Mr. Irrigation Farmer have you considered these things, the complications and increased costs involved in a lowering water table? If so, you cannot fail to be greatly disturbed. Your income, and the economy of your entire community and county, are threatened.

We hope you will get even more disturbed, even get agitated. Who knows but that you, yourself might have an idea about this crisis that would help to solve it. And please remember: The Japs hit us a terrific blow at Pearl Harbor, but we won the last battle.
