Following his college graduation he directed the Cowden Junior High Band in Midland, with the band winning outstanding band honors, while he was there.

The local Sweepstakes winning band is directed by Dean Foshee, who has been director since the 61-62 school term, replacing Norman Hemphill, who moved to Childress to direct the band there with the beginning of that school term. 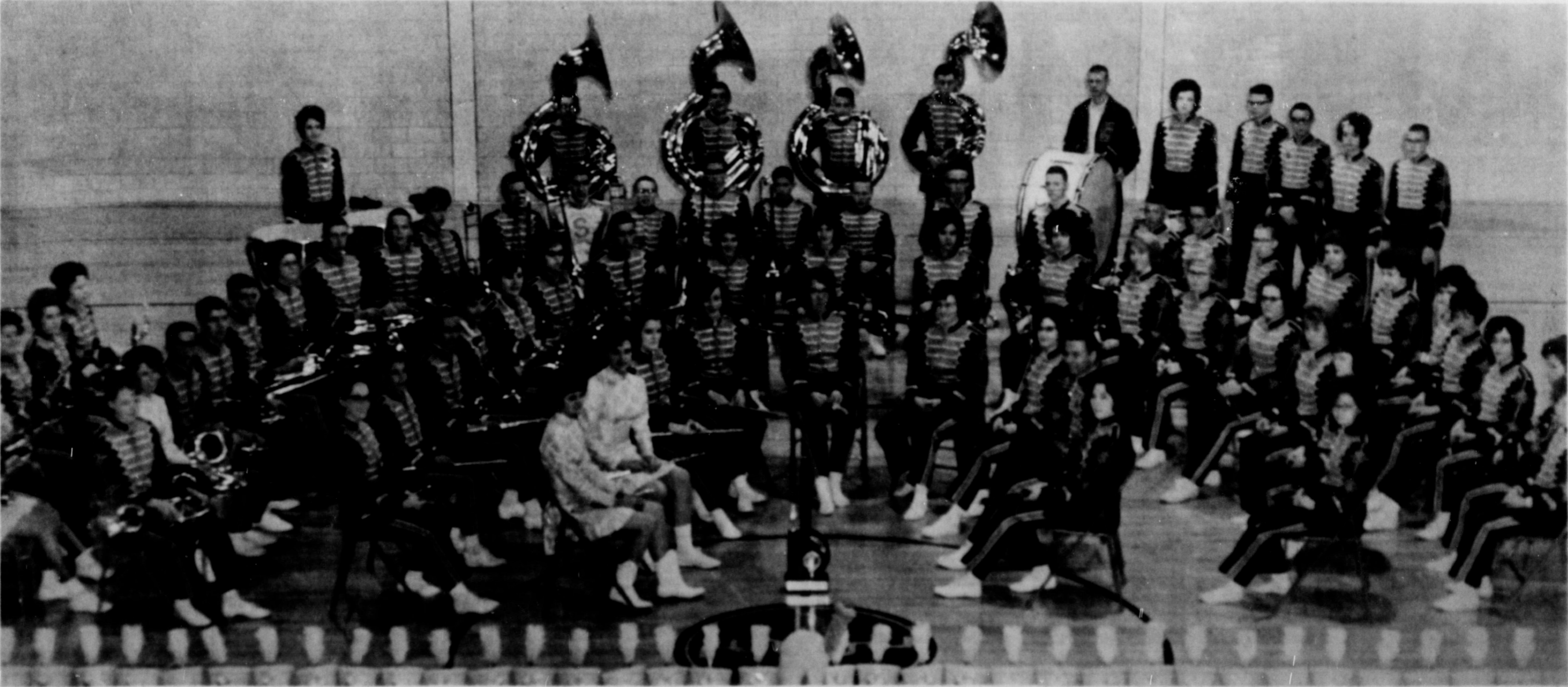
The councilmen were elected to serve two year terms. Mayor Crawford has completed two terms as mayor and Stephens and McClure incumbents are completing their first term.

