County Committee Elected To Push High Plains Research Field Station

Richard Etter of Springlake was elected General Chairman of a committee selected Tuesday night to head this county in its effort to secure financing for a field station of the Texas Research Foundation for the High Plains Area. He was elected to replace Mr. Paul Lewis, who asked to be replaced due to his lack of time to devote to this project.

Oscar Allison of Pleasant Valley was named vice chairman. Dan Stagg of Littlefield was elected as secretary.

The purpose of this committee is to obtain pledges to finance the county's share of the initial cost of setting up this sub-station of the T. R. F. for the High Plains Area.

Fifteen counties on the Plains have asked to be included in this progressive move to bring this Agricultural Research Station to this region.

Bailey and Hale Counties have already begun their push to get pledges to finance their share of the financial load.

Paul Lewis, president of Lamb County's Farm Bureau introduced V. T. Tanner, mayor of Springlake, who emceed the meeting. Dr. Whiteherst, assistant to the Director of Research from the Texas Research Foundation at Renner, Texas, said that the program should not be undertaken here for less than five years, and he suggested a permanent set up would be more feasible for this area. He said the smallest number of acres advisable for experimental purposes would be 160 acres. More would be advisable of the Plains area felt they could afford more.

Dr. Whiteherst said the Texas Research Foundation at Renner began in 1944 and that it consists of 850 acres which was engaged in experiments on both old and new crops. Twenty two scientists are engaged in experiments on Soybeans, Sesame Grasses and Legumes and that the station required a total of 50 employees.

Dr. Earl Collister, Director of Plant Science Research gave a report on the discoveries made at Renner and of the advantages of having this sub-station here on the Plains before our soils have lost their productivity.

He said they received seeds from most every foreign country and used it for experimental purposes as well as seeds from all over the U. S. A.

There is already three field stations that are branches of the Texas Research Foundation at Renner. The No. 1 Field Station was at Henderson, Texas; No. 2 Sub-Station is located at Costal Bend, near Corpus Christi and the No. 3 Field Station is at Merkel, Texas near Abilene. No. 4 he said was the one we are seeking for the High Plains Sub-Station.

When asked about the locality of the High Plains Sub-Station, Dr. Collister said a site would have to be selected by a committee, in a Democratic way, after the money had been raised for the station.

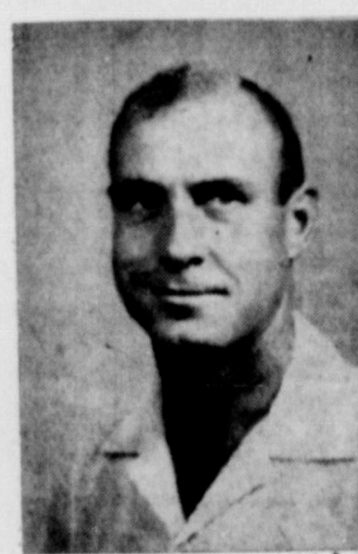
Superintendent and Mrs. William L. Mann and family moved to the Springlake School Campus, Tuesday from Crosbyton, Texas.

In a five hour meeting held at Littlefield Tuesday, County Commissioners agreed to accept a petition calling for an \$800,000 Bond Election to create Lamb County's Water Control and Improvement District.

Five temporary directors were elected at the meeting. Coleman Terrell of Sudan, Frank Bozeman of Springlake, Gerald Allison of Pleasant Valley, Troy Armes of Littlefield and H. C. (Jake) Armstrong of Fieldton.

The newly elected directors will be sworn in shortly, they will be bonded and call for the bond election of \$800,000 to purchase rights on some 24,000 acres in the Sandhills.

The chief aim of this bond election is to retain and control water in Lamb County.

The proposition will give voters living within the Water District boundaries the right to decide whether to create this district, vote the bonds, and elect permanent directors of the organization. (Under the law, permanent directors from each area must be elected by qualified voters.)

V. T. Tanner, mayor of Springlake and Gordon Willis, Hydrologist of Lubbock, were the five called by the Water Groups attorneys, Samuel Aldrich of Parwell and Arthur Duggan of Littlefield to give reports concerning the water controversy.

Tanner reported that the southwest and eastern portions of the county were left out by request, as the southeast is mostly dryland farming and they did not wish to bear the tax load and receive no benefits from such a bond. The population in the eastern portion said they were unable to deal with landowners for the purchase of water rights.

Willis, Hydrologist from Lubbock stated in his report that "If a large percentage of water is moved rapidly, you can deplete the water in the Sandhills, and it will also affect the adjoining areas."

He said water tables had declined in Lamb County from a round 15 ft. to 35 ft. in places since 1938. He stated that the greatest decline was yet to come because of the large increase in irrigation wells in the recent years.

Grandchild of Henry Gilmore Dies After Being Struck by Car

Mary Elizabeth Jackson, 8, of Fort Worth died at 1:00 P. M. Friday in St. Joseph Hospital. Mary Elizabeth died from injuries she received Tuesday when struck by a car as she was crossing a street in Fort Worth. She was not across the street when a car driven by a negro minister failed to see her. She died from a blood clot after undergoing head surgery twice.

