First '62 Cotton Produced In Earth Area By Earl Kellar

The first bale of 1962 cotton was produced in the Earth area by Earl Kellar and ginned at Campbell Cotton Gin, Inc. at Dodd. The cotton was weighed in at 3:04 p.m. Thursday, September 13.

Kellar received as a reward for bringing in the first 1962 bale, \$205 in merchandise and \$82 cash, all donated by merchants in the area. Mr. Campbell also paid 50 cents per pound for his cotton and ginned the bale free of charge.

The load of cotton weighed in at 2190 pounds. After ginning the bale weighed 525 pounds and produced 870 pounds of seed.

Kellar raised the cotton on land owned by his aunt, Mrs. C. E. Woods, Clovis, and located 7 miles north, 2 miles west and one and three quarter miles north of Earth.

The crop was planted April 24 on pre-irrigated land and was irrigated twice after planting. The cotton load was picked from 15 acres.

Last year's first bale was produced by G. Pellham and was ginned September 11.

Earl Kellar Is Presented Check By Earth Jaycees

The Earth Jaycees met Monday at the Earth community room with ten members attending.

The Jaycees sponsored the First Cotton Bale award. Charles Dunn, president, presented a check for \$82 to Earl Kellar, producer of the first bale. Kellar also received approximately \$200 in Merchandise. Prizes were donated by area merchants.

The members met at the Jaycee building last Tuesday and cleaned the building grounds.

First Cotton Of Season Reported In Two Counties

The 1962 season's first cotton bales have been reported from two area counties with each farmer using the same brand of cotton seed.

Certified Rilecot 90 early cotton seed was used by Castro County farmer Tex Conard and by the Ware Bros. of Farmer County. The Castro County bale was the Sunnyside Morrison Gin. Conard farms land owned by W. W. Gilbreath of Hereford.

During the first run Friday, 15 acres yielded 2190 pounds of cotton, 470 lbs. of lint and 820 lbs. of seed.

Ray Joe Riley, owner of the Riley Yieldmaster Seed Corp. at Sunnyside, supplied Conard with the seed which was developed in Castro County.

Bath Unit Total Loss In Blaze Thursday Evening

Earth Volunteer Firemen answered a call Thursday, September 13 at 5:30 p.m. to the Service Seed and Delinting Co. owned by Bob Belev.

A barracks building, in the last phases of remodeling as living quarters for harvest hands, suffered partial damage.

One complete bath unit was declared a total loss. The building is located on the north side of the firm.

Deputy sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. reports that the cause of the fire was due to burning of weeds by workmen using a weed burner and the flames crept unnoticed to the site of the barracks building.

Bond Issue Passes By 2 to 1 Margin

The Springlake School Bond election last Saturday resulted in the passing of the bond and maintenance propositions by a vote of almost 2 to 1.

A total of 341 voters, out of approximately 500 eligible voters, turned out for the Saturday election.

Voting for the bond were 210, against 122. Voting for the maintenance issue were 210, against 131.

The bond of \$195,000 will be used to construct a new cafeteria, seven classrooms and library for the elementary building and repair on the junior high school building.

Maturity date of the bond will be 1977.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS

The Springlake School board met Monday evening at the high school with bondsman attorney Joe Smith of Lubbock.

The bonds will be advertised for bids about the latter part of November. Construction on the project is expected to start in February of 1963 and it is hoped to be completed when the school term begins in September 1963.

In the intervening months, architects will be meeting with the school staff to iron out problematic details and to draw up final building blueprints.

