

In a five hour meeting held at Littlefield Tuesday, County Commissioners agreed to accept a petition calling for an \$800,000 Bond Election to create Lamb County's Water Control and Improvefent

Five temporary directors were elected at the meeting. Coleman Terrell of Sudan, Frank Bozeman Pleasant Valley, Troy Armes of Littlefield and H. C. (Jake(Armstrong of Fieldton.

The newly elected directors will be sworn in shortly, they will be bonded and call for the bond elction of \$800,000 to purchase rights on some 24,000 acres in the

The chief aim of this bond election is to retain and control water in Lamb County.

The proposition will give voters living within the Water District boundaries the right to decide whether to create this district, vote the bonds, and elect permanent directors of the organization. (Under the law, permanent directors from each area must be electd by qualified voters.)

V. T. Tanner, mayor of Springlake and Gordon Willis, Hydrolofive called by the Water Groups attorneys, Samuel Aldrich of Far well and Arthur Duggan of Littlefield to give reports concerning

the water controversy. Tanner reported that the southwest and eastern portions of the county were left out by request, as the southeast is mostly dryland farfing and they did not bear the tax load and receive no benefits from such a bond. The population in the eastern portion said they were unable to deal with landowners for the purchase of

water rights. Tanner also said that \$31.00 per acre for water rights on the 24,-000 Sandhill acres was the amount agreed on by both Ewing Halsell and Frank Daugherty. He said that both men had received bids from large cities for the water rights on these Sandhill acres, but that both had stated the ywould much rather deal and cooperate with their home county.

Willis Hydrologist from Lubbock stated in his report that "If. a large percentage of water is moved rapidly, you can deplete the water in the Sandhills, and it will also affect the adjoining areas.

He said water tables had declined in Lamb County from a round 15 ft. to 35 ft. in places since 1938. He stated that the greatest decline was yet to come because of the large increase in Irrigation wells in the recent years,







And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordince with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous colamns, a will can preform useful funtions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement

What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.
