Post Office Helps Count Livestock

A number of patrons of the Earth Post Office will find livestock survey cards in their post boxes on November 16.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Miller explains.

Cards are distributed at random among patrons having livestock and poultry.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Miller said.

"For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of the livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

"This annual survey has been a joint undertaking of the Post Office and the Agriculture Department since 1924," concludes Mr. Harold Miller.

"Blue Law" Now In Effect in Texas

The new "Blue Law" went into effect Monday, November 6, in Texas. This new law requires businesses to close at least one day a week but not necessarily Sunday.

Merchants can elect to remain open either Saturday or Sunday, but not both. The new act was sponsored by Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan.

The law is said to have been prompted by complaints from old-established merchants of the "unfair competition" of the discount houses, which now remain open Sundays as well as week days.

Under the new law, the first offense is punishable by a \$100 fine, and subsequent convictions will draw penalties of up to six months in jail or a \$500 fine or both.

Each separate sale constitutes a separate offense.

Furthermore, the act says a business which continually violates the law may be declared a public nuisance, subject to injunction.

Emergency sales of prohibited items may be made if the purchaser signs a certificate that the items are needed to protect the health, welfare or safety of human or animal life. The certificate must be kept on file by the merchant, available for inspection, for a period of one year.

Some legal questions will probably have to be ironed out after the new law takes effect.

A court test of the law is not an improbability.

The 42 classes of merchandise which may be sold on only one of the two days are:

Clothing, clothing accessories, wearing apparel, footwear, headwear, furniture for home business, office or outdoors, kitchenware, kitchen utensils, china, home appliances, stoves, refrigerators, air conditioners, electric fans, radios, television sets, washing machines, dryers.

Also cameras, hardware, tools, (excluding non-power-driven hand tools), jewelry, precious or semi-precious stones, silverware, watches, clocks, luggage, motor vehicles, musical instruments, recordings, toys, excluding items customarily sold as novelties and souvenirs.

Also mattress, bed coverings, lamps, draperies, blinds, curtains, mirrors, lawn mowers and cloth piece goods.

Merchandise which may be sold includes food, beer, ice, magazines and periodicals, drugs, newspapers, items used for funeral or burial purposes and real estate.

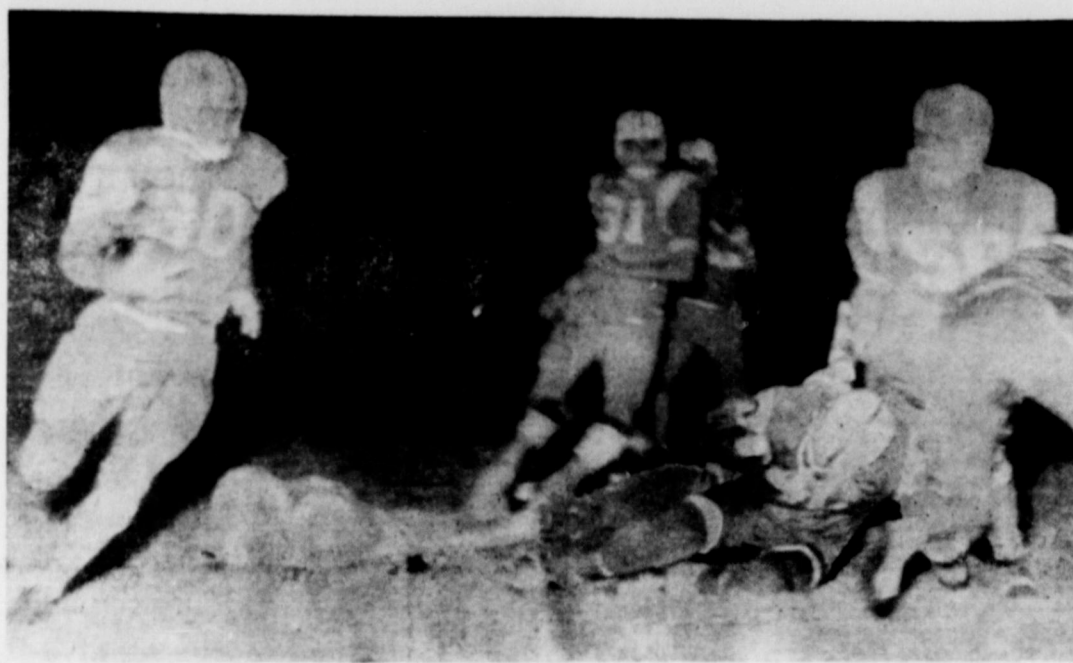

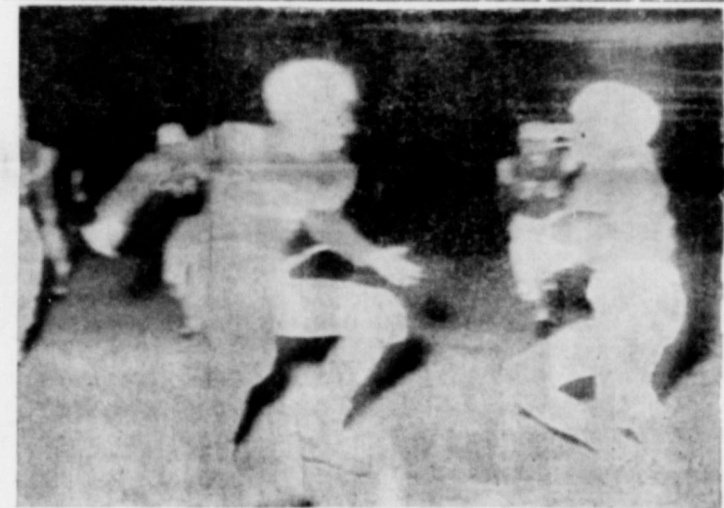

The veteran Highway Patrol Supervisor listed some tips to help the driver WINTERIZE his driving.

