### Insurance Exec. Discusses Traffic Safety at S. Club

The Town and Country Study Club met Thursday at 7:30 p.m. in the home of Mrs. Clarence Hamilton, with Mrs. Dora Terry as co-hostess.

Mrs. H. F. Axtell, president of the club introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Ralph Cakiwal, a Lubbock insurance executive of Southwestern Insurance Information Service of Dallas, who gave an interesting discussion on Traffic Safety, a community Responsibility.

The speaker said, "That Traffic accidents take the lives of 38,000 people in the Nation each year. To bring the problem a little closer home, Tex. while it ranks 3rd in the nation in the number of registered automobiles, it also averages 6.4 per cent of all the country's traffic fatalities. In our great state during 1954 we killed 2,431 people in traffic accidents. The second largest number of fatalities in the nation."

He told the Study Club that while there are varying estimates, the cost of these accidents to each individual in the state is generally agreed to be about \$60. He further pointed out that for a community of 10,000 persons the bill would be \$600,000, enough to build a new school, swimming pools and to pay for countless other civic improvements.

"Such waste is needless because accidents can be prevented. Not in theory but actually. Cooperative action can eliminate accidents but people must accept these methods, put them into practice, and make them work."

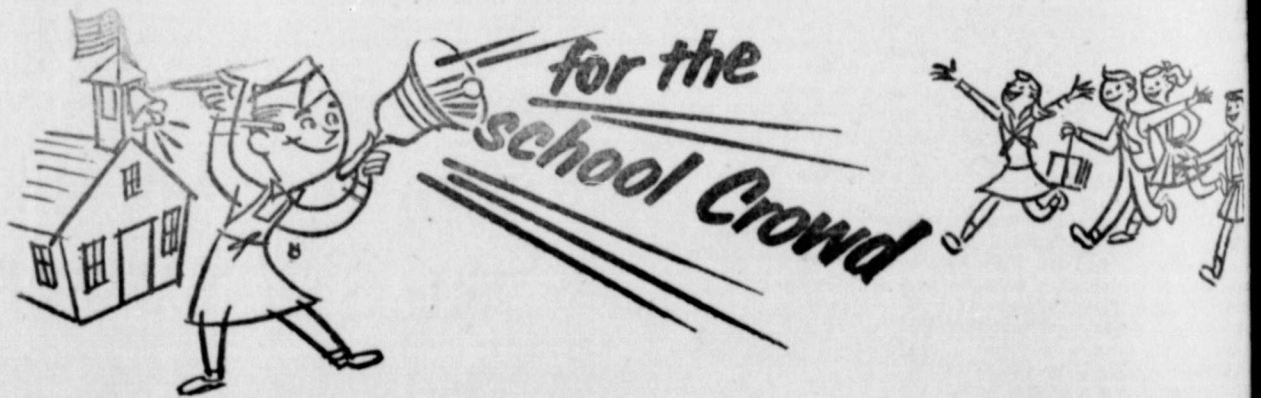

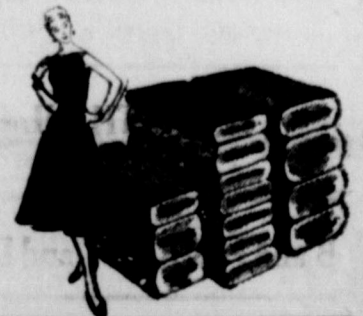

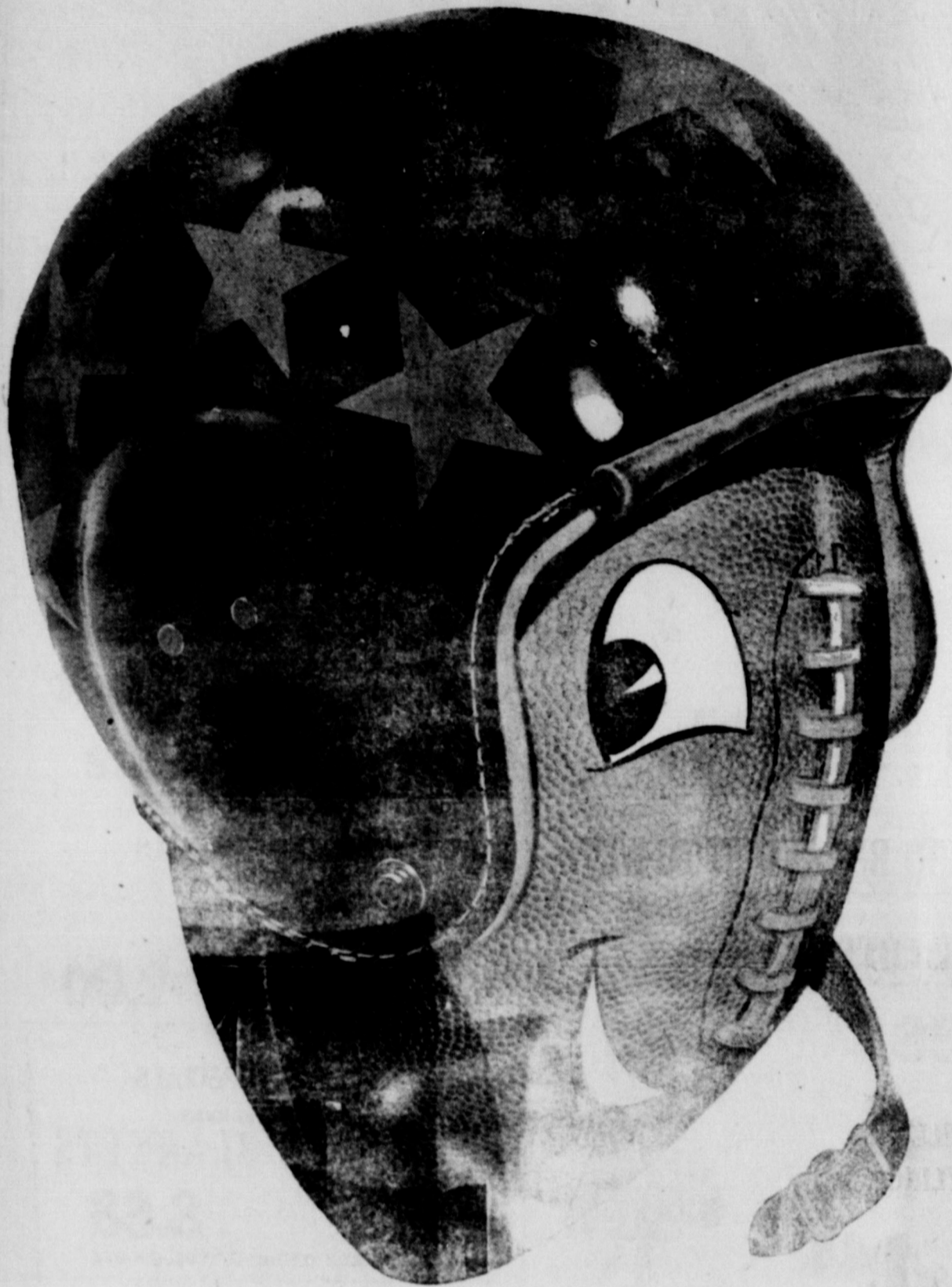

### 5,000 SCHOOL BUSES IN TEXAS

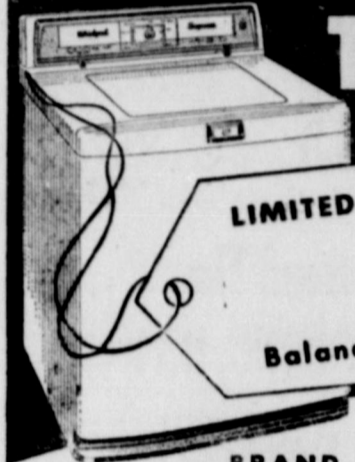

While the liquor lords of America keep selling and boasting  
 about how much "revenue" the government receives from the

