Final Rites Held Tuesday Morning For Pete Parish, Pioneer Resident

Funeral services for Chive Payton (Pete) Parish, 68, early day resident of Earth, were conducted Tuesday morning at 10:30 in the First Methodist Church of Earth, Rev. Walter Driver, pastor, officiated.

Parish died Sunday at 3:40 a.m. in the South Plains Hospital in Amherst, where he had been rushed following a heart attack Thursday morning while at work in the field.

Parish was born in Llano, Texas, on January 7, 1904. He moved to Cook County in 1918, and with members of his family, he moved to Lamb County in 1923, while a lad of 16 years of age.

He was married in Canyon on August 27, 1938, to Miss Gladys Bull.

He was active in the Parish Hardware, and later in the Parish Grocery Store here before becoming engaged in farming in the area in 1941.

Parish had been an active member of the Methodist Church for 22 years. He was an

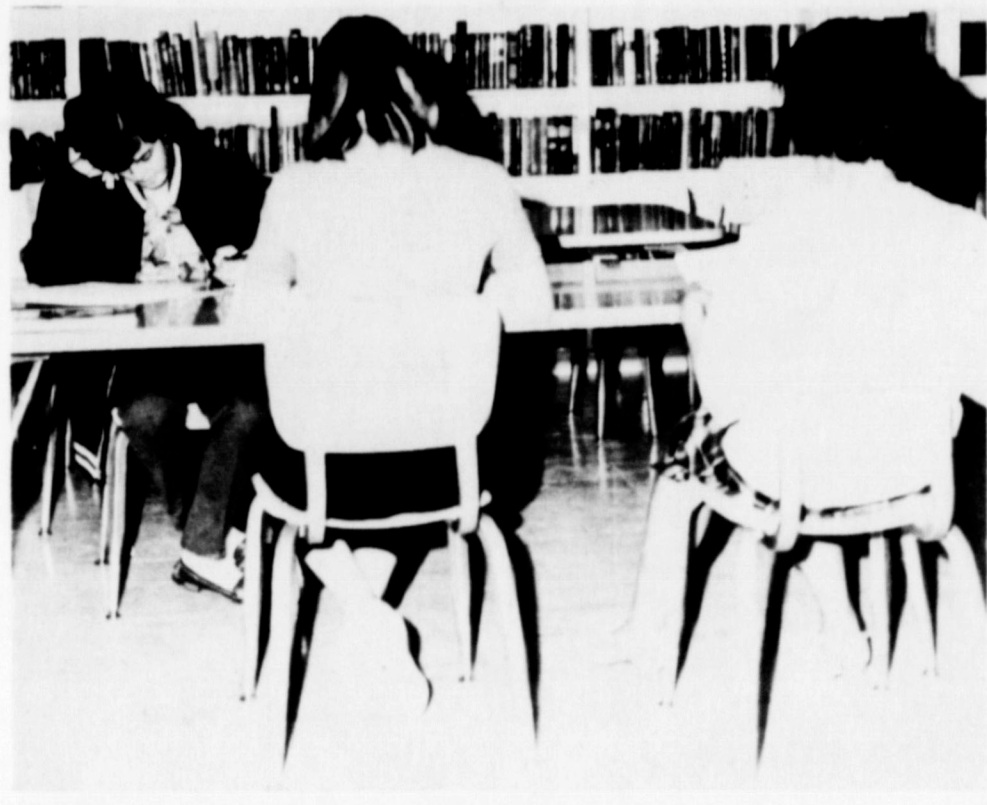
At Monday night's regular meeting of the Springlake-Earth School Board of Trustees, the 1967-68 budget was approved in the amount of \$509,598.00. Along with the approval of this year's budget, last year's budget was amended to read from \$486,859 to \$534,370. The amendment was necessary due to roof damage from last year's hail, the purchase of additional land, and the new home economics cottage.

The board also approved routine business as well as establishing a policy on the use of school buses used on activity trips. On all activity trips, a portion of tax money will be used to provide 10 cents per mile on these field trips. At the end of the year, if there is money left in the activity transportation fund, there would be no necessity in using the tax money until the available funds are used. This transportation fund is to be used on activity trips only and does not pertain to regular bus runs to and from school.

