## Love Gains, Deaths Up, Births Down

1973 was a love-ly year, according to Dan Cupid who stayed way ahead in the marriage versus divorce category in 1973 over 1972.

Death rate was up this past year in comparison with the year before, and there was an

other population decline in Lamb County in '73.

There were only 288 births recorded in Lamb County in 1973, compared to 365 in 1972 when there was an average of one for every day of the year. This makes the population 77

short of the previous year.

One hundred seventy nine deaths were recorded in the county this year, up 11 from 168 deaths in Lamb County in 1972.

Five more couples were married in Lamb County in 1973 than in 1972, and two more divorces were granted this past year than the one previous.

A total of 207 couples applied for a marriage license in 1973. Two hundred and two couples were married in 1972. Fifty-seven divorce decrees were granted in 1973, compared to 55 decrees in 1972.

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## Bus-Train Hearing Results In Distribution of \$379,284

A hearing Friday in the District courtroom in Littlefield resulted in the total sum of \$379,284 being awarded to families of those involved in the schoolbus-train accident. In the court order, stipulations were made that all expenses, attorney fees, medical fees and hospital bills be paid out of the recovery to the parents, and not out of the recovery set aside for the children injured in the accident.

All of the money awarded to the children is to go into trust funds. Orders for only one of the involved families had been filed in the district clerk's office Friday, but all of the orders are expected to read similar to the one filed on the Medina family.

This order stipulates that money is to be placed with the trustee bank and invested in government bonds, savings accounts, or certificates of deposit so it will earn dividends and draw interest while on deposit.

A written application by parents must be made to withdraw money, and this application must be approved by the trust department of the trustee bank and by Judge Pat Boone Jr. or his successor.

Withdrawn funds are limited to purchases for educational requirements, bus transportation, tuition and medical expenses. Using the funds for any type motor vehicle will not be allowed and is strictly forbidden.

The \$379,284 damages were apportioned to the nine families in these amounts:

To Mr. and Mrs. Larry Ortiz who had two children killed

and two injured--\$48,900 to the parents; \$27,100 net for injuries of Betty Ortiz and \$426.87 to Mickey Ortiz.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Foley, \$12,000, and \$15,000 net to Terry Foley for injuries.

Mr. and Mrs. George Davis, \$31,784 in the death of Julia Ann, and \$5,000 net to children Jennifer Leigh and \$1,500 net to Clifford.

Mr. and Mrs. Procopio Chaves, \$2,050, and \$1,450 net to Diana Cordova.

To Johnny Frausto and wife, \$49,314.63 for Diana Sue who was killed, and \$47,500 net to Deborah Lynn Frausto who was seriously injured.

Mr. and Mrs. Andreas Medina were awarded \$27,488 in the loss of their daughter Maria, and \$7,500 net each went to Ester Medina and Robert Medina for injuries.

Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Diaz received \$21,282.50 resulting from injuries to four of their children. Net amounts of \$3,375 went to each of the four, Maria Elida, Raul, Irene and Joe Jesse.

A total \$25,988 went to Mr. and Mrs. Pablo Martinez for the death of Anita Martinez and injuries to five children. Net amounts of \$3,300 went to Pablo, Geneviva, Osca, Vicente and Olga Martinez.

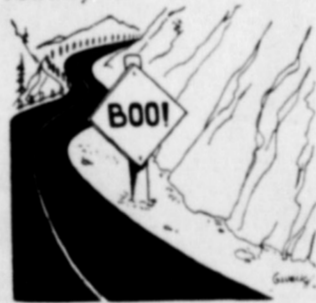

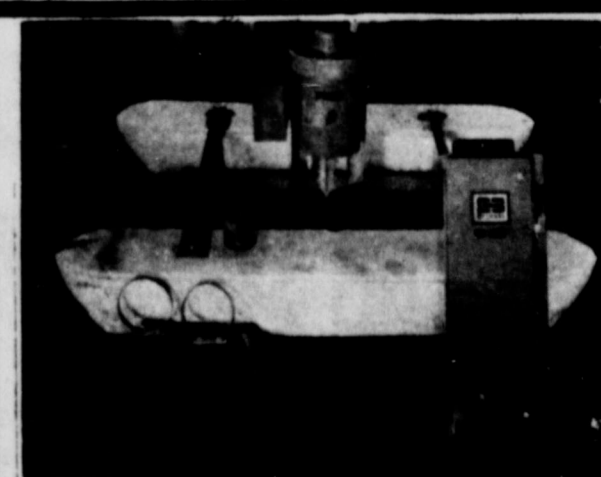

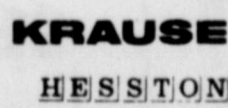