- (1) Frost or ice on bridges means to slow down BEFORE you reach the bridge. It is too late to do anything once you are on the slick surface.
- (2) Check your exhaust system thoroughly, don't risk carbon-monoxide poisoning.
- (3) Be extra careful at railroad crossings with windows up. In a sealed car you cannot hear the train.
- (4) Check windshield wipers NOW. They will be carrying an increasing load from now on.
- (5) Clear ALL fog or any form of precipitation off windows and windshields. Don't just rub a small hole to peep through. Use defrosters to help keep the windshield clear.
- (6) Make a definite, conscious attempt to adapt your driving habits to the changing season. Your life may depend on it.

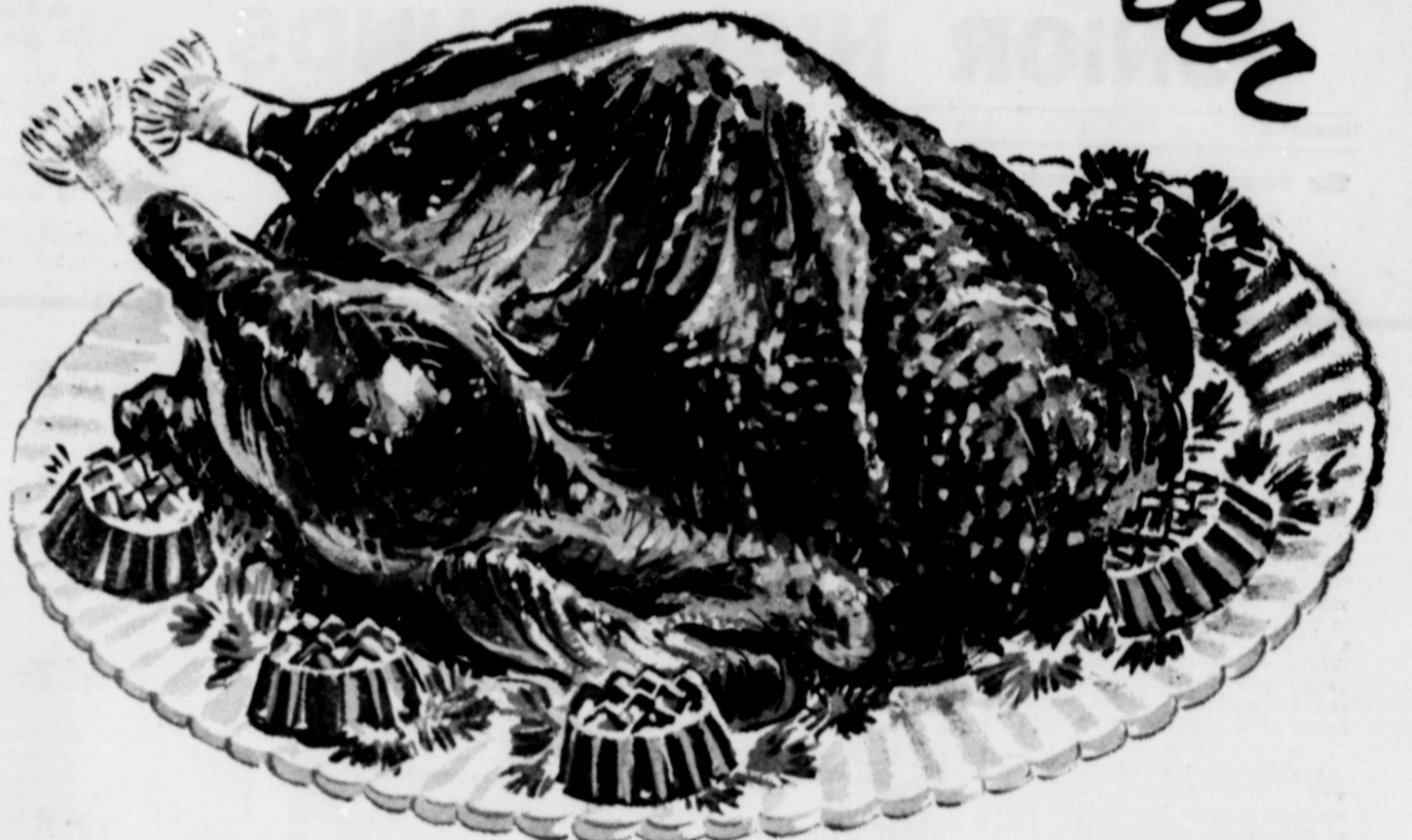
