# Yankees Gain In Little League Race

## Search Is On For 1957 Farm Bureau Queen

The pleasant process of scouring the Texas countryside to find the fairest and most charming young farm or ranch girl to receive the title of "1957 Texas Farm Bureau Queen" has begun.

The Farm Bureau of Lamb County will hold the annual Queen Contest in the Springlake High School Auditorium, August 23 at 8 p.m. Applications may be filed at the Farm Bureau office in Littlefield.

The search already under way in some counties—will culminate with the crowning of the queen Nov. 18 at the state convention in Dallas. The winner will attend the American Farm Bureau Federation convention in Chicago the following month with all expenses paid.

Purpose of the contest, according to the queen contest committee of the TFB Board of Directors, is "to give recognition to the farm and ranch girls of Texas." The rules provide that this is to be an "honest-to-goodness queen contest," with the contestants to be judged on "grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness and all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas future homemakers."

Any daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production is eligible for participation. She must be single, age 15 to 22, and to enter district eliminations, must have been in a county queen contest with at least two participants.

Not eligible to enter are former state winners and daughters of employees, state directors, county presidents and secretaries.

Communities in participating counties (counties must have at least 25 members to participate) will select community queens who will vie in county eliminations. Winners of the county contests will compete in district eliminations prior to Sept. 1. The 13 district winners and an attendant for each will receive an expense-paid trip to the state convention, courtesy of the Texas Farm Bureau, to compete in the finals.

The state Farm Bureau queen and her matron escort will be allowed \$500 for expenses to the AFBB convention. Runners-up will receive beautiful wrist watches.

Last year's TFB queen was Joann Vaughan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carshall Vaughan, of Tulsa, Swisher County.

Bill Braden has recently been appointed zone chairman for the zone of which both the Earth and Springlake Lions Clubs are in.