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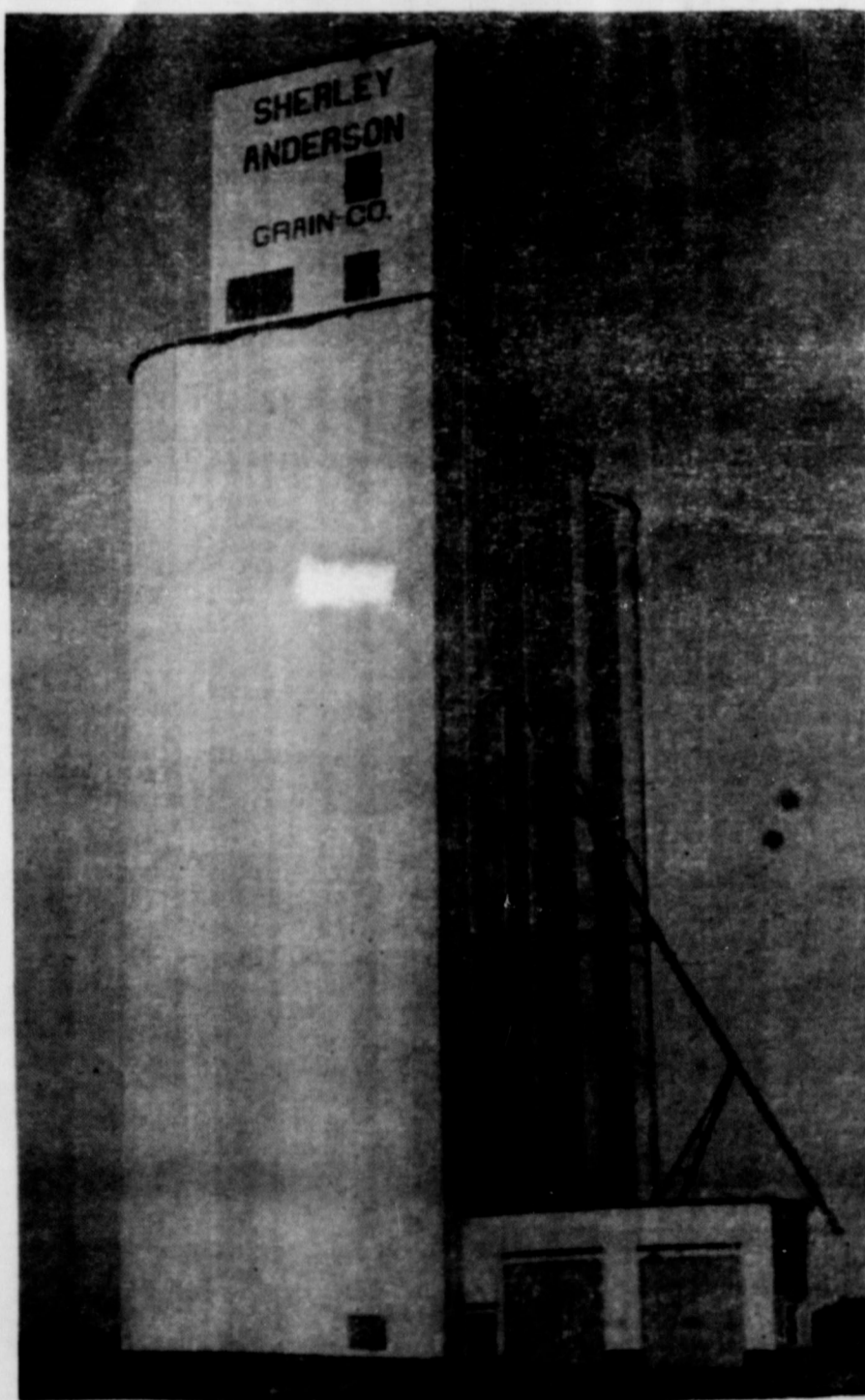
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FHA Officers Installed Recently In Formal Rites

Allen, known as "Mr. Cowboy," ended his 1961 performance by tossing a western hat into the inmates' stand. The hat was caught by Cuauhtemoc Munoz of Dallas, an inmate printer at the Huntsville Unit, Texas Department of Corrections.

This year, Munoz hopes another inmate gets a hat from Allen because "this gift has meant so much to me in many ways," Munoz stated.

Munoz said he had sent the hat to his home where his family is looking after it until he is discharged from prison, which Munoz hopes will be next year.

"After that, I'm going to wear that hat with pride. I received it from a wonderful man and entertainer," Munoz added.

Other stellar artists who will make personal appearances in the prison stadium will be Anita Bryant and Ann Marston, Oct. 14; Willie Mays, Oct. 21, and Dan "Hos" Blocker, Oct. 28.

As usual sharing the spotlight each Sunday will be top inmate riders contesting tough prison rodeo stock, plus a host of specialty numbers by inmate entertainment groups and free-world performers.

Plains Conservation Land Leveling On The Gene Brownd Farm

The Great Plains Conservation program is a conservation program designed to speed up the amount of conservation practices on the ground and to help stabilize agriculture on the Great Plains.

