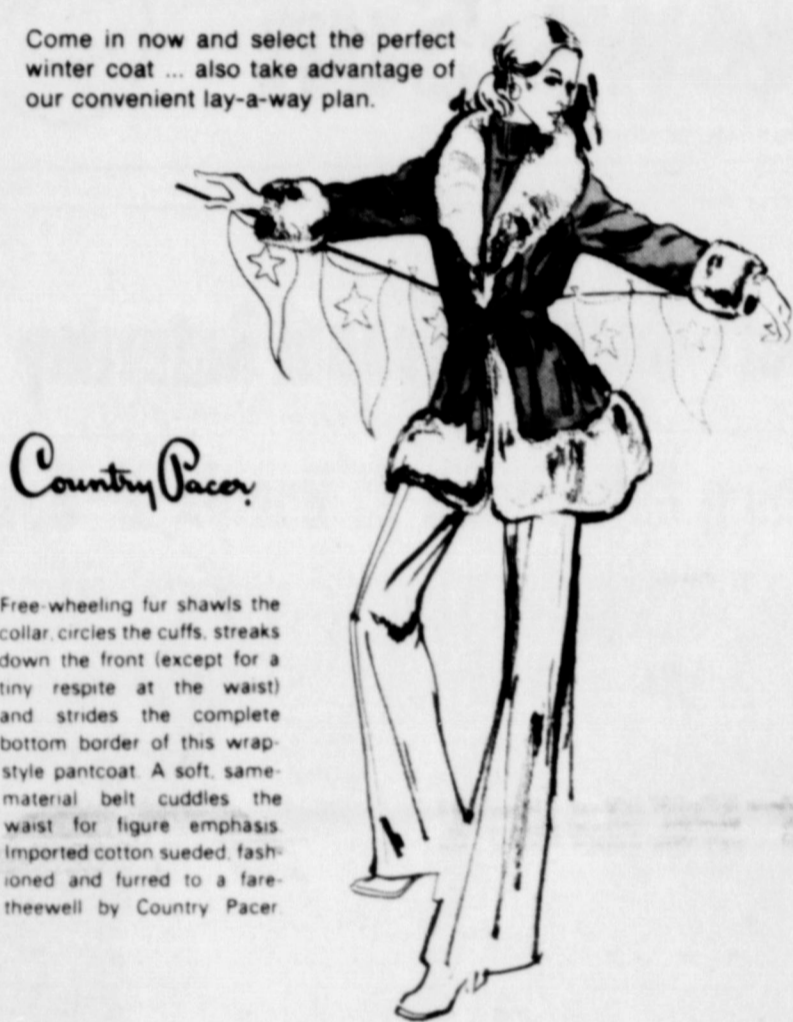

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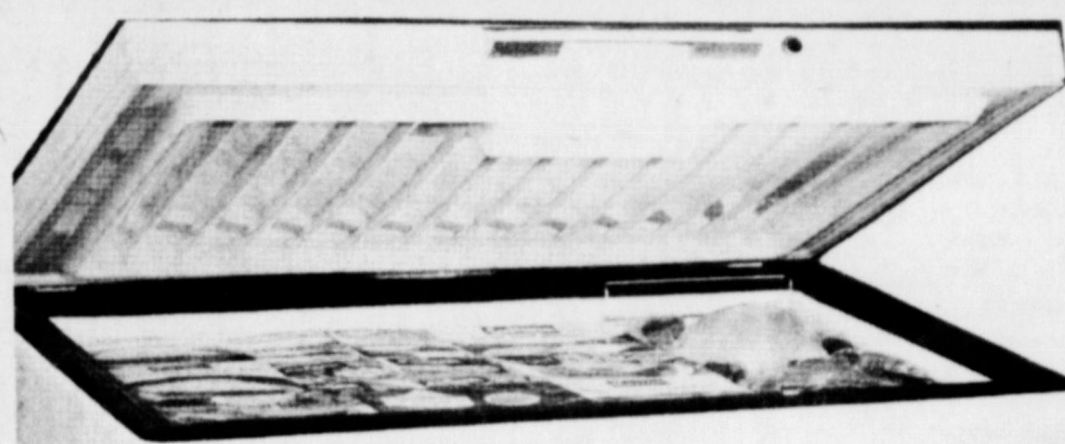

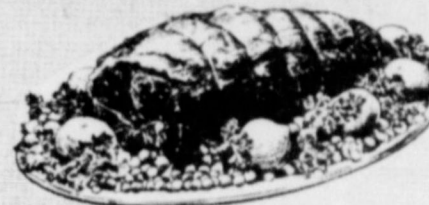
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# Longhorns Control Ball And Wolverines 9-0

On a cool windy Halloween night, the Hart Longhorns needed no pumpkin, or witches brew, or bag of tricks, instead using a rock-hard defense and a crunching ground game to all but clinch the district title as they defeated the Wolverines 9-0.