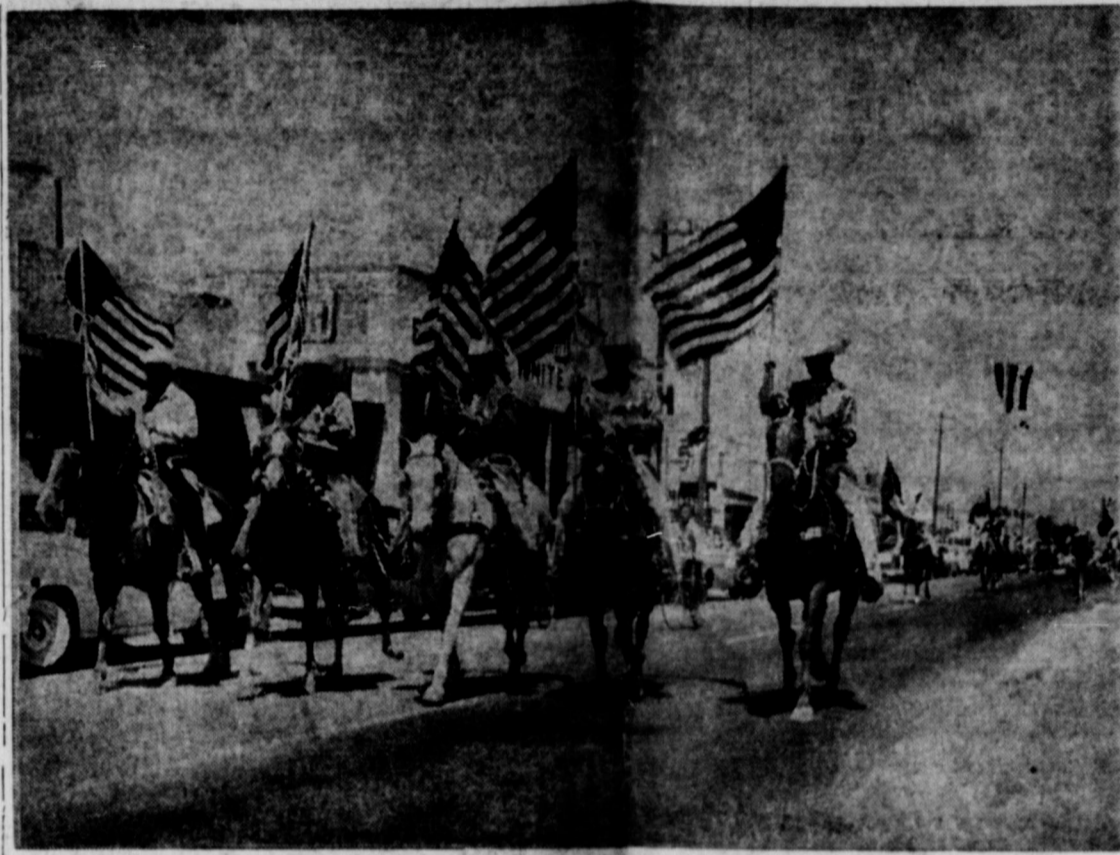

Blackwell states the shipping should be completed by mid-August. To make ready the warehouses for this year's harvest.

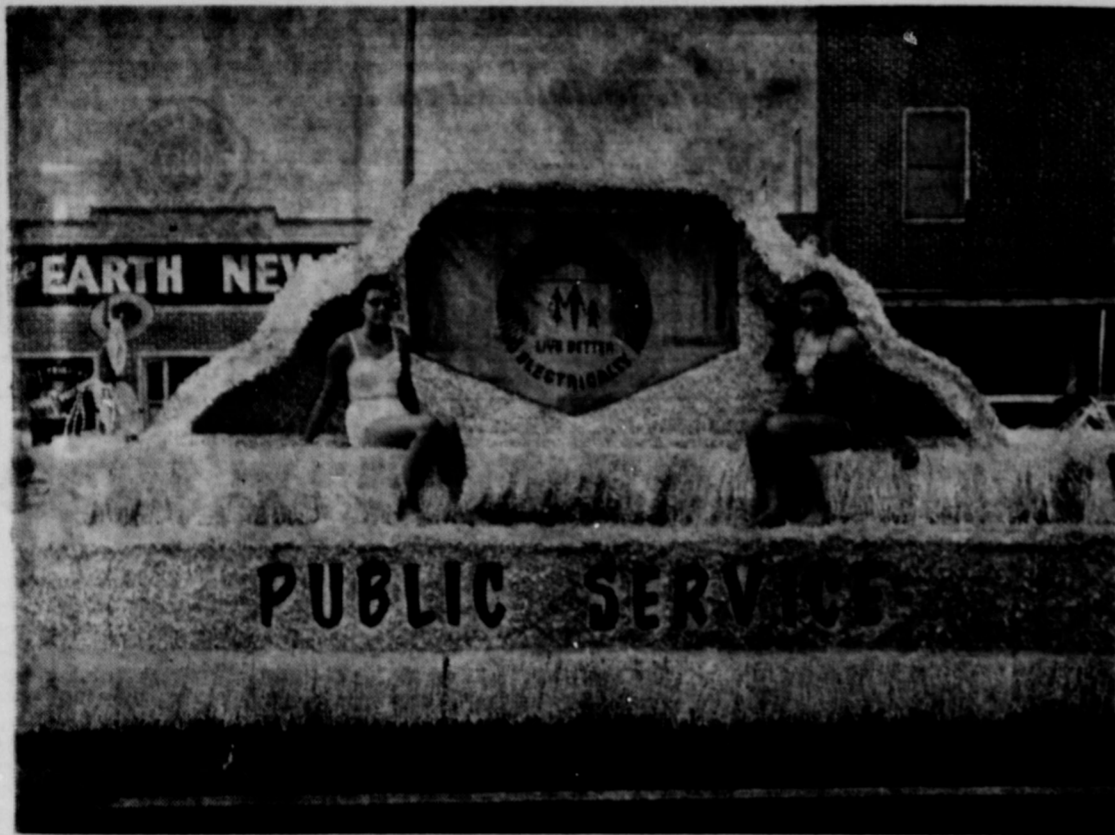

**Southwestern Public Service Company's New Generating Plant In Operation Soon**

More power for growing electrical requirements of the Eastern New Mexico and West Texas area becomes available early in July, when Southwestern Public Service Company's new modern Cunningham generating plant goes on the line.

