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### J. C. Green Services Held At Sayre, Oklahoma

Services for J. C. (Cage) Green, prominent Western Oklahoma pioneer farmer, who died in an Oklahoma City Hospital Saturday, April 26, following a month's critical illness, were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church, Sayre, Okla., with Rev. Marvin Hall and Rev. L. A. Combs officiating.

Interment was in Lone Oak Cemetery with Scroggins Funeral Home directing arrangements, assisted by Martin's Funeral Home, of Elk City, Okla.

Born Oct. 9, 1878 in Chambers County, Ala., he moved to Texas in 1884 and in 1899 moved to Oklahoma where he filed on land which was the farm where he had resided since that time.

Mr. Green was an active member and took part in all activities of the Lone Oak Baptist Church. He was teacher of a men's Sunday School Class and an active deacon at the time of his death. He had been a deacon for 40 years.

He was chairman of the Beckham County Excise and Election Boards, having served on both boards continuously for 20 years. He helped build the first roads and telephone lines in the County.

He was married to Mary M. Smith on Sept. 27, 1903, at Port, Okla. They celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary in 1953.

During Oklahoma's Semi-Centennial last year, Mr. and Mrs. Green represented Beckham County on Farm Family Day at the State Fairgrounds when farm families throughout the State were honored for having lived on the same farm for 50 years and having reared the largest number of children on the farm.

Survivors are his wife, of the home address, four daughters, Mrs. Blanche Burnett, Hale Center; Mrs. Eula Kelley, Earth; Mrs. Lucille Habbinga, Lubbock and Mrs. Ethel Glass, Marlow, Okla.; seven sons, Haskell, Oakdale, Calif.; Amos, Sayre, Okla.; Wilson, Alexandria, Va.; Eugene, Portland, Ore.; J. C., Jr., Tomball, Tex.; George Glen, College Station and Windle of Amarillo.

Additional survivors include four brothers, five sisters, 17 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

### Area History Related At Lions Luncheon

Here in Lamb County where we reside was once a part of the 3,000,000 acres of land traded by the State of Texas for the State Capital Building in Austin in the 1880's. Mrs. Lester LaGrange, of Amherst, told Lions Club members and their guests at the regular noon meeting Tuesday.

Land in the now townsite of Earth sold for \$25 per acre in 1925, when the Springlake Division of the XIT Ranch was being sold by the Halsells. W. E. Halsell had purchased 193,000 acres, which comprised this division, in 1903 for \$2 per acre, the speaker recalled.

Another interesting bit of information related by Mrs. LaGrange was the way in which the Mashed O got its name. Mr. Halsell was a partner in a ranch in the Indian Territory, the brand of which was three O's. When the ranch was dissolved, he took a hammer and flattened out one of the O's. The result was the Mashed O.

Other interesting and informative items of interest were related by Mrs. LaGrange.

**Safe Driving Demonstration At Springlake School**

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Vernon Gayle, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department, declared recently as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Springlake High School.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Gayle said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour can be excessive. Gayle added, "When drivers know the true facts and base their driving on these facts, highway accidents will drop sharply."

**New Legislation Explained For Wheat Allotment**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture today explained the effect of new legislation (Public Law 85-366, enacted April 4, 1958) on the computation of future acreage al-

lotments for wheat. The 1958 law relaxes the provisions of Public Law 85-203, approved Aug. 28, 1957. The general effect of the 1957 and 1958 laws combined is to alter the past practice under which the farm that exceeded its wheat allotment received credit for the entire harvested wheat acreage for the year in determining future allotments. Under the new legislation, one set of requirements will apply to the 1958 wheat crop and another to 1959 and subsequent crops as follows:

**1958 CROP**  
Individual farm allotments: A farmer who overproduces his 1958 wheat allotment will receive credit for the 1958 farm base acreage (adjusted 4-year average) as 1958 history, just as the farmer who complies with his allotment does. However, he cannot receive credit for more than the base acreage, regardless of acreage produced. These legal provisions deal only with wheat average history and have no effect on marketing quota provisions. Any farmer who produces more than 15 acres of wheat and exceeds his allotment in 1958 will be subject to marketing quotas. A producer who has overplanted his 1958 allotment has until the disposal date for his area to decide whether or not to dispose of his excess acreage. The amendment does not affect producers who have obtained a feed wheat exemption. The provisions of the application signed by such producers that none of the wheat acreage in excess of the wheat allotment will be considered in establishing future farm wheat acreage allotments will remain in effect.

