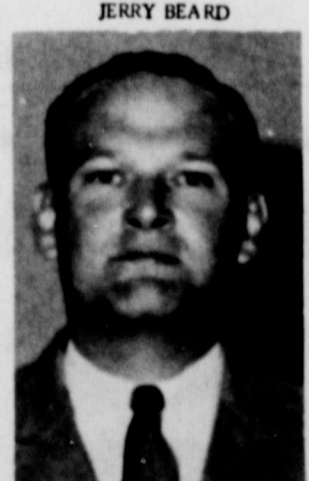

Registration results show a total of 802 students enrolled for the 1968-69 school year. 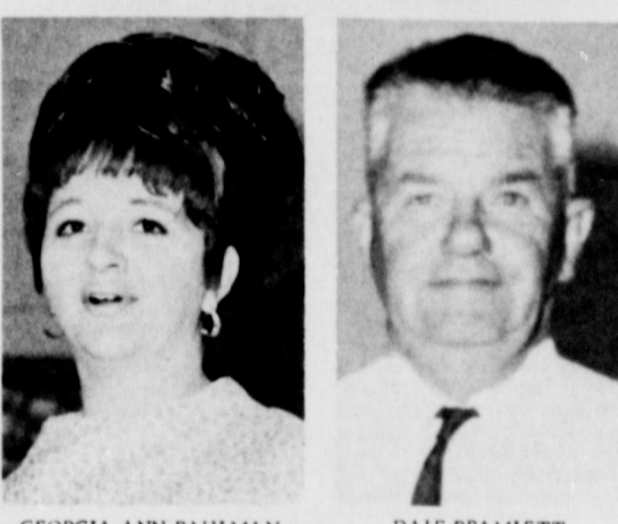

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\$10 Million Arriving For Lamb County Farmers

Allotment checks, arriving soon from the county office will give Lamb County farmers a total of \$10 million in federal cotton and grain sorghum allotment payments.

According to L. D. Aten, manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office, Mailing date for the checks is set for Tuesday, September 3.

"This constitutes the final payment for 1968 of the cotton and feed grain support program," Aten said, and added "a little over \$4 million in advanced payments was made to the farmers in the county back in February and March when they first signed up for the program.

The total number of farms in the county participating in the program reached 2,400 and the county-wide average check

being paid is \$5,600, Aten said. "If this doesn't put us first in payments in the Plains counties, then we certainly can't be lower than second," he added.

Thirty percent of the cotton allotment acreage was diverted and 45 percent of the grain sorghum acreage was diverted. Average per-acre payments being made include \$65.60 an acre for the planted cotton and \$57.68 per acre on the first five percent of the diverted cotton. On the remaining 25 percent of the diverted cotton, a payment of \$32.16 per acre is being made.

A payment of \$21.43 an acre is being made on planted grain sorghum and \$38.99 per acre on grain sorghums that are diverted.

Total support payments for the year for cotton will be \$9,400,000 and for grain sor-

Frank Ford Says State Commissioner Of Agriculture Used Public Funds For Political Purposes

Frank Ford opened his campaign for State Representative in Earth this week with the pledge that "The people of this district are going to be represented in the Texas Legislature."

"It is very evident that the voters of this area are dissatisfied with the recent 50% increase in the state sales tax which will go into effect October 1st," said Ford. "This tax bill did little or nothing toward funding the impending pay raise for Texas teachers, nor did it provide much needed tax sharing with local government."

"The fact that it did provide, with an appropriation item in which was slipped into the spending bill during the secret meeting of the House-Senate Conference Committee, for development of the LBJ State Park is evidence enough that we need a two-party system in Austin, Texas have had enough of seeing their hard-earned tax money squandered on special privilege legislation."

"Our state ranks 44th in literacy at a time when there are fewer jobs for unskilled people. And yet our one-party Legislature has voted to double their own salary every two years for the past several sessions. This is a strange assignment of priorities, and I intend to vote against any increase in salaries for Legislators until we meet the more pressing needs of our state."

Taxpayers have had enough of higher and higher taxes without performance.

Eight Receive Probationary Sentences

District Judge Pat Boone, Jr., presided over eight cases in the criminal trial session, conducted by the 15th District Court which ended Friday, August 23. All eight defendants pled guilty and all were given probationary sentences.