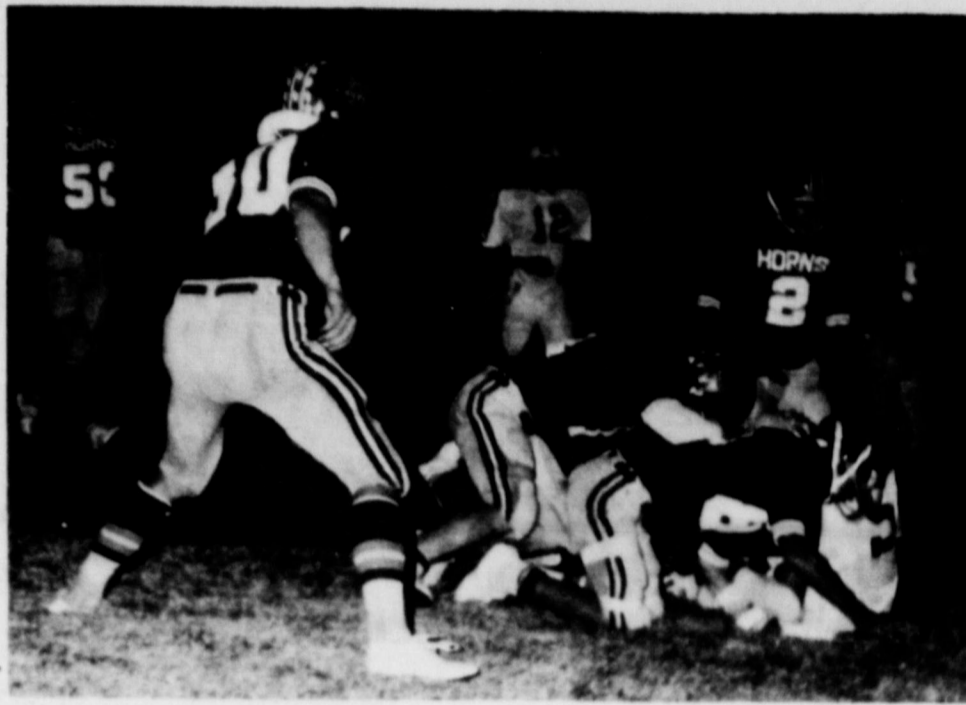
For the "Mean Green" it was the same old story, fumbles and penalties and a lack of any offensive attack until the final quarter. The defense which has carried them so often was brilliant in defeat as time and time again they stopped a supposedly vaunted attack.

The night started as if Hart would make it a runaway when the Wolverines immediately got into trouble on their first offensive series. Starting from their 23 a motion penalty and a fumble set them back at the 6. A loss of three on an option made it 3rd and forever and the Wolverines tried to catch Hart by surprise and quick kick only to have it blocked for a safety with only 1:08 gone in the game.

After an exchange of punts Hart got another chance when Furr never got control of a handoff and fumbled at his 45. Hart quickly moved to the Wolverines 34, but the drive bogged and they had to punt with Castillo punting out of bounds at the Wolverine 9.

The teams then got into a series of exchanging punts until the Wolverines got their first opportunity to score. A good rush forced a hurried punt by Castillo for only 8 yards to his 27. Furr carried the ball 3 times for a first at the Hart 17. But Brown was thrown for a 11 yard loss on first down and two straight passes were incomplete so the Wolverines tried a 45 yard field goal that was off to the right.

The Wolverines had one more chance with time running out as they went from their own 9 to the Hart 30 aided by two 15 yard penalties and a Brown to Bridges 11 yard pass. But a bad snap ruined the 47 field goal attempt and the half ended

2-0. The Longhorns decided enough was enough and so dominated the 3rd quarter that the Wolverines ran only 3 plays the whole quarter for a total of 1:15. Hart took the second half kickoff and drove in 16 plays from their 37 to the Wolverines 15. But the drive bogged when two passes fell incomplete and Brent Been broke through on 4th to throw Castillo for a 13 yard loss. But the Wolverines couldn't move and had to punt with Furr booming a tremendous 61 yard punt out of bounds on the Longhorn 16.

