Hail Damage Reported in Area

Area farmers received hail damage to crops Thursday afternoon. Mr. Max Jackson manager of Co-op Gins in Earth says several farmers received hail but very little rain. He said there was hail on the J. A. Littleton Jr. place about 3 1/2 mi. north of Earth and on the Phillip Haber farm. Jerry Kelley 1 1/2 mi. north of Earth received 40 to 60% hail damage to crops with a trace of rain.

Mrs. Pete O'Hair said they received about 50% hail damage to their crops with about 1/2" of rain.

Mrs. Orville Cleavinger reported hail damage to their crops but she did not know the extent of damage. She said the hail storm did some damage to crops in the Sunnyside Community, also.

The hail damage was light in some areas while some reported heavier damage. There was a very small amount of rain reported.

There are a few unscrupulous persons who sometimes take advantage of tourists with out-of-state license plates. If your car was given a clean bill of health before you left, you can better evaluate warnings about faulty fuel pumps, air filters, batteries etc.
- Take traveler's checks or use credit cards, and keep a list of your credit card numbers in a safe spot.

Things to do Before Leaving for Vacation

Vacation bound? There's a chance you might also be heading for trouble if you haven't taken certain precautions before leaving home.

Law enforcement experts and our Consumer Protection Division attorneys say that what is vacation time for most folks is working time for many burglars, pickpockets, and con men.

They suggest that you plan in advance to burglar-proof your home and to guard against possible thefts or consumer frauds on your trip. While the number of such occurrences is small compared to the number of vacationers, it only takes one bad experience to ruin a trip.

Here's a list of things to check before you leave:

- Stop mail, newspaper, and other deliveries.
- Tell a neighbor or your apartment manager that you will be gone and ask them to keep an eye on the place.
- Leave a few lights on or buy an automatic timer to turn certain lights on and off each evening.
- Cut your lawn just before leaving, and if you will be gone a long time, have someone cut it while you're away.
- Check all windows and doors to make sure they are locked. A sliding glass patio door can be more securely fastened by wedging a stick at the top or bottom of the door.
- Check with your local police if you plan an extended vacation. Many forces offer a "close patrol" of homes where persons are away. If your police force does, you will need to tell them what cars or persons, if any, will be making authorized visits to your house.
- Have your telephone put "on vacation." Your callers will be told that the telephone has been temporarily disconnected at your request, and you can have them referred to another number if you wish.
- Before leaving, engrave all valuables in your home and those you will be taking with you in the car with your driver's license or social security number. Some police forces will loan you an engraver to mark your belongings and will register your number on their master list. This may discourage burglars from taking your goods and can make identification of recovered stolen goods much simpler.
- After taking precautions to secure your home from burglars

pickpockets, use the inside coat pocket or a money belt.

- Women should select a purse with a secure clasp or a zipper and keep a hand over the opening when carrying it.
- Don't wear unusually expensive or flashy jewelry or display large rolls of bills.
- Never boast of wealth or possessions or tell strangers your home town or address.
- Check valuables at your hotel desk for safekeeping.

You could be taken advantage of in more subtle ways, too. Many people spend large amounts of their money on vacation souvenirs without examining them carefully. Many souvenir items are cheaply made, over-priced, and of little or no practical value. Try to set a limit on the amount of money you spend on things you are likely to throw away or put in a closet later.

The Boy Scouts of Troop 614 placed a flag on the graves of each veteran buried in the local cemetery.

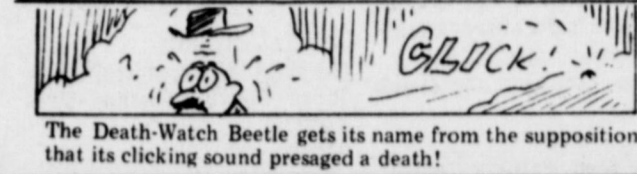
Mrs. Abe Griffin, Secretary, read minutes of the previous Memorial Day Service in '73. Directors are Ernest Green,

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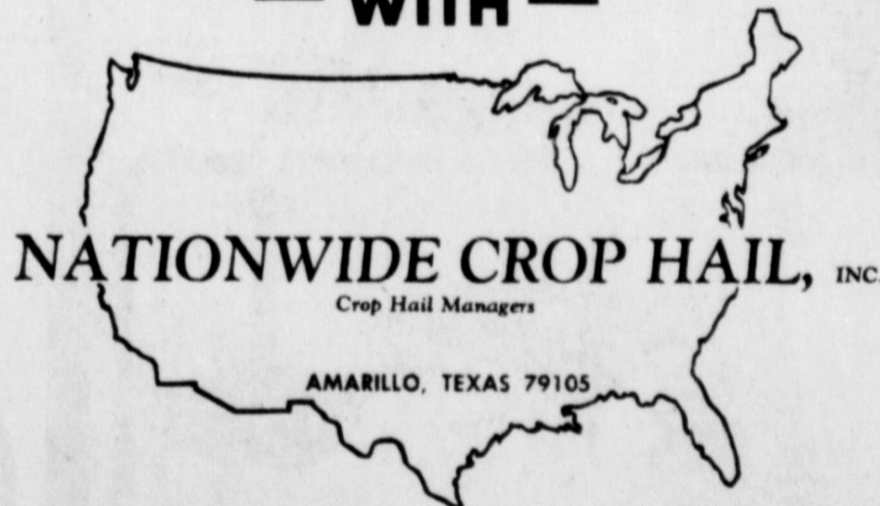