The board also approved the sale of four vehicles. Up for sale is a 1955 Chev. P/U; a 1951 Chev. P/U; a 1955 Ford 1 1/2 ton truck, and a 1959 Rambler. Anyone interested in purchasing these vehicles may contact the high school office.

The purchase of the additional land will make available a new parking area south of the football field. Fans wishing to watch the game from inside their automobiles will be charged admission as they go through the gates, but no additional charge will be added for the automobiles. This is the first time this parking space has been available to local fans.

The board also discussed written school board policies and decided to have no changes in the present policies.

Alfalfa Could Be Boon To Area

Planting alfalfa could well be a boon to area farmers, according to E. G. Gaston, local agriculture instructor at Springlake-Earth High School.

In a survey made by Gaston with all large cattle feeding lots in a 50 mile radius, he found that owners of the feeding lots are all wanting alfalfa cubes rather than baled hay. As an alfalfa cubing machine costs approximately \$30,000, feed lot owners are hesitant to purchase the machines unless enough alfalfa acreage is planted to justify the purchase.

It requires approximately 700 acres of alfalfa per machine, and some farmers have already shown interest in the idea. The nearest supply of alfalfa is Roswell, New Mexico, which furnishes only enough for its immediate area. Any area farmer interested in this new program is asked to call E. G. Gaston right away. If enough interest is shown in the project another meeting will be called.

His body was found near the pickup on his farm three miles east of here. Huff carried a rifle to rid his farm of coyotes. Justice of Peace L. A. Glasscock ruled the death from accidental gunshot from a .22 caliber rifle. Huff had been a resident of the Springlake-Earth area for 27 years prior to moving to Muleshoe three years ago.

The "grow-more-cotton campaign", an almost extinct species which reappeared on the cotton scene in late 1966 with the first short crop under a new government cotton program, got more fuel for campaign campfires with the recent issuance of USDA's first crop report for 1967.

The report, received August 8 in the offices of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., set U. S. upland cotton production for this season at 8,250,000 bales, about half a million below the 8.7 million others sources had been estimating and about 3 million below what officials had hoped for.

Original planting intentions of U. S. cotton farmers came to a little over 10 million acres. But bad weather, both during and immediately after planting time, has reduced standing acres of upland cotton to 8,477,500, USDA reveals.

Harvested acres last year came to 9,477,500, from which 9.5 million bales were gathered. Production in Texas for 1967 was estimated at 2,775,000 bales from standing acres of 3,700,000. This compares with Texas production of 3,182,000 in 1966, when 3,968,000 acres were harvested.

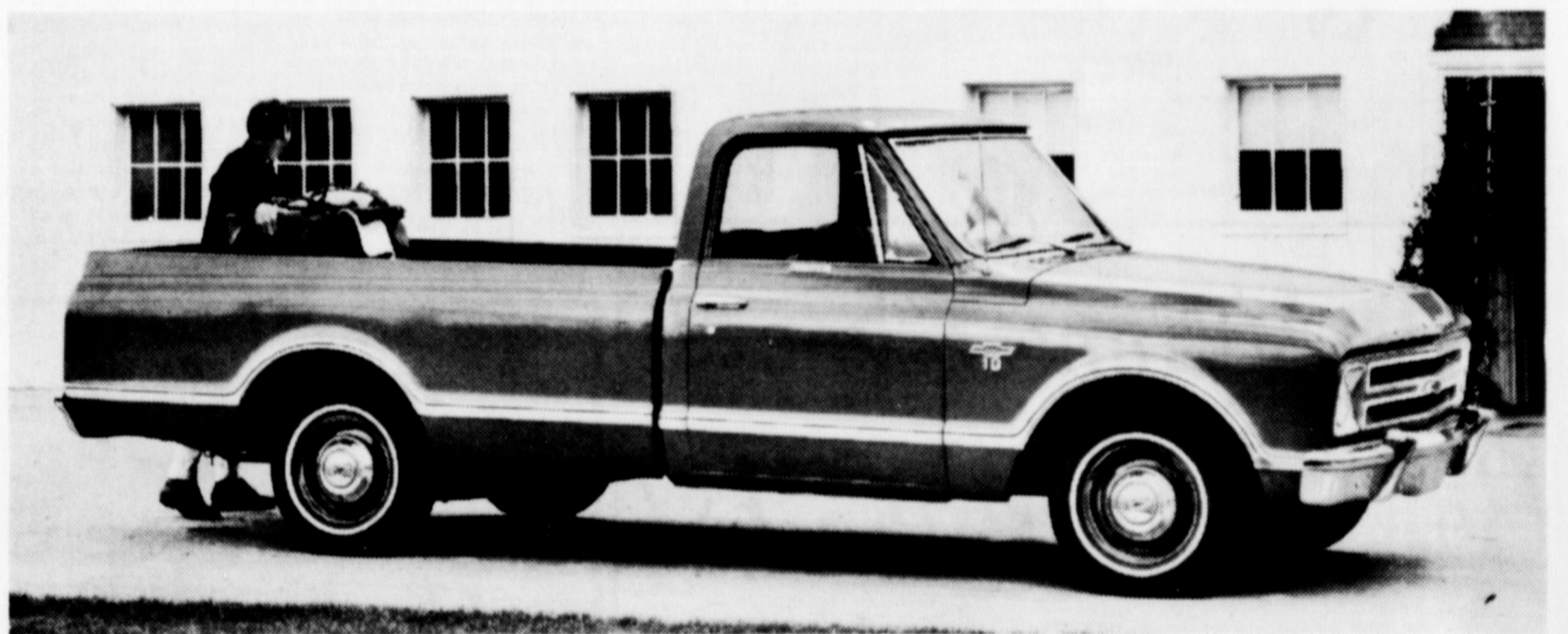
In the 23 counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., the guess is that 1,173,500 bales will be produced. The High Plains has about 1,250,000 standing acres out of 1,430,384 acres which farmers had signed up to plant. Plains production in 1966 was 1,278,000 bales.

