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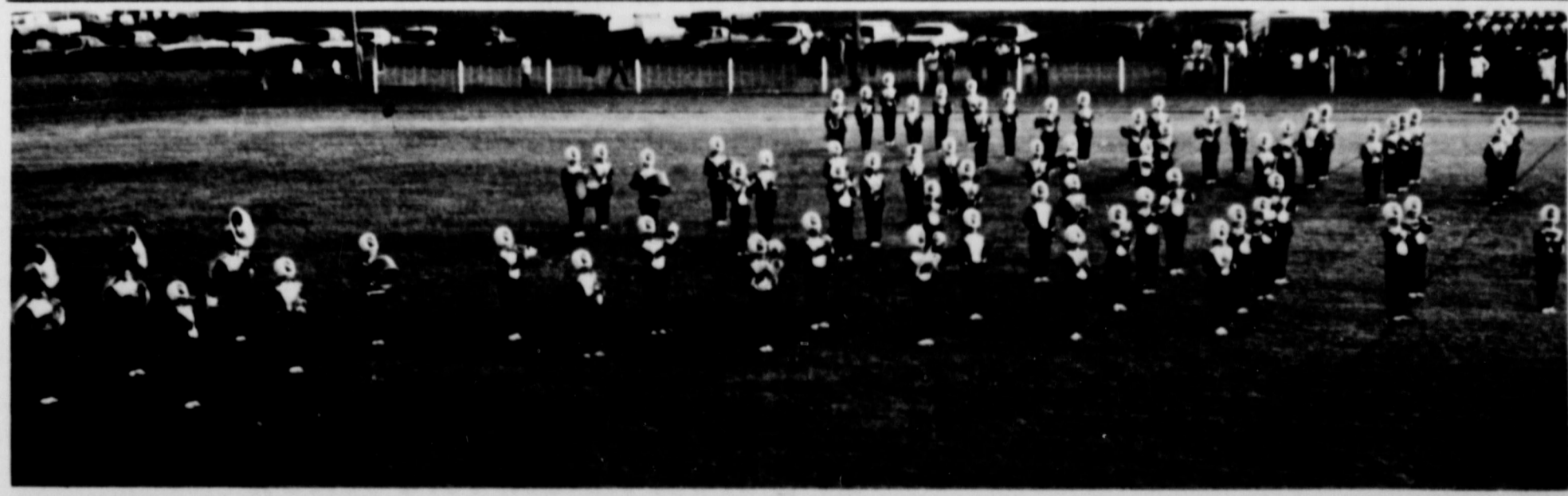