Heading the list of convictions was Ray Hyte Bradshaw who was given a three year probationary sentence for forgery. Bradshaw was placed on probation to Hale County authorities and ordered to pay court costs and restitution in the amount of \$131.33 to the Earth Service and Supply Co.

Found guilty of defrauding by a worthless check, James D. Allen was put on probation to Wood County authorities for four years. Other than court costs Allen was ordered to pay \$1675 restitution to the Ed Thompson Implement Co of Olton, and \$110 to the White and Watts Implement Co of Muleshoe, against whom the offenses were made. Payment for the restitution were set at \$50 per month.

Littlefield residents, Walter Lee Johnson, George Henry Morgan and Claude Edward Williams were convicted of the June burglary of a Littlefield grocery store owned by Willie Carson, and were sentenced to five years each. Johnson and Morgan were put on probation to Lamb County authorities, and Williams to Curry County New Mexico authorities. Each was ordered to pay \$25 in restitution to Willie Carson.

Convicted on two counts of felony theft were Truman Ray Hunter and Raymond Samuels, Jr. Both were given four years sentences and placed on probation for that same length of time to Lamb County Authorities.

Each was ordered to pay \$250 in restitution to O. B. Whitford of Earth on the first conviction and an additional \$250 each to W. B. Hucks of Springlake on the second count, this payment is to be in addition to court costs.

Plato Updated

The new book "The Modern Industrial State" by Dr. John Galbraith, ex-ambassador, advisor to presidents and so on, is most interesting. For he makes the case, as did Plato some 2300 years ago, that the best way to keep the economy, the social order and other matters on an even keel is to have at the wheel a group of super planners who would compromise the government. Now, of course, one could well launch into a discussion of how well the super planners, called government economists, have been handling the affairs of the American ship of state these past few years, bringing up such items as the balance of gold, the national deficit and other matters. But the price was cut due to the competitive situation in the steel market. It was done without a utopia from would be economic planners in Washington. As a matter of fact, the juggling of tariff rates by the Washington thinkers was one of the reasons for the price cut. There is no great new moral involved here. But it does point up one old fact. When politicians and their even less experienced bureaucrats try to play businessman, the result is as ridiculous as a six year old boy trying to play big by dressing up in his father's clothes. And not nearly as amusing either.

For a wedding trip to Amarillo and Oklahoma, the bride chose a blue silk suit trimmed in white, with matching white accessories.