Any farmer or rancher in Lamb County who controls (owns or rents) land considered as an operating unit (farm or ranch) can take part.

To take part a farmer or rancher must file application form with his local Soil Conservation office. Next a plan of operations must be worked out that includes treatment for all of the land within the operating unit.

The contract may be entered into for a minimum of 3 years and a maximum of 10 years. These contracts can be amended if for a good cause. If the contracts are violated part or all of the cost-share may have to be returned.

Some of the practices which may be cost-shared on under the Great Plains conservation program are grass planting, range re-seeding, windbreaks, waterways, terraces, diversion terraces, underground irrigation pipeline, and land leveling.

Lions Eye Bank Opened Sept. 15

The Hi-Plains Eye Bank, Inc. officially launched its activities on September 15.

Omar Hermesmyer, president of the association, which has headquarters in Amarillo, said the eye bank will maintain a booth at this year's Tri-State Fair.

The booth will be located in the Sports Arena at the Fair Grounds. The organization is sponsored

by Lions Clubs of the Panhandle area. All Lions Clubs in the area will have donor cards for use in their respective locality, Hermesmyer said.

Purpose of the eye bank is to restore vision in patients by surgical replacement of damaged eye parts by healthy tissue from eye donors.

Through the eye bank, persons will allow their eyes to be removed immediately following their death. Within 24 hours after death, the donors eyes are removed and rushed to hospitals in special containers.

St. Anthony's Hospital will serve as a receiving station for donated eyes.

Since operations must be completed within 48 hours, patients are in almost constant contact with their surgeon.

When an eye is available, the operation is scheduled as quickly as possible.

Activities of eye banks and eye donors make possible the corneal transplant operation in which a damaged cornea limiting a patient's vision is replaced.

Some 60 Lions Club in District 2T-1 have banded together to promote the project. Hermesmyer said Final plans have been completed and a fund drive is now in progress.

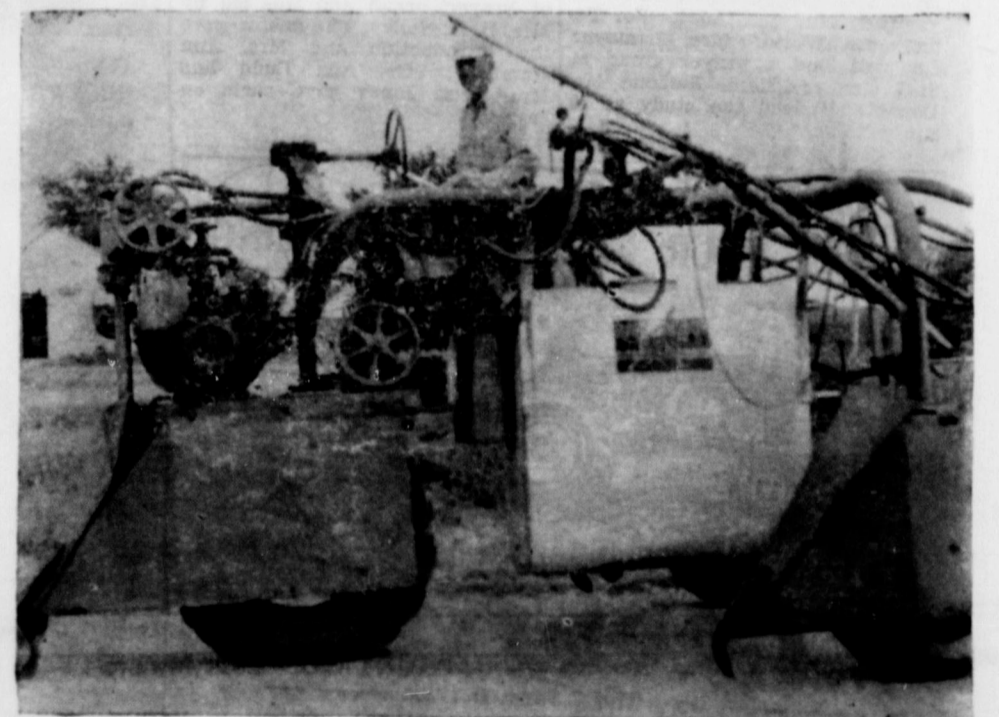

DOUGHNUTS

4½ C flour
4½ t baking powder
1 t salt
¼ t nutmeg
* t cinnamon
2 T shortening
1 C sugar
2 eggs
1 C milk

Sift flour, add baking powder, salt, nutmeg and cinnamon; sift again. Cream shortening, add sugar gradually, continue beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, beating after each.