National, State and area production have been drastically cut in both 1966 and 1967 by the cotton section of the Agriculture Act of 1965, which required farmers to divert 12.5 percent of allotments and offered strong payment incentives for diversion up to 35 percent.

In addition, the weather has refused to cooperate during both of the years the program has been in operation.

Consequently, the production figures above compare with the 1961-65 average for the nation

They also provide a security watch around the perimeter of their base.

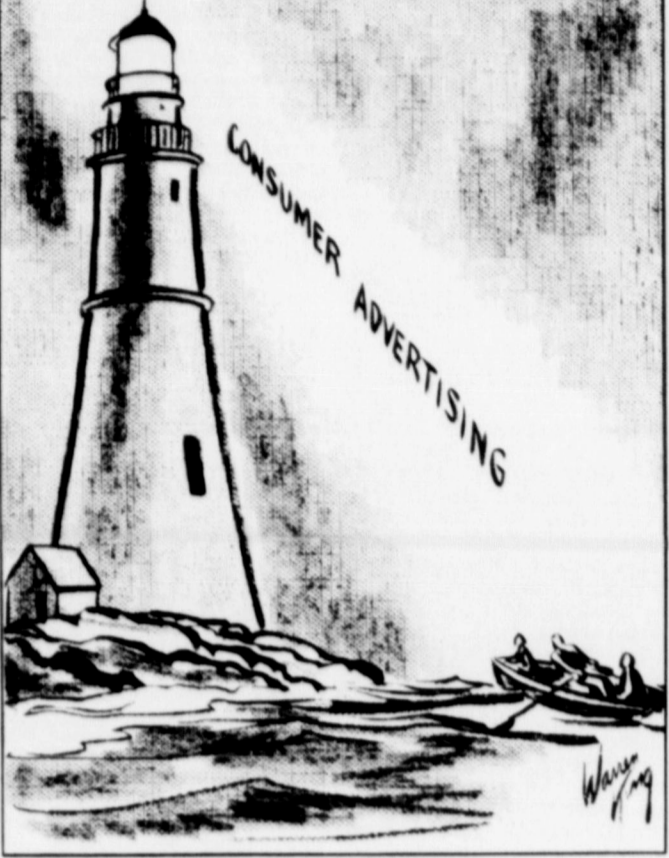

INFORMED CONSUMERS

Attacks on advertising are nothing new. Fortunately, it's easy to refute such charges. For years critics have been saying that advertising corrupts the public taste, that it is useless and unnecessary. Others contend that it weakens competition by developing consumer loyalty for particular products and companies.