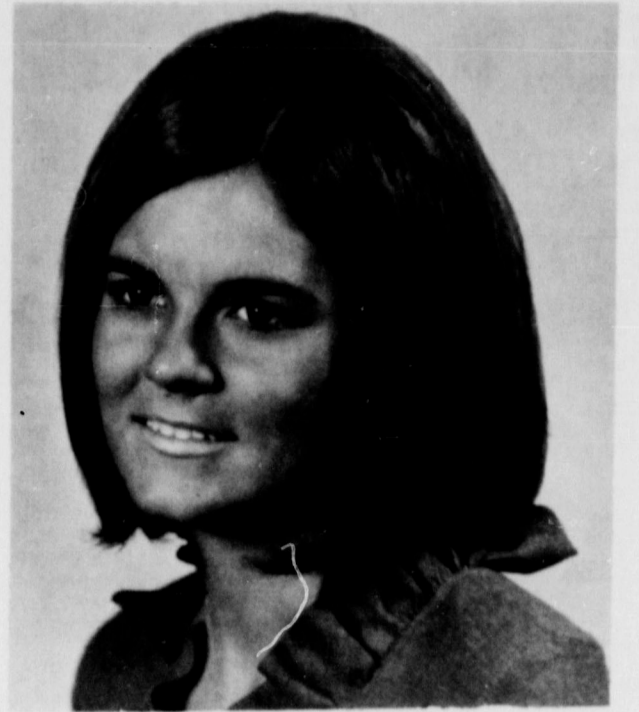

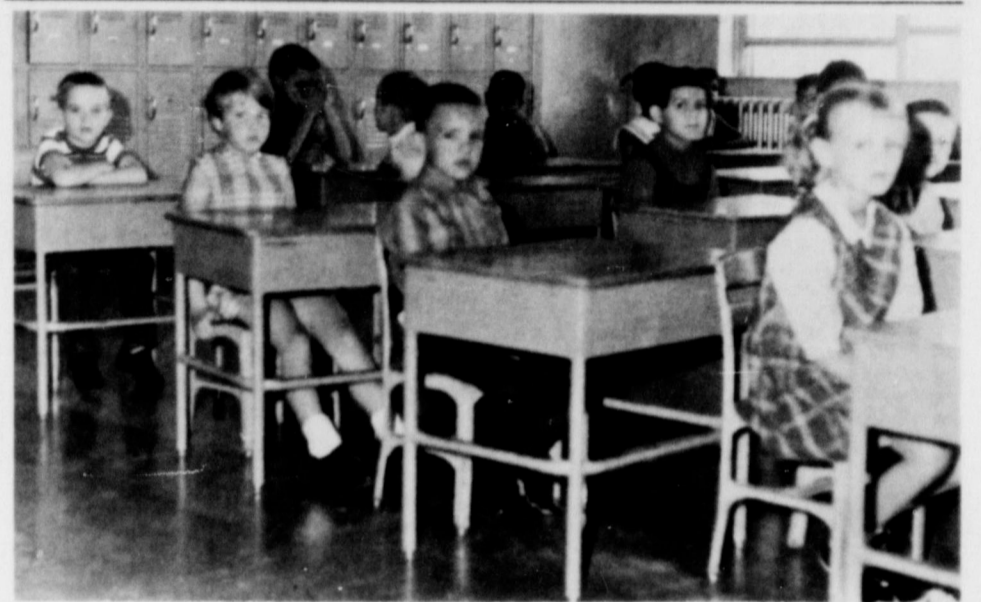

Farmers In Need Of Action, Not Sympathy

In an address before the Texas Wheat Growers Association Friday, Dick Brown, Democratic candidate for U. S. Representative, and also state secretary of the Association, said that the farmers are in dire need of some positive action on the part of members of the agriculture committee, and not empty sympathy. He said that it was hard to swallow the statement that "We are concerned about your problems" when action on the part of some of the committee members contradicts this statement.

Failure of the grain reserve bill to pass out of committee last November is proof positive of the lack of concern of some members of the committee. This measure would have boosted grain prices immediately, and would have gone far to prevent the grave crisis that has developed for the Panhandle farmer. And yet it was killed in the Agriculture committee by the slim margin of two votes, one of these cast by our representative. The only explanation of this action by committee members is that some vote against everything that comes up, and at no time offering an alternative. Being a member of the all important Agriculture Committee takes with it the responsibility of offering positive alternatives to solve the problems of those that are represented.

My opponent terms the farmer as "the forgotten man", and here is exactly right. He forgot the farmer until now that it is election time. He is remembering him lightly by saying that "I supported the one year extension of the farm bill earlier this summer, but I do not like what is in it, and if you will vote for me this time, I will do better next term."