Add milk and flour mixture alternately, stirring until blended. Chill 1 hour. Roll out ¼ in. thick on lightly floured surface, cut with floured doughnut cutter. Let stand, uncovered 20 to 30 minutes. Fry in deep fat, 3 to 5 minutes until brown. Turn doughnuts as they rise to surface.

Pesticide Drift In Use Of Chemicals Under Investigation

College Station — The extent of pesticide drift in the use of agricultural chemicals is being investigated by a team of scientists from the A and M College of Texas, Texas State Health Department, Entomology Research Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Weather Bureau of the U. S. Department of Commerce.

In compliance with House Resolution 199 of the 57th Texas Legislature, leadership in the pesticide drift project is provided by the A and M College of Texas through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Field studies with fluorescent dyes and other tracer techniques to determine the extent of pesticide drift and air pollution was conducted during the current growing season at four locations in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Comprehensive data recorded in these field experiments were reviewed recently at the Lower Rio Grande Valley Experiment Station at Weslaco. An evaluation of these findings will be presented to the incoming 58th Legislature.

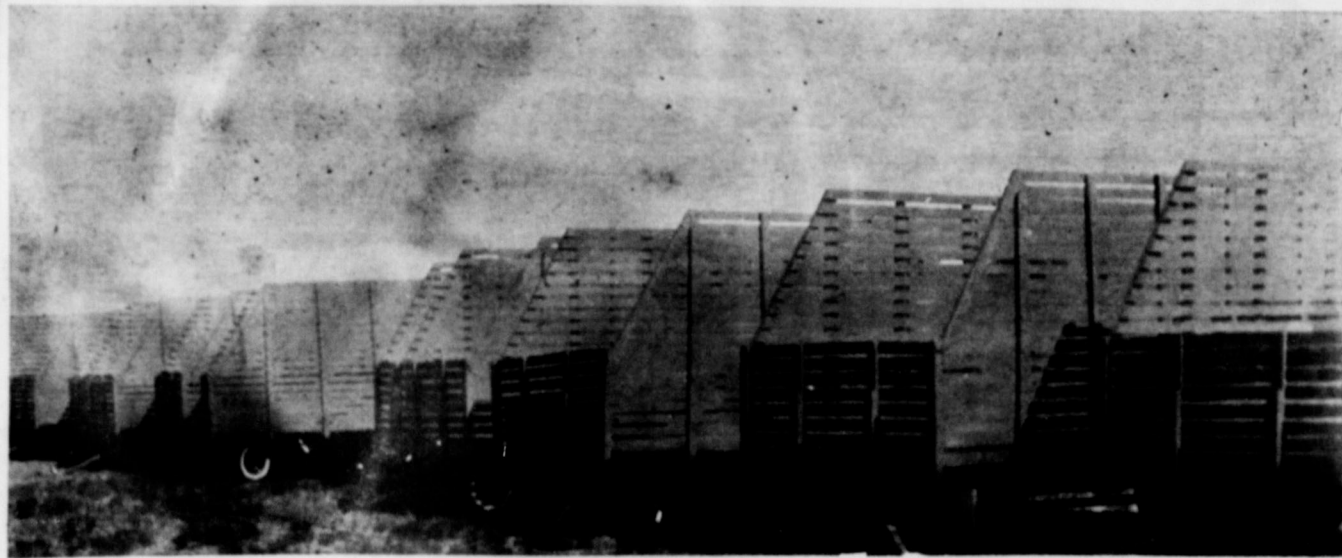

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Farm Facts

According to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, there were 14,803,000 people living on farms in the United States in 1961, or about one person out of every 12 in the total population.

This is the smallest farm population of recent record. From 1960 to 1961, the number of farm people decreased by about \$30,000 as the movement away from farms was more than offset the growth that would have taken place from births.

Non-white farm people number 2,846,000. They account for 1/6 of the total but because of their concentration in the South make up 3/10 of all Southern farm residents.

The farm population has a high percentage of children and teenagers; 43% of all farm people are under 20 years old. Farm people of late middle age or older outnumber young adults, however. In 1961, there were 106 farm males for every 100 fe-

males, compared with 97 males for every 100 females in the non-farm population. Farm people are defined as those living on places with 10 or more acres of land and selling \$50 or more worth of farm products per year.