**STATE AND COUNTY ALLOTMENTS:** In computing future State and County allotments, 1958 wheat acreage in excess of farm allotments will not be counted. Thus, excess farm wheat acreage will not produce an increase in the State or county allotment in future years. For the State and county calculations, the 1958 acreage history of a farmer who exceeds his allotment will be the allotment. In other words, a non-complying farm wheat history will be listed at one figure for purposes of the farm allotment computation and at another for purposes of computing State and county allotments.

**1959 and SUBSEQUENT YEARS**  
Individual farm allotments: If the acreage allotment is exceeded, the farm's wheat history for the year will be the allotment. To receive credit for the base acreage as history a farmer who exceeds his allotment may store the excess wheat under marketing quota regulations or deliver it to the Gov-

## Chemical Treating Planting Seed Good Insurance

College Station, Texas — Planting high quality seed which have been treated to protect them from soil-borne diseases is one of the best steps a farmer can take for getting his crop off to a good start, advises Lee Coffey, extension agronomist.

Farmers do not have to wait until the last minute to treat the seed, he points out. Storage is no problem as long as the seed is stored under dry conditions and recommended dosages are used. In fact, early treating is sometimes advisable because it helps avoid the last minute rush and gives the chemical extra time to work, he adds.

Farmers will have several approved chemicals to choose from when treating seed this year, says Coffey. The effectiveness of these chemicals is essentially the same and each will do the job if they are used according to instructions.

Special care must be taken when treating legume seed so the chemical will not kill the inoculant, cautions Coffey. Chemical treatment should be done at least two weeks before planting and then the seed should be planted as soon as possible after inoculation.

It is especially important to treat seed which is to be planted early, he says. Treating helps protect the seed and seedling from seed and soil born diseases that

may attack when soil conditions are not favorable for immediate germination.

In general, points out Coffey, planting seed purchased through seed stores has already been treated. But to make sure, he advises checking the tag on the bag.

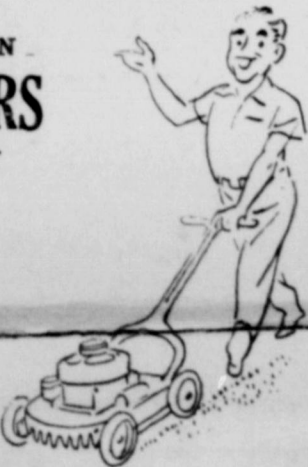

## High Plains Station Receives Grant For Cotton Research

Cotton Research at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation was strengthened by a grant of \$6000 for 1958 by the directors of the Plains Cotton Growers Incorporated by unanimous action at their meeting April 29th. Orville Balley, Ropesville chairman of the Finance Committee for the P. C. G. presented the proposal. Frank Moore, Plainview area Finance Chairman of the High Plains Station outlined the cotton research program, under irrigation, to be conducted at the High Plains Station.

The cotton research program supported by the grant include variety tests, fertilizer tests, time of planting, method and time of fertilizer application, frequency of irrigation and a study of Trace Elements as they affect production, grade and profit in cotton.

Fertilizer tests on cotton include: (1) different rates and ratios of nitrogen and phosphate; (2) time of application of nitrogen; (3) comparison of six common sources of phosphate; (4) comparison of different methods of application of phosphate; and (5) a study of the effects of mag-

nesium and trace elements. In all these fertilizer tests emphasis will be made on the cotton grown with different kinds and amounts of fertilizer to determine fertilizer uptake.

An irrigation test will also be conducted on cotton to study the effects of the amount and time of application of irrigation water on yield and quality of cotton. The efficiency of water usage by cotton will also be studied in an effort to find out where irrigation water should be applied to obtain the greatest net return from cotton.
