



## Mrs. Claude Ellis On "Campaign For Christ"

Mrs. Claude Ellis, Earth, was among 33 personal workers who entered the Minneapolis-St. Paul area Saturday, July 25 to wage a campaign for Christ. This well-trained group, representing all age levels and many congregations of the Church of Christ, are assisting the 300 local Christians of the Twin Cities in a program of person-to-person visitation and home Bible teaching. As a part of this work, they are distributing the same teaching booklet now being given away at the exhibit of Churches of Christ at the New York World's fair. It is a comprehensive lesson on the origin of the New Testament Church. Campaigners invite families to have individual, home Bible studies. They also invite them to a two week series of sermons on the theme, "Faith for Today—Ageless at the Cross." Beginning this week, these are being delivered nightly at the 1500 seating capacity Fish Memorial Auditorium in Minneapolis by Thomas B. Warren.

Warren, a noted scholar, educator and minister of the gospel, is now of Ft. Worth but beginning with the fall term will become head of the Bible department at Freed-Hardeman College, Henderson, Tennessee. The speaker is also a capable artist and is using personally developed, full-color illustrations to clarify and emphasize his lessons. Representative of the sermon titles are, "If a Man Dies, Will He Live Again?", "Is the First Century Faith Adequate for the Twentieth Century?" and "How Can One Be Saved From Sin?"

All 14 lessons are designed to reinforce the basic beliefs in the authority of God and his Word, the nature of sin, and the means of salvation.

In preparation for the campaign Christians in the locality had established 500 contacts of persons interested in Bible truths. Extensive advertising had been done.

According to elders of the Vandellian Church of Christ in Lubbock who are directing the campaign, more than 600 years of service in the church has been accumulated by the 33 workers who are being led by Eugene Groom, Durant Okla. Forty-seven of these years have been contributed by Mrs. Ellis. During this almost half a century that she has been a member of the Church of Christ, she had begun and taught a number of ladies' Bible Classes and has also taught many children's classes. A devout Bible scholar, she has studied at the Tech Bible Chair and at a special Bible school sponsored by the Sunset Church of Christ, Lubbock. Through the years she has also taken Bible correspondence courses and attended many lectureships. Prior to the moving to Earth in

May of this year, Mrs. Ellis taught ladies' Bible Class at Smithlaw Church of Christ in Lubbock.

She is the mother of five children including Norman Ellis of Earth, and has 16 grand children and four great grandchildren. A grandson, Dee Ellis, 18 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dalton Ellis of Lubbock, and a student at Lubbock Christian College, made the trip with her.

In speaking of the trip, the local lady says, "I am happy to give of my time in going to their metropolis and doing what I can for those who have never heard the gospel."

Mrs. Ellis left Earth Friday, July 23 in order to attend a special prayer session held at 6:30 a. m. Saturday at Vandellia Church of Christ in Lubbock.

### S. S. Rep To Be In Earth August 5th

People who will be applying for social security benefits in the near future should remember to bring certain documents with them which may very likely speed up the processing of their claims, said Mr. John G. Hutton, district manager for social security in Lubbock.

Mr. Hutton said that you can reduce the processing time on your claim by bringing the following things with you when you come to file your claim: (1) Proof of age, with your birth certificate, baptismal certificate, or old life insurance policy; (2) A copy of your 1963 tax return if you are self-employed; (3) 963 W-2 form (the statement of your wages from your employer); (4) a list of your employers during the year, amounts each paid you and their addresses, if you had several employers during the year.

It will also help if you have the following dates in mind or written down: Your date of birth, date of marriage, and dates of prior marriages, and divorce (or date of death) of each. Bring birth certificate of any children you have. Mr. Hutton explained that the person who brings these items on the first visit enables the social security office to start his claim without undue loss of time and gets his checks sooner. 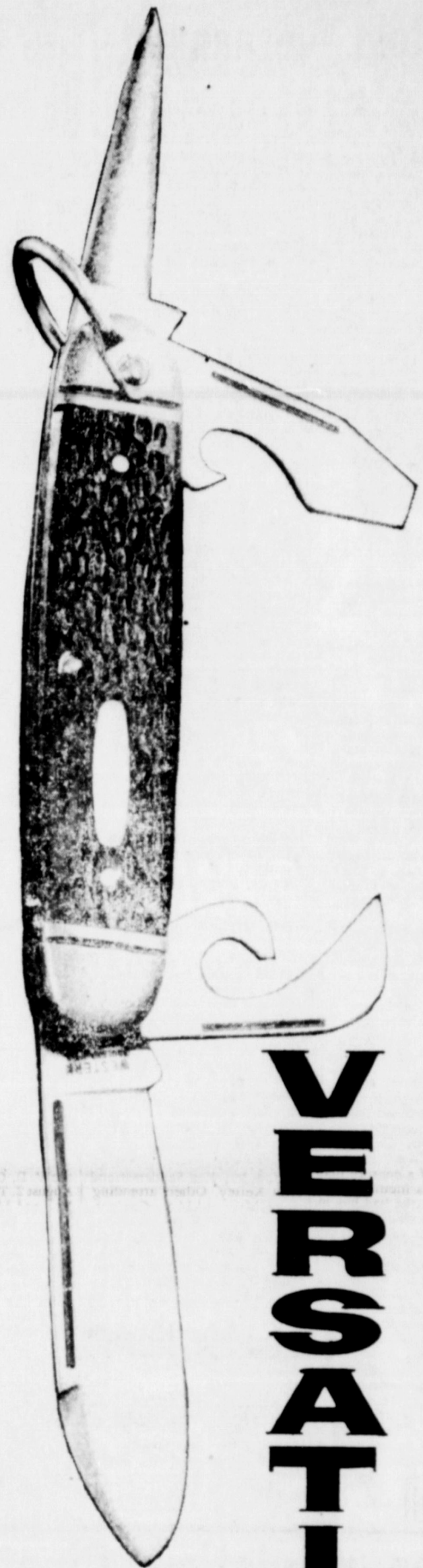