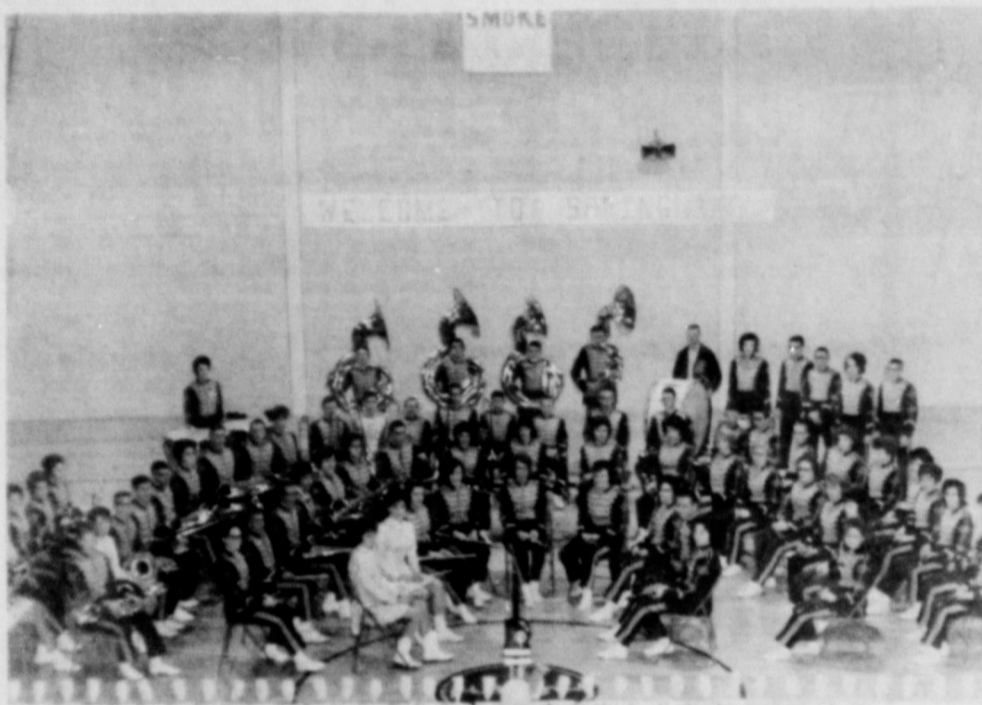
Springlake Places Third Party Line... In Kress Cinder Meet

