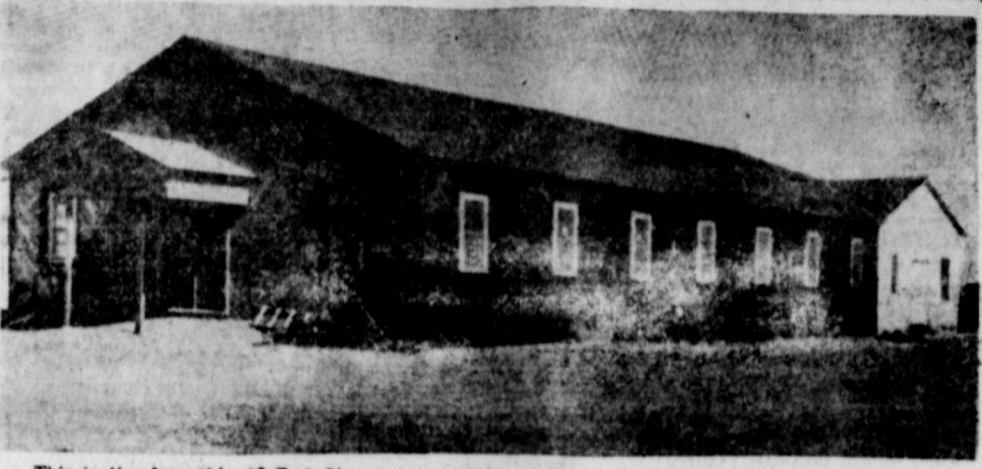

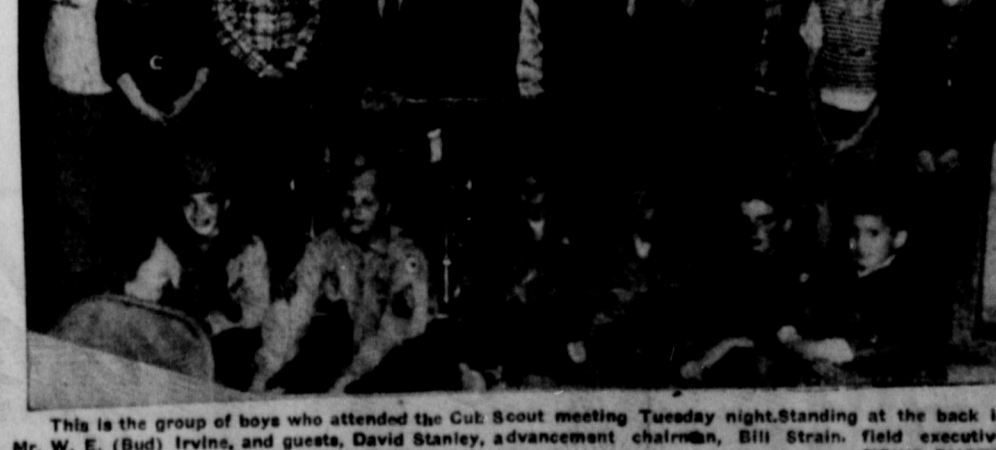
**TWINS**

Springlake's powerful Wolverines defeated the challenging Sudan Hornets last Friday night on the Wolverine's home field with a score of 13-7. This victory went a long way in wrapping up the District 2A conference title. The Wolverines now sport a record of six straight wins without a defeat during the season so far. Springlake holds victories over Bovina, Malou, Meadow, Muleshoe, Dalhart and Sudan. The Wolverines have scored 199 points and allowed their opposition only 20. Dalhart and Sudan have been the only teams that have managed to score against the tough Wolverine defense. This loss changed the Sudan Hornet's record to five wins, three losses, and no ties. The stadium was packed to capacity, with a record crowd cheering for each team. This was Springlake's homecoming game, and the win over Sudan, made the day end perfectly for all the "Six Grads" who had returned for the day as well as all the regular fans. The Hornets lost no time in getting the game underway as they received Springlake's kick-off. Gaining considerable yardage over the Wolverines they advanced down to the 22 yard line. The fans were roaring as Susan fumbled and Springlake's Bobby Angeley covered the ball. Using their advantage, the Wolverines pushed the Hornets farther away from their goal and nearer to the Wolverine goal as they reached the 20 yard line. Most of the yardage had been gained from carries made by the Sandel twins. Springlake landed on the 14 yard line as a result of confusing penalties against both sides. Jimmy Herring then made a terrific pass to Rex Loftis who carried it over for the first touchdown of the game. Loftis completed the extra point, making the score 7-0 against the Hornets, in the second quarter. The Sudan Hornets quickly made up for lost time as they powered past the Wolverines to the 8 yard line on carries made by Dickey Hanna and Larry Bates. A penalty set them back to the 12 and slowed them down. Backus, of the Hornets, tried three passes to the end zone with the third try knocked down by the kick of time by Springlake's Jimmy Herring. During the one time that Springlake had the ball during the third quarter, Donald Sandel carried over a touchdown running a length of 67 yards. The extra point failed, putting the Wolverines ahead with a score of 13-0 over the Hornets. The Hornets then matched the play made by Sandel with their own Backus shooting through the line to score. By kicking a flawless conversion, Backus completed an extra point boosting the score of the Hornets to 13-7, still under the Wolverines. From that point on, the ball was in a continual upset. Loftis intercepted it only to have the Hornets regain it in the next play. Donald Sandel then recovered a Sudan fumble on the play following that. The ball was snatched from the Wolverines as a result of a fumble only to be intercepted by the Wolverines on a Sudan pass. The tension in the stands mounted as Sudan advanced nearer and nearer the goal. At the end of the game the score remained in favor of the Springlake Wolverines 13-7 over the Sudan Hornets.