Southwestern Public Service's eleventh steam plant is located 12 miles west of Hobbs, New Mexico and one mile north of the Hobbs-Carlsbad highway. The gleaming aluminum structure is on a 160-acre tract owned by the power company.

The new plant is named for J. E. Cunningham, president of the Public Service Company and member of its board of directors. He has been associated with Southwestern Public Service 30 years, and president for the last 12 years.

Generation from Cunningham plant will "feed" onto the existing 115,000 volt transmission line between the Company's Denver City and Carlsbad plants. This same line connects the power company's principal generating stations and interchange substations with 3000 miles of high voltage transmission line over the 45,000 square mile area served by Southwestern Public Service.

The turbo-generator in Cunningham plant was manufactured by General Electric has a nameplate rating of 70,000 kilowatts and a capability of producing 96,000 horsepower. This additional generation brings Southwestern Public Service's total plant capability to 820,600 kilowatts or 1,100,000 horsepower.

Mr. A. R. Watson, executive vice president and general manager of Public Service, remarked that just ten years ago the total plant capability of Southwestern's system was only 166,000 kilowatts. "Our last ten year's growth and the new plant capability symbolizes the progressive thinking of our 170,000 customers in applying more electric power for use in industry, commercial establishments and the home," the power company executive added.

Mr. Watson also added that Cunningham plant was another home grown product, for this newest plant was the second steam generating station in Southwestern Public Service's system which was designed by the company's own engineering staff. Airl, like the first, which was Plant X, Cunningham plant incorporates the latest features in economical power plant design and operation. H. O. Hodson, vice president of Southwestern Public Service Company, supervised the design and construction.

Public Service engineers cut down on the construction time by putting aluminum exterior walls

instead of steel. Designers did not omit a decorative touch, for they used black ceramic coated aluminum for outside trim, parapet caps and front entrance facade.

Another construction cost cutting application was the location of the plant's 55,000 gallon water storage tank on the roof deck of the semi outdoor boiler. This location saved most of the construction cost of a conventional hi-tank.

J. B. Matthews is plant manager at Cunningham. He was named to this position February 1, 1957 and moved here from Public Service's Moore County Plant near Dumas, Texas.

