

## 120 Area Folks See Bill Clayton Sworn In

AUSTIN--A packed gallery, including more than 120 area residents, watched Rep. Bill Clayton, Democrat from Springlake, sworn in as Speaker of the House of Representatives for the 64th Legislative session Tuesday, January 14.

The 12-year member of the House was elected to the top position by an overwhelming 112-33 vote. His only challenger, Rep. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, received the 33 opposing votes. Three members voted "present," and one member was absent.

The district guests made the Austin trip on a special flight from Lubbock arranged by Dr. B. W. Armistead of Littlefield. Armistead was Clayton's campaign manager during the Speaker's race.

District Judge Pat Boone, Jr., also of Littlefield, swore in the new Speaker and the Rev. Glen C. Smith, pastor of the Springlake First Baptist Church, gave the invocation.

Following the opening ceremonies, the House recessed and Clayton hosted a reception for

Although this trend has dealt a blow to recreational motor vehicle sales, the market for backpacks, sleeping bags, lanterns, canoes and other camping gear is currently very strong, according to the article. And boat sales, particularly canoes, are much better than were expected during the fuel shortage months in early 1974.

The Interior Department has recommended a combined effort by the government and private sectors to increase the size and number of privately owned recreation areas, said *Exchange*. Suggestions include tax breaks and other financial incentives.

At least half the recreational facilities in the U.S., some 100,000 ranging from small campgrounds to large parks, are privately owned.


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


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
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
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## A.L. Hollingsworth Noted For High Yield Crop

A.L. Hollingsworth of Hereford was given special recognition for his ability as a corn grower recently.

His documented 1974 yields were recorded in the Funk's C. Project 200 national high-yield growing contest.

Hollingsworth produced six award winning entries each made with a different hybrid. His yields were 138.1 bushels per acre with one variety, 149.3 with another, 152.3 with another, 173.3 with another and 170.0 with another.

All yields were adjusted to No. 2 corn at 15.5 per cent moisture.

Project 200 was designed to challenge growers to increase corn yields for greater producti-

vity and profit. Yield results and the agronomic practices used to achieve them are then shared with corn growers everywhere. More than 15,000 U.S. and Canadian growers have entered Project 200 during the past three years.

Hollingsworth yield of 173.5 bushels per acre was produced on 3.0 acres. He planted the Project 200 corn on April 29 in 40-inch rows. It was harvested November 6 when the moisture content was 19.0 per cent. Plant population was 26,000.

## January Has Three Deadlines for Taxpayers

Although the mention of tax usually brings to mind that square on the calendar marked April 15, the month of January contains three very important tax deadlines which will affect many taxpayers in North Texas.

Employers are reminded that the deadline to give employees their 1974 W-2 forms is Friday, January 31, 1975. Adherence to this date is important because of the delay in filing individual income tax returns that can be caused by late W-2 forms.

January 31 is also the deadline for reporting social security and withheld income taxes for the full calendar quarter ended December 31, 1974. If employers make timely deposits of the full amount of tax due, ten addi-

tional days are allowed to file the return. Employers who received a pre-addressed form 941, "Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax Return," should use this form to report their tax liability. Other employers can obtain blank forms from their local IRS office.

The last day of January is also the last day to report and pay any balance of Federal Unemployment Tax not over \$100.00 for 1974, using form 940. If the balance of tax due is over \$100.00, the employer must make a deposit with FTD form 508. Employers depositing the full amount of tax on time will then have until February 11, 1975, to file the accompanying return.


## Coach Phelps Dubbed Teacher of the Month

## Census on Employment to be Taken Here

Local representatives of the Bureau of the Census will conduct a survey of employment in this area during the week of January 20-24, 1975. Percy R. Millard, Director of the Bureau's regional office in Dallas announced today.

The survey is conducted monthly by the Bureau for the U. S. Department of Labor in a scientifically designed sample of households throughout the entire United States. Employment and unemployment statistics which are based on results of this survey are used to provide a continuing measure of the economic health of the Nation. Total employment, as measured by the monthly sample survey of households, declined by nearly 800,000 in November to 85.7 million a level approximating that of a year earlier. Until this decline, employment has been advancing although slowly and unevenly, through-



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## Eating Breakfast Is Important

Euell Gibbons might go to a little more trouble than most to get his wild hickory nuts every morning, but at least he eats breakfast! While millions of Americans skip this most important meal for time purposes, diet or whatever, they're doing themselves more harm than good.

The Texas Medical Association urges all Texans to eat a good breakfast and start a good day. Studies show that workers who tuck away a good meal before work get more done than those who skip breakfast or eat a poor one. As the morning goes on, the hungry ones grow less efficient. After lunch they do better for awhile, but then they slow down again. And what is true for those workers is also true for homemakers, weight watchers, teenage girls and everyone else. Those who eat a good breakfast have a better chance to do a good day's work than those who neglect breakfast.

Breakfast can be prepared in minutes. If the family eats at different times, or if a child has to be left to eat breakfast alone, plan ahead of time. Eggs can be cooked and bacon prepared early and left for later-comers. Cooked cereal can be kept hot until eaten. With foods ready at hand, family members can serve themselves. When every minute counts, you can use canned, frozen or fresh citrus juice. This can be mixed or squeezed the night before. Ready-to-eat cereals, which are available in a wide variety to please any appetite, only take a second or two to prepare. Sausage or ham bought precooked only take a few minutes to heat and serve.