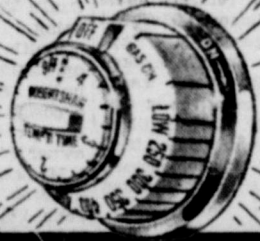

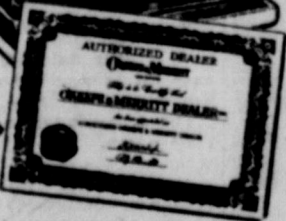

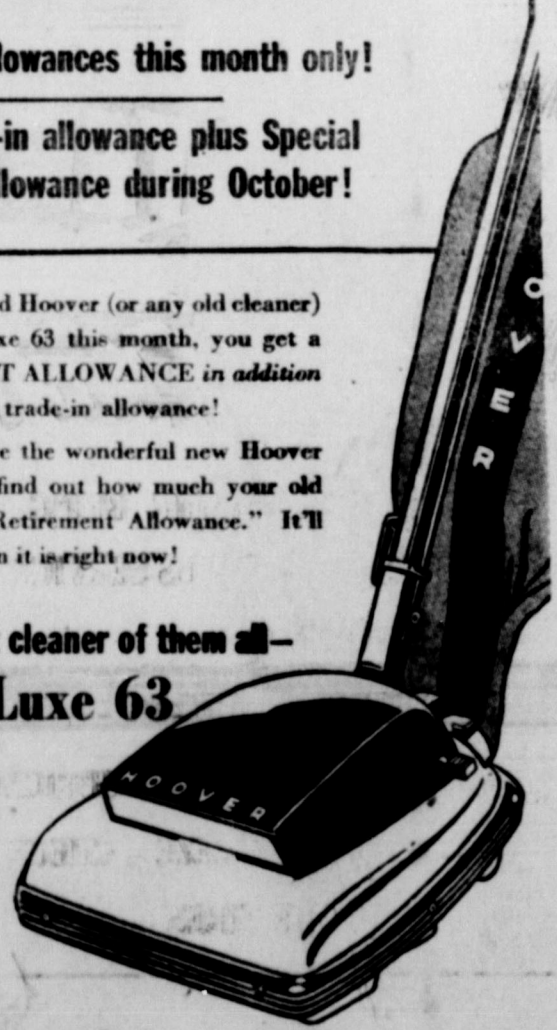

## R. M. A. of Texas Warns of Possible Pitfalls of Adjusters

AUSTIN, Tex. — Possible pitfalls in doing business with debt adjustment agencies by persons who think they are "hopelessly in debt" were outlined this week by Charles T. Lux of Austin, executive vice-president of the Retail Merchants Association of Texas.

Lux said such agencies, sometimes called pro-raters or budget plan houses, were numerous in the East and California but had only recently penetrated into Texas, thus far only in the largest cities.

These firms, operated by persons who pose as "professional budgeting experts," offer to "rehabilitate" people who have found their earnings cannot meet payments for the debts they have incurred, Lux said.

They propose to do this by setting up payment schedules for ea-

ch debt, budgeting earnings and arranging with creditors to carry the account until the debt is paid off in full.

"This sounds very attractive to a person who is so far in debt he cannot see how he will ever get out," Lux said.

"But what he doesn't realize is that for this advice and service he is charged a fee," he explained. "The fee sometimes ranges as high as 40 percent of his total indebtedness, and usually no less than 15 per cent," he explained.

"For a debt of say \$300, the fee will increase the debt to anywhere from \$345 to \$420."

What happens then is the "professional budgeting expert" not only takes a large slice of the money that would go toward retirement of the debts, but also piles on a new debt, he said. Thus instead of keeping a debtor from bankruptcy, he is plunged closer to it.

Experiences in other states show Lux said, that the debt adjustment agency usually takes out its fee before making any effort to retire a person's debt.

Lux said a few states have laws regulating the operation of debt adjustment companies, among them Minnesota, Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Maine and Colorado.

There are no laws in Texas that control their operations, he said.

Lux said the best way a debtor, who is pinched to meet his payments, can meet his bills is to call upon his creditors and explain the situation frankly.

"Before you sign up with anyone or pay a fee, it is wise to contact your creditors and seek their advice," Lux said.

## Farmers Should Plan Land Leveling and Irrigation Now!

Farmers who are planning to do bench and field leveling before the next crop should prepare to do this as soon after the crops are harvested as possible.

Indications are that the demand for this kind of work will be greater than ever before. Unless these jobs are well distributed over the season, not all of this work can be done before it is time to plant the next crop; due to the lack of contractors or technical assistance available by the Soil Conservation District. Leveling involves a considerable amount of time in the engineering of the layout and check-

ing.

Mr. James Abbott, Soil Conservationist assigned to the Lamb County Soil Conservation District, advises farmers who are interested in leveling to contact the Soil Conservation office in Amherst if they are interested in technical assistance furnished by the District. Technical assistance for land leveling includes the engineering which is available without cost to the farmer but does not include the actual cost of moving the dirt by the farmer himself or by the contractor.

Some of the farmers who will do their land leveling in the near future are: Aubrey Jones, M. B. Dutton, Doyle Tapley and Bennie Harmon of Amherst and J. M. Maehen and R. L. Menische of Olton.

The purpose of land leveling is to alter the slope of irrigated land.

COULD THIS EXPLAIN IT?

After a young lawyer had talked nearly five hours to a jury, who felt like lynching him, his opponent, a grizzled old veteran arose, looked at the judge and said: "Your honor, I will follow the example of this young friend who has just finished, and submit the case without argument."

We have felt that many have followed the same method in teaching. Many people speak at great length without "giving reason for the hope that is within them." 1 Peter 3:15. The Bible says: "Prove all things hold fast that which is good." 1 Thessa. 5:21.