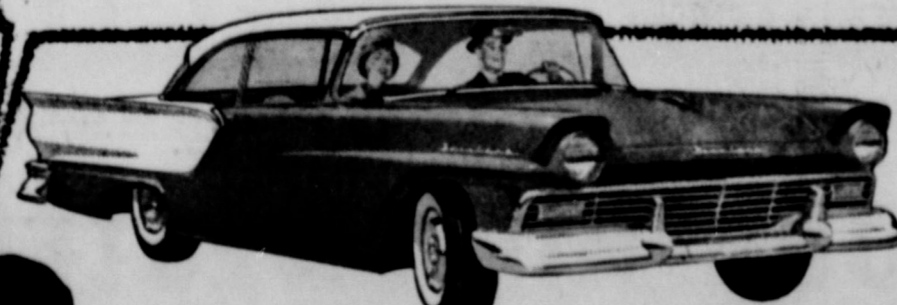

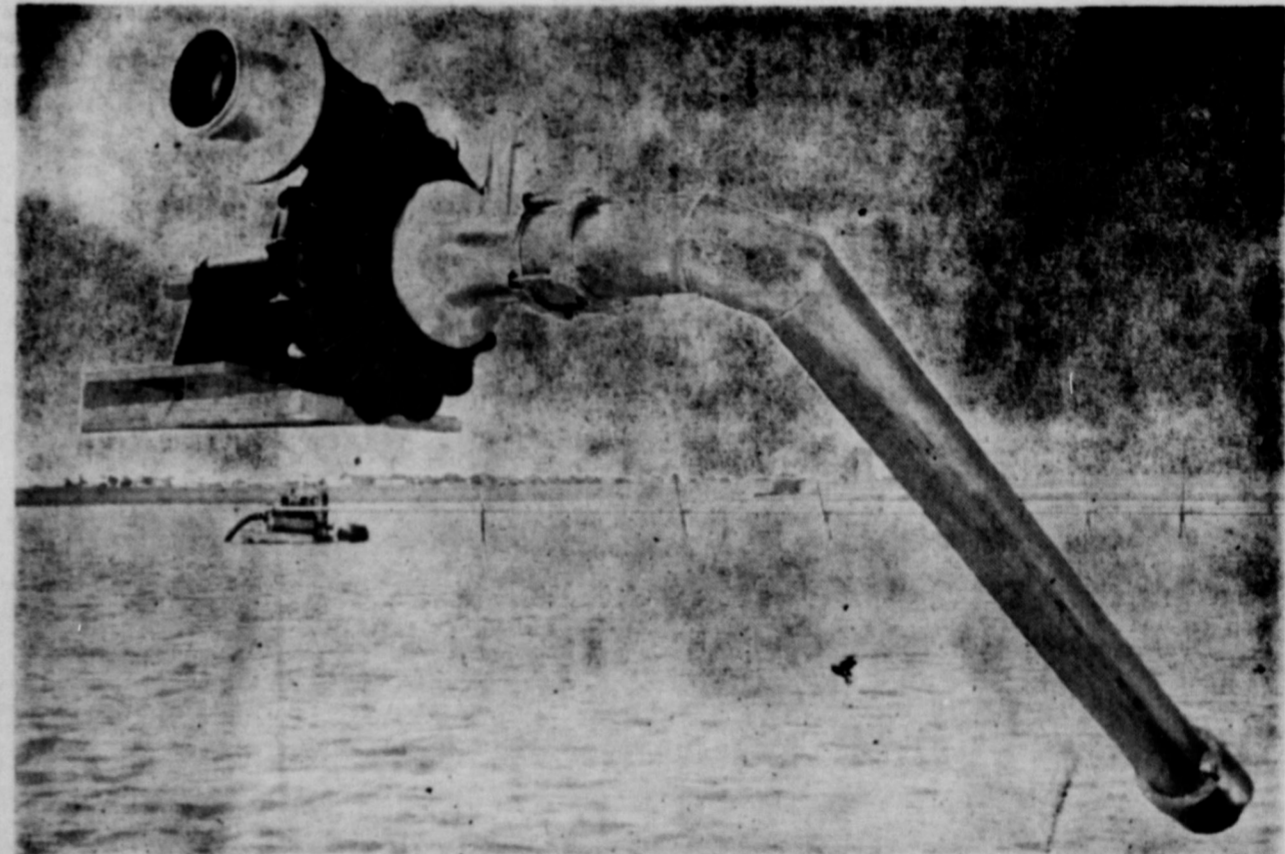

Grain sorghum fertilization tests are receiving a great deal of attention in the fertilizer research program at the High Plains Station at Halfway.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element that has been found to be most effective in increasing yields of grain sorghum but more information is needed to how much nitrogen is needed, when it should be applied, and whether any phosphate fertilizer is required along with the nitrogen. The grain sorghum fertilization tests are set up to find answers to these and other questions concerning grain sorghum fertilization.

In one grain sorghum test 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen and phosphate per acre are applied alone and together at all rates of each. The results of this test should help answer the question of how much nitrogen required for the greatest return to the farmer, and also if phosphate is required as well as nitrogen and if so, how much phosphate.