Student Council To Sell Homecoming Corsages

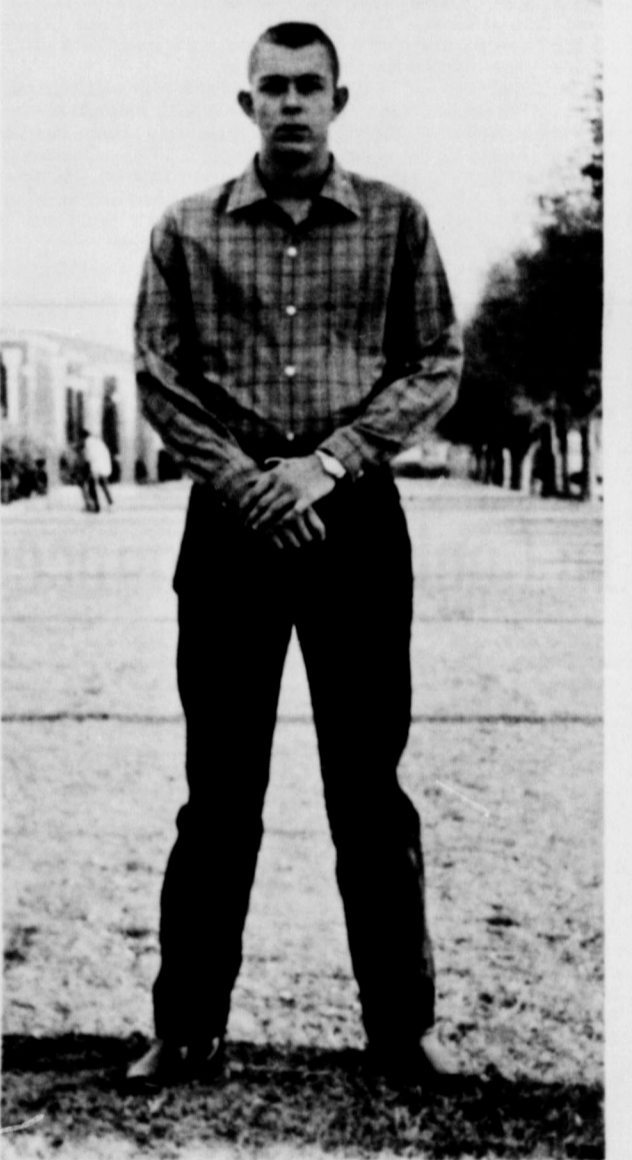

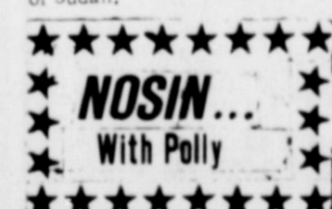

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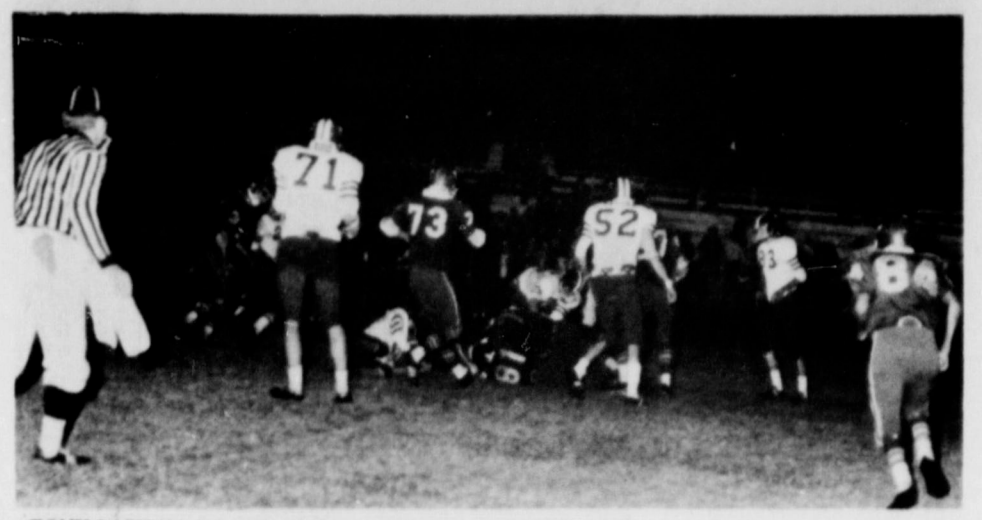
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TONY BARTON-Drives hard for 5 yards against a stubborn Amherst defense Friday night. The Bulldogs won the game 28-8.

USS SPRINGFIELD (at sea)---Seaman Apprentice Kenneth E. Jones, US Navy, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Jones of Route 1, Springlake, is serving aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Springfield in the North Atlantic in support of Operation Silver Tower.

