Lamb County May Be Short Of Cotton Pullers For Harvest in Fall

Lamb County will be short 13,625 cotton pullers during the peak period of the cotton harvest according to the figures presented by the Texas Employment Commission to a Lamb County Farm Labor Committee who met with the TEC to review the total seasonal employment needs.

Attending the meeting were County Farm Labor Committee

men, Paul Lewis and A. G. Arvarez who met with Edward D. Vaughn manager and Eldroid G. Travis Field Assistant of the Texas Employment Commission Office, also Jesse Everett and Jack Wattenburger of Littlefield.

The Committee will function under Law No. 78 in obtaining facts relevant to the supply of

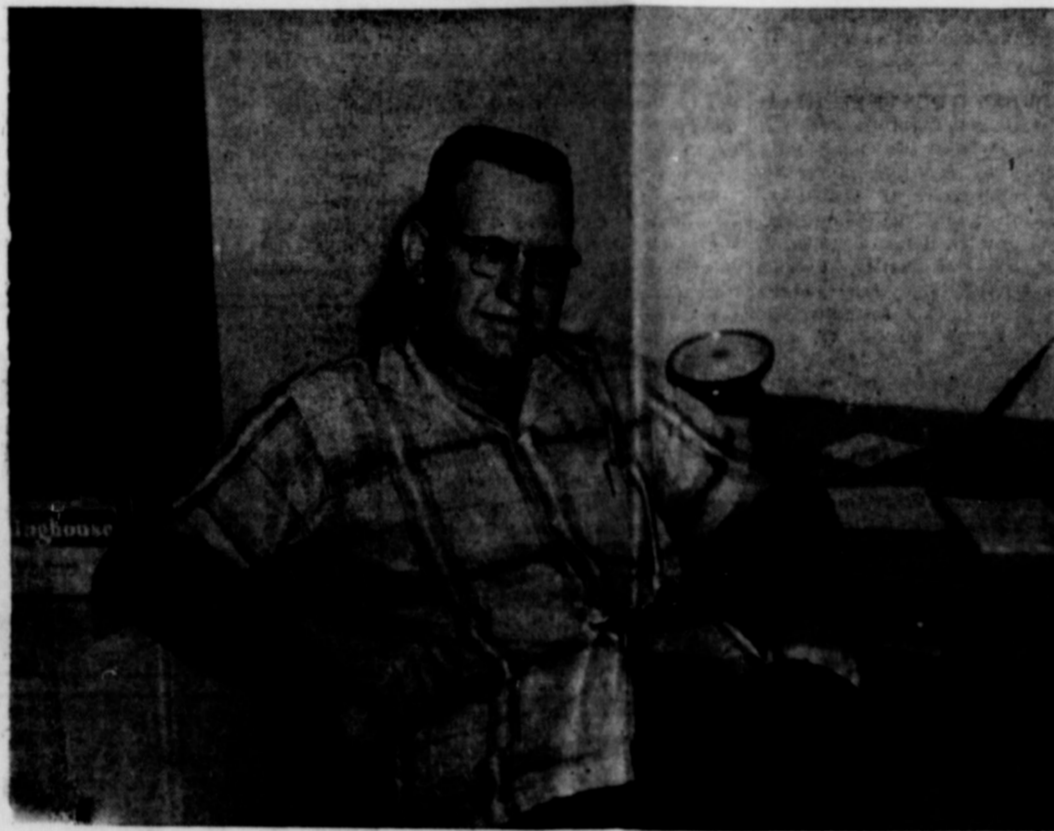