Let's take a look at ingredients that make a good breakfast. In any breakfast, light or hearty, try to include fruit. It gives zest to meals, prevents constipation and is outstanding in providing vitamin C. Cereals and bread give protein, iron and other minerals, vitamins and food energy. An active worker or a growing child can have a heartier breakfast by eating both cereal and bread. Choose whole-grain, enriched or restored kinds, for they offer added values in B-vitamins and minerals. Butter

and margarine used with bread help provide food energy and vitamin A. Milk supplies our bodies with calcium, the B-vitamin riboflavin and top-grade protein. Normal healthy adults need a pint or more of milk in some form each day. Young children need from two to three cups; older children should have at least three cups; and teenagers, a quart. Be it evaporated milk, skim, buttermilk or nonfat dry milk, it's all rich in energy.

Eggs, meat and fish provide high grade proteins for body building and repair, and they have mineral and other values besides. Building foods of some kind are a must in the day's eating and one or more should appear in each morning meal.

Something hot in the morning, whether a hot beverage or hot cereal is good for you. It is cheering and gives you a sense of well-being, summer or winter.

If you are a weight-watcher, eating a bird-sized breakfast or skipping the whole meal is a poor way to try to keep your weight under control. It's a far better plan to eat a good breakfast and learn enough calorie arithmetic to even out your day's quota over the three meals. More calories than you need for work or play is where fat begins.

## You Can Barbecue Fish Indoors

Barbecued goat, chicken, spare ribs, beef and pork chops are so good that it's sometimes hard to get Texans to try a new idea, no matter how good it is.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's seafood marketing experts have just such an idea, barbecued fish, and they say they are winning over Texans in spite of their famed resistance to change.

With cold weather coming on, Texans are going to have to move their barbecuing indoors, and Parks and Wildlife Department officials hope they bring their fish with them. To encourage this, they suggest the following recipe for "Broiled Fillets Southwest." Other seafood recipes are available, if you'll send a postcard to Seafood Recipes, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, John H.

**BROILED FILLETS SOUTHWEST**  
2 pounds drumfish fillets, or other fresh fillets  
1/3 cup hickory-flavored barbecue sauce  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons frozen pineapple juice concentrate, thawed  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 tablespoon instant minced onion  
3 tablespoons salad oil

Place fillets in a single layer in a well-greased baking dish. Combine remaining ingredients and brush fillets liberally with sauce. Reserve small amount of sauce for basting. Broil about four inches from source of heat for 10 to 15 minutes, or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. Baste once during broiling. Makes four to six servings.

High heels also lead to bad posture, a wobbly gait, strained muscles, calluses, and corns. If you must wear high heels, (which, fortunately, most people don't) limit them to dress occasions. If you are going to be on your feet for long periods of time, wear a heel that is no higher than an inch or an inch and a half.

With the exception of specific mechanical problems of the feet, special shoes are not necessary. Fads come and go, but the primary function of shoes is to protect the feet from injury. Other than proper fit, there is no reason to consider one shoe over another.

Shoes that are too tight can cause the two most common foot disorders, corns and bunions. Shoes that slip or press tightly on the heel can cause blisters. The best way to prevent these, or to relieve them if they are present, is to buy shoes that are properly fitted. Go into the store yourself, have your foot measured, try the shoes on, and make sure that the tip of the shoe is at least one-half inch longer than your longest toe. It's a good idea to buy shoes toward the end of the afternoon when your feet are slightly larger than they are in the morning.

Very little can be done by way of home treatment for corns and bunions except to relieve the discomfort they cause. You should never attempt to pare away a corn with a razor blade or any other sharp instrument because this can lead to a serious infection. The safest home treatment is to apply a thin, doughnut-shaped pad to hard corns or a piece of lamb's wool to soft ones. This will relieve the pressure and eventually, if you have switched to properly fitted shoes, the corn may disappear.

Bunions, which form most frequently on the first joint of the big toe, may be caused by crowding your foot into shoes which are too narrow. Changing your footwear may ease the problem, although sometimes bunions have to be removed by surgery.

One of the most neglected of health habits is the brisk daily walk. Our feet, marvelously constructed of 26 bones, 107 ligaments and 19 muscles, are capable of supporting approximately 65,000 miles of walking in an average lifetime. Regular daily walks not only stimulate circulation but maintain the strength of the foot's muscles and other structures.

Foot comfort can also be promoted by elevating your feet when you are lying down, walking barefoot around the house, taking warm foot baths, rubbing your feet with a rough towel after bathing and using foot powder to keep your feet dry.

### Navajo Nation Plans for Future

The Navajo Nation of Arizona has planned Bicentennial projects which will be useful far into the future.

A Navajo Irrigation Project will provide water for cultivating 11,000 acres of otherwise arid land. There will also be a \$2.5 million Navajo Heritage Center where arts and crafts of all tribes can be shown and sold, a Navajo Land Outdoor Theater, and an amphitheater in Canyon de Chelly National Monument.



## Are You Killing Your Feet?

While almost everyone is born with perfect feet, only ten percent of the people in this country are free of some form of foot trouble by adulthood. Since almost all of these miseries are self-inflicted, it might be appropriate to admit "I'm killing my feet" instead of the familiar complaint, "My feet are killing me."

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
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