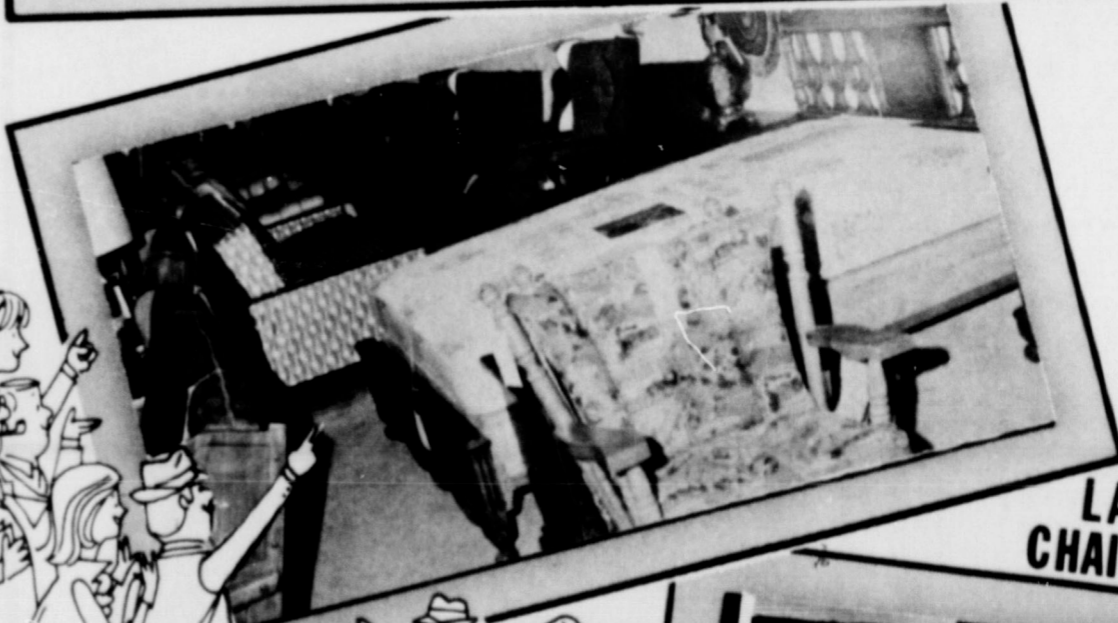
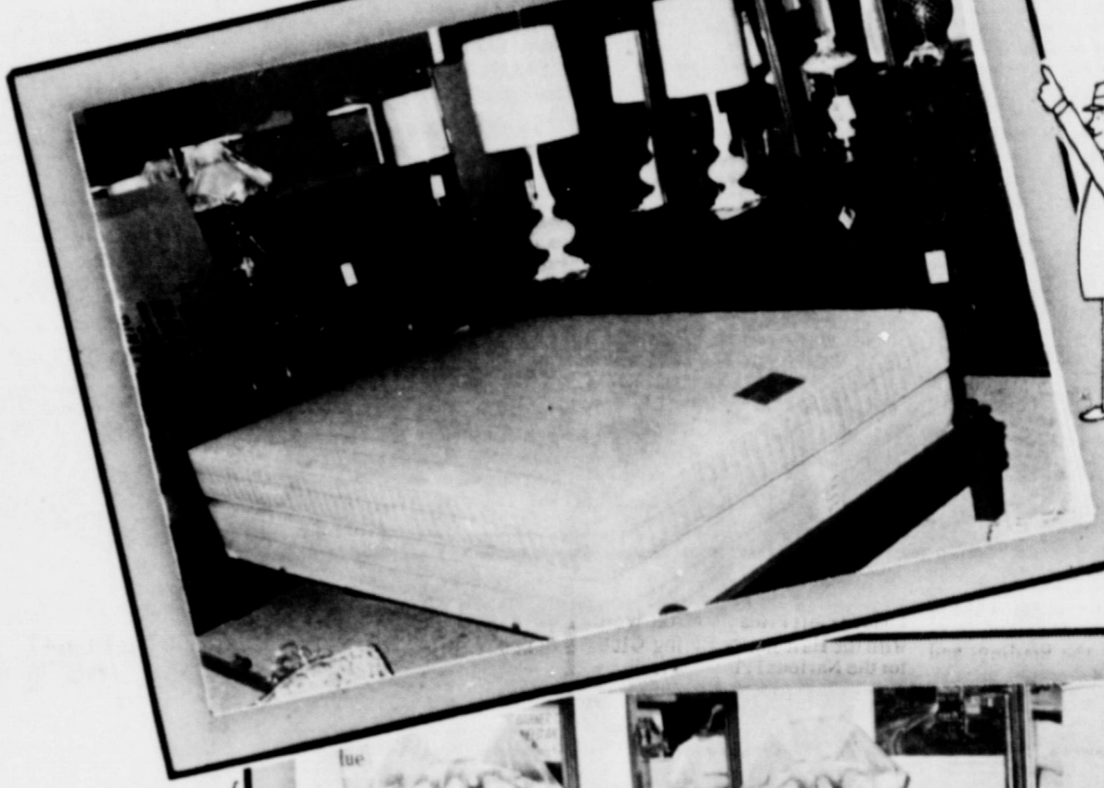
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Highlights From TFB Sponsored World Tour

(Hoover, information director for the Texas Farm Bureau, is accompanying the TFB-sponsored world tour that is visiting in nine countries around the world.)

