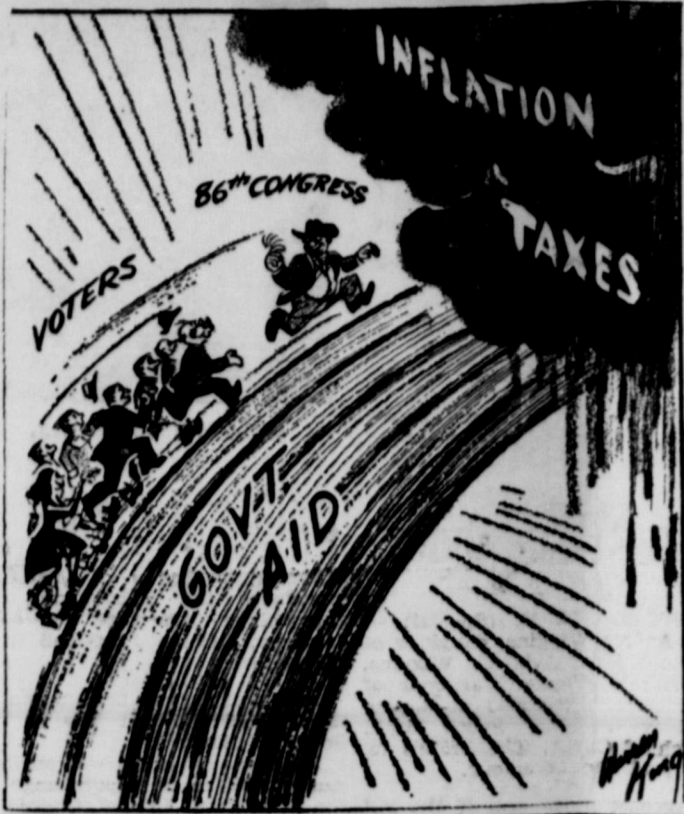

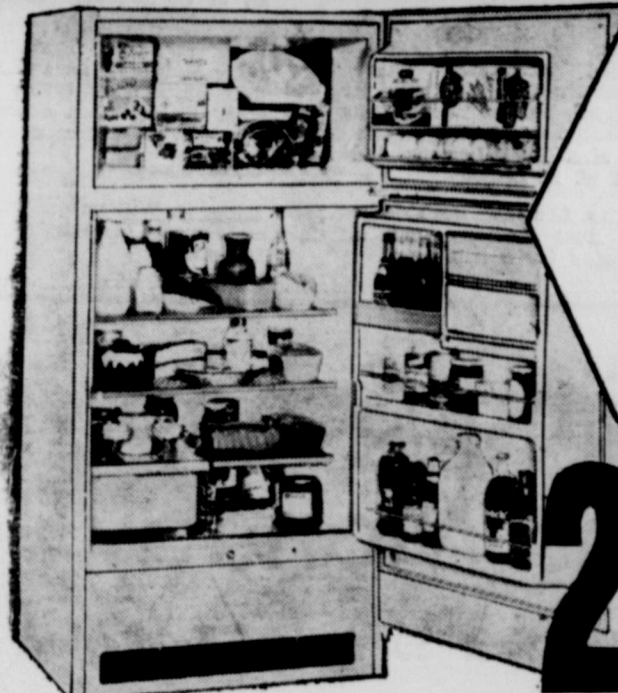

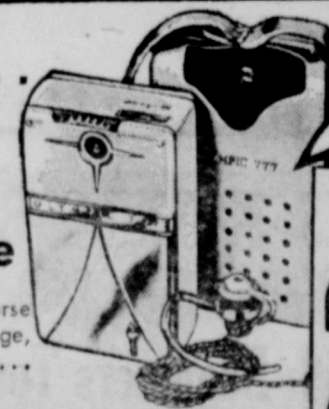

## Texas Safety Assoc. Advises Motorists To Exercise Driving Skill

With almost three and a half million passenger cars on Texas' streets and highways, motorists are going to have to exercise greater skill and technique if they are going to stay alive. Furthermore, new drivers—the teen-agers—are going to have to be trained scientifically and systematically to drive safely.

Some people maintain that teaching teenagers is the responsibility of parents and that driver education does not belong in the high school curriculum. But it should be remembered that many parents are arrested for traffic violations and that some parents pass on to their children their own bad attitudes and driving behavior.

Youthful drivers should be the nation's safety drivers. Their reflexes are quicker, their coordination more accurate, their eyesight and hearing better than at any other time in their life. But this group does not have a favorable traffic safety record. Traffic accident studies, based on the number of miles driven, show that young drivers proportionately are involved in far more fatal accidents than older drivers.

Traffic safety experts from the National Safety Council, Texas Safety Association and Texas Education Agency believe the public schools are the only agencies that can effectively reach the bulk of youth at the time they reach legal driving age, and that the schools can best develop attitudes and provide the proper training to improve driver behavior.

Automobile insurance companies recognize the importance and effectiveness of driver education by reducing insurance premiums when teenagers, who drive the family car, have had driver education.

## Littlefield Man Charged In Unlawful Practice of Medicine

State and local officers swarmed in and arrested Glen Simmons of Littlefield, Tuesday at his self-styled "Asthma and Hay Fever Clinic" on charges of unlawful practice of medicine.

He was released about 90 minutes after being arrested under \$1000 bond.

Simmons allegedly has treated hundreds of persons over a period of three decades from all over the United States for asthma and hay fever.

The arrest climaxed an investigation by the State Board of Medical Examiners beginning last October and followed the careful planting of a "patient" in Simmons' office.