This would seem to indicate that some firms are more successful in their advertising than others. But the argument that competition can be strengthened by penalizing those who are successful at it isn't convincing.

Commenting on a proposal of the Federal Trade Commission to constrict advertising, Justice John Marshall Harlan of the Supreme Court wrote, "Undeniably, advertising may sometimes be used to create irrational brand preferences and mislead consumers as to the actual differences between products, but it is very difficult to discover at what point advertising ceases to be an aspect of healthy competition. It is not the Commission's function to decide which lawful elements of the product or for the consumer, should be considered useful and which should be considered the symptoms of industrial sickness. It is the consumer who must make the election through the exercise of his purchasing power."

This may be only the view of one Justice, but we think he is on the right track. Commercial advertising serves the essential purpose of informing consumers of the choices open to them. Any impairment of the channels conveying such information would damage the interest of the consuming public.

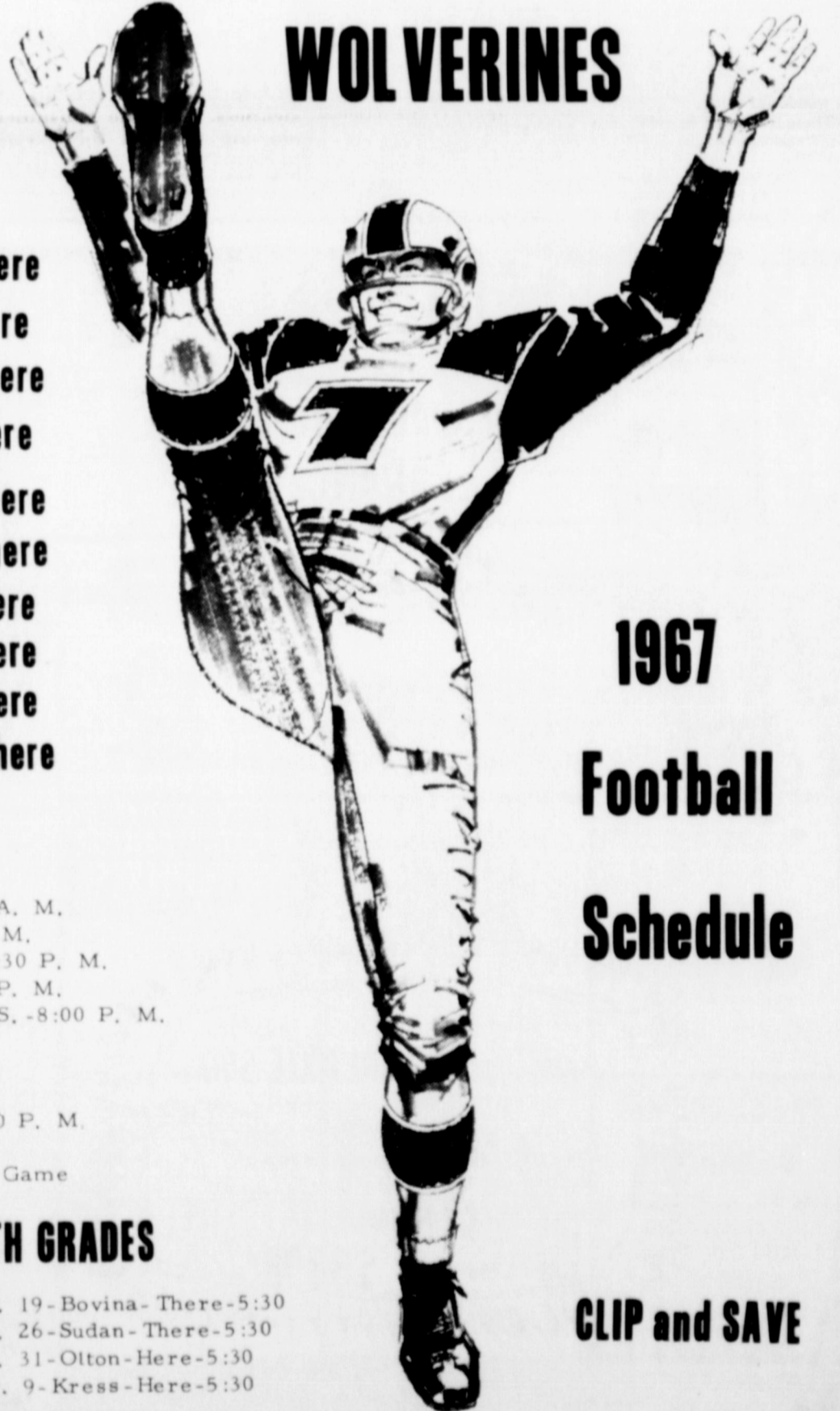

Peace Corps To Test August 19

Earth area residents interested in serving with the Peace Corps in developing nations are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, August 19, at the post office building in Lubbock. The test measures general aptitude and ability to learn a foreign language, not education or achievement. It is given to determine where and how an applicant will be happiest and best utilized overseas. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail. The test takes approximately one hour and a half. Persons interested in serving

with the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from local post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D. C. 20528. 15,000 Peace Corps Volunteers with widely varying backgrounds are currently serving in 56 developing nations in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific. They are working with the people of these nations in self help projects ranging from food production and health to education and community action.

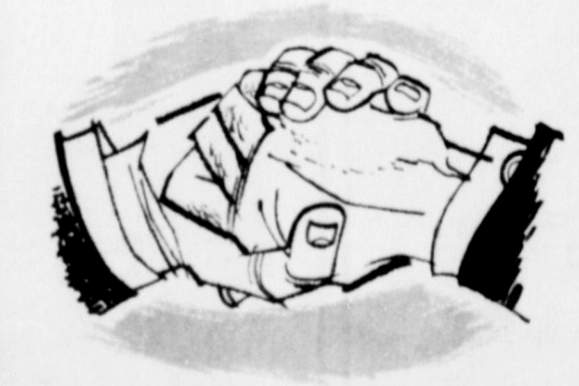

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section 13 thereto to read as follows:

"Section 13. Notwithstanding any other section of this article, the Legislature in providing for the creation, establishment, maintenance, and operation of a hospital district, shall not be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services including the operation of any community mental health centers, community mental retardation centers or community mental health and mental retardation centers which may exist or be thereafter established within the boundaries of such district, nor shall the Legislature be required to provide that such district shall assume full responsibility of public health department units and clinics and related public health activities or services, and the Legislature