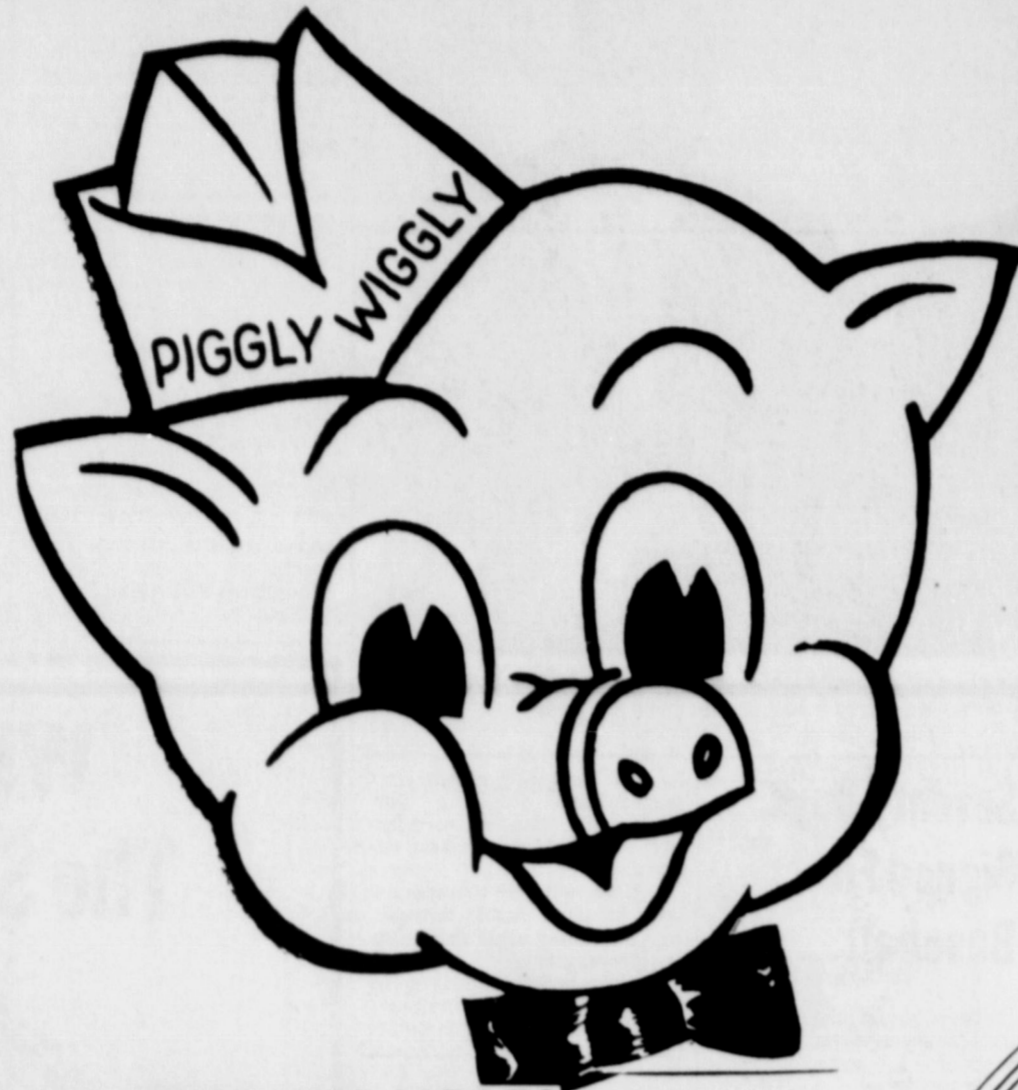

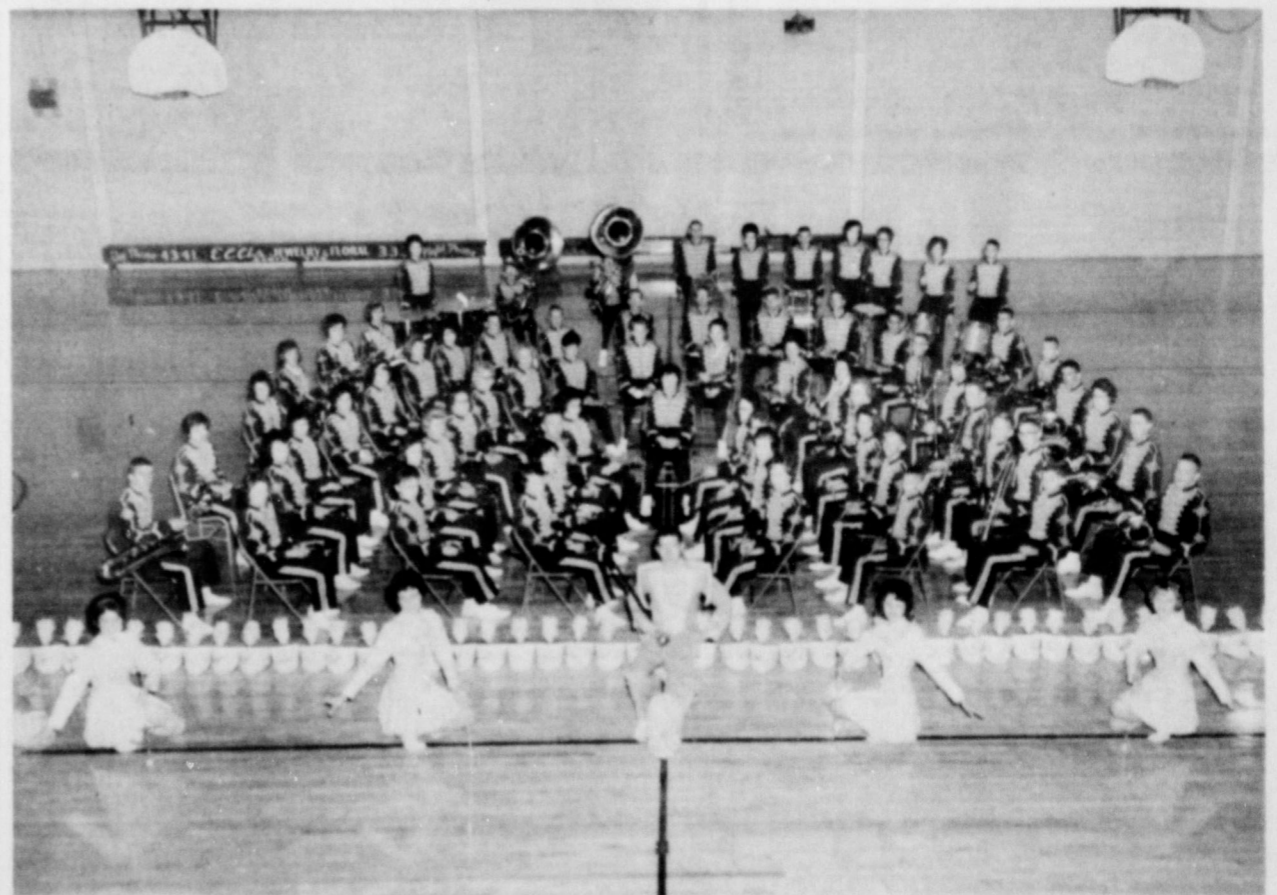

Inspection Deadline April 15

The time is almost here--- April 15th is the deadline for having your 1964 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker displayed in the lower right hand corner of your windshield. Only 50% of the 604,369 registered vehicles in the Region #5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety have visited safety inspection stations and obtained their 1964 safety inspection sticker, according to Captain Alan Johnson, Motor Vehicle Inspection Service of the DPS.

Residents of Lamb county own 15,500 registered vehicles and 6070 have not been inspected yet," Johnson said.

"Under the law there can be no extension of the deadline, and motorists who fail to display the new sticker on and after April 16th are subject to arrest," He said. Authority for the enforcement of the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act is vested in any Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff and City Policeman as well as the enforcement officers of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

According to Captain Johnson there are 15 state approved inspection stations located in this county, and many motorists are going to find long lines awaiting them as the deadline rolls nearer.

He added, "It is as much a violation to display an old sticker as not to have one at all. The law provides a fine of from one dollar to two hundred

Lamb County 4th In State Cotton Production

Lamb County, ranked second among cotton producing counties in Texas on the 1962 totals,

dropped to fourth place the past season after old man weather took a bigswipe at the 1963 bale count. Lamb's total, as released by the US Department of Commerce was 166,064 through Jan. 15, 1964. The County total in 1962 was a record-breaking 223,694 bales. The decrease in bales ginned was reflected in other leading counties, too. The top four cotton producing counties all

showed decrease over the 1962 crop total. Lubbock, the leader dropped from 292,144 bales to 246,523. Hockley County, right behind Lamb in the 1962 totals, moved up to second place with 207,566 bales. Hale was third this past year with 189,177. Both had higher production in 1962 however. Texas had 12 counties among the top 27 ranking counties in the nation.