The "Dr. Glen Simmons Asthma-Hayfever clinic, the only clinic of its kind in the world"—according to a sign on the front of Simmons' building in Littlefield has been in operation since 1932.

"I've treated patients from every state in the union," Simmons said following his arrest.

"It's not a crime to help suffering humanity," he added.

The case against Simmons is based on his diagnosing and treating a human being's illness and charging for it without having a license to practice medicine. Lamb County Attorney Curtis Wilkinson said. Whether the patients were helped is irrelevant insofar as the charges are concerned, he said.

Last week, a Lubbock woman, Mrs. Mary Lennox, volunteered to consult Simmons about her asthma, telling him she had seen his advertisement. The complaint alleges that he treated her without a license to do so.

It was reported that Mrs. Lennox was given three pills to take and was told to go on an orange juice diet and take castor oil. She said Simmons told her his fee was \$500 but that he agreed to take \$250 as a down payment, giving her a receipt for that amount.

The \$250 was furnished by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, it was reported.

In a hall storage closet at Simmons' Clinic, searchers Tuesday found hundreds of copies of a booklet which said "you do know that if and when that you could get this phlegm out of your system, that it would be impossible

for you to suffer any longer with asthma."

Officers confiscated from his office a ledger which, since 1946, listed the names of more than 600 persons from at least 25 states.

The last entry was "Mary Lennox." Hers was the 13th name for the year.

Also found in Simmons' clinic were several bottles, most of them empty but some containing pills; three bedrooms; a stethoscope; a waiting room and a room filled with various articles.

## Birth Certificate Required For School Children

Attention parents: It's later than you think.

This comes from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, whose vital statistics staff at the Texas State Department of Health is responsible for handling the flood of requests for birth certificates for children entering school for the first time this September.

Carroll's problem is this: There is a tendency among parents to put off requesting copies of their youngsters' birth records until the last moment. When too many parents delay in this manner, the results are obvious: a work overload.

The condition does not result from any lack of effort on the part of Carroll's staff. "Our limited Vital Statistics Division staff—despite long hours of night and week-end work—can process just so many requests before school begins," he explains.

More than 262,000 children are expected to enter elementary schools of Texas for the first time this fall. The estimate is based on calculations made by the Texas Education Agency.

A good many parents—some of whom may have waited too long in past years—have already requested and received birth records on this year's new scholars, but tens of thousands of additional records will have to be processed between now and the time that first school bell rings in September.

More than one youngster has been forced to postpone his first days at school simply because his parents couldn't produce proof of his age when it came time to register him.

Carroll's advice to parents: "Send in your request today to the local registrar, county clerk, or the State Department of Health."

All you have to do is give the child's name, date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name, and the name of the father. This information with the legal fee of one dollar, should be addressed to your local registrar, the county clerk, or to the State Department of Health, Section on Records and Statistics, 410 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

Something else: Be prepared to show school officials a record of "shots" your youngster has had. Depending on local school board regulations proof of immunizations against smallpox, whooping cough, diphtheria, and other diseases may be required.

## L. H. Dent Will Fly To Dallas For New Tractor Show

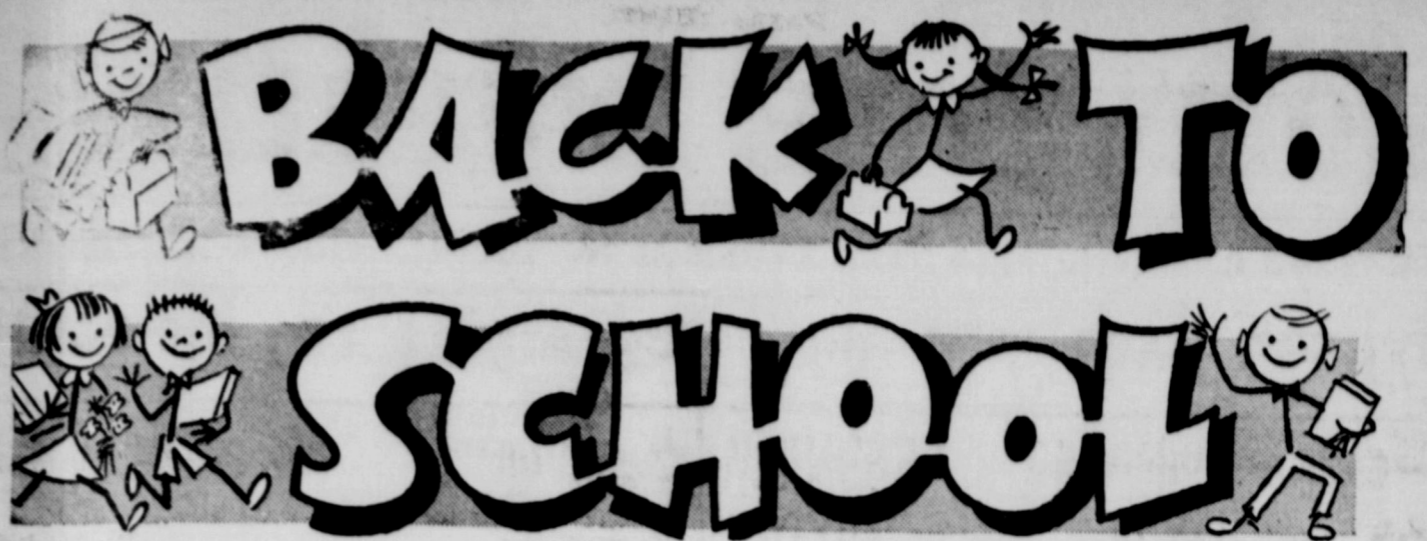