Dr. Lawrence Kolb of the United States Public Health ser-  
 vice points out that more than one out of every ten patients

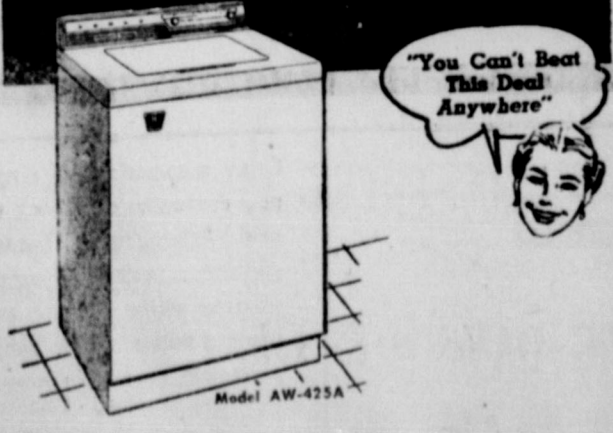

Beef week in Texas was officially proclaimed for October 30 - November 5 by Governor Allan Shivers, who delivered the proclamation to Texas Beef Council officials Leo Welder and J. D. Sartwell of

the first anniversary of the Council's state-wide "meat week," which was launched in 1954. A recent survey of retailers indicated beef sales up 17 percent since the first week last year.

The cattle industry is one of the largest and greatest in Texas. Cattlemen have always played a major role in the growth and development of our state," the Governor proclaimed in part. Celebrations will be held in more than 200 Tex. communities headed by Mr. Welder, president of the Council. The lead off event is a Beef Supper in Fort

Important date for Texas farmers and ranchers: November 5. That's the time set for the hearing of the Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee in Fort Worth at Hotel Texas.

Farmers and ranchers will get a chance at this hearing to express their views on what kind of Federal farm program the country needs.

Senator Allen Ellender of Louisiana committee has asked that a group designate a spokesman to appear before the committee.

Farm legislation looms high in importance next year. This hearing may be a vital matter to all Texans, especially those engaged in agriculture.

The fair and fall stock show season is with us.

All over the state boys and girls and their families are putting their best wares on display. Support of local fairs is important. They are a real community enterprise, deserve all the help they can get.

Good news for dairymen: Prices received for milk and butterfat have been a little higher. But they'll still be lower than 1953 prices, before price support programs were changed.

Texas Beef Council officials just completed a survey which shows beef consumption in Texas up 17% during the past year, proving the effectiveness of the campaign. Program has been extended into 1956.

Litigation originated in Big Spring. Suit was brought by the Texas Citizens Council in district court to prevent payment of state funds to mixed schools. High court judges, in effect, upheld District Judge Charlie N. Sullivan's ruling that portions of state law requiring segregation are unconstitutional.

Gov. Allan Shivers was quick to point out that neither the state nor U. S. courts set a deadline for desegregation, but both leave it to local school authorities.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, who had sided with the Citizens Council, merely said the decision "settles the law in Texas on a statewide basis." He added that timing will be a "district-by-district matter."

**HOSPITAL MOVE FORWARD**  
 A priority list has been set up to use the remaining \$10 million in the state hospital building program fund during the next two years.

On the day a new medical and surgical building was dedicated at the Austin State Hospital, the State Board for Hospitals and Special Schools decided on this order for new projects, by cities: Mexia, Wichita Falls, Austin, San Antonio and Abilene.

Two others, one in Austin, one

in Harlingen, are under construction now.

Governor Shivers spoke at the dedication of the \$1,312,000 medical-surgical hospital in Austin.

**NARCOTICS HEARINGS UNDER WAY**

Texas has been labeled a "national gateway" for illegal narcotics trade from Mexico.

