Data To Be Available On Research Conducted At High Plains Station

Data on the results of the research program will sent to all investors in the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Tex., Dr. Tom Longnecker, head of the Station stated today.

Since the Field Day in September many inquiries have been received by members of the Regional Council and the Station Staff regarding the availability of the results of the first year's research program. All professional workers in the High Plains Station, including County Agents, Soil Conservation Districts, Vocational Agricultural teachers, Texas Tech and Texas A. and M. Experiment Stations will also receive results. Research results will be released through the newspapers in the High Plains area.

Due to the fall rains, harvest has been delayed here as it has throughout the Plains area. Preparation of research data for release will take considerable time following the late harvest. The results will therefore probably not be available until early in 1958.

"Widespread interest in the Station throughout the High Plains area will probably result in further expansion of the Council in the near future," Mr. Hinn said.

Operators of farm trailers and other vehicles engaged in harvesting operations were cautioned by the Lubbock office of the Texas Department of Public Safety to have the vehicles properly equipped before operating them on public roads.

Maj. R. A. Crowder, commander of the Lubbock DPS region, pointed

1958 Texas Cotton Allotments And Referendum Date Announced

COLLEGE STATION — Farmers in Texas will have 7,474,661 acres available on which to grow their 1958 upland cotton crop and producers of extra long staple cotton 27,829 acres.

These state allotments, according to that all trailers "must have at least two red reflectors and one red tail light on the rear and only one trailer may be towed by a truck, car or tractor."

Crowder added that all trailers with gross weight of 3000 pounds or more also must be equipped with clearance lights and reflectors at front, sides, and rear, according to state law. Texas law also prohibits the towing of two trailers on any public road.

Drivers of motor vehicles who reside in Texas or work in Texas are required to be licensed as an operator, commercial operator, or chauffeur, Crowder explained. And he pointed out that owners and operators of vehicles who hire other persons as drivers are responsible under the law for seeing that the driver has a valid Texas license.

Captain E. L. Posey, Highway Patrol Commander at Lubbock, warned that trailers operating at night without proper lights are extremely hazardous. He pointed out that trailers have been involved in serious accidents each year as a result of not being properly lighted.

Posey said he has issued instructions to Highway Patrolmen throughout his district to issue summons to persons pulling trailers not properly lighted, in an effort to reduce accidents.

Posey cautioned that operators of vehicles towing trailers and operators of farm tractors should avoid impeding the normal flow of traffic, as this is a violation of Texas traffic law and sometimes results in serious accidents.

Vehicles that must move at slow speeds on public roads should move to the shoulder of the road to allow other vehicles to pass.

"Common courtesy in driving will reduce the accident rate in this area. Each Texan owns about 33 feet of highway, yet by sharing with others he can drive like a king over 50,000 miles of pavement, and often does," the Captain concluded.

ing to the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, will be apportioned among the counties and the county allotments, to be announced later, among the farms according to the provisions of the law and regulations issued by the Secretary of Agriculture. The state committee adds that individual farm allotments will be mailed to cotton producers prior to the December 10 referendum on marketing quotas for the 1958 crops.

In the case of extra long staple cotton, the Secretary of Agriculture has designated 10 Texas counties as being eligible to receive allotments. They are Brewster, Culberson, El Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Loving, Pecos, Presidio, Reeves and Ward.

The State committeemen point out that the December 10 referendums, for upland and extra long staple cotton growers, will determine whether or not marketing quotas will be operative for the 1958 crops. At least two-thirds of

those voting in the two referendums must approve the quotas if they are to remain in effect. Acreage allotments are a condition of eligibility for price support.

A national marketing allotment and national acreage allotment for upland cotton must be proclaimed for the following year if the secretary finds that the total supply of upland cotton for the current marketing year exceeds the normal supply. For extra long staple cotton, quotas and allotments must be proclaimed whenever the total exceeds the normal supply more than 8 per cent.