To answer the question as to whether nitrogen should be applied before planting or as a side-dressing, an experiment is underway in which 40,80,120 and 160 pounds of nitrogen applied before planting is being compared with the same rates of nitrogen applied as a side-dressing. A total of 240 pounds of nitrogen will thus be applied in some treatments.

"Planting grain sorghum in closer rows for increased yields is receiving more attention all the time," stated Dr. Longnecker, head of the High Plains Station, "so we considered it important to conduct some tests with combination of row spacing, seeding rate and fertilizer application." In this test

one and two rows per bed are being compared at 4 seeding rates, 5.6, 7.0, 8.9, and 10.1 pounds of seed per acre. In addition no fertilizer, 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre before planting and 100 pounds both before and after planting are being compared at each rate of seeding and with one and two rows per 40 inch bed. "I believe that the proper use of fertilizer and irrigation water along with the new hybrid grain sorghums that we now have offers the opportunity to boost yields of grain sorghums from present yields of 3500 pounds per acre to 7500 pounds."

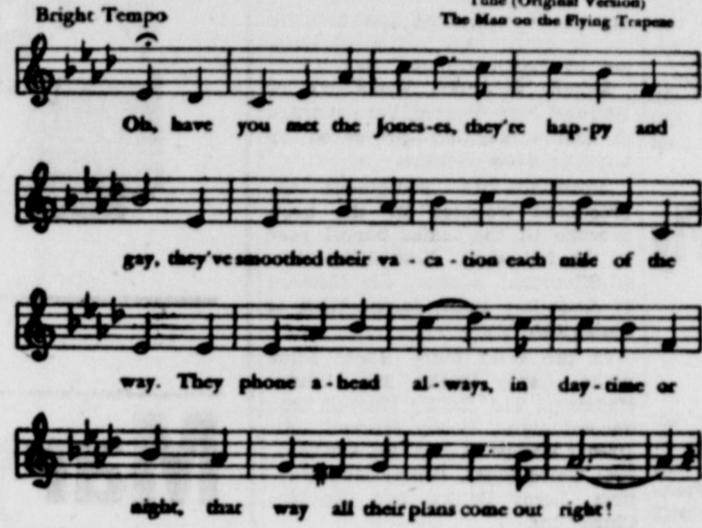

Grain sorghum fertilization tests are receiving a great deal of attention in the fertilizer research program at the High Plains Station at Halfway.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element that has been found to be most effective in increasing yields of grain sorghum but more information is needed to how much nitrogen is needed, when it should be applied, and whether any phosphate fertilizer is required along with the nitrogen. The grain sorghum fertilization tests are set up to find answers to these and other questions concerning grain sorghum fertilization.

In one grain sorghum test 40, 80 and 120 pounds of nitrogen and phosphate per acre are applied alone and together at all rates of each. The results of this test should help answer the question of how much nitrogen required for the greatest return to the farmer, and also if phosphate is required as well as nitrogen and if so, how much phosphate.

To answer the question as to whether nitrogen should be applied before planting or as a side-dressing, an experiment is underway in which 40, 80, 120 and 160 pounds of nitrogen applied before planting is being compared with the same rates of nitrogen applied as a side-dressing. A total of 240 pounds of nitrogen will thus be applied in some treatments.

"Planting grain sorghum in closer rows for increased yields is receiving more attention all the time," stated Dr. Longnecker, head of the High Plains Station, "so we considered it important to conduct some tests with combination of row spacing, seeding rate and fertilizer application." In this test

one and two rows per bed are being compared at 4 seeding rates, 5.6, 7.0, 8.9, and 10.1 pounds of seed per acre. In addition no fertilizer, 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre before planting and 100 pounds both before and after planting are being compared at each rate of seeding and with one and two rows per 40 inch bed. "I believe that the proper use of fertilizer and irrigation water along with the new hybrid grain sorghums that we now have offers the opportunity to boost yields of grain sorghums from present yields of 3500 pounds per acre to 7500 pounds," concluded Dr. Longnecker.
