## Group Votes For Right-of-Way Bond Election

**BULLETIN**

The State Highway Commis-  
sion announced Monday that  
the Highway Department will  
provide for widening pavement  
and its support on U. S. 70 in  
the city of Earth from near W.  
2nd St. to near the east city  
limit when financing is avail-  
able, if the city will furnish all  
necessary right of way and a-  
gree to customary municipal  
agreements.

A program endorsed by a group  
of 35 men of Springlake, Earth  
and Littlefield to obtain a bond  
election for right of way to wid-  
en highways 70 and 84, was held  
in Earth, Friday night, August 19,  
at 8:00 p.m.

The group voted to begin secur-  
ing names on a petition to be pre-  
sented to the commissioners Court  
asking that a bond election be  
called to get funds for buying  
right of way to make a four lane  
highway out of 70 and 84.

It was decided by the group to  
call for \$800,000 in the petition.  
Spokesman for the group was  
Marshall Howard of Littlefield.  
Other speakers at the meeting was  
Herschel Patterson, mayor of Earth  
and V. T. Tanner, mayor of Springlake.

## FATHER and SON REUNITED AFTER 36 YEARS

A reunion was brought about  
by a truck driver from Ruth, Miss-  
issippi who had stopped in an  
Earth cafe to eat lunch six months  
ago. And by selecting Earth to  
have lunch helped to reunite a  
father, H. G. Eagle of Earth and  
his son James Otis Eagle of Corsi-  
cana, Texas, who had not seen each  
other for 36 years.

When James Otis was 16 mon-  
ths old, his mother died and he  
made his home with his grand-  
parents.

The father, H. G. Eagle moved  
from Waxahachie, where the boy  
lived with his grandparents in Earth  
county in 1919 when James Otis  
was 8 years old. This was the  
last time father and son were to-  
gether.

In 1924, James Otis moved to  
King and Chapman Ranch at Cor-  
pus, later moving to Corsicana for  
four years and then to Mississippi  
for a period of about three years,  
and back to Corsicana where he  
is now employed with the Buile  
Implement Co.

During this time he had lost  
track of his father.

When the truck driver who was  
eating in an Earth cafe asked the  
waitress her name and she told  
him, Eagle, he mentioned knowing  
Otis Eagle in Ruth, Mississippi.

The family hoping it would be  
their son, wrote him. At that time  
he had moved back to Corsicana,  
where the letter was forwarded  
on to him. After corresponding  
they learned they were father and  
son. He immediately began plan-  
ning a trip to visit his father. But  
was delayed until this week.

When he arrived in Earth, Sat-  
urday and stopped at Earth Oil  
Company to inquire about his fa-  
ther, the father was across the  
street and saw his son and recog-  
nized him, after 36 years.

The new process uses a dust-gases from pumping and other engines found at city and industrial water treatment plants, rather than expensive pure carbon dioxide of sulphuric acid. One untrained operator can handle the process replacing from two to four operators needed for ortho-treatments, the college said. Dr. R. V. Andrews of the department of chemical engineering said some cities will be able to save from \$70,000 to \$80,000 a year in labor cost alone. The new unit will only need a fraction of the space usually required for silica treatment installations, Andrews said.

### Farmers Plan To Plant Seed Lovegrass On Eroded Land

Plans and preparations are being made to plant weeping love blue panis or sand love grass on Lamb County Soil Conservation district cooperators farms. The cooperators participating are: Roy Roberson, Zearl Young, P. E. Bennett, Dan Heard, Norman Eminger and H. H. Neunenschwander. The grass will be planted on land that can't be economically farmed without increasing the erosion hazard. The soil is either too sandy, shallow, rocky, too much slope or it has a dryland area on an irrigated field. Before the land can be revegetated, there should be a covered or high terrace crop planted to stabilize the soil and protect the young grass from high winds. The SCD cooperators plan to use these grasses for seed production and grazing which will also give a soil improving crop and a permanent cover to stabilize high erosion areas.

Soil Conservation Service technicians recommend, for best results, a cover crop of sudan or millet planted late to be killed by frost for dead cover or stubble hums. The residue should be chopped with a stalk cutter, shredder, or a tandem disc but the seedbed should be kept as firm as possible. The grass seed should be planted with a grass seed drill or a drill attachment that will not plant the seed more than one inch deep. The best planting dates for warm season grasses are from April through May. The young grass should not be grazed the first year in order to get a good root system established. Weeds can be controlled by mowing once or twice the first year.