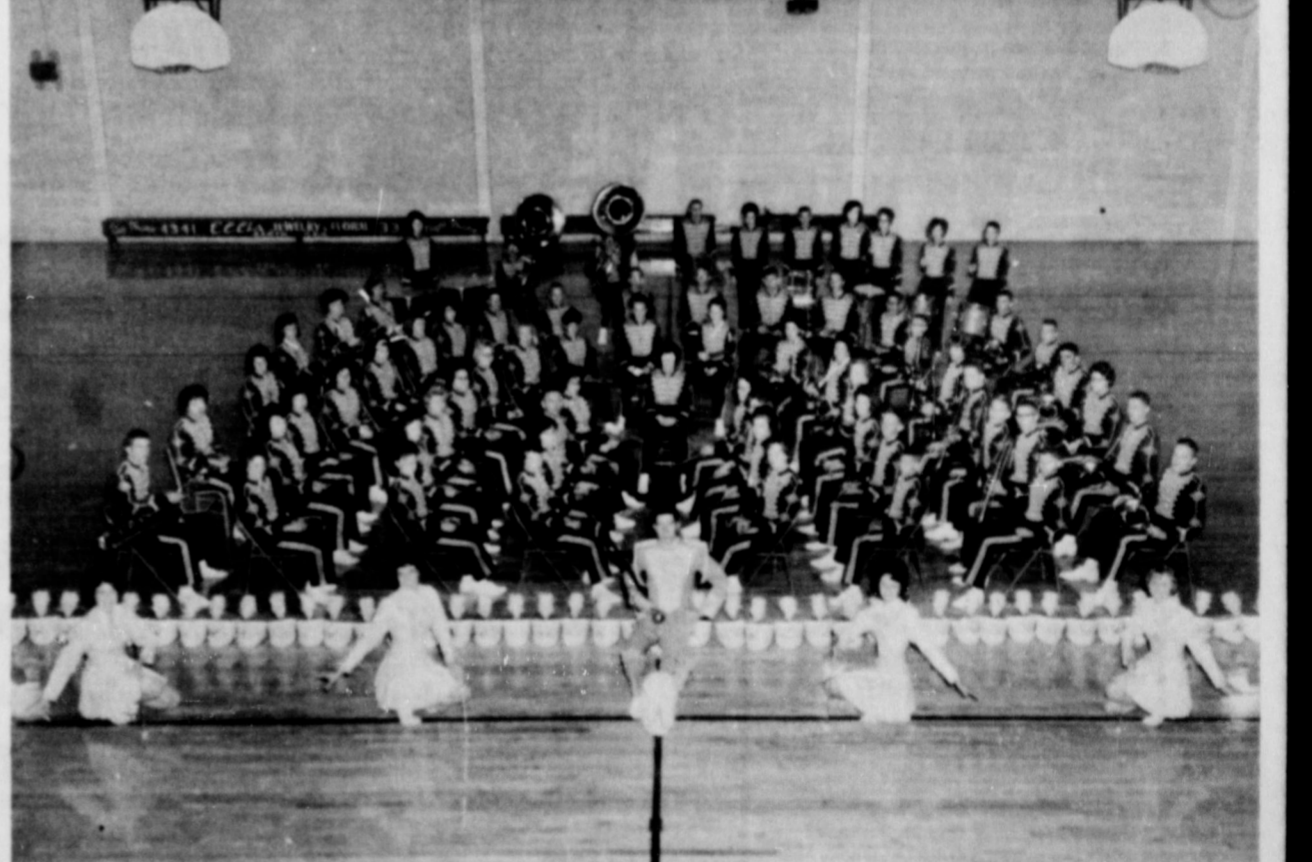

- (a) Allow people to be jailed without trial by jury (Titles I, II, III, IV, and VII).

- (b) Allow the government to hold Star Chamber sessions and to imprison those who disclose, without permission, what went on behind its closed doors (Sec. 501).

Therefore, there would be no uniformity of interpretation. What might be classified as a "discriminatory practice" by one agency, might not be so classified by another agency.

Dictatorial Attorney General

Last fall, when broad authority to sue in Civil Rights matters was first proposed, the Attorney General said: "Obviously the proposal injects Federal executive authority into some areas which are not its legitimate concern and vests the Attorney General with broad discretion in matters of great political and social concern." This bill falls within that condemnation.
