Sometime ago we were given a rate increase by the General Telephone Company in order to get the "Toll Free" hookup with the Lazbuddie Exchange. That was agreed on, and we have gone all the way paying the increase for this exchange plus a rate increase which General Telephone said was due us here in Earth anyway. This was airight with Earth, but now we find we are paying a high price for a service which is rated lower than poor service For instance, one morning two weeks ago Earth was without communication for hours. This is not uncommon to be without outside communications, that happens fairly often, but this was for the most part of a morning and this had not followed a windstorm.

When we finally did get through to an operator, she said the reason for our trouble was that the lines were locked up. (I don't Pretend to know what is meant by locked lines,) (all I could think about was our town and what would happen in case of a fire. In some areas of town a whole block would go down before aid could be summonsed by any other means other than by telephone.) This most modern means of communication is what we pay dearly for. But our expectations of service from General Telephone are dwindling lower and lower.







Inci-dentally, those who have tried evaporative egg coolers found that in high temperatures the method failed to bring egg temperatures down to 55 degrees and that humidity control was lacking. Too much relative humidity may cause mold to develop on the eggs, shrinkage, as much as 31/2 % in five to seven days.
