Highway 70 From Bailey County To Earth Scheduled For Seal Coat Early In 1960

The Texas Highway Department will spend \$12,600 for US and State Highway betterment in Lamb County during 1960, D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, has announced.

Location of work scheduled for the county is along US Highway 70 from Bailey County line to Earth, approximately 11.5 miles of seal coat at an estimated cost of \$12,600.

At the December meeting of the Texas Highway Commission, funds were appropriated for improvements on US and State Highways over the state.

US and State Highways are scheduled to receive surface and base strengthening and also shoulder improvements.

This is in addition to the regular construction and maintenance program already programmed for the counties concerned, State Highway Engineer, D. C. Greer, stated.

Conservation Practice Retained For West Texas Cotton Growers

The Department of Agriculture has reversed its decision to eliminate strip planting of cotton due to the vigorous protest of Alex Dickie, Jr., president of Texas Farmers Union to Secretary Benson and Texas Senators and Congressmen.

The reversal will retain the conservation practice used by thousands of West Texas farmers and save millions of dollars for the West Texas farmers.

Due to the arguments of Mr. Dickie, the farmers can continue to plant four rows of cotton and leave four rows summer fallow without losing cotton acreage. Mr. Dickie, satisfied with the results of his protest expressed his appreciation for help from the Texas Senators and Congressmen.

When Mr. Dickie learned of this unfair and discriminatory ruling, he immediately protested to Secretary Benson as follows:

"This shrinkage of cotton land by the latest ruling from USDA would substitute the land available for production of grain sorghum which is already plagued by surplus and low price. We are convinced that this edict not only causes great distress to already distressed farmers but it also greatly aggravates the deplorable surplus and price situation of grain sorghum. We respectfully urge you to reconsider this ruling and plan for this long established and sound farm practice to continue."

'Dimes' Opens First Birth Defects Center

A birth defects study center, the first of its kind designed to combine clinical treatment with research and teaching, has just been officially opened at Columbus, Ohio. It is supported by funds from the New March of Dimes, which is now engaged in its January campaign for contributions to fight three major crippling diseases including, besides birth defects, arthritis and polio.



Parents are taught to give home care to children with birth defects at the Columbus Children's Hospital Birth Defects Study Center, supported by New March of Dimes funds. Medical experts say that birth defects are the biggest unmet childhood medical problem in the United States today. There are more than 600 different kinds of birth defects, or "congenital malformations," as they are called by doctors. They range all the way from harelip and clubfoot to mental retardation.

Shrouded in Superstition

The study center in Columbus' famed Children's Hospital thus represents the beginning of the New March of Dimes attempt to solve a medical problem that has heretofore been largely neglected by research. It is a problem that has for centuries been shrouded in fear, superstition and shame. By tackling this issue with a three-pronged program of research, patient aid and training of skilled medical professionals, the March of Dimes organization seeks to bring hope to the hundreds of thousands of parents whose lives have been blighted by bewildering grief and heartbreak following the birth of a malformed child. This hope is embodied in the past record of the March of Dimes organization in fighting baffling diseases. It was March of Dimes funds that encouraged Dr. Jonas E. Salk to become a virologist and that

produced his world-celebrated vaccine against crippling polio.

Through the combination of treatment, teaching and study at the Columbus Birth Defects Study Center and others the March of Dimes hopes to establish and support, it is believed that new knowledge will be obtained and spread so that the devastating effects of these disorders may eventually, for the most part, be prevented or controlled.

No Mystery in Mufflers

If you are one of the millions of women responsible for the family car, chances are your service station dealer will someday tell you the muffler should be replaced.



When he does this, turn off your feminine skepticism and take his advice. The muffler helps keep the engine quiet and carries motor exhaust to the rear of the car. After long use it may develop leaks. Result: noise and possible health hazard. Understand the problem and you see why the solution makes sense.

The car exhaust contains carbon monoxide. Like many other substances, it is poisonous if breathed in sufficient amounts. In its pure form, it is colorless, odorless, tasteless and non-irritating. It is dangerous because it keeps blood from carrying its normal load of oxygen. On long trips, stop every couple of hours for a stretch in the fresh air.

Always keep an air vent or window open—at least a little. In a station wagon, never leave only the back window open—exhaust can be sucked into the car. Don't snooze in a car with the motor running.

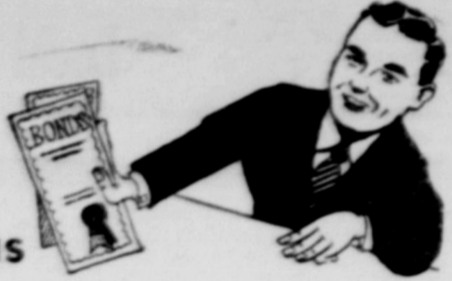
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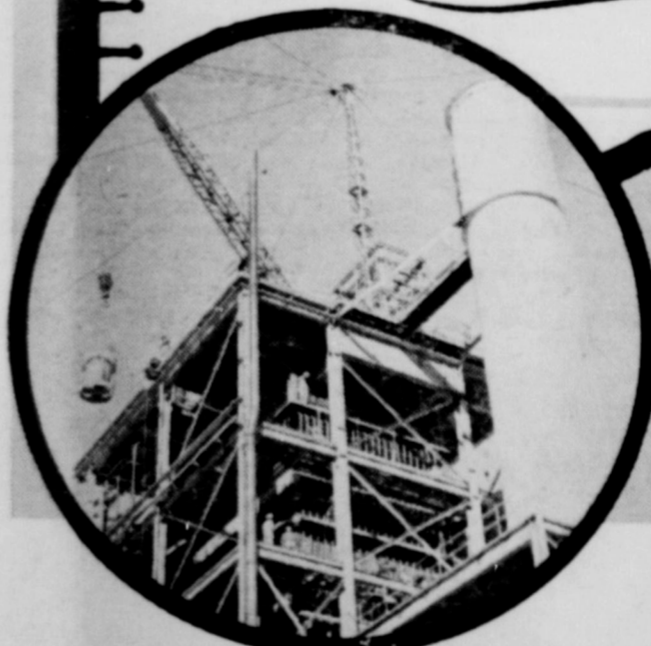