shall not be required to restrict the power of any municipality or political subdivision to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations or to expend public moneys for the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities or services or the operation of such community mental health or mental retardation centers within the boundaries of the hospital districts; and unless a statute creating a hospital district shall expressly prohibit participation by any entity

other than the hospital district in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units or clinics or related public health activities within or partly within the boundaries of any hospital district, any municipality or any other political subdivision or state-supported entity within the hospital district may participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, public health units and clinics and related public health activities and may levy taxes, issue bonds or other obligations, and expend public moneys for such purposes as provided by law.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 13, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to permit municipalities, other political subdivisions, and state-supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support, or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services."

Freezing Not Recommended As Best Way To Preserve Potatoes

by Mrs. Lady Clare Phillips County Home Demonstration Agent

The method of freezing new Irish potatoes at home has been a question many have asked.

directories has been delayed until January of 1968. It had been hoped that the new directories would be out in September of this year, but printing schedules would not allow this deadline.

The Department of Agriculture does not recommend freezing as a best way to preserve the potato, but it can be done safely.

The reason given for not freezing is that they do not result in a product of satisfactory texture.

Mrs. Lady Clare Phillips, County Home Demonstration Agent, recommends if you wish to freeze the new potato, peel or scrape and boil until almost done. Cool and package in vapor proof bags or rigid containers. Seal and store at zero degrees or lower.

Specialist Says Food Expenditures Are Edging Up

Total food expenditures last year increased seven to eight percent, according to Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, Texas A&M Extension consumer marketing specialist. Mrs. Clyatt added that disposable personal income during 1966 was up approximately eight percent, so the actual percentage of income spent on food is about the same as in 1965.

The cost of food, like the cost of many other things, will probably mean higher prices, especially after mid-year. Dairy prices, too, are expected

to rise. Consumers may also expect higher prices for cereal and bakery products. Fats and oils may cost more; potato prices should remain about the same.

On the brighter side, Mrs. Clyatt forecasts generous supplies of pork, poultry and eggs and lower prices on these items. Citrus fruits, too, should be less expensive in 1967.