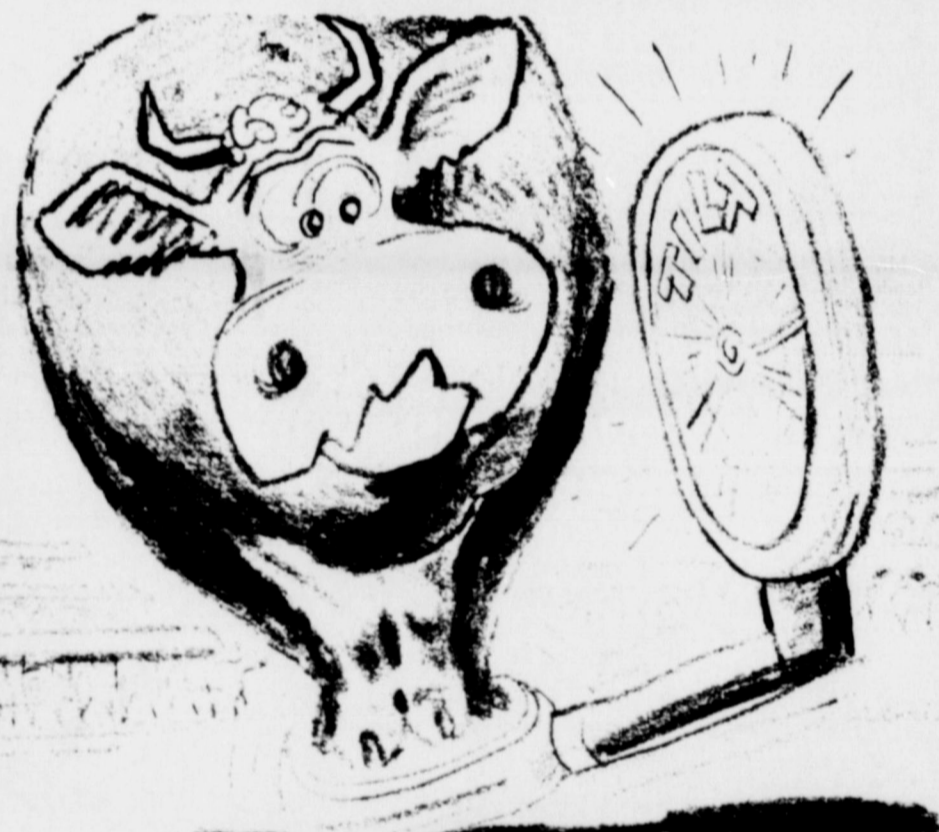

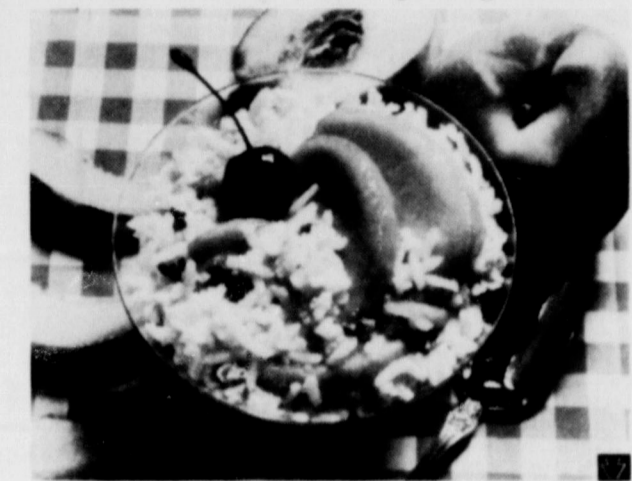

Meanwhile, sprinkle peaches with enough sugar to sweeten; let stand. Drain fruit, measuring 1/4 cup syrup. Add fruit, measured syrup, and nuts to cooled rice. Fold in whipped topping. Spoon into dessert dishes and garnish each serving with a maraschino cherry and additional sliced peaches, if desired. Makes about 4-1/2 cups or 8 servings.

DPS Estimates 46 Persons May Die In Texas Traffic During Labor Day

Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS estimates 46 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Labor Day weekend.

"This is the last holiday weekend of the summer, and thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Speir said. "It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during an otherwise happy period," he added.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 6 p. m. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

"Many other groups such as local police and sheriff's departments, the trucking industry, and the Jaycees will be cooperating in this effort to promote safe driving during the holiday," Speir noted.

For example, the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will sponsor a holiday road patrol during the Labor Day weekend to assist stranded motorists.

Jack Bryan, TMTA safety director, said some 40 cars marked "Holiday Road Patrol" will be used in the program. These will be manned by the safety directors, safety supervisors and safety engineers of the trucking industry who comprise the membership of the Council. Personnel participating in the road patrol will work as volunteers.

The Jaycees will provide rest stops for motorists in many areas of the state. Texas Safety Association said W. F. (Bill) Leonard will coordinate efforts of over 12,000 Junior Chamber of Commerce members in operating some 200 "rest stops" for serving free coffee to fat-

Prevention Best Control For Plant Disease

The best disease prevention measure that can be taken in ornamental plants is to buy healthy or disease resistant plants, Dr. C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M University, advises.

Once an ornamental plant becomes badly diseased, it is almost impossible to nurse it back to health. For this reason, every effort should be made to prevent introduction of disease-causing organisms on plant material or in soil, he says.

Plants in poor growth condition are usually more susceptible to disease, therefore good cultural and sanitation practices will help prevent trouble, Horne explains.

Diseased branches should be removed as soon as observed, and pruning wounds should be treated with a specially prepared material to stop entrance of wood decaying organisms.

For treatment, fungicide applications should begin when disease development first ap-

pears and should continue at seven to 14-day intervals as long as weather conditions are favorable for the disease, says Horne.