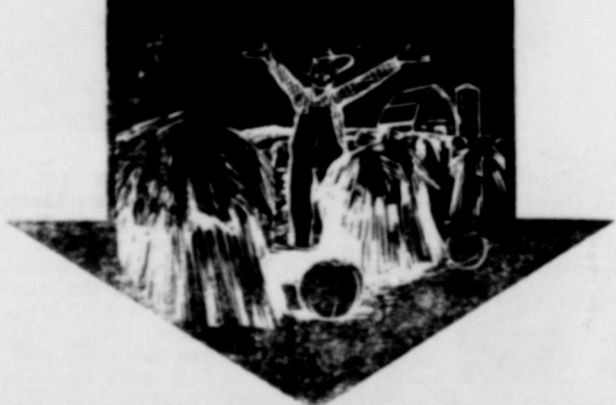

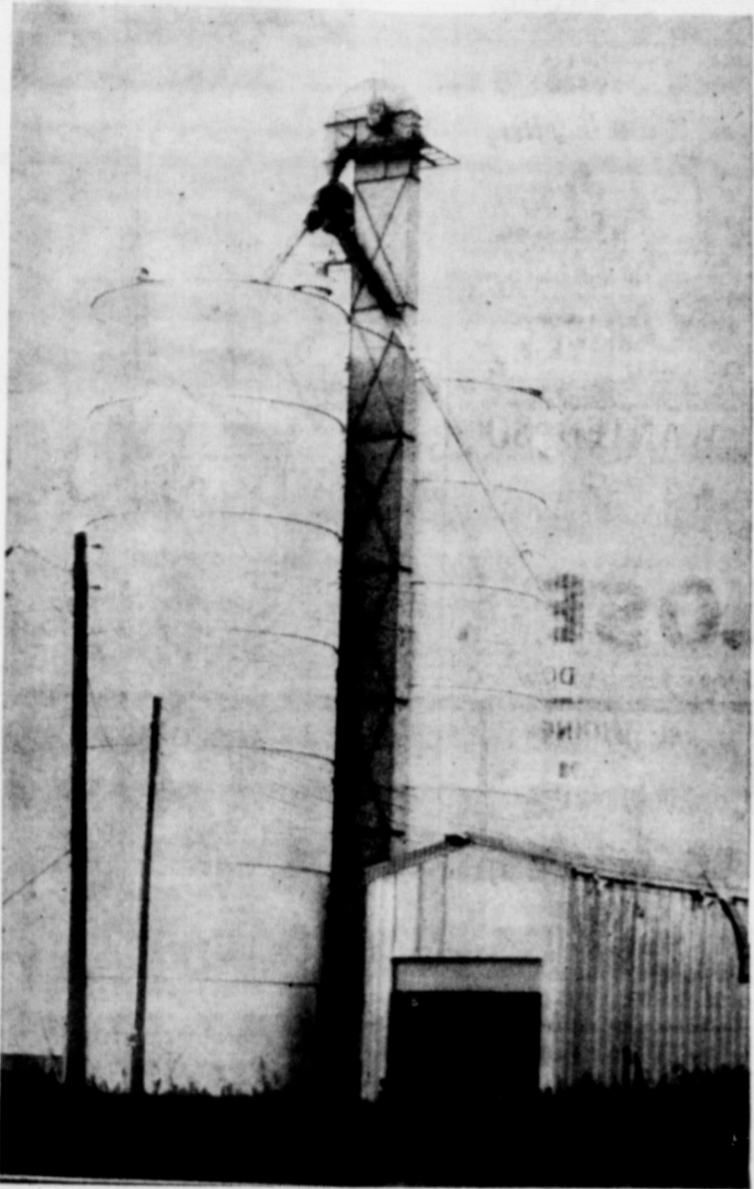

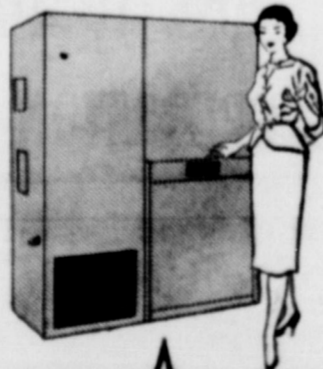
