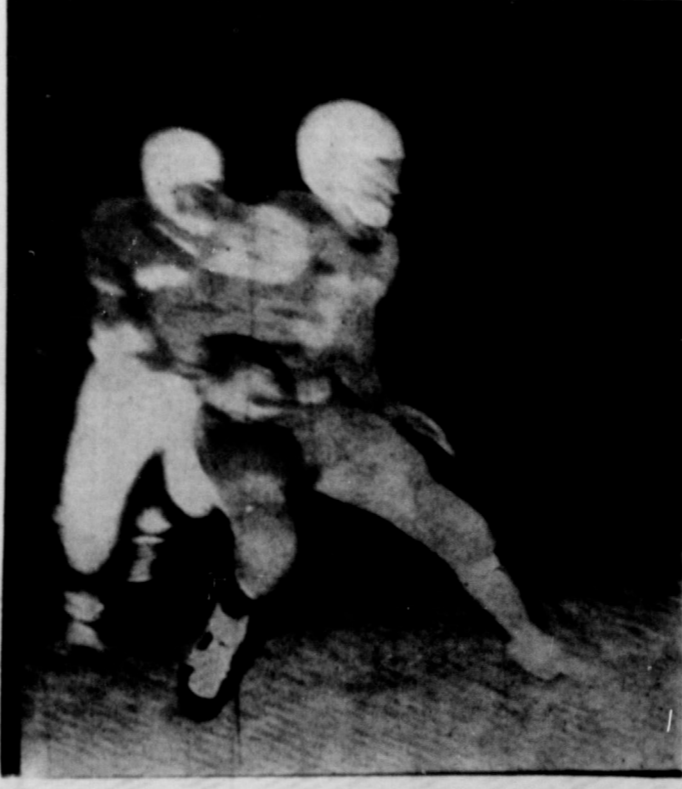
Layman was credited with a 23 yard run which was the longest run of the first half, and brought the Wolverines to Olton's 38. From the 38, Layman and Hudson each rolled out 5 yards and a first and 10 on Olton's 39 yard line. However, at the end of four plays Springlake had lost yardage and were back to midfield.

The Mustangs had only one first in the first quarter, but gained momentum in the last few minutes of the first half.

As the second half opened, Olton cracked Springlake defenders for three consecutive first downs; only to lose the ball on downs; the Wolverine 17 when Ronnie Dent stopped quarterback Johnny Schenck a yard short of a first and ten situation on Springlake's 44.

Springlake couldn't move the ball at all in the second half until the game's last five minutes. The Wolverines put the ball in play on their own 42 and Hudson started spinning the pass disc.

Federal Crop Insurance Offers Improved Program

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has announced that Federal Crop Insurance will offer an improved cotton insurance program to both dry land and irrigated cotton farmers in Texas and New Mexico for the 1962 crop year.

For the first time a new irrigated grain sorghum insurance plan will be offered in the following Texas counties: Lubbock, Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Floyd, Hockley, Lamb and Swisher.

Dry land grain sorghum will be added to Wilbarger, Williamson, Nueces and San Patricio counties and cotton in Denton and Wilbarger counties.

Already given a new citrus and cotton program in Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy counties, the Corporation expects to improve its protection to rice farmers in the coastal counties of Fort Bend and Wharton, Texas.

This year all-risk crop insurance provided Texas and New Mexico farmers with over \$11,000,000 of protection on money spent to produce crops, and a sharp increase of this amount is expected for 1962.

"We are thinking in a straight line toward rapid expansion of this self-help plan of insurance," Secretary Freeman stated. "The climbing cost of production dictates the necessity of making this investment protection available to as many farmers as possible. We are moving fast in that direction."