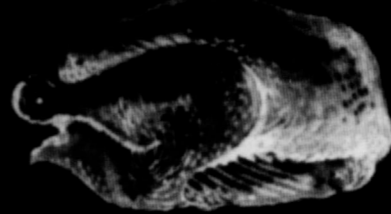

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

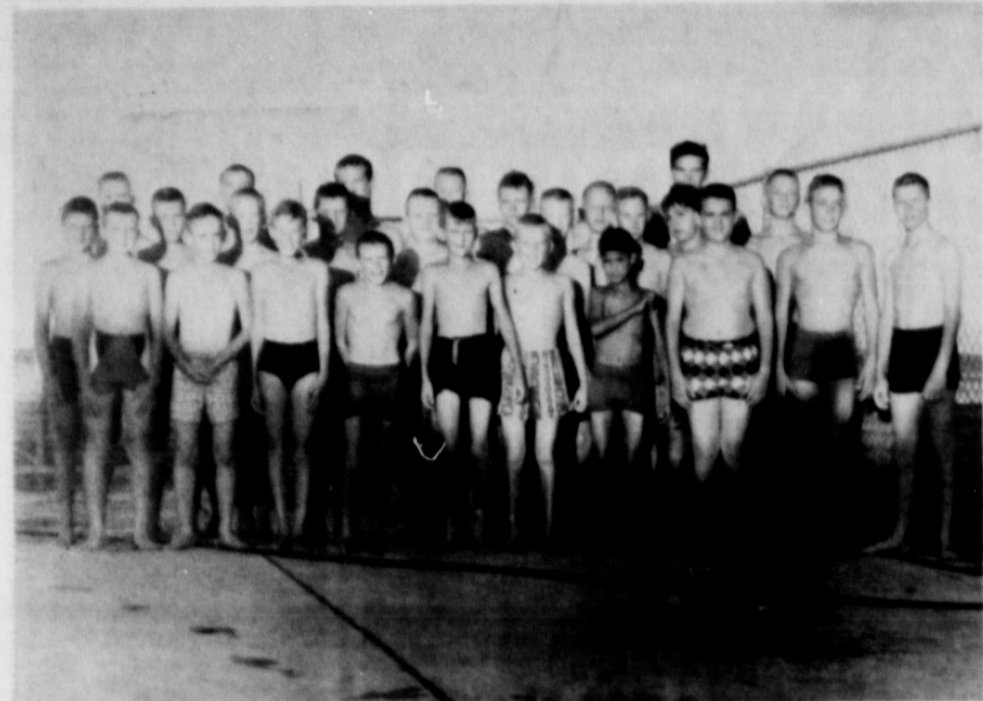
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

of area residents. The FHA'ers wish to thank the people of the city for helping in their latest money raising attempt.

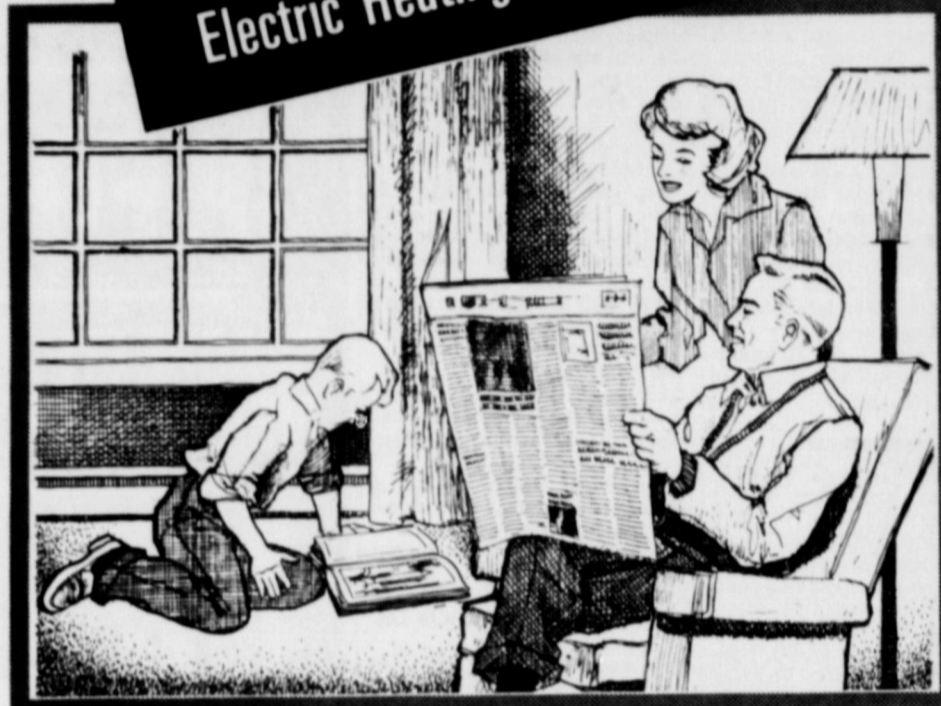