But Hart began using the crushing runs of Larry George, who gained 154 yards on the night, to move in for the clinching score. George started it with a 33 yard run after Furr's kick. The Longhorns used 12 plays and 5:04 to score and only faced two 3rd down plays in the drive, once at the Wolverine 31 when George got 8 and a first at the 29, and again at the Wolverine 3 when George got 2 and then scored on the next play at 11:29 of the last quarter to make it 8-0. Kerry George kicked the extra point to make it 9-0 and that's the way it ended. The Wolverines had a golden opportunity to get back into the game when Bridges recovered a Longhorn fumble at the Hart 29.

Cleavinger hit Deer with a desperation heave on 4th down at the Longhorn 12. A late hit pushed the ball to the eight. Furr gained three, but then lost 2. On 4th down Cleavinger under a heavy rush threw to Furr on an outlet pass, who eluded one tackle but the pursuit caught him at the 3.

Hart could not move and forced to punt came up with a short one to their own 44. Interference on a Brown to Bridges pass gave the Wolverines a first at the 36. But that old nemesis the penalty stopped the drive when the Wolverines were detected for clipping. A halfback pass was intercepted on the next play and the Longhorns simply ran out the clock for the victory.

The Wolverines in the second half were only able to run 19 plays and had possession for just 9 minutes as Hart was able to control the tempo and the ball with a bruising ground attack. With the win Hart now has a 7-1 record and the Wolverines fall to 5-3.

### Fertilizer Short Course Set In Dimmitt

DIMMITT—Two soil chemists and two agronomists will be featured speakers for a fertilizer shortcourse at the County Exposition Building here November 6, beginning at 7:30 p.m. The one-evening event, says Jim Valentine, Texas Agricultural Extension Service soil specialist, is of special interest to area producers needing a refresher course on plant nutrients, forage and grain fertilization and soil testing.

Dr. Charles D. Welch, head of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Soil Testing Laboratory at College Station and Valentine who heads the Extension Soil Testing Laboratory at Lubbock, will discuss fertilizing corn and sorghum and the value of soil testing.

Dr. James Supak, Extension agronomist-cotton, will take a practical look at plant nutrient carriers, and Dr. Frank Petr, Extension area agronomist at Amarillo, will discuss fertilizing small grain. Sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Panhandle Economic Program for Castro, Deaf Smith and Parmer counties, the fertilizer shortcourse is designed to

aid area producers in planning their fertilizer programs. "Topics to be discussed will be short and to the point," says Valentine. "Included will be factual information on fertilizer use practices that have been proven effective in our area." Refreshments will be provided. No fee will be charged for the shortcourse.

Rev. Watson offered to teach this course after several concerned people discussed need of the course, and asked him to teach the course.

Rev. Watson has served as counsellor for eight years with the Suicide Prevention and Crisis Intervention Center in Amarillo.

He found that a large part of the problems that youth face are a direct result of the misuse of sex. Gutter education is the only education that some of our youth receive as far as sex is concerned. Misinformation Watson believes, is a destructive force that should be combated with the whole armor of God.

Since T.V., Radio, movies, magazines and advertising medias are all vying for the minds of our youth through the idea of sex appeal. Clothing is so designed, hopefully to make one look sexy by the exposure of over sized bosoms and very

short skirts, or split up the side skirts. These exposures tend to cause frustration to the youth. Everything points to sex; yet society demands chastity for the unmarried. Confusion mounts in the minds of many. This is the purpose of the course to untangle the frustrations and confusion.

The 4-H Council re-scheduled the banquet due to numerous conflicts with the November 1 date.