Funeral services were held at 10:00 A. M. Monday at Guardian Funeral Home Chapel.

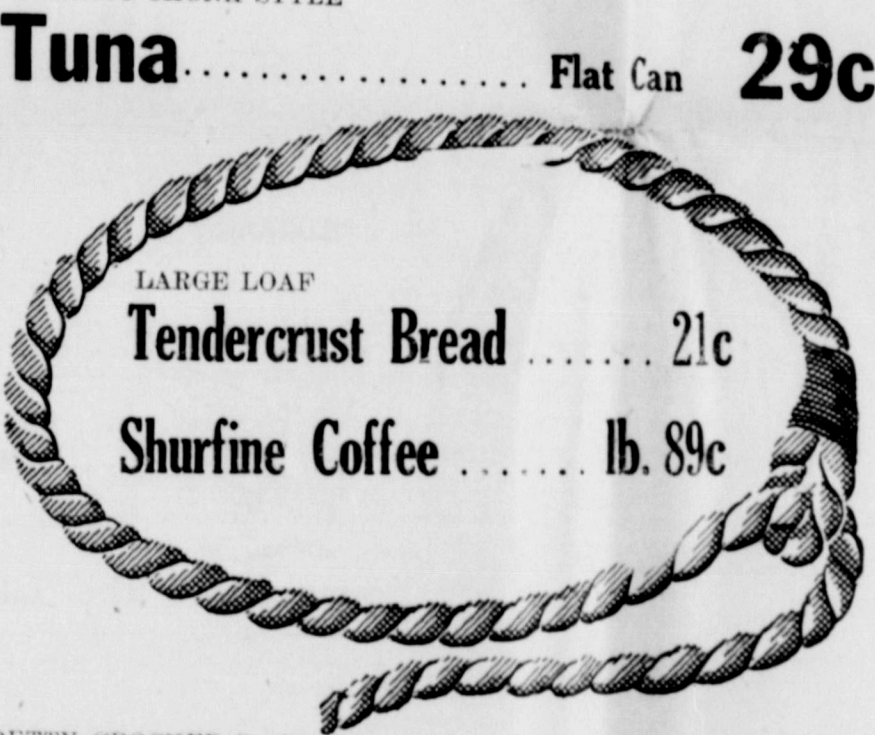

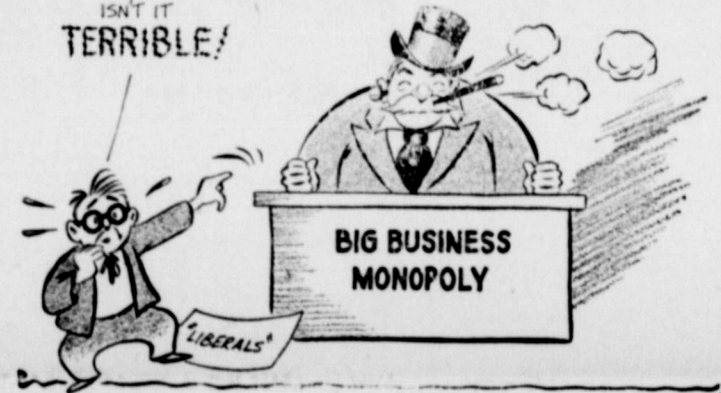
LAW OF ESCHEAT EXPLAINED

Made your will? If not, the State of Tex. may wind up as owner of your estate upon your death. Under our statutes, the estates of persons having who die intestate revert, or 'escheat', to the State.

Such provisions have been carried over from the English common law. There, process under such circumstances, the estate escheated to the British crown. The theory of the process is that the sovereign (or State), having been the original owner of all lands before they were parceled out to individuals, is entitled to a return of such lands when the possibilities of legal inheritance have been exhausted.

This idea has been expanded to include personal property as well as real estate. It also applies in the case of a person absent for a term of seven years and not known to exist who leaves no heirs and no will.

Strange How The "Liberal" Mind Works

Presumably, there is hardly a person who does not have some individual or charity that he would prefer to have his estate, rather than have it go to the State by default, so to speak. Yet surprisingly, estates worth many thousands of dollars do escheat to the various states from time to time.

Now, before you shrug the matter off with the idea that these statutory provisions could not possibly apply to you, better think a minute. Suppose you and your

wife have no heirs besides each other and your children. Many people do fall into this category.

In event of a catastrophe resulting in death for your entire immediate family, no legal heirs would remain. Therefore if you had no will, your property would go to the State. In preparing a will, it is possible to provide for such an eventuality.

In this hypothetical case, you would probably want to designate some friend as executor, to take care of all necessary arrangements and then distribute the estate ac-

ording to your wishes.

On the other hand, if you have plenty of possible heirs, a will could be used to designate which of them shall participate in the division of the estate. And even if you wish your property to be distributed entirely in accordance with our statutes of descent and distribution as explained in previous columns, a will can perform useful functions. Among other uses, a will could provide for an orderly and economical partition of your property, preventing any waste of the assets by heirs impatient for a settlement.