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Fullinwider - Lewis Vows Exchanged May 25

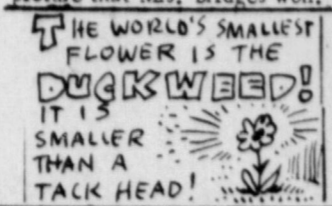

Rev. and Mrs. Walter G. White and children of Munday will be moving to Earth to minister to the local church here. Rev. White will preach his first sermon here on June 16.

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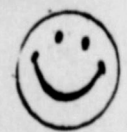

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Cotton is "King" Again

For those who have predicted the demise of cotton in recent years, 1973 proved that the crop is once again "king."

Past years of over supply, low prices led to many speculations that the cotton industry was going downhill. But in 1973 cotton again came into its own, especially in Texas where a record \$1.2 billion crop was harvested. The crop of 4.68 million bales was the largest since 1965.

And the demand was there, so prices jumped to an all-time high.

"For 1974, strong demand again appears evident and the new farm program is encouraging plantings at near capacity. This should lead to another banner year for cotton producers," speculates Charles Baker, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Producers can generally look for lint cotton to average about 55 cents a pound."

Despite earlier projections of a 16 million bale crop in the United States, a production of 14 million bales seems more reasonable to Baker due to shortages and increased costs of labor, fertilizer, machinery, fuel and other inputs.

"And with only a fraction of the crop contracted to date, cotton mills will be competing strongly for 1974 cotton. Stocks of some medium and long staple cotton will be tight before this year's crop hits the market," believes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Carryover stocks are expected to be only 3.8 million bales by August 1, a level considered too low by cotton mills to assure price stability at a low level. With both foreign and domestic

SECTION 4: The provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable and if any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of any part. Any signs located or erected shall be with State Highway specifications.

SECTION 5: Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) and not more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) and each and every day this ordinance is violated shall constitute a separate offense.

over stocks were a record 16 million bales in 1965.

"The cotton picture has brightened some as the demand in natural fibers has been strengthened due to the current energy situation. Shortages of petrochemicals and other inputs have forced synthetic fibers into tight supply, thus stealing much of their competitive clout. However, should energy problems generate an overall slowdown in the textile industry, then cotton will also suffer," points consumption estimated at 13.25 million bales and a 14 million bale crop in prospect, carryover through 1975 will continue at a low level. In contrast, carry-over Baker.

Foreign demand should continue strong due to petrochemical shortages and the fact that many foreign countries are directing their resources to food production rather than the production of fiber.

"So, the overall picture looks bright," believes the economist. "Of course, weather conditions can make a big difference in the final output. A general rain is needed across Texas to get the young crop off to a good start in southern and central areas and to provide planting moisture in West Texas and the High and Rolling Plains."

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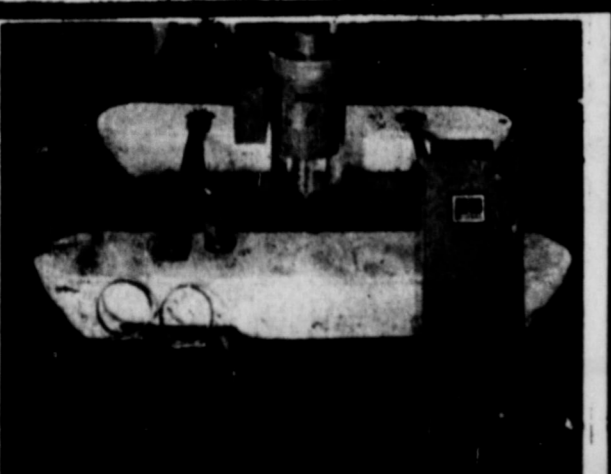
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Scouts Collect \$112 from Fines in Earth

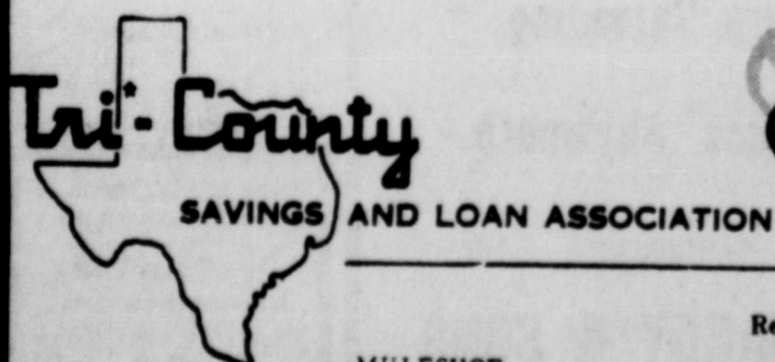