### Weather Condition Favor Growth, Report Indicates

Weather conditions have been favorable over the area for growth and fruiting of cotton during the past week. While fruiting was generally satisfactory some very rapidly growing cotton was slow in setting squares.

Aphid infestations increased in many fields throughout the area. While some cotton showed reductions in populations due to increased beneficial insect activity, other fields had sufficient infestation to show honeydew on plants. Control applications have been made in limited areas.

Damaging fleahoppers infestations were reported in some fields of late planted cotton. In practically all cases such populations were found on cotton where insecticides had not been used.

Boilworms activity increased somewhat over last week. Heaviest infestations were reported in Dawson, Garza, Howard, Martin, Mitchell, Terry and Scurry counties. Infestations were sufficient to require control in a number of

fields in Crosby, Cochran, Haze, Lubbock and Swisher counties. Since bollworms moths are appearing in larger numbers in cotton fields and since conditions are favorable for development of the insect, frequent checks should be made for presence of eggs and small worms. As damaging infestations develop, good control can be secured when plants are thoroughly covered with proper dosages of recommended insecticides.

Lygus bugs were found in flight to occasional fairly heavy infestations on cotton in Bailey, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Garza and Lamb counties. The insects were generally found in greater numbers on cotton near alfalfa.

Cabbage loopers appear in larger numbers in many fields throughout the area. In most cases infestations were not sufficient to warrant control.

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AUSTIN, Tex. — Whether a special session of the legislature is called on school integration apparently hinges on a Texas Supreme Court decision to come.

Filed by anti-integration Texas Citizens Council in a district court at Big Spring, the suit seeks to bar payment of state funds to bi-racial schools.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard says the court decision holds the

key to whether Texas laws must be changed immediately or already integrated schools must back track. Decision by the district court can be carried directly to the Supreme Court and possibly be settled by the time school starts.

Should the court hold payment to integrated schools can be made under existing laws, there apparently would be no urgent need to change them, at least in that regard.

Sheppard said he welcomed the Big Spring suit since it promises to clear up the difficult legal situation.

Gov. Allan Shivers says he will call a special session "if necessary." He apparently was awaiting three developments:

He asked his newly formed citizens' advisory council on school integration to investigate and report to him on several questions, including the need of a special session.

He asked Sheppard to prepare an official ruling on legal questions.

And the decisions in the Big Spring court case may set up conditions to determine need of the session.

In July the Board of Education voted to continue regular payments to local districts, whether segregated or not. It left racial policy up to local officials.

Since then, some 30 districts have announced whole or partial desegregation plans.

A University of Texas student committee also has taken on the segregation problem with a poll of student opinion on acceptance of Negro students outside the classroom. Graduate courses have been open to Negroes since 1950. Regents have ordered full desegregation in September, 1956.

### KKK TALK CHALLENGED

Attorney General Sheppard's claim that efforts are underway in Texas to revive the Ku Klux Klan brought a challenge last week.

Sen. Jimmy Phillips called on Sheppard to name names, but Sheppard declined. Names will be given prosecutors and grand juries when sufficient evidence is gathered for convictions, Sheppard said.

### STATE SENATOR KILLED

Death of State Sen. Wayne W. Wagonseller of Bowie cost Texas

liberals one of their leaders. Wagonseller killed in a three-car collision in Fort Worth, was buried last week in the State Cemetery at Austin with full military honors. Services were held earlier in the Senate Chamber.

A World War II veteran, he served two terms in the House before beginning his Senate career in 1951. Friends in Tyler recently boomed him as a candidate for attorney general. He had been associated with Loyalist Democrats and had supported Ralph Yarborough in the latter's two unsuccessful races for governor.

### GILES PLEADS GUILTY

One of the biggest news breaks of last week was Bascom Giles' plea of guilty in criminal district court at San Antonio to charges in connection with a Bexar County block land deal.

Giles' guilty plea concerned charges of consenting to accept a \$30,000 bribe. He pleaded not guilty

to a third count, of accepting the bribe. The state waived this charge and Judge Buck Jones imposed a six-year prison sentence. It is to run concurrently with a three-year sentence given Giles earlier at Austin on a charge of theft of \$6,800 from the veterans' land fund.

Giles has appealed the case, which affords at least 90 days' delay in final disposition of the sentence.