Witnesses so testified before U. S. Sen. Price Daniel's subcommittee in Austin.

Department of Public Safety Director Homer Garrison charged that Mexican authorities are not cooperating with Texas officers in trying to halt the flow of dope across the border. Garrison and W. E. Naylor, chief narcotics agent of the department, testified that 90 percent of the heroin and 98 percent of the marijuana reaching Texas or flowing through Texas came from Mexico.

Daniel invited the Mexican secretary of state and the Mexican representative on the narcotics committee of the United Nations to attend hearings. They did not show up at Austin, however.

From Austin, hearings went to San Antonio, Houston, Dallas and Fort Worth.

Meanwhile, Hunt and Hopkins County Bar Associations sent telegrams affirming their faith in the integrity of Davidson and the court. Hunt lawyers expressed regret that "polititions have seen fit to abuse Judge Davidson."

**TEXAS FARM INCOME DOWN**

Reported down were cottonseed, wheat, oats, flax, calves, hogs, wool and corn. Prices remained about the same. Increases were not seen in grain sorghum, peanuts, sheep and lambs, mohair, milk and fruits and vegetables.

Though cotton prices are prospective production in S. Department of Agriculture casts put the 1955 Texas four million bales, 150,000 more than was expected a ago. This would be two per cent more than in 1954, 18 per cent above average.

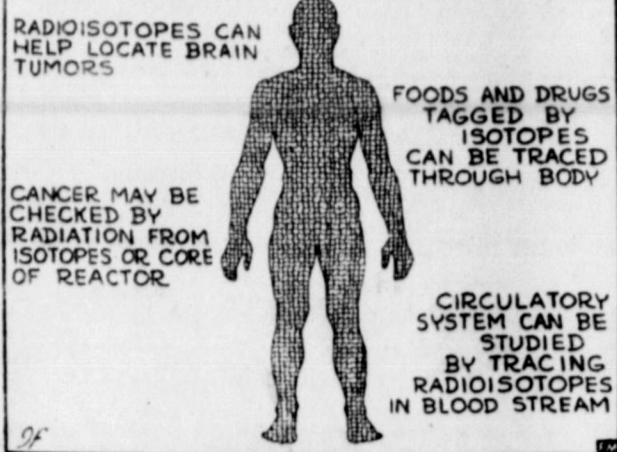

**Atoms For Medicine**

Scientists have long been troubled by the question "How do antibiotics work?" With the aid of the first privately owned atomic reactor to be built for industrial and medical research, they may soon get some answers.

Scientists have long since demonstrated that antibiotics are potent destroyers of disease-causing bacteria. They now are searching for clues as to exactly how an antibiotic acts once it enters the human body.

By incorporating in the antibiotics radioactive substances to be generated by the new reactor, they will be able to track the course of the drug in the body. These radioactive elements have been in extremely short supply, thus limiting research in this field. The new reactor will eliminate this problem.

To be constructed near New York City, the reactor will be completed within a year. Isotopes generated by it will be used for medical research by Chas. Pfizer & Co., Inc., one of the eight companies supporting the project.

According to Pfizer's president, Dr. John E. McKee, the reactor project will make possible the study of atomic radiation as a method of sterilizing drugs and preserving foods.

The reactor, he said, will also enable Pfizer to investigate use of radio-isotopes in such fields as agriculture and fermentation chemistry, and will expand the radioactive research program begun several years ago at the company's Therapeutic Institute, Maywood, N. J.

The reactor will be built by U. S. Atoms, Inc., a subsidiary of American Machine and Foundry Co. Also taking part in the project are the American Tobacco Co., Continental Can Co., Corning Glass Works, International Nickel Co., Soco-Mobil Oil Co. and U. S. Rubber Co.