TOKYO, Japan - For Texas farmers not yet accustomed even to daylight savings time, the long jet flight from Texas to Tokyo-crossing nine time zones enroute--can be downright devastating to the human "inner clock."

What this means in plain language is that many of the farmers and ranchers on their wives on the TFB-sponsored world tour get awful sleepy in the daytime when it's bed-time back home--and wake up hours before breakfast--just because their "inner clocks" are set to Texas time.

But, despite being a little bleary-eyed, the 64 Texans on the tour are becoming oriented to the Orient.

What they see in Japan is an aggressive, hard-working people with a rising standard of living. They observe an island nation of 100 million people with less land area than California, a mountainous country of delicate beauty where only 10% for the land is capable of agricultural production. What this would seem to add up to is a growing market for Texas--produced grain sorghum, wheat, rice, cotton, poultry and livestock products. The tour members will have a clearer picture of market potential when they are briefed by U. S. embassy officials later on. They expect also to meet with buyers for a large import firm here.

The Texas Farm Bureau tour group--comprised mostly of farmers and ranchers and their wives--is on the first leg of a 31-day around-the-world market-inspection, sightseeing and goodwill tour. After Japan, they are scheduled to visit Hong Kong, the Philippines, Thailand, India, Lebanon, Israel, Greece and Rome.

In our journey thus far, we have witnessed first hand some of the startling improvements made in transportation in recent years. We were whisked by jet to Tokyo via Los Angeles and Honolulu in just 16 hours flying time--an unthinkable feat just 15 years ago. And yet the big, sleek jets cross the ocean now with the casualness of a bus ride across central Texas.

Here in Japan, we have seen what may be the forerunner of rapid surface transportation--especially between populous urban areas. I'm speaking of the super-train, 130-MPH KODAMA (Echo) trains that travel at 30-minute intervals, both ways, between Osaka and Tokyo. Imagine travelling by train between Dallas and Houston--a distance of some 300 miles--in

just 2 hrs. and 50 minutes! That's the equivalent of what we did on one ride from Kyoto to Tokyo. The "silver bullet" as it is sometimes called--makes only two stops between Osaka and Tokyo--and Kyoto, where we stayed the first 2 1/2 days in Japan and Nogoya. The "bullet" runs on a tight schedule, and only stops about three minutes at each place to take on and discharge passengers. As a matter of fact, we had to send our heavy luggage ahead the night before by truck so we could board with only our small hand luggage. The "bullet" waits for no one. The train trip from Osaka-Kyoto to Tokyo takes you through a "fairlyland" of rural loveliness. For mile after fleeting mile you view an unfolding panorama of rural Japan. It is a country of verdant hills, rice paddies and rows upon rows of manicured tea plants. And yet, you are never out of sight of human habitation. The farm houses in the small villages are only seconds apart, and you rush through many, many towns and cities. There are 25 million Japanese living along the 300-mile route of the Kodama train. This is one fourth of the total population of this teeming island. When you arrive in Tokyo and step from the train into the vast labyrinths of Tokyo Station, it is like being immersed in a sea of humanity--a veritable ant hill of scurrying figures. For this Tokyo-city of more than 11 million people--largest metropolis in the world. Of this you have no doubt.

Vernon, Bill Swanson, Houston and Bill Finck, San Antonio, took the tour prior to the public committee hearing in Hereford on October 5th.

The air tour was conducted in an aircraft furnished by Pioneer Natural Gas and another furnished by the Beechcraft Company of Amarillo. After take-off from Lubbock the flight was over Brownfield, West Plains, North Muleshoe, Morton, the East to Plainview for lunch. A visit was made after lunch to observe recharge wells on the farm of Billy Clayton, near Springlake. A tour of the Missouri Beef Packers Plant at Friona and feed lots near Friona and Hereford completed the tour.