Awaiting trial in San Antonio were Arthur McKenzie and C. V. Wynn, San Antonio land operators, indicted for offering the \$30,000 bribe to Giles.

Other suits now pending against the former land commissioner are a civil suit at San Antonio, seeking recovery of \$35,000, and nine additional charges in Austin, on other transactions. He also faces trial in Zavala County on another land case.

### STEVENSON REPLY AWAITED

Adlai Stevenson is slated to

speak in Austin on Sept. 28. At that time he may reply to Gov. Allan Shivers' repeated refusal to support him for president.

During the national governor's conference in Chicago, Shivers said he would again, as in 1952, refuse to support Stevenson if he were Democratic candidate for president.

Stevenson withheld comment "until I am in Texas," Shivers, he pointed out, was a "guest in Illinois."

Stevenson's Austin appearance was arranged by the University of Texas great issues committee. It is billed as "non-political." Subject of his talk will be "America, the Economic Colossus."

### TOO MUCH MONEY

Overpayment of drivers license fees has created a problem for the Department of Public Safety. DPS staffers reminded the public that increased charges voted

by the 1955 Legislature do not go into effect until September 6. At that time charges will jump from \$1 to \$2 for an operator's license, \$2 to \$3 for commercial licenses, \$3 to \$4 for chauffeurs. Meantime, the lower rates apply, and the department has quite a task returning excess money.

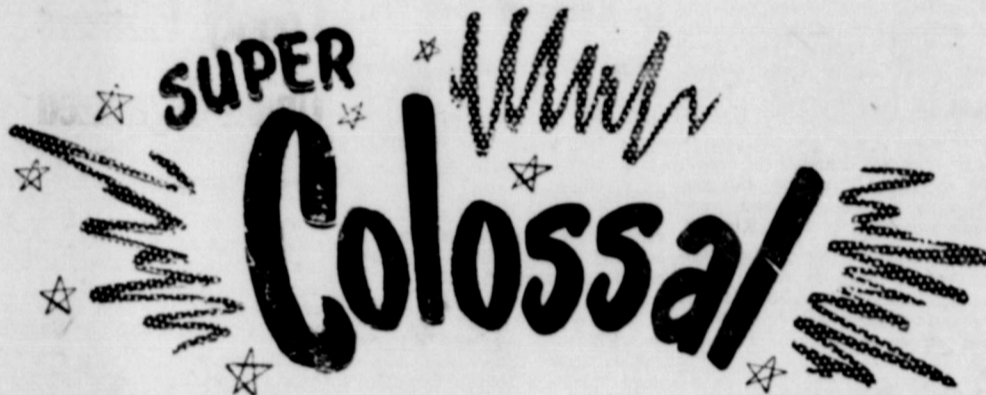

### GO DUTCH... WITH CHICKEN CORN PIE



**"KISSIN' don't last, cookery do!"**  
That's an old Pennsylvania Dutch saying. And a dish to prove the point is Chicken Corn Pie.  
Now's a good time to use golden kernels fresh from the cob, but canned corn is fine year 'round. Tender chunks of chicken, left from Sunday dinner or plunked from a can, add flavor. And a luscious sauce, smooth and "chicken-wonderful," comes ready-prepared in a can of condensed cream of chicken soup. Make pastry from your favorite recipe, or speed up the job with a prepared mix. Then the pie bakes for an hour while you attend to other tasks.  
Spicy bread 'n' butter pickles and tiny white onions are "as Dutch as chow chow" and just as tasty when served with chicken corn pie. A tossed vegetable salad of lettuce, carrot rounds, radish chips, and tomato chunks adds its bit to the dinner.  
For dessert, how about homemade ice cream? Make it with fresh cherries or peaches, and pass chocolate chip cookies to munch with it. When the family gets a taste of this scrumptious meal, they'll borrow another phrase from the Dutch and declare it's "wonderful good!"

**Dutch Style Chicken Corn Pie**  
2 small onion, chopped  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed cream of chicken soup  
1 cup diced cooked chicken  
1 cup cooked whole kernel corn  
1 package (9-ounces) pie crust mix  
or enough pastry for a 2-crust pie  
Cook onion in butter; blend with soup, chicken and corn. Roll half of pastry dough on floured board and line a 9-inch pie pan; pour in chicken filling. Roll remaining pastry into circle; place on top of filling; pinch edges together and make several slits in top to allow steam to escape. Bake in moderate oven (375° F.) about 1 hour, 7 servings.

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