**Vote For Right of Way**

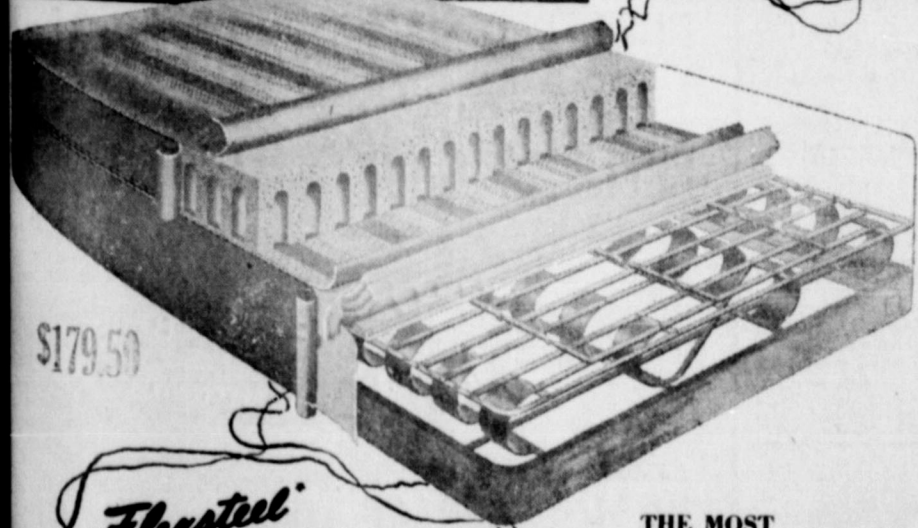

### To Speak On Holy Land Tour

Dr. Robert L. Dobson, chairman of the Division of Bible and Religion at Wayland College, who will be guest speaker at First Baptist Church of Earth at 7:30 p.m. on October 23, 1955 has recently returned from a study tour of the Holy Land and attendance at the Baptist World Alliance in London.

Since his return he has been invited to give an illustrated lecture on his Holy Land experiences and observations by many groups.

Dr. Dobson who has been in his Wayland post since 1948 was given this trip by his friends, members of the Valley View Church which he pastors on a part-time basis, and members of his family who knew it would increase his knowledge and understanding in a field in which he is already widely recognized.

In the party with Dr. Dobson were eight others. Conductor was Dr. Joe Burton, editor of "Home Life," a monthly family magazine published by Southern Baptists.

A highlight of the week in London at the Baptist World Alliance was the sermon preached by a Baptist pastor from Moscow. This was the first time that Russia has permitted representation at a Baptist World Alliance since the Communists came into power.

From Jerusalem the group studied historical points mentioned in the Bible, such as the Mount of Olives, Calvary, the Garden Tomb and Gethsemane. They also visited Bethany, Jericho, the River Jordan the traditional site of the baptism of Jesus, the Dead Sea and Bethlehem.

"We agree that our greatest inspiration came on the Sunday when we stood in the Garden Tomb and read the resurrection story, sang 'He Arose,' and joined in prayer. It was here that we were impressed anew that the tomb is empty and that Christ truly lives," Dr. Dobson declared.

"My swim in the Dead was also an interesting experience," he laughingly says.

Many other biblical points were visited, making Bible reading a more thrilling experience.

#### Chili Meat Balls and Noodles

5/8 cup fresh bread crumbs  
1/2 cup Fat  
Evaporated Milk  
1 lb. ground lean beef  
1/4 cup finely cut onion  
1 teaspoon pepper  
1 1/2 Tablespoons hot fat  
1 cup catsup or chili sauce  
1 cup water  
1/4 cup bottled horse-radish vinegar  
3 cups drained, hot cooked noodles

Mix crumbs and milk in a bowl. Let stand 5 min. Add, then mix well the beef, onion, salt and pepper. With wet hands, shape meat mixture into 8 balls. Brown meat balls on all sides, in the hot fat in a skillet. Then drain fat from skillet and pour over the meat balls a mixture of catsup, water, horse-radish and vinegar. Cover and cook over low heat 20 min., turning meat balls twice in the sauce while cooking. Serve with the hot noodles. Makes 4 servings.
