## School Children To Recieve Polio Vaccine Friday

HEALTH AND SANITATION for Lamb County was discussed at a meeting of city officials, physicians and representatives of the State Health Department in the City Hall in Littlefield last Friday night. Students of the Springlake School will be given the first Polio shot, Friday, March 22 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the school.

Dr. Carl Nowlin, County health doctor and Dr. F. B. Faust will give the shots. Second shots will be given in four to six weeks. The exact time will be announced later. Third shots will be due in seven to 12 months following the second shot. Parents will be responsible for the third shot.

However, Dr. Carl Nowlin, County health doctor, said that any child whose parents cannot afford the third shot will be given one free.

Springlake is the first school in Lamb County to receive the polio shots.

More than 4500 polio shots will be given the Lamb County school children during the next few weeks in conjunction with the nationwide mass inoculation program now underway. 275 children are scheduled to receive the shots here.

### County Health Meet Held In Littlefield

C. P. "Pete" Parrish, City Commissioner and F. B. Faust, M. D., the local doctor, attended an important meeting Friday night in the City Hall of Littlefield.

The meeting was called by Bob Cox, chairman of Health and Sanitation Committee of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce, for an informal "Town Meeting" of all Lamb County City Officials, Mayors and for representative commissioners, Medical Doctors and the County Health Officer.

Guy McGraw introduced Mr. Robert E. Peale of Austin who is a member of the Vector Control Staff form the Texas State Department of Health.

The Encephalitis (Sleeping Sickness) epidemic occurring about every 2 or 3 years in Texas, was the principal subject of discussion. There are two types of this disease, one which is the western Equine, is endemic (is here all the time) and affects horses. The other type is St. Louis Encephalitis and affects the human. During 1956, there were 346 cases reported in Texas. 262 occurred on the High Plains, mostly in the Lubbock and Plainview area. There were 15 deaths, but other results as poor brain development and tremors, are often as bad as death itself.

### Area Resident Suffers Injuries In Accident

A School bus and two automobiles were involved in an accident Monday at 4:15 p.m. on a three and one half miles north of Earth on Farm 60 Market Road.

The accident injured Dale Syrell Anderson, who was stopped to disperse school students from the bus. Orbie Armstrong, driving a half ton '57 Chevrolet Pickup came to a stop behind the bus, and was waiting for the bus to get into motion, when Kenneth Lowe, driving a '56 Ford Victoria, hit the Pickup from the rear with such impact, throwing Armstrong into the rear window, resulting in face and shoulder cuts.

Armstrong was taken to the Dr. and released after seven stitches were taken in his shoulder and two stitches over one eye.

Deputy Sheriff Joe Ebeling said he had filed charges of following to close behind on Kenneth Lowe. Ebeling said he estimated the Pickup to be a total loss, the Ford was estimated at \$700.00 damages, with slight damages to the bus.

### County Health Meet

(Sleeping Sickness) are found in small mosquitoes, birds such as Red Wing Blackbird, Blue Jays, Sparrows, Pigeons, Doves and Chickens. These birds are called the Reservoir of the disease (a place from which the disease is spread.)

The means by which the disease is spread is the Mosquito. This is the VECTOR. There are 35 different species of mosquitoes in this area of Texas. (The Anopheles (Malaria) mosquito is NOT found here!) There are only 2 species that spread encephalitis. One is the Culex tarsalis (the Irrigation Mosquito). The other is the Culex quinquefasciatus (the Southern House Mosquito) (called "Kink" for short). It should be mentioned that there are no scientific proof that these mosquitoes are able to pick up the virus from chickens. The life cycle of the mosquito depends on water, from one-eight inch in depth to as much as a small spoonful to a stagnant lake or sewage. Here the female lays the eggs, or if there is a drought she finds a hollow depression which will fill with water. (Eggs have been known to have been in a dry state up to 3 years.) The egg hatches as a larva, (fetus) then rises to the surface as a pupa. (Infant) then breaks out and floats on the water surface to dry the wings. At this point if it is out in the middle of the lake, and the edges of the lake are clean of tall weeds and obstruction to the wind, the small wave from a gentle breeze, will create sufficient force to drown the infant mosquito. The length of time from the female's egg deposit to the mosquito flying from the water surface is 7 days.

The time that we can prevent the growth of mosquitoes is during the larva and pupae stages. This then means any place where the smallest amount of water is allowed to accumulate will breed mosquitoes; empty cans, jars, bottles, tires, even in tire treads, depressions in the ground under drainage of evaporative coolers. These places are the breeding places of the Culex tarsalis, (the Irrigation mosquito.)

Sewage water, cesspools, refuse, and draining water into the open from kitchen sinks will lead to the breeding of the "Kink".

The control of mosquitoes in a city involves the surrounding country side as it is known that mosquitoes can travel a distance of 2 to 3 miles, by hopping and skipping on a gentle wind.

Plans suggested to the group by Mr. Powell and Dr. Hancock of the Lubbock office of the Texas State Department of Health along with Mr. Peale involves:

1. Map the Breeding Sources, weekly.
2. Educational features, such as school compositions, placards, drawings, with radio and newspaper articles.
3. Screening houses, barns, chicken houses, sewage vents with plastic screens.
4. Aerosol bombs in buildings.

5. Spray foliage outside.
6. Treat evaporative coolers and pads.
7. Evaluate the breeding sources weekly by counting larvae and pupa, (fetus and infant).
8. Count and identify adult mosquitoes in light traps.

As the last two evaluations increase in numbers the time has come to treat the area.

The discussions indicated that all cities, Littlefield, Sudan, Olton and Earth, spray the cities, get rid of the adults; but allow the young to continue growing, hence in several days a new deluge exists.

From a financial standpoint it is very expensive and does not reach the source of the problem in several ways. The cities must cooperate with the surrounding country. It was felt that the farmers would be more than willing to get rid of the pest.

Another discussion was begun about the pesky and disease carrying common fly which lives on filth and manure about barns, streets and chicken houses. Only good housekeeping and screening will fight these pests which spread "Polio", typhoid and dysentery.

As this was a "Town Meeting" type of discussion and not authoritative, it was suggested to those in charge of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce to appoint a small committee by the City-County Commissioners of City-County people interested in the problems and get advice from the District Health Office in Lubbock and the Texas State Health Department.

The control of pests of this or any other type resolves itself to the question of good house keeping in the House, outside the House, in the Cities and Outside the Cities. It involves every one in Lamb County and then spreads like circles in a pond when a stone is dropped into it, until it covers the nation, continents, and Earth itself. So we must start at Earth, Texas and finish with Earth.