What happens to property which escheats to the State? Following certain required legal formalities and court proceedings, all escheated lands are set apart to the Permanent Free School Fund of the State, and may be leased and sold by the Land Commissioner under certain regulations. Escheated personal property is sold by the local sheriff under a court writ and the money received therefrom paid into the State Treasury.

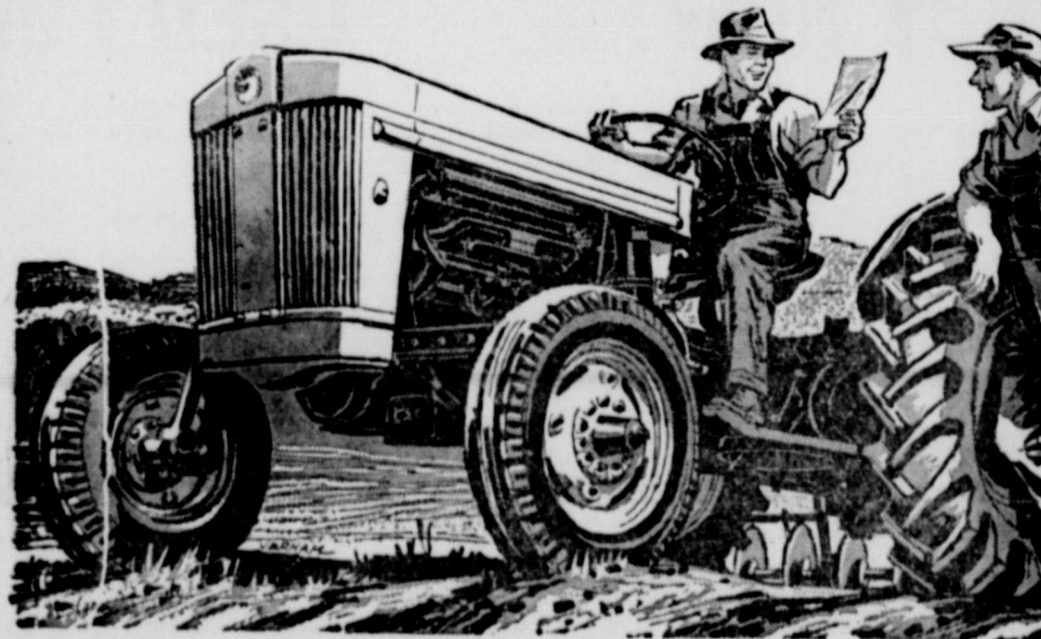

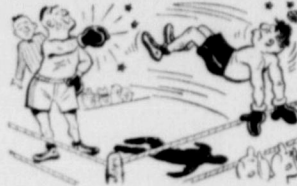

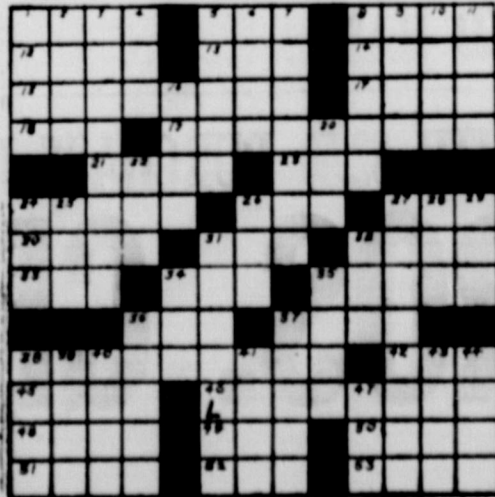

He has been experimenting with raising tomatoes for past three years and he says there's no reason why the High Plains area could not produce high quality tomatoes in large quantities.

Farmer Experiments With Tomatoes As Supplement Crop on High Plains

Beginning his third year experimenting with tomatoes on the High Plains is Edd Haley, who has a ten acre patch this year.

According to Haley, the tomato seeds were planted with a four-row planter. The seeds were purchased from the Burfesson Seed Farm in Colorado.

In his past two years of experimenting, Haley says, most people stop watering the plants when about 10 percent of the crop begins to ripen, but he has found that they bare longer and the quality is much better if one continues to water until the first freeze.

Haley sold his last years crop to a vegetable company at Mobile, Alabama.

Observers who have visited the Haley farm from Lubbock and surrounding area, say they are the best the county has ever grown.

Haley says, he believes we need a packing plant in this area and more farmers to become interested in raising tomatoes. Haley reported that a San Antonio jobber has offered him as much as \$800 and \$1,400 an acre in the patch.

Haley said he gathered 185 bushels of tomatoes off of two acres last year, that one vine will produce one-half bushel per week.

Haley learned last year that a Mrs. Joe Holmes of Austin, who was very ill and a doctor had prescribed for her to eat lots of tomatoes, Haley flew nine tomatoes

to her weighing 31 and one-fourth pounds.

Haley says his tomatoes will be ready for market the middle of August this year.