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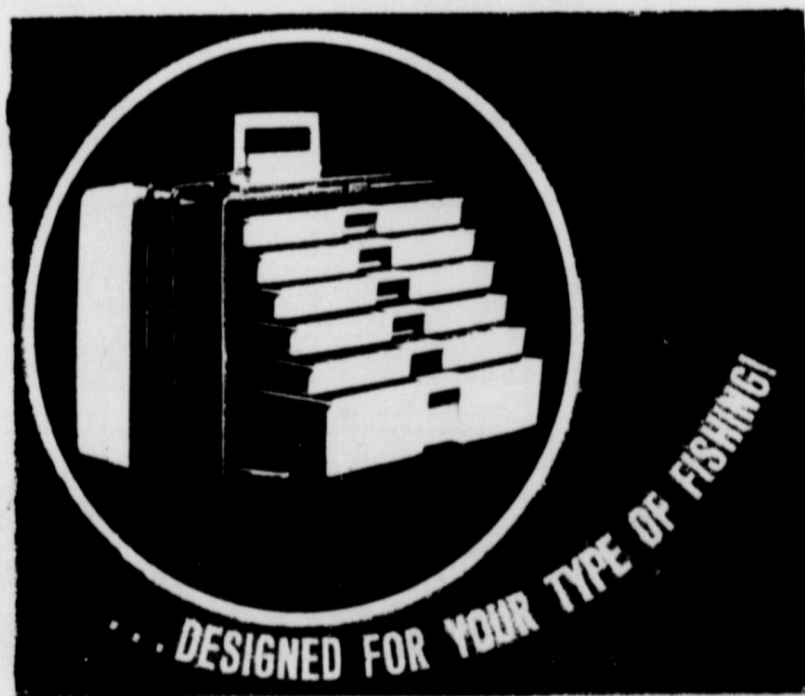
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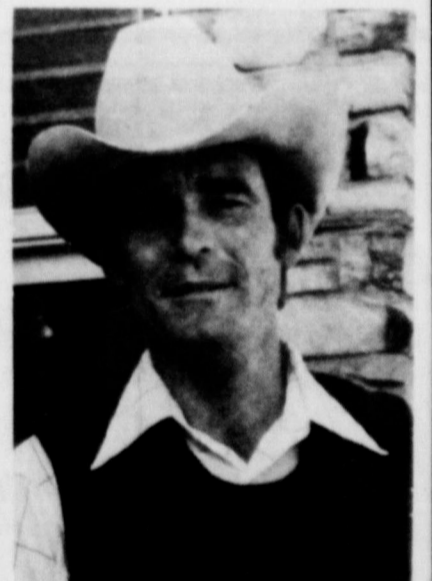
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## Peps Thanksgiving Festival Set November 27

## Mahon Pleased With Soviet Grain Agreement

Congressman George Mahon, following the announcement by the Administration of a grain sales agreement with the Soviet Union, today said:

"Although I have not had the opportunity to analyze all of the provisions of the announced agreement, I am most pleased that the suspension of grain sales to the Soviet Union has been lifted. However, the announcement of the grain agreement comes at a time when it appears that the Russians have already bought much of their requirements from sources outside the U. S. The benefits which will now accrue to the American

farmer have been greatly diminished due to the long delays in lifting the moratorium."

Concerning the 5-year agreement for an annual purchase of 6 million tons of American

grain by the Soviet Union, Mahon stated:

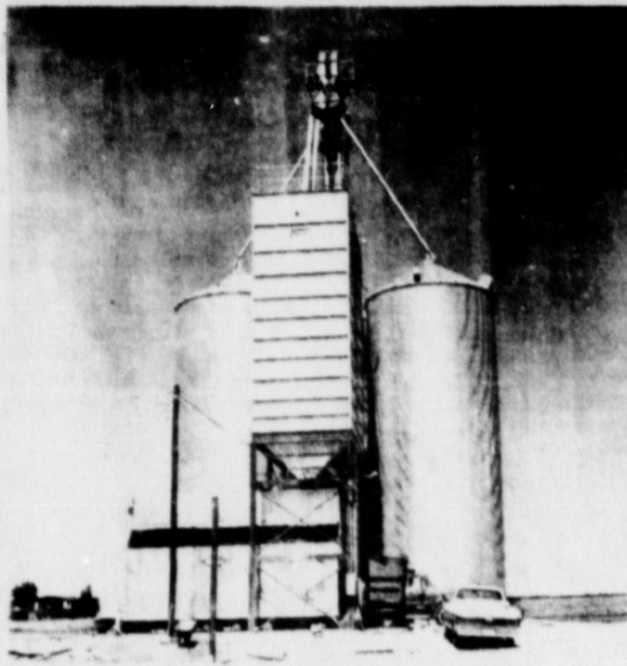
"I favor a long term grain sales agreement with the Soviet Union as long as the sales are made on the basis of the current market price at the time of the

sale."

In commenting on the purchase of Soviet oil, Mahon said:

"It appears that the agreement with respect to the annual purchase of 10 million tons of oil per year from the Soviet Union

would be in the public interest. The amount being purchased is relatively small, but could prove significant as international trade agreements are considered during the 5-year period."