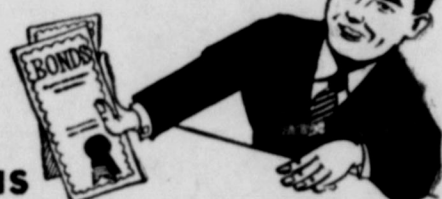

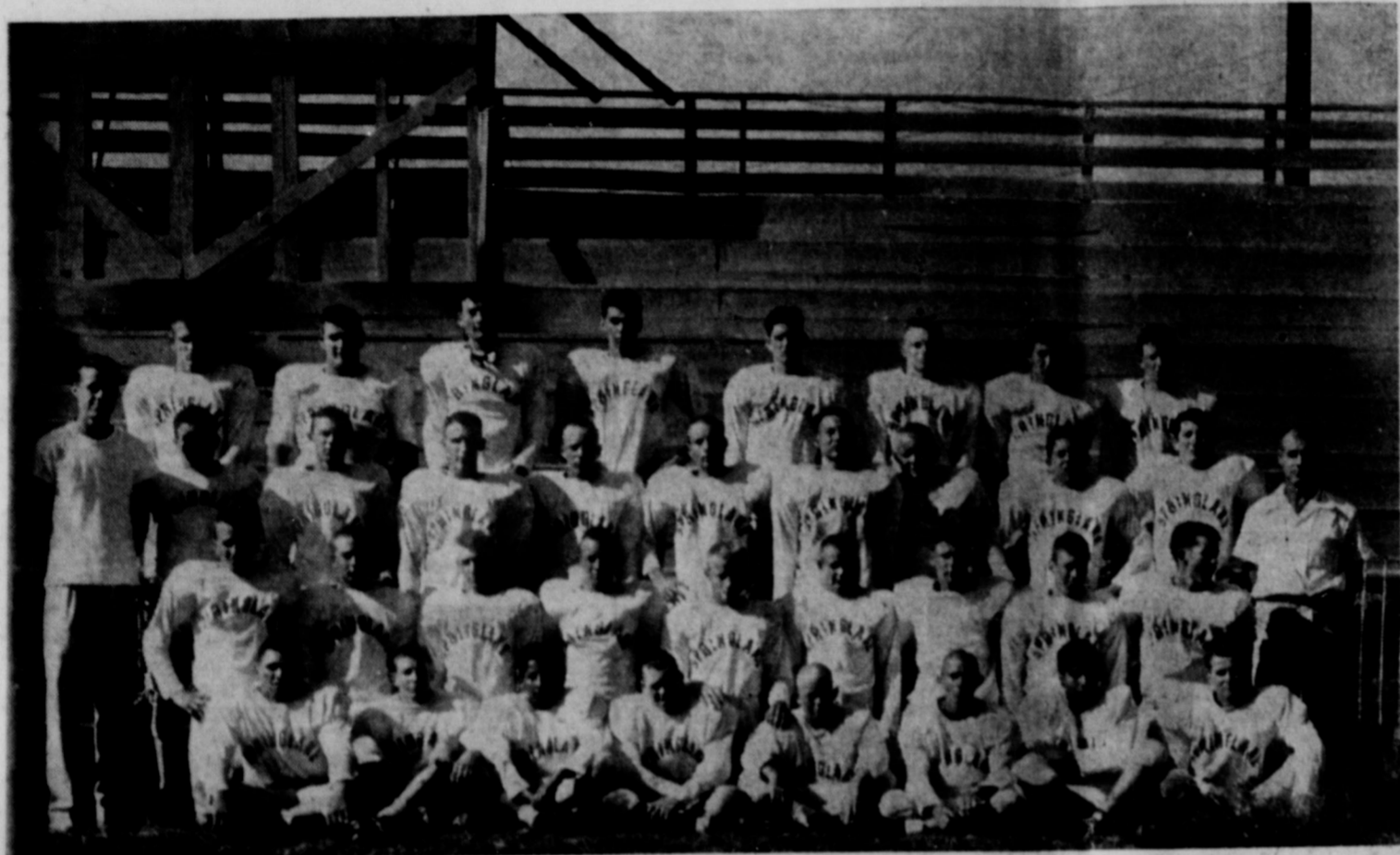

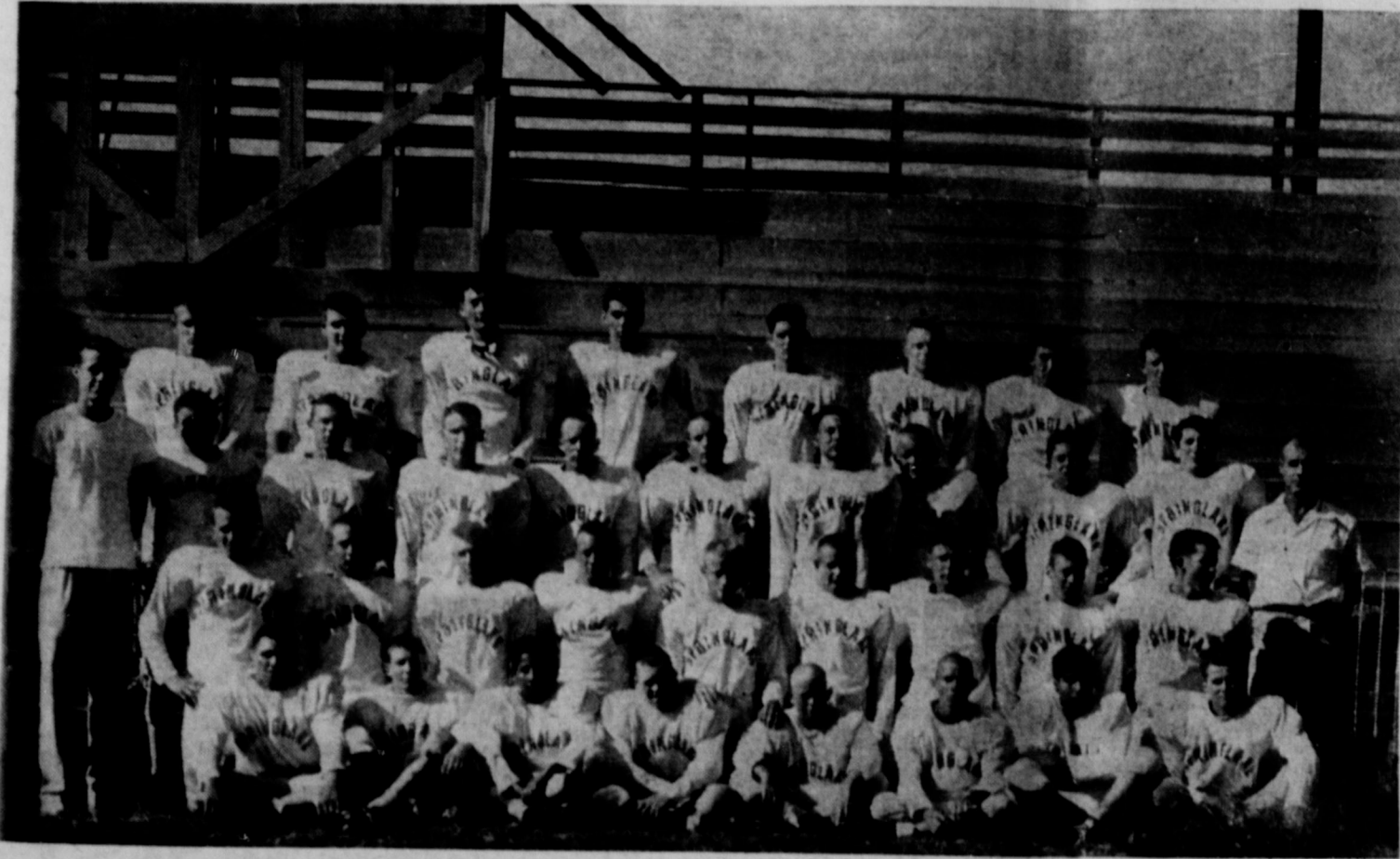