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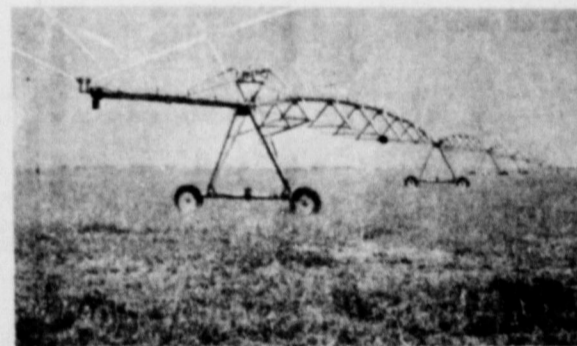
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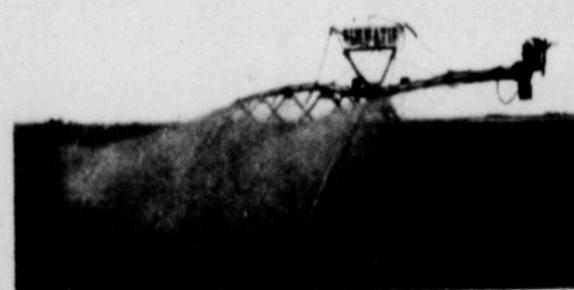
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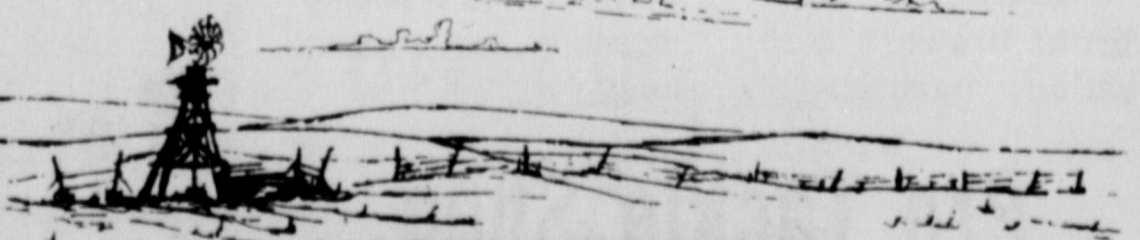

### Providing First Aid For Injured Motorist

If you are the first to arrive at the scene of a serious highway accident, you may have the responsibility of providing life-saving first aid measures to those who are seriously injured. It is a responsibility of great importance and best handled if you can keep a cool head. You literally have to do several things at once. Recruit

help from other passengers in your car or passing motorists. Ask them to send for an ambulance and police and to halt or re-route traffic so that you can carry out your first aid without further danger to the victim and yourself.

Your first priorities are: \*To prevent the victim from choking to death.

\*To restore breathing. \*To stop bleeding.

The unconscious victim should receive attention first. His airway may be blocked by blood, vomit, loose teeth or broken dentures. Inspect his mouth and throat with your fingers and remove anything that threatens to choke him. Then check to see if he is still breathing. You can tell by the movement of his chest and the sound of breathing.

If the victim is not breathing, you should immediately clear his airway and start mouth-to-mouth resuscitation. Remember that you must breathe directly into his mouth, with his head tilted backward and his nostrils pinched to prevent the escape of air. When you detect the first sign of resumption of breathing (that is, when his chest rises a little on his own) stop and see if spontaneous breathing continues. If not, breathe for him until he seems to be breathing well under his own power. Then turn him on his side so that if he starts to vomit or bleed there is less risk of choking.

Almost as urgent as the restoration of breathing is the prevention of serious blood loss through external wounds. The application of pressure is the most effective way of doing this. First apply pressure directly

with your hand, being certain you have identified the entire wound. Then, as soon as you or anyone else who has joined the rescue can find a cloth, put a thick pad over the wound and hold it in place with a bandage. You may have to use your own clothing or the patient's clothing to accomplish this. Raise the portion of the body that is bleeding, but do not use a tourniquet. If the bleeding continues, apply another pad and bandage, but do not remove the first one. There is some risk that the bandage can be applied too snugly. If the patient complains of pain or numbness in the fingers or toes of the injured arm or leg, ease the bandage slightly, but not enough so as to decrease the pressure.

Both the breathing aid and the bandaging can be done while the victim is in the car if it does not seem safe to move him. In general, do not move an injured person unless absolutely necessary. You may be forced to move him because of the risks of fire or moving traffic. At this point in the rescue it is to be hoped that others have come to your aid so that you do not have to move a victim single-handedly.

A few final safeguards in coping with highway accidents: \*Do not touch occupants or vehicles if live wires are in contact with the car.

\*Turn off the ignition of crashed cars. \*Make sure no one is smoking at the scene; spilled gasoline can ignite and compound the problems. \*Most accident victims will be suffering from some degree of shock. Keep them quiet and

protected; be as reassuring as you can; never give them alcohol. \*Get all the help you can from others in warning motorists to stay clear of the scene until the ambulance and other official vehicles arrive and take over. \*Plan ahead. Think of what YOU would do in the event of

an accident.